SCHEDULE NOTES

-The Huskers have 13 of the top-25 team finishers from last year's NCAA Championships on their 2018-19 schedule. NU will make road trips to both Penn State and Ohio State this season. The Nittany Lions are the defending national champions while the Buckeyes were national runner-up last season.

-Nebraska has seven home duals on the docket this season, beginning with the "Pepsi Pack the House Night" in its first Big Ten dual against the Wisconsin Badgers on Nov. 16. This dual will begin at 8 p.m. at the Devaney Center with television coverage by the Big Ten Network.

-In addition to the dual against Wisconsin, which will also be on BTN, the six other home duals will be available for streaming on BTN Plus (subscription only).

-NU is set to bring the full team to three open tournaments this season (Daktronics Open, Northeast Duals, Cliff Keen Invitational). Redshirts and non-starters will also compete at additional open tournaments that will be announced at a later date.

-The Big Ten Championships will take place at Maturi Pavilion in Minneapolis, Minn., March 9-10. Seeding for the Big Ten Championships is determined by pre-seeds and finalized at the coaches' meeting ahead of the tournament. A double-elimination tournament will be held at each weight, with the top team finisher being determined by tournament scoring. The first rounds, quarterfinals and consolation rounds will be held in Session I on March 9, while the quarterfinals, consolation second rounds and semifinals will be held in Session II on that same day. Session III will consist of the consolation semifinals and seventh-place matches on March 10, with the finals, third-place and fifth-place matches being contested in Session IV.

THIS IS NEBRASKA

The Nebraska wrestling program continues its excellence both on and off the mat. Coach Mark Manning has continued a tradition of success in his 18 years at the helm of the Huskers. With hard work and a dedication to excellence, Manning has developed a program that consistently competes with the nation's best in collegiate wrestling.

Since its inaugural season in 1910-11, Nebraska has earned more than 700 dual victories, including 234 wins in the past 18 years under Manning. Over the past 18 years, the Huskers have finished in the top 10 at the NCAA Championships nine times and racked up 49 All-America honors, including five individual national titles. In the classroom, NU wrestlers have earned 60 NWCA All-Academic Team selections en route to seven CoSIDA Academic All-America awards.

One reason NU has been able to develop such a successful program is its top-notch facilities. In the fall of 2011, the Husker wrestling program moved into the state-of-the-art Hendricks Training Complex, which provides three full-sized practice mats, office suites and areas for both strength and conditioning and athletic medicine. The Hendricks Complex is attached to the Devaney Center, which hosts the majority of Nebraska's duals this season. With a wealth of support and a history of success, Nebraska wrestling expects to contend for conference and national championships every year.

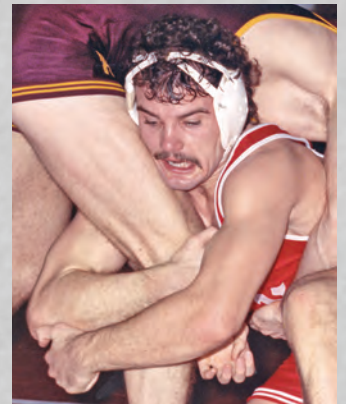
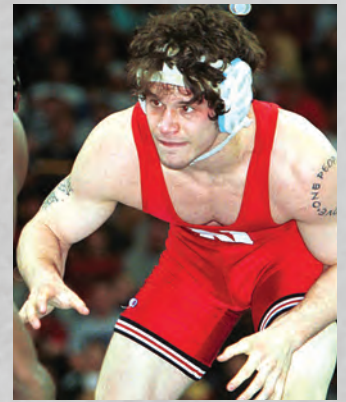

SUCCESS BEYOND WRESTLING

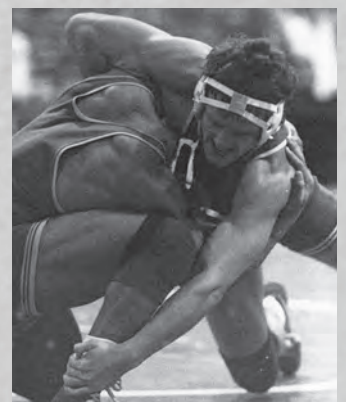

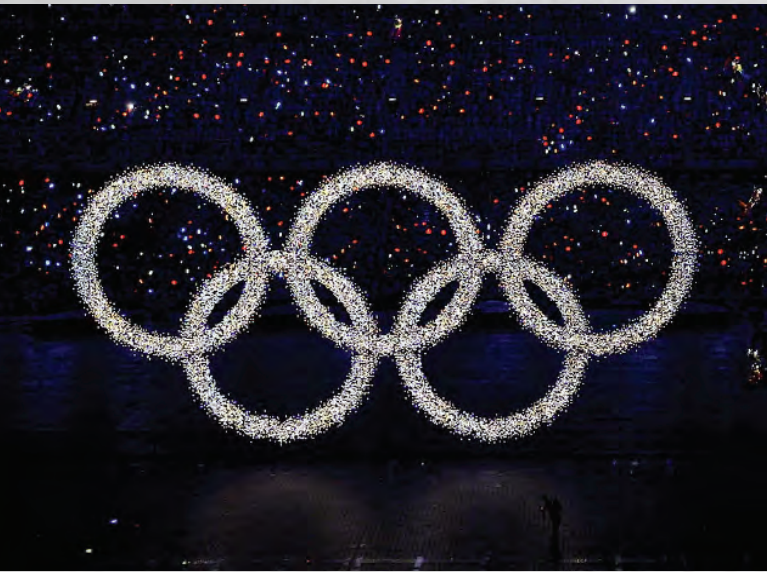

OLYMPIC GLORY

Nebraska wrestling has climbed its way into the Olympic spotlight during the past several Olympics. Former Huskers who have continued their careers on the international stage include 2012 freestyle gold medalist and 2016 Olympian Jordan Burroughs and two-time Olympic medal-winner Rulon Gardner, who won a gold medal in 2000 and a bronze in 2004 in Greco-Roman. Overall, seven Nebraska wrestlers have participated on eight U.S. Olympic teams and claimed six medals.

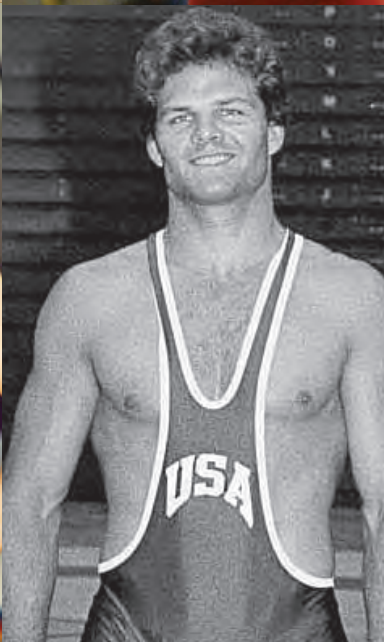

A three-time All-American and two-time national champion for Nebraska, Jordan Burroughs (top) won the gold medal in freestyle at 163 pounds at the 2012 Olympics in London. He also wrestled at the 2016 Games in Rio.

A 1993 All-American at heavyweight for Nebraska, Rulon Gardner (middle) pulled off one of the most remarkable upsets in sports history with his victory over previously undefeated Alexander Karelin of Russia in the gold medal match in the 2000 Olympics in Sydney, Australia. Gardner also earned a bronze medal in the 2004 Olympics in Athens, Greece.

Matt Lindland (bottom) was a 1993 Big Eight champion for Nebraska and went on to earn a silver medal at the 2000 Olympics in Sydney, Australia. He is currently the head coach of the U.S. Greco-Roman team.

INTERNATIONAL EXCELLENCE



Numerous Nebraska wrestlers have continued their careers on the international stage after their time at NU. Most recently, Jordan Burroughs and James Green medaled at the 2017 World Championships last summer in Paris, France, helping the United States to its first team title at the World Championships since 1995. Burroughs took the title at 74 kg, his fourth World Championships gold, while Green finished second at 70 kg to earn his second World medal. The pair also helped the United States to its first World Cup title since 2003, going a combined 7-1 at the 2018 UWW Freestyle World Cup in Iowa City, Iowa for a Team USA that also featured Nebraska Assistant Coach Kendric Maple.

Huskers have won 21 medals at the World Championships, including titles by Bill Scherr in 1985, Rulon Gardner in 2001 and Burroughs in 2011, 2013, 2015 and 2017. Burroughs is the second American wrestler to win four World gold medals in freestyle, joining John Smith. Green also medaled for the United States in 2015, when he took bronze in freestyle at 70 kg. Brad Vering was named the 2007 Greco-Roman Wrestler of the Year by USA Wrestling after his silver-medal performance at the 2007 World Championships.

Jordan Burroughs (top left) and James Green (top right) were members of the 2017 USA Wrestling World Championships team that took the team title for the first time since 1995, thanks in large part to the efforts of Burroughs and Green. Burroughs defeated Khetik Tsabolov at 74 kg to claim his fourth world title after winning in 2011, 2013 and 2015, while Green took silver at 70 kg after winning bronze in 2015.

Justin Ruiz (middle-left), a two-time All-American for the Huskers, earned a bronze medal in the 2005 World Championships in Budapest, Hungary.

Tolly Thompson (middle-right) claimed a national title for Nebraska in 1995 and was a three-time All-American before going on to earn a bronze medal at the 2005 World Championships.

After winning national titles at Nebraska in 1984, the Scherr brothers, Bill (bottom left) and Jim (bottom right) continued their wrestling careers by winning seven medals between them at the World Championships, including a title by Bill in 1985.

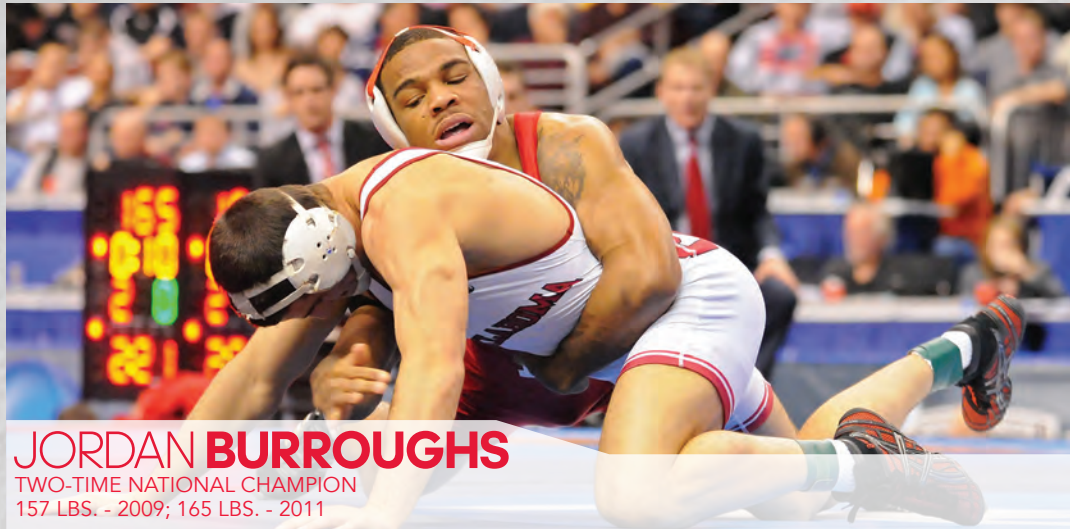
NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

One of the nation's premier wrestling programs, Nebraska has produced 11 national champions, including five in the last 18 years. Husker wrestlers have earned 108 All-America honors, including 83 awards since 1990 and 49 since Coach Mark Manning took the reins of the program in 2000-01.

Top Right: Jordan Burroughs became Nebraska's first two-time national champion in 2011 at 165 pounds after winning the 157-pound title in 2009.

Middle: Heavyweight Tolly Thompson won the 1995 national title with an 8-0 major decision over Northern Iowa's Justin Greenlee. The Nebraska record holder for career wins, Thompson was a three-time Big Eight champion and All-American.

Bottom Left: Jason Powell capped his illustrious career as a three-time All-American, including a 125-pound national championship as a senior in 2004. Powell, who ended his career 109-24, took third in 2003 and fifth in 2002 before becoming the first national champion coached by Mark Manning at Nebraska.



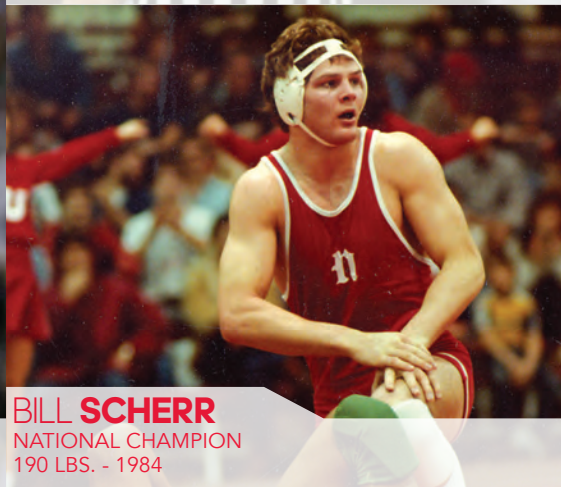

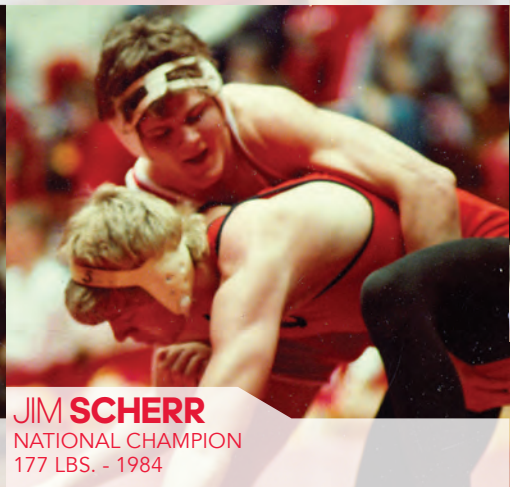

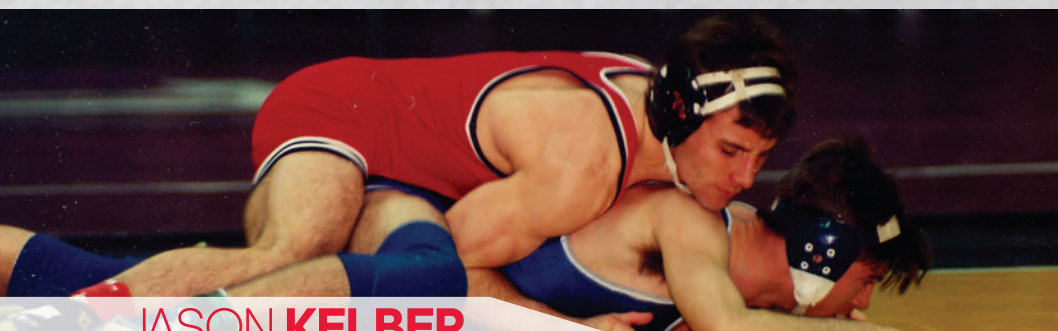

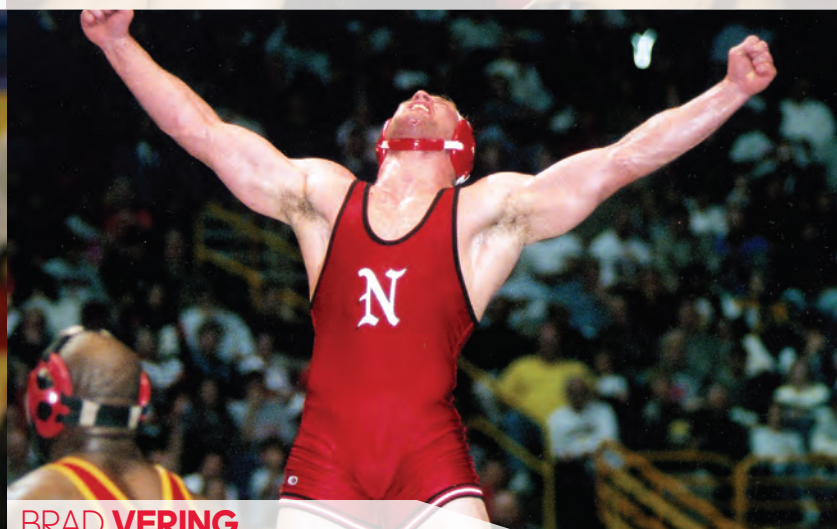

Top Left: Jason Kelber (top left) led the Huskers to a 10th-place NCAA finish in 1991 with his national title at 126 pounds. He finished 32-2 as a senior, defeating Terry Brands in the NCAA final. Kelber's son, Jordan, is a freshman for the Huskers this season.

BOB DEVANEY SPORTS CENTER



Nebraska Wrestling has hosted nearly all of its home duals at the Bob Devaney Sports Center since moving there from the NU Coliseum in 2013-14.

The Huskers ranked eighth nationally in home attendance during the 2016-17 season according to The Open Mat with an average of 1,948 fans over eight home duals, which included a season-high of 2,373 against second-ranked Penn State. In 2015-16, NU set a program record for highest attendance in a season with a total of 13,248 fans. NU also set a school record on Jan. 24, 2016 for most fans at a home dual when 3,952 watched the Huskers face Iowa at the Devaney Center.

In addition to hosting duals, the Devaney Center and Hendricks Training Complex house the wrestling offices, locker room, weight room and wrestling room, all just steps from each other, providing an atmosphere conducive to elite training. The Hendricks Complex, which is connected to the Devaney Center, includes a practice facility, coaches' offices as well as strength and conditioning and athletic medicine areas.

Top: The Devaney Center has received more than \$20 million in renovations to make the nearly 8,000-seat arena one of the best home atmospheres in the nation.

HENDRICKS TRAINING COMPLEX



The Nebraska wrestling program experienced some major facility improvements in the fall of 2011, starting with the addition of the Hendricks Training Complex.

The Hendricks Training Complex provides three full-sized practice mats, office suites and areas for both strength and conditioning and athletic medicine attached to the Bob Devaney Sports Center. The facility was completed in October of 2011.

Top: The Husker wrestling locker room features 40 custom-made lockers with back-lit displays.

Middle: The Hendricks Complex features a 5,000-square foot strength complex, that includes five Transformers, which are unique to Nebraska. The Transformers are fully automated, which helps student-athletes reach optimal training.

HEAD COACH MARK MANNING



The all-time winningest wrestling coach in program history, Nebraska Head Coach Mark Manning enters his 19th season as the head coach of the Huskers in 2018-19. Since 2000, Manning's squads have racked up a total of 234 dual wins, nine top-10 NCAA finishes and one conference championship. Under Manning, Husker wrestlers have won four national championships and 49 All-America awards. Manning continues to coach freestyle wrestlers and former Huskers Jordan Burroughs and James Green, leading the pair to a combined eight Olympic and World Championship medals.

Nebraska's strength and conditioning has long been at the forefront of college athletics. Under the direction of Boyd Epley, Nebraska has a staff of 14 strength coaches, who create personalized strength and conditioning programs for Husker student-athletes. The strength and conditioning center at the Hendricks Training Complex (pictured above) is just steps away from the wrestling room and locker room.



LIFE SKILLS EXPERIENCE

The Husker Life Skills program allows student-athletes to continue their development and impact lives in the community. In 2017-18, Husker student-athletes, including Brian Peska pictured above right on the No Filter trip to Panama, completed more than 400 outreach activities while volunteering more than 7,500 hours to impact approximately 35,000 people in Nebraska communities.

SPORTS NUTRITION LEWIS TRAINING TABLE

Husker student-athletes have ample places to dine, as the Lewis Training Table is open extended hours for meals, while the North Stadium and Hendricks Training Complexes have areas for supplements for recovery after workouts or for snacks throughout the day. Nebraska's three full-time sports dietitians work with the Lewis Training Table manager and executive chef to plan and prepare meals to help maximize performance for student-athletes. Nebraska's individual nutritional counseling focuses on performance nutrition strategies, hydration, quality food choices and proper supplementation to help student-athletes reach their full potential.



ATHLETIC MEDICINE: CARING FOR HUSKERS

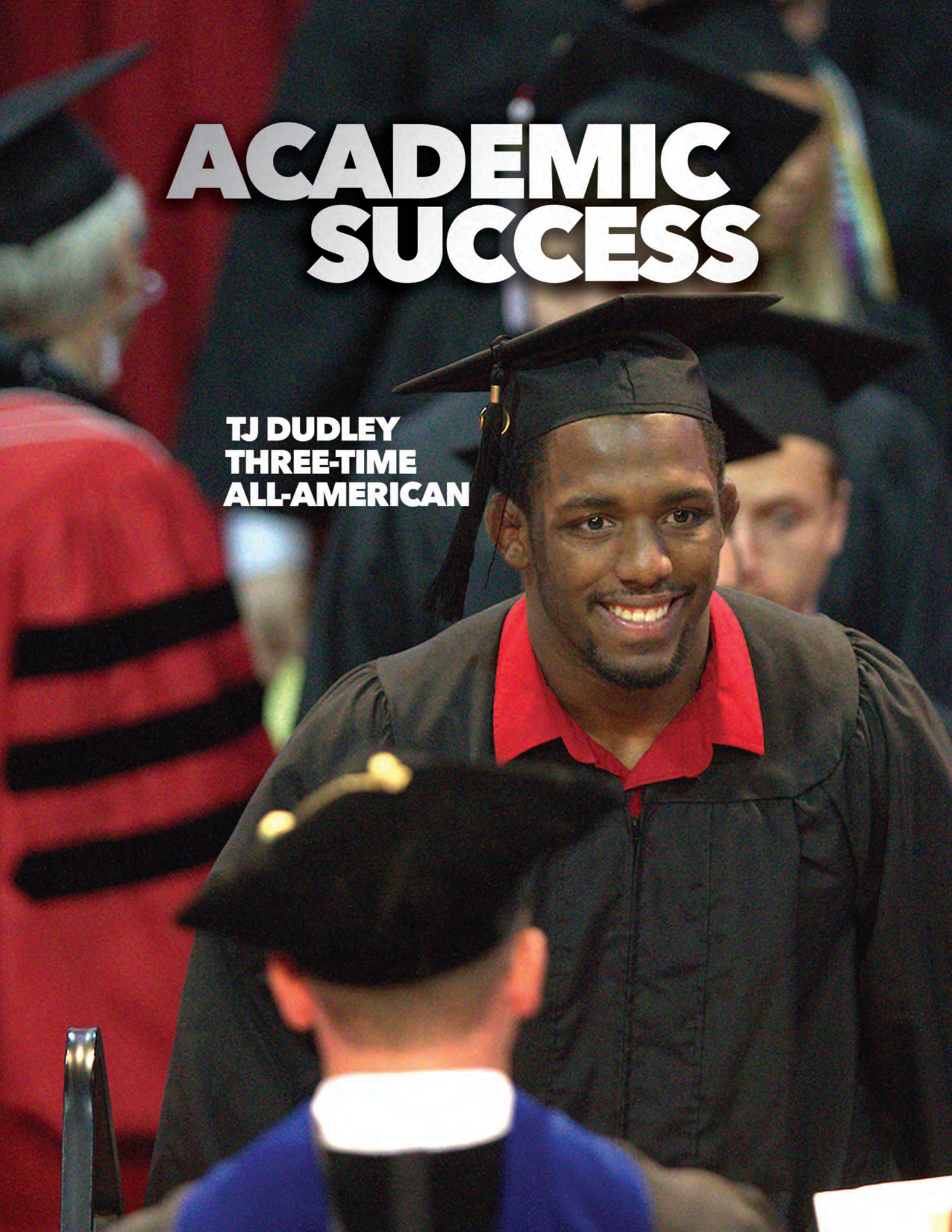
Nebraska's Athletic Medicine facilities rank among the nation's best, while one of the most experienced medical staffs in the nation care for all Husker student-athletes. Nebraska's medical team consists of 13 full-time athletic trainers and eight graduate assistant trainers, led by Associate Athletic Director Dr. Lonnie Albers (kneeling far left), Head Athletic Trainer and Physical Therapist Jerry Weber and Head Football Athletic Trainer Mark Mayer. A full staff of orthopaedists is also available to the Huskers, led by Dr. Richard Dugas (pictured back in white). The Husker Athletic Medicine team also includes a full-time, in-house athletic psychologist, and sports psychiatry consultants who work directly with Husker student-athletes.

In August of 2014, the NCAA Division I Board of Directors restructured the way member institutions and conferences, including the Big Ten, govern themselves. Nebraska has a great history and tradition of providing unmatched benefits and support to student-athletes. However, this change in governance, and subsequent legislation, paved the way for Nebraska to enhance the benefits and experiences for student-athletes. A few examples of these enhanced benefits are:

- All scholarship student-athletes across all sports have their scholarship calculated based on the full cost of attendance.
- Each student-athlete is offered an Apple MacBook Air laptop computer to enhance their learning opportunities.
- Nebraska has increased resources and support in all academic and performance related areas including but not limited to Academic Services, Life Skills, Athletic Medicine, Athletic Training, Strength and Conditioning, Nebraska Athletic Performance Laboratory, Nutrition and Dining Services (Training Table) and Sports Analytics.
- Nebraska created the first-known Post-Eligibility Opportunity (PEO) program, where every student-athlete graduate who has exhausted their athletic eligibility has the opportunity to pursue (with Nebraska support) an internship, participate in a study abroad program or attend graduate school at UNL or UNMC.

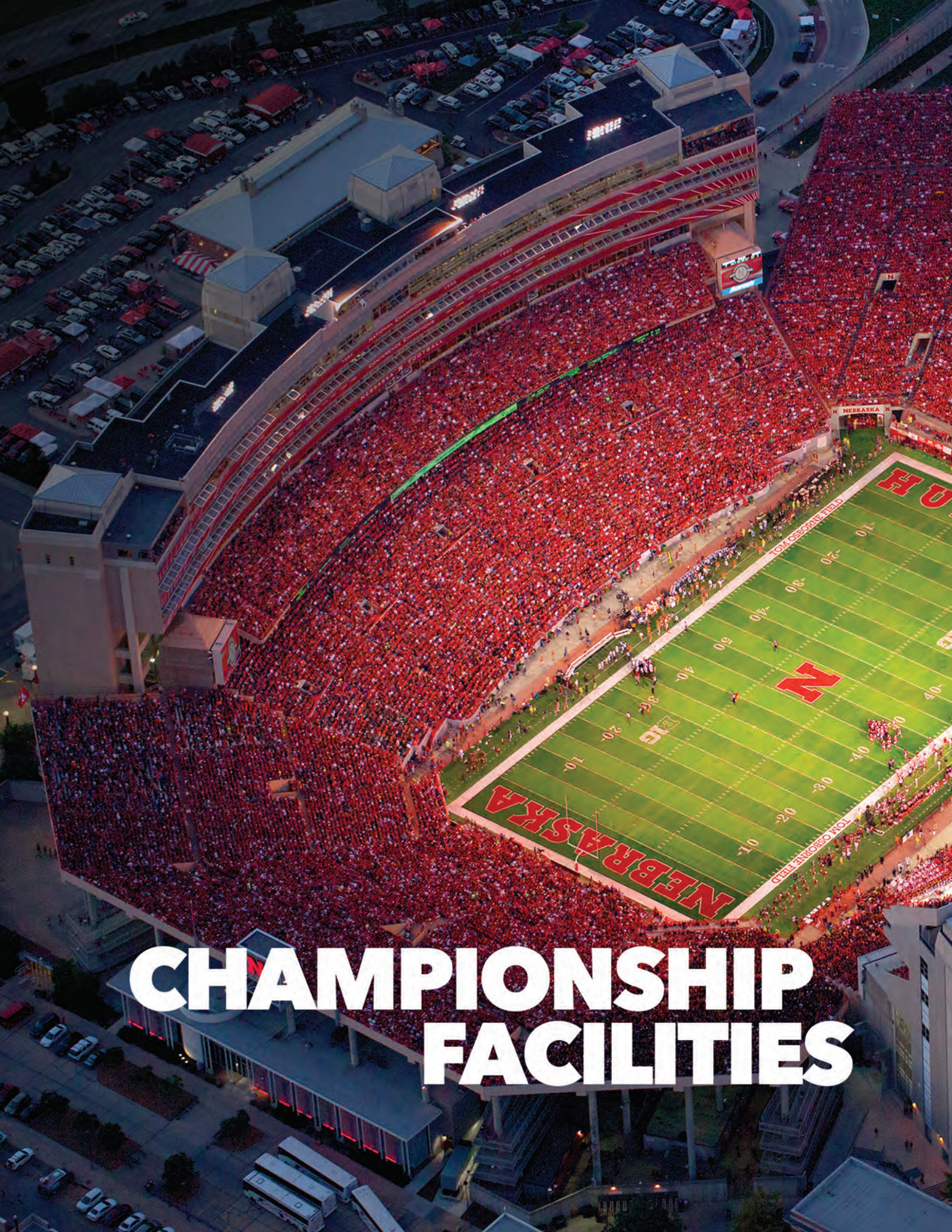

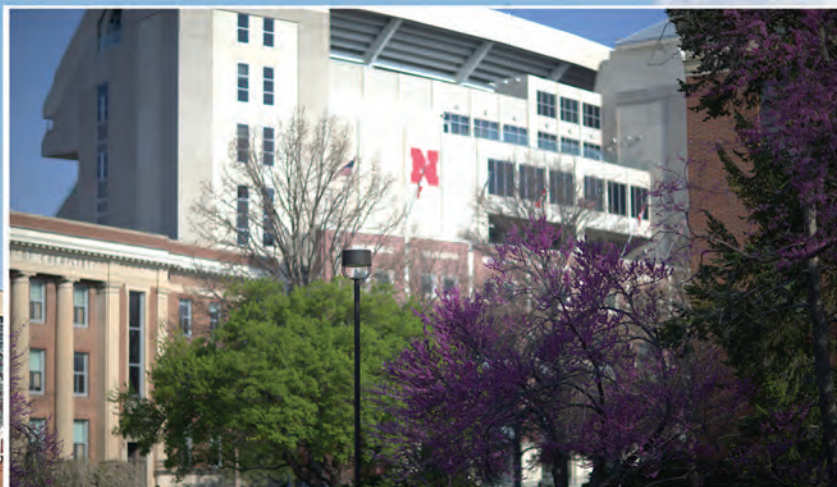

THE UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA

The University of Nebraska was chartered by the Nebraska Legislature in 1869 as the state's public university and land-grant institution. Founded in Lincoln, the University of Nebraska was expanded in 1968 into a state educational system now comprising four campuses under the guidance of a Board of Regents and a central administration. Nebraska, which joined the Big Ten Conference in 2011, is a member of the Big Ten Academic Alliance, a consortium of Big Ten universities and the University of Chicago, which has generated unique opportunities for students and faculty by sharing expertise, leveraging resources and collaborating on programs.

BIG TEN ACADEMIC ALLIANCE

As a member of the Big Ten, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL) is a member of the Big Ten Academic Alliance (BTAA), formerly the Committee on Institutional Cooperation, which is the academic consortium of the universities in the Big Ten Conference. The consortium was renamed on June 29, 2016. The BTAA includes all 14 Big Ten Institutions and the University of Chicago. The Big Ten Academic Alliance and the institutions together have annual research expenditures topping \$10.2 billion — more than the Ivy League and the University of California System combined — and they educate a total of nearly 600,000 students with approximately 50,000 full-time faculty members.

MARK MANNING
HEAD COACH | 19TH SEASON

With nearly 100 years of history, Nebraska wrestling is one of the most storied programs in the collegiate wrestling ranks. Head Coach Mark Manning has taken the Huskers to new heights in his tenure and has established himself as one of the top wrestling coaches in the nation.

The NU record book is a testament to Manning's accomplishments in Lincoln. In his 18 years at the helm, he has coached 49 of Nebraska's 108 All-Americans. He has led the Huskers to six top-eight finishes at the NCAA Championships, compared to just eight for the 14 NU coaches before him. He became the winningest coach in school history on Feb. 21, 2015 when he picked up his 200th win at Nebraska. He won back-to-back Big 12 Coach-of-the-Year awards (2008 and 2009) after guiding Nebraska to a share of the conference crown in 2009 and a runner-up finish in 2008. Manning has also guided five wrestlers to a total of four individual NCAA championships.

Manning earned one of the top coaching honors in the entire sport when he was named the 2011 FILA Freestyle Coach of the Year by USA Wrestling after helping Jordan Burroughs capture the gold medal at the World Championships in Istanbul, Turkey. In 2015, Manning received the honor for a second time, as Burroughs earned another world title and a spot on the U.S. Olympic Team. Burroughs reached the pinnacle of the sport, earning Olympic gold in 2012, while winning world titles in 2011, 2013, 2015 and 2017 with Manning in his corner. Manning has also overseen the growth of James Green, who earned world bronze in 2015 and silver in 2017. Manning and Nebraska Associate Head Coach Bryan Snyder were honored as the Terry McCann Award winners as USA Wrestling's Freestyle Co-Coaches of the Year in 2017 for their accomplishments.

Records go on paper and in books and get tucked away. More important to Manning is the fact that he has helped numerous young men grow into upstanding adults by teaching them the correct principles of life. Regarded as one of the nation's top recruiters, Manning has a keen eye for finding the athletes with the right work ethic and dedication that he can develop.

Manning's coaching philosophy is one that he began during his competitive days, developed during his time as an assistant coach and continues to modify during his time as head coach at Nebraska. It focuses on developing wrestlers to reach their potential. A wrestler who brings a positive attitude and work ethic to the room can use goal setting and responsibility to develop into an upstanding citizen who is committed to excellence. Manning works daily with the team on every detail in and out of practice, while keeping in mind the best long-term interests of his student-athletes.

Known for his fiery nature on the edge of the mat, Manning instills in his wrestlers a sense of determination and pride through his actions and demeanor. His guidance teaches his athletes to become winners in life, which translates into success in the classroom, on the mat and in their lives beyond wrestling.

In addition to their success on the mat, Husker wrestlers under Manning have earned 116 academic all-conference selections, including 75 Academic All-Big Ten awards during Nebraska's first seven seasons in the conference. In 2012, Nebraska turned in the nation's best team grade-point average (3.46). Manning's beliefs and values in developing student-athletes are evident right outside his office, where Snyder, a former Husker All-American, is a member of the NU staff.

MANNING'S MARK AT NEBRASKA

Manning began teaching his methods immediately when he was hired at Nebraska in May of 2000. His efforts first paid dividends when he led Nebraska to back-to-back eighth-place team finishes at the NCAA Championships in 2001 and 2002. Four Huskers (Snyder, Todd Beckerman, Ati Conner and Brad Vering) claimed All-America honors in Manning's first year coaching the Huskers in 2000-01, as NU finished with an 11-6 dual record. Powell and Snyder also gave Manning his first two Big 12 Conference champions that year.

During the 2001-02 season, Manning led the Huskers to their third consecutive third-place finish at the Big 12 Championships. Justin Ruiz and Powell earned their first All-America accolades under Manning, while Snyder became Nebraska's first four-time All-American with his second-place finish at 157 pounds.

Nebraska claimed a 16-7 dual record in 2002-03, as Manning guided NU to seven victories over ranked opponents, including a 20-17 victory over fifth-ranked Illinois at the Virginia Duals. At the 2003 NCAA Championships, Manning led a young lineup that included two juniors, five sophomores and three redshirt freshmen to a 13th-place showing. The finish marked the eighth time in nine seasons that NU had claimed a spot in the top 15 in the nation.

The 2003-04 Huskers and Manning posted one of the best wrestling seasons ever at NU with a 19-3 overall record, tying the second-highest win total in NU history. The Huskers posted two team titles during the season, winning the prestigious Las Vegas Invitational behind individual titles from Powell, Travis Shufelt and Travis Pascoe and winning the Virginia Duals with a 25-13 defeat of Lehigh in the finals. Manning directed the Huskers to second at the Big 12 Championships, while qualifying eight wrestlers for the NCAA Tournament, where NU earned a fifth-place finish. Manning coached his first national champion at Nebraska, as Powell claimed the title at 125 pounds with a 17-2 technical fall in the finals.

The Huskers' success continued in 2004-05, with Nebraska winning 19 duals for the second straight year. NU's 19-2-1 dual record was the second-best mark in school history. The Huskers started the campaign with eight straight dual wins, and ended the season by winning 12 of the last 13 duals. Nebraska posted eight wins over ranked foes, including a 16-15 upset of No. 2 Iowa State to end the dual season.

Manning's 2005-06 squad was relatively inexperienced, but the Huskers earned a solid 12-5 dual record and a third-place finish at the National Duals. NU claimed third at the Big 12 Championships and two Huskers went on to finish as All-Americans. Manning's legacy continued to grow in 2006-07, as he watched his second Husker claim a national title. Paul Donahoe earned the crown at 125 pounds after helping Nebraska to a 10-7-1 dual record.

The 2007-08 Husker campaign was one of the best ever under Manning. NU finished second at the Big 12 Championships with three individual champions and claimed fourth at the NCAA Championships with five Huskers finishing as All-Americans. That success would no doubt be a challenge to match, but the 2008-09 Nebraska wrestling team did just that. The Huskers won a share of the Big 12 championship for the first time in school history behind individual titles from Burroughs, Brandon Browne, Craig Brester and Vince Jones. Seven NU wrestlers qualified for the NCAA Championships, where the Huskers finished fourth with All-America accolades going to Burroughs (1st at 157), Brester (2nd at 197), Browne (4th at 174) and Jones (6th at 184). For his work with the 2009 squad, Manning was named Dan Gable Coach of the Year by WIN Magazine.

In 2010, Nebraska fought through a rash of injuries, including a season-ending setback to Burroughs. Despite the unfortunate luck, the Huskers still qualified five wrestlers for the NCAA Championships and finished 12th in the team standings, marking the seventh top-15 finish under Manning.

History was made in 2011, when Manning helped Burroughs become the first two-time national champion in school history by winning the 165-pound title at the NCAA Championships in Philadelphia, Pa. After the season, Burroughs was awarded the school's first-ever Hodge Trophy, given annually to the nation's top wrestler. As a team, the Huskers qualified seven total wrestlers for the national tournament and finished in 12th place for the second consecutive season.

In 2011-12, the Huskers finished 21st at the NCAA Championships as two wrestlers (Josh Ihnen and James Green) earned All-America accolades. Senior Tucker Lane became the 20th member of Nebraska's 100-win club on Feb. 19.

In 2012-13, Robert Kokesh led Nebraska with a 38-4 record and a third-place finish at the NCAA Championships at 174 pounds. Green captured his second consecutive All-America honor at 157 pounds to help NU to a 13th-place finish. Ihnen fell one match short of All-America status but picked up his 100th collegiate win at the national tournament. He also earned CoSIDA Academic All-America honors, and helped the Huskers to an 11-6 dual record.

Green and Kokesh repeated as All-Americans in 2014, as Green took third at 157 pounds and Kokesh earned a fourth-place finish at 174. The pair also took home Big Ten titles, becoming the first Husker champions in three seasons as members of the conference. The Huskers returned to the newly renovated Devaney Center for all of their home duals after years of wrestling at the NU Coliseum. NU finished the dual season with a 12-2 record before finishing 11th at the NCAA Championships.

In 2014-15, the Huskers notched a ninth-place finish at the NCAA Championships, marking the 19th top-10 result in school history and first since 2009. Kokesh and Green each collected third-place finishes, while TJ Dudley earned his first All-America honor with an eighth-place showing at 184 pounds. During the dual season, NU set a school record for winning percentage (.933) after a 14-1 season, which included a tie for second in the Big Ten dual standings.

Dudley repeated as an All-American in 2015-16, this time making it to the NCAA Finals at 184 pounds. His runner-up finish led the team, which produced two additional All-Americans, Eric Montoya and Austin Wilson. As a team, NU finished eighth at the NCAA Championships and fourth at the Big Ten Championships. For the first time since 1995, NU qualified all 10 wrestlers for the national tournament. The Huskers posted an 11-6 record overall, going 5-4 in Big Ten duals.

The Huskers had four All-Americans to finish ninth as a team at the 2017 NCAA Championships. Dudley finished third to capture his third All-America honor. Montoya took sixth to finish his career as a two-time All-American. Aaron Studebaker and Tyler Berger each made the podium for the first time. Nebraska finished fourth at the Big Ten Championships after going 12-4 during the dual season.

Nebraska posted another top-10 finish at the NCAA Championships in 2018, as the Huskers placed ninth with three All-Americans. Berger earned his second All-America honor, as he finished third, while Taylor Venz and Chad Red Jr. became the first pair of freshmen to earn All-America honors for NU in the same season, as Venz placed fourth and Red took seventh. The Huskers went 10-4 on the dual season and placed fifth at the Big Ten Championships after returning just two starters from the 2017 team.

NEBRASKA WRESTLING PHILOSOPHY

Guided by the following philosophy, the Nebraska wrestling program creates an environment in which student-athletes can reach their potential, both as wrestlers and as young men.

Attitude: Winners accept constructive criticism knowing it will make them better. Positive words and actions produce positive results.

Work Ethic: There is no substitute for hard work. Worthwhile things come from hard work and believing that you deserve to win.

Goal Setting: Individually, have a road map to reach your goals and the discipline to stick to your plan. Remember that the drive and determination in your daily activities will bring about success.

Responsibility: Anyone can make excuses; you must be responsible for your actions and learn to make proper choices in your academic work, athletic endeavors and in your personal life.

Citizenship: Each team member is expected to represent themselves, their family, university, teammates, coaches and community in a first-class manner.

Commitment to Excellence: Demonstration of total effort and concentration whereby each team member gives their absolute best during practice, competition and in the classroom, regardless of result.

THE ROAD TO LINCOLN

Manning showed his ability to develop a top-notch program was universal, as he led a turnaround in the tradition-rich Northern Iowa program in his first head coaching position. Manning coached three seasons for the Panthers from 1997 to 2000 in Cedar Falls, Iowa. Under Manning, UNI compiled a 23-24-2 dual record and improved its mark in each of his seasons. His rebuilding effort with the Panthers included strong showings at the NCAA Championships. Northern Iowa tied for 30th in Manning's first year, but improved to a 17th-place showing in 1998 and added an 11th-place finish at the 2000 NCAA Tournament, which was the school's best showing in seven seasons.

Individually, several UNI wrestlers excelled on the national stage under Manning. In each of his last two seasons, the Panthers had a pair of All-Americans, including Tony Davis. A two-time NCAA finalist, Davis was the national champion at 149 pounds in 2000 and finished second in 1999.

Manning returned the Northern Iowa program to national prominence by attracting some of the nation's top wrestling talent. His first Panther recruiting class was ranked second in the nation, while his second class was tabbed as the top class in the nation in 2000.

Before his appointment as the head coach at UNI, Manning had extensive experience as an assistant coach, including ties to the Big 12 Conference. Manning spent four seasons on Jack Spates' staff at Oklahoma from 1993 to 1997 before accepting Northern Iowa's head position. Manning helped guide the Sooners to three top-10 team finishes at the NCAA Championships during his tenure, including a seventh-place showing at the 1997 national tournament. He assisted in coaching 14 OU wrestlers to All-America accolades, and five Sooners to the NCAA finals. John Kading also claimed the 1996 190-pound title under him. Manning aided in the recruitment of three top-five national recruiting classes while in Norman.



Manning began his coaching career as an assistant at North Carolina from 1985 to 1993. While pursuing his master's degree in sports administration, Manning assisted Coach Bill Lam in guiding 15 Tar Heel wrestlers to All-America honors, including four NCAA finalists and a pair of national champions. UNC posted top-10 NCAA finishes in 1986, 1987 and 1993 with Manning on staff, and captured four Atlantic Coast Conference titles. He also helped attract the nation's top recruiting class to Chapel Hill, N.C., in the spring of 1990.

In addition to his extensive collegiate coaching experience, Manning has been selected numerous times to coach the United States in international competition. He has coached on U.S. Olympic teams as an assistant in 1996, 2000, 2012 and 2016, while also being named the head coach at U.S. Olympic Festivals in 1991, 1993 and 1995. Manning was chosen to head the U.S. freestyle team at the 2001 FILA World Championships and was an assistant on the U.S. delegation to the FILA World Championships eight times. He has also been active at the FILA Junior level, serving as the head coach twice, and traveling to the 2008 FILA Junior World Championships in Turkey as an assistant coach, where he coached Burroughs to a 10th-place finish. In 2009, Manning was a coach for the U.S. Freestyle World Team at the World Wrestling Championships in Herning, Denmark.

MOLDING MANNING

Manning had plenty of experience to build his coaching philosophies, as he was one of the top wrestlers in the nation during his competitive career. Manning wrestled collegiately at Nebraska for one year, before transferring to the University of Nebraska-Omaha. After redshirting a season, Manning went on to become a two-time NCAA Division II national champion and three-time All-American under Coach Mike Denney. Manning posted a 121-23 record for the Mavericks, while capturing titles at 150 pounds in 1983 and 1985. Manning helped UNO earn a third-place team finish in 1983 and runner-up honors in 1985. While competing for the Mavericks, he was the leader of UNO's chapter of Fellowship of Christian Athletes for four years. Manning was inducted into the NCAA Division II Hall of Fame for his accomplishments as a wrestler and coach in 1999.

Manning's competitive career also extended beyond the collegiate ranks. He was a member of the U.S. freestyle team from 1986 to 1989. He won a silver medal at the 1989 Pan American Games.

The Vermillion, S.D., native received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Nebraska-Omaha in 1985, with a specialization in exercise science. Manning was the recipient of an NCAA postgraduate scholarship following his graduation from UNO and earned his master's degree in sports administration from North Carolina in 1989.

Manning and his wife, Carrie, were married in August of 2006. Mark has four sons, Matthew, Connor, Ryan and Will.

BRYAN SNYDER
ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH | NINTH SEASON

Bryan Snyder enters his ninth season as a coach for the Nebraska wrestling program and his sixth season as associate head coach in 2018-19. Since returning to the NU staff in 2011, Snyder has helped turn Nebraska's middle weight classes into national powers, as Huskers at the weight classes of 157, 165, 174 and 184 have earned a total of 16 All-America honors since 2011.

Snyder was the 2017 Terry McCann Award winner as USA Wrestling's Freestyle Co-Coach of the Year, and serves alongside Nebraska Head Coach Mark Manning as personal coaches for Jordan Burroughs and James Green, in addition to his duties with the NU wrestling team.

From 2011-12 to 2017-18, Snyder has assisted in helping the Huskers rack up 19 All-America honors. Green earned All-America accolades four times, while Robert Kokesh and TJ Dudley each ended their careers as three-time All-Americans. Green and Kokesh also collected the first two Big Ten titles in school history in 2014, and Kokesh added a second one in 2015.

In 2017-18, Snyder helped Nebraska to its fourth-consecutive top-10 national finish, as the Huskers placed ninth at the 2018 NCAA Championships. Tyler Berger earned All-America honors for the second time, while Taylor Venz and Chad Red Jr. became the first pair of NU freshmen to win All-America honors in the same season.

In his first season at NU as a coach, Snyder played a key role in helping Burroughs win his second national championship with a perfect 36-0 record. Snyder also helped Burroughs win the 2011 74-kilogram freestyle World Championship in Istanbul, Turkey, becoming the first U.S. wrestler to win a freestyle title since 2006. Additionally, Snyder helped Burroughs win the freestyle gold medal at the 2012 London Olympics as well as the 2013 and 2015 FILA World Championships. Burroughs also represented the United States in the 2016 Olympic Games in Rio. Most recently, Snyder helped Burroughs to gold at the 2017 World Championships, while guiding James Green to silver. He also helped Green to bronze at the 2015 World Championships. Burroughs and Green again earned the right to represent the United States at the World Championships in 2018.

Snyder, an Easton, Pa., native spent the 2009-10 season as the head assistant coach at Arizona State and helped guide five Sun Devils to the NCAA Championships in Omaha. Snyder began his coaching experience as an assistant at Harvard in 2002-03, while returning to the Husker wrestling program as a graduate assistant coach for two seasons (2003-04 and 2004-05), as NU went 38-5-1 in duals and finished fifth at the 2004 NCAA Championships. He helped coach eight All-Americans at NU during that time.

Snyder graduated from Nebraska with a bachelor's degree in sociology and communication studies in 2002. He earned a Master of Arts in 2005 before earning a Ph.D. in 2012.

One of the most decorated wrestlers in program history, Snyder owns the best winning percentage all-time at Nebraska with a mark of .925, compiling a 136-11 record from 1999 to 2002. A member of Nebraska's 100-win club, he claimed All-America accolades and a Big 12 championship all four years, while finishing as the NCAA runner-up at 157 pounds in 2001 and 2002.

He amassed more than 30 wins in a season three times, including his 43-3 record as a sophomore that stands as the second-best single-season mark in school history. A four-time NWCA All-Academic selection, Snyder was named the 2002 Nebraska Male Student-Athlete of the Year and was also a four-time first-team academic All-Big 12 selection.

Prior to Nebraska, Snyder was a three-time state place-winner and a 1997 state champion at Easton (Pa.) High School. He finished with a 112-12 record and was one of the nation's most highly regarded recruits.

KENDRIC MAPLE
ASSISTANT COACH | SECOND SEASON

A three-time All-American and a 2013 NCAA champion as well as an accomplished international wrestler, Kendrick Maple is in his second season as an assistant coach for the Nebraska wrestling program in 2018-19.

In his first season as an assistant coach at Nebraska, Maple helped the Huskers to a ninth-place finish at the 2018 NCAA Championships. He guided Chad Red Jr. to All-America honors at 141 pounds, as Red became NU's first All-American at that weight since 2004. Maple also helped Tyler Berger and Taylor Venz to All-America honors in 2018.

Prior to joining the Nebraska staff, Maple spent one year at Purdue as an assistant coach, where he helped lead three Boilermakers to the 2017 NCAA Championships.

Maple's coaching career began at his alma mater, Oklahoma, where he was a volunteer assistant from 2014-16. During his two seasons on staff, Maple coached former teammate Cody Brewer to the 133-pound title at the 2015 NCAA Championships. In 2016, Maple helped Brewer claim his fourth All-America honor with a third-place finish at 133 pounds at the NCAA Championships. Maple also played a key role in Ryan Millhof's 2016 Big 12 title run and All-America finish at 125 pounds.

Maple was one of the most successful wrestlers in OU history, as he won three All-America awards and posted a 127-25 (.836) career record from 2010-14. His 127 wins rank sixth all-time at Oklahoma.

Maple concluded his 2012-13 season by claiming the 141-pound NCAA title and finishing a perfect 31-0. The following year, after moving to 149 pounds, Maple became OU's 25th three-time All-American after placing eighth at the NCAA Championships. He took fourth in 141 pounds in 2012.

Off the mat, Maple was named to the Capital One Academic All-America Division I At-Large Team in 2014. Additionally, he was a three-time NWCA All-Academic Team member (2012, 2013, 2014), a two-time first-team Academic All-Big 12 honoree (2013, 2014) and a second-team Academic All-Big 12 selection (2012). He also won the NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship, as well as the Big 12 Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarship.

Maple continued to see success in freestyle wrestling following the completion of his college career. He was a member of the United States team in 2018 that won the UWW Freestyle World Cup for the first time since 2003. Maple is a two-time U.S. Freestyle Open Men's finalist (61 kg), winning the title in April 2017. He also won the 61 kg title at the 2017 Medved International. Maple was a finalist in the 61 kg at the 2017 U.S. Freestyle World Team Trials. He was the runner-up at the 2015 U.S. Open, as he qualified for the U.S. Freestyle World Team Trials, where he earned a fourth-place finish.

Originally from Wichita, Kan., Maple earned his bachelor's degree from Oklahoma in health and exercise science in May 2013. He received his master's degree in adult and higher education, with an emphasis in intercollegiate athletic administration from OU in May 2015. Maple and his wife, Jordin, have two sons, Kiner and Kyro.

Former Husker and two-time NCAA All-American Eric Montoya is in his first season as Nebraska's volunteer assistant coach in 2018-19.

Montoya works primarily with the lower weight classes on the team, and assists with the Nebraska Wrestling Training Center and summer camps.

Montoya racked up a career record of 113-49 as a collegiate wrestler, competing three seasons for Nebraska and one season for Campbell. In his three years at NU, Montoya went 80-32 and qualified for the NCAA Championships all three seasons, earning a pair of All-America honors.

As a senior in 2016-17, Montoya posted a record of 30-7, including 14-2 in duals, and placed fifth at the Big Ten Championships and sixth at the NCAA Championships.

He was an All-American for the first time as a junior in 2016, as he placed fifth at the NCAA Championships and also took fifth at the Big Ten Championships.

A four-time NCAA Championships qualifier, Montoya reached the Round of 12 as a sophomore in 2015, and also qualified for the tournament as a freshman at Campbell in 2013. He was Nebraska's Redshirt of the Year for the 2013-14 season.

Montoya was a two-time member of the NWCA All-Academic Team, and he was a three-time Academic All-Big Ten selection. He also spent five semesters on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll.

An Albuquerque, N.M. native, Montoya was a four-time state champion at Volcano Vista High School. He graduated from Nebraska in May of 2017 with a degree in business management. Montoya resides in Lincoln with his wife, Evangeline, and two sons, Josiah and Asher.

As Director of Performance Nutrition, Ellis plays an integral role in the development and implementation of sports nutrition services for all student-athletes to optimize health and performance. Ellis directs the nutrition efforts of the Husker football team on a daily basis, while overseeing a team that will coordinate nutrition services and education for all 24 of Nebraska's sports.

Before becoming the first full-time nutritionist at Nebraska, Ellis first served the Huskers as a certified strength and conditioning coach during his undergraduate work in Lincoln. He returned to Nebraska in 1994 after a successful stint at Wisconsin, where he created a multi-sport training table for athletics.

After leaving the Nebraska staff following the 2001 football season, Ellis was the pre-eminent consultant in the sports nutrition industry in the United States. Bob Burton joined the Huskers in 1998 and was named Deputy AD - Chief of Staff in March of 2018. Burton handles the day-to-day oversight of the Nebraska football program. He also handles the facilities master plan for the athletic department, is a liaison to adidas and is the liaison to Haymarket Park, working with the Lincoln Saltdogs, he helps set the budget for field and stadium operation costs and create strategic plans for the facility.

Burton also oversees multiple support areas within the athletic department, including facilities and maintenance, capital planning and construction, event management, equipment, computing services and concessions.

Along with football, Burton is Nebraska's sport administrator for wrestling and bowling.

Burton joined the athletic department in 1998 as an associate athletic director for compliance/sports administration. He served in that role until 2007, ensuring that the conduct and operations of Nebraska's athletic teams were in compliance with NCAA, Big 12 and institutional rules and regulations. He also performed as the primary sports administrator for many of Nebraska's teams.

Burton filled a similar position at Oklahoma State as the assistant athletic director for sports administration and compliance from 1993 to 1997. He oversaw OSU's Olympic sports programs as well as the training and strength and conditioning, wrestling, men's and women's track and field and men's and women's tennis programs.

Burton came to Nebraska from Texas Tech, where he served as an associate athletic director for compliance for one year. While at Texas Tech, Burton helped complete the NCAA investigation into the Red Raider athletic department and analyzed the entire compliance system at the institution. He also helped identify and implement financial aid and eligibility systems, including changes in personnel and restructuring of the compliance department.

Burton, who was a member of the NCAA Division I women's soccer committee for three years and was a member of the NCAA Division I bowling committee, served as a legislative administrator for the NCAA from 1989 to 1993. At the NCAA, he was involved in the development of legislation, interpretation of regulations and reviewed legal issues related to the application of the association's regulations. He served as an NCAA liaison to committees and conducted comprehensive education to several intercollegiate athletic conferences. He has served on the National Association of Athletic Compliance Coordinators Executive Committee and the subcommittee of Big 12 Directors of Compliance.

He received his bachelor's degree in finance from Nebraska in 1985 and his juris doctorate from the Nebraska College of Law in 1989. A native of Falls City, Neb., Burton and his wife, Krista, have a daughter, Elly Kathryn, and sons Robert Falk, McClain John and Abram Lawslo.

2018-19 NEBRASKA SEASON NOTEBOOK

NEBRASKA TO FACE STRONG DUAL SCHEDULE

Nebraska posted a 10-4 dual record in 2017-18, its eighth consecutive winning season and 29th winning season in the last 31 years. This winter, the Huskers will look to continue that streak and build off a ninth-place finish at the 2018 NCAA Championships.

NU will face a challenging schedule that features 13 of the top-25 team finishers from last year's NCAA Championships. The home schedule is highlighted by matchups against top-25 finishers Iowa, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Northwestern, Northern Iowa and Illinois. Stanford will also travel to the Devaney Center for the regular-season finale on Feb. 23. The Cardinal finished tied for 34th at the NCAA Championships.

Nebraska faces a grueling road schedule this season with notable trips to 2018 national champion Penn State and national runner-up Ohio State. Early in the season, NU takes a road trip to North Carolina and NC State. The Tar Heels, who the Huskers face on Dec. 15, finished 20th at last year's NCAA Championships. The next night, the Huskers travel to Raleigh, N.C., for a dual against NC State, which finished fourth at the 2018 NCAA Championships. Other road duals for NU include matchups against Wyoming, Maryland and Rutgers.

As for tournament action, NU opens the season with the Warren Williamson/Daktronics Open on Nov. 4. On Saturday, Nov. 10, the Huskers head to Albany, N.Y., for the Northeast Duals. They will also travel to the Cliff Keen Las Vegas Collegiate Wrestling Invitational Nov. 30-Dec. 1 for the second straight year. The Big Ten Championships will take place March 9-10 in Minneapolis, Minn., where the Huskers will look to improve on three straight fourth-place finishes. The NCAA Championships are set for March 21-23 at PPG Paints Arena in Pittsburgh, Pa., as NU will look to make it five consecutive top-10 national finishes.

BERGER LOOKS TO EARN THIRD ALL-AMERICA AWARD

A 157-pound senior from Prineville, Ore., Tyler Berger returns looking to become the 17th Husker to achieve All-America status in three separate years. He finished third after earning 15.5 points at the NCAA Championships last season, continuing a string of success at that weight in recent years. The Huskers have had an All-American at 157 in six of the past eight seasons.

Berger was second on the team last year with 28 wins, giving him a career record of 88-28. His performance on the mat in 2017-18 puts him just 12 wins away from joining Nebraska's 100-win club. He would be the 28th all-time member of the 100-win club and first since Tim Lambert joined in 2016-17. Of Berger's nine losses last season, six of them came against Hayden Hidlay of N.C. State, Andrew Crone of Wisconsin or Alec Pantaleo of Michigan. Berger fell to each of these opponents twice. A three-time NCAA Championships qualifier, he finished fourth at the Big Ten Championships last season.

VETERAN BUNCH RETURNS TO LEAD NU

Nebraska will be guided by a strong group of veteran returners in 2018-19. NU loses just two senior starters as they get set for this year's campaign. Mitchell Maginnis (125) went 16-16 in 2017-18 while Colton McCrystal (149) was a two-time NCAA Championships qualifier and won 23 matches last year. Maginnis and McCrystal were the two most decorated Huskers to expire their eligibility while Justin Arthur (157) and Eric Engler (174) added quality depth.

Seven Huskers qualified for the NCAA Championships in 2017-18 and five were seeded in the top 20 of their weight class. Five of these wrestlers return this season. At 141 pounds, redshirt sophomore Chad Red Jr. returns after finishing seventh at the NCAA Championships, while Isaiah White (165) lost in the Round of 12 after coming in as the No. 11 seed. White will be a junior this fall. Taylor Venz and Eric Schultz, now redshirt sophomores for NU, each participated at the NCAA Championships at 184 and 197 pounds, respectively. Venz took home a fourth-place finish while Schultz did not place. Berger is the fifth returning NCAA qualifier while Jason Renteria, a freshman in 2017-18 who qualified for the championships at 133 pounds, transferred away from the program.

NU GOES FOR FIVE STRAIGHT TOP-10 FINISHES

Nebraska's seven-member senior class of Tyler Berger, Tanner Farmer, Zak Hensley, Zeke Moisey, Brian Peska, Aris Shino and Dustin Williams enter the 2018-19 season looking to ensure that Nebraska's streak of four consecutive top-10 NCAA finishes continues this season. Peska and Shino

are two of the top competitors projected to take over the starting job at 133 pounds, while Zak Hensley posted an 11-4 record at 141 pounds last season. Tyler Berger looks to etch his name in the Husker history books as a senior. His career-best win total in a season is 36 in 2016-17 and he sits 40 wins behind Jordan Burroughs, who ranks in fourth place on the NU all-time wins list.

Zeke Moisey, a senior from Northampton, Pa., has one year of eligibility remaining after spending the first four years of his collegiate wrestling career at West Virginia. Moisey qualified for the NCAA Championships three times at WVU. He was the national runner-up at 125 pounds in 2015 and finished eighth in 2018 on his way to All-America honors in both years. He looks to be the heir apparent to Mitchell Maginnis as the 125-pound starter.

DUAL EXPERIENCE A PLUS FOR NU

Nebraska returns 13 wrestlers with dual experience this season, including All-Americans Tyler Berger, Chad Red Jr. and Taylor Venz. Along with the three aforementioned wrestlers, redshirt sophomore Eric Schultz and junior Isaiah White return as NCAA qualifiers who gained significant dual experience last season. They combined to go 21-6 in duals. Berger, Red Jr. and Venz also won at least nine duals in 2017-18.

Brian Peska (133), Zak Hensley (141), Collin Purinton (149), Johnny Blankenship (165), Patrick Grayson (HWT) and David Jensen (HWT) all gained dual experience last season. As a team, NU won 10 of its 14 duals overall and seven of its nine Big Ten duals.

REDSHIRT YEAR PAYS DIVIDENDS FOR FRESHMEN

In the past, Nebraska's redshirt freshmen have played a big role in the team's success. Last year, Chad Red Jr. (141), Beau Breske (174), Taylor Venz (184) and Eric Schultz (197) made the leap from redshirt seasons to significant roles in NU's dual lineup. Each was heavily depended upon in their weight class a year ago.

Top candidates to break into the lineup during their redshirt freshmen seasons are Christian Miller (133) and Mikey Labriola (174). A native of Easton, Pa., Labriola posted an 18-2 record in his redshirt year with four pins, three technical falls and five major decisions. FloWrestling ranked him as the No. 11 wrestler in the country at 174 pounds in the preseason. Plainview native Christian Miller went 11-6 during his redshirt year and appears set to challenge for the starting job at 133 pounds.

NEBRASKA WELCOMES STRONG CROP OF NEWCOMERS

Nebraska's incoming class of newcomers features 10 wrestlers, including two transfers and eight true freshmen. Highlighting the class is West Virginia transfer Zeke Moisey, who has one year of eligibility remaining to compete for the Huskers. He's a two-time All-American who finished eighth in the 125 pound bracket at the 2018 NCAA Championships. Christian Lance, a 2017 Division II NCAA Championships qualifier at Fort Hays State, will look to break into the lineup at the heavyweight spot.

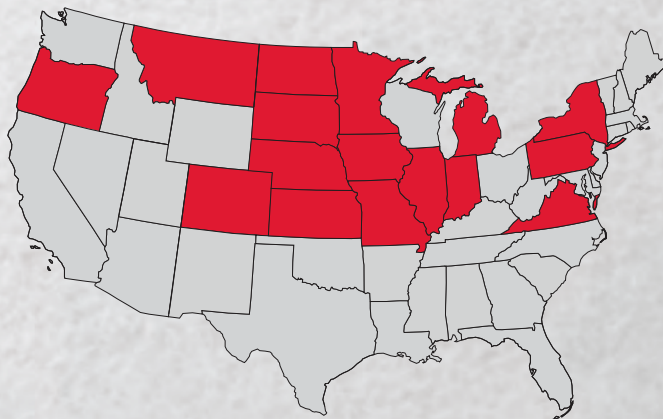
ROSTER NOTES

- Nebraska features a 35-wrestler roster as it begins official practice.
- Two-thirds of the Huskers' 2018-19 roster are underclassmen, as 23 of Nebraska's 35 wrestlers are either freshmen or sophomores.
- Included in Nebraska's roster are also six seniors and six juniors.
- Fourteen Huskers on this season's roster are returning letterwinners.
- This year's Huskers come from 16 states, and seven are Nebraska natives.

COMPETITION ABOUNDS AT MULTIPLE WEIGHTS

Nebraska will have a few starting roles to sort out after the graduation of a few key seniors. Two-time All-American Tyler Berger figures to be firmly entrenched at 157 pounds. Returning NCAA qualifiers Chad Red Jr. (141), Isaiah White (165), Taylor Venz (184) and Eric Schultz (197) are all locked into starting spots. A few spots up for grabs are at 125, 133 and 149 pounds as NU looks to replace departed seniors Mitchell Maginnis (125) and Colton McCrystal (149).

- **125 pounds:** A first-time starter will fill the spot at 125, as Nebraska must replace Mitchell Maginnis, who competed in 13 duals for NU last season. The frontrunner looks to be Zeke Moisey, a two-time All-American who transferred from West Virginia last spring. He took a medical redshirt in 2016-17, which is why he will have one season left to compete at Nebraska. Alex Thomsen, a four-time Iowa Class 1A state champion, will be waiting in the bullpen for his shot to compete. The true freshman posted a 190-1 record in high school.
- **133 pounds:** The starting job at 133 pounds is open for the taking. Senior Brian Peska competed in five duals last year and has a great chance to see time once again. Redshirt freshman Christian Miller went 11-6 in his redshirt season in 2017-18 and could challenge for the job. True freshman Jevon Parrish is also vying for time and could factor heavily into the equation. Zak Hensley, who wrestled at 141 last year, will be another option. Freshmen Jordan Kelber and Josh Mason will provide depth to this weight class.
- **141 pounds:** Chad Red Jr. moved into the starting lineup as a redshirt freshman and never looked back. The fifth-ranked wrestler in the class of 2016 by FloWrestling, Red went 26-11 overall and 9-5 in duals last season on his way to qualifying for the NCAA Championships. He's locked in as the starter, but senior Aris Shino will be there to back him up.
- **149 pounds:** NU has perhaps its biggest hole to fill at 149 pounds after losing NCAA Championships qualifier Colton McCrystal to graduation. Collin Purinton, a junior from Banks, Ore., competed in 13 duals at 149 pounds in 2016-17 but spent most of last season backing up McCrystal. Zemua Baptista moves down a weight class from 157 pounds and should have every opportunity to win the starting job. He redshirted last year but won 22 matches in tournament action. Kyle Ruettiger and Jordan Shearer will also be competing for time. Shearer, a junior from Fargo, N.D., posted a 12-5 overall record last season after competing at four tournaments throughout the year.

Taylor Venz earned All-American honors in his redshirt freshman season last year after posting a 29-9 record and finishing fourth at the NCAA Championships.

- **157 pounds:** Two-time All-American Tyler Berger returns for his senior year with three NCAA Championship appearances under his belt. The Prineville, Ore., native went 28-9 a year ago. FloWrestling ranked him as the No. 3 wrestler at 157 pounds in the country heading into the 2018-19 season. Luke Weber and Caleb Licking return as redshirt sophomores. Weber, who went 19-6 in 2017-18, will be Berger's top backup. Freshmen Jake Silverstein and Peyton Robb add quality depth.
- **165 pounds:** The Huskers are littered with talent and experience at the 165-pound weight class. Former Division II National Champion Isaiah White, who competed for NU last year after transferring from Ohio College, went 11-2 in duals on his way to an appearance at the 2018 NCAA Championships. Redshirt sophomores Johnny Blankenship (20-9 in 2017-18) and Dalton Peters (9-5 in 2017-18) have only one combined match of dual experience between them but could push White for time this year.
- **174 pounds:** Nebraska has an opening at the 174-pound spot, and redshirt freshman Mikey Labriola will likely be the guy to earn the starting nod. A highly touted prospect who went 18-2 in his redshirt season in 2017-18, Labriola looks to establish himself as NU's top dog at 174 pounds. FloWrestling ranked him as the No. 11 wrestler in the country in his weight class in its preseason rankings. Despite not having any dual experience at the collegiate level, Labriola has drawn his fair share of preseason attention as he looks to have an excellent redshirt freshman season.
- **184 pounds:** After redshirting in 2016-17, Taylor Venz broke out in a big way as a redshirt freshman. The Farmington, Minn., native went 29-9 overall and 10-4 in duals on his way to being named an All-American. Venz went on to be named NU's Most Valuable Wrestler in 2018 after he finished fourth at the NCAA Championships in March. Venz is the only wrestler on the roster set to compete at 184 pounds.
- **197 pounds:** Nebraska 2016-17 Redshirt of the Year Eric Schultz, like Taylor Venz, had a huge redshirt freshman season last year. Schultz went 20-11 and 10-4 in duals on his way to qualifying for the 2018 NCAA Championships. Colton Wolfe, who redshirted last season, posted a 9-8 record, highlighted by a first-place finish at the Roger Denker Open. Others looking to push Schultz for time include Cade Svoboda, a redshirt sophomore from Ord, Neb., and Anthony Gaona, a true freshman out of Overland Park, Kan. who posted a 40-2 record in his final high school season.
- **Heavyweight:** Nebraska has several solid options at heavyweight this season. David Jensen returns after posting a 5-5 dual record last year as a junior. Patrick Grayson, a redshirt junior who went 19-11 overall and 1-3 in duals in 2017-18, will fight for time as well. Christian Lance, a redshirt junior who transferred from Division II Fort Hays State, won five open tournament titles at FHSU last year and qualified for the NCAA Division II Championships in 2017. Senior Tanner Farmer, a starter on Nebraska's football offensive line, will again join the wrestling program following the completion of the football season. Wyatt Wriedt, a two-time Iowa state champion, used a redshirt season to his advantage last year, posting a 23-12 mark while getting his feet wet at the college level. Freshman Austin Emerson is a highly touted recruit out of Temperance, Mich., who also could get a look at the heavyweight spot.

2017-18 NEBRASKA SEASON REVIEW

The 2017-18 Nebraska wrestling team produced three All-Americans, including third-place finisher and two-time All-American Tyler Berger (157), en route to a ninth-place team finish with 47 team points at the NCAA Championships at Quicken Loans Arena in Cleveland, Ohio.

The result marked NU's 22nd top-10 NCAA finish all-time and the fourth in a row, following a ninth-place finish in 2015, an eighth-place finish in 2016 and a ninth-place finish in 2017.

BERGER GRABS SECOND ALL-AMERICA HONOR

Berger capped a 28-9 season with a third-place finish at the NCAA Championships to become a two-time All-American after finishing fifth in 2017. He defeated Big Ten nemesis Michael Kemerer of Iowa by injury default in the third-place match at 157 pounds. Berger fell in the quarterfinal round, but battled back through the consolation bracket, defeating Paul Fox of Stanford in the Round of 12 to gain All-America status. Berger is the 29th Husker to win multiple All-America honors in program history.

REDSHIRT FRESHMEN EARN ALL-AMERICA STATUS

A pair of Husker freshmen were All-Americans in the same season for the first time in program history, as Taylor Venz and Chad Red Jr. earned All-America honors at the NCAA Championships. Venz placed fourth at 184 pounds, NU's highest finish by a freshman since Bryan Snyder placed fourth in 1999. Venz dropped a second-round match, but won five matches in the consolation bracket before ultimately falling to Emery Parker of Illinois in the third-place match.

Red placed seventh at 141 pounds to become just the eighth unseeded wrestler in NU history to win All-America honors. He became an All-American by pinning two-time defending champion Dean Heil of Oklahoma State in the Round of 12. In addition to becoming the first pair of NU freshmen to win All-America honors in the same season, the two became Nebraska's first freshmen All-Americans since James Green in 2012.

SEVEN HUSKERS QUALIFY FOR NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

Seven Huskers qualified for the NCAA Championships in 2018, including the aforementioned All-Americans, senior Colton McCrystal (149), sophomore Isaiah White (165), redshirt freshman Eric Schultz (197) and freshman Jason Renteria (133). Every Husker who competed at the NCAA Championships won at least one match. White reached the Round of 12, while Schultz and McCrystal finished with 2-2 records. Renteria did not compete (weight).

SEVEN HUSKERS PLACE AT BIG TEN CHAMPIONSHIPS

Seven Huskers earned podium spots at the Big Ten Championships, as Nebraska finished fifth overall as a team with 72.5 points. McCrystal, Berger and Venz were NU's highest finishers, as each placed fourth at their respective weight classes. Renteria took fifth, while Red, White and Schultz each placed seventh.

NU POSTS 10-4 MARK IN DUAL COMPETITION

Nebraska, which finished 13th in the final USA Today/NWCA Coaches Poll, went 10-4 in duals, including a 7-2 record in the Big Ten to tie for third in the conference. The Huskers defeated three teams that finished in the top 25 at the NCAA Championships (Wisconsin, Wyoming and Northwestern) as well as five teams in the final NWCA Coaches' Poll (Wyoming, Northwestern, Rutgers, Purdue and Wisconsin).

The Huskers finished the season by winning seven of eight duals, including five in a row in January, knocking off three ranked teams in the process.

Nebraska outscored its 14 dual opponents by a combined score of 308-213, as Husker wrestlers emerged victorious in 77 of 140 individual matches in dual competition. Nebraska welcomed 7,429 fans for seven duals at home in 2017-18, an average of 1,061 fans per dual.

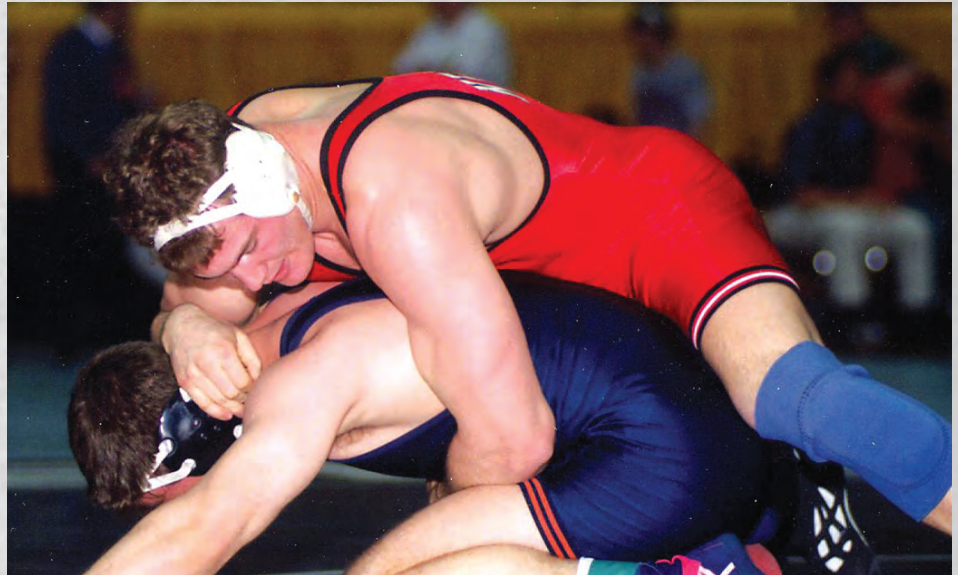

NEBRASKA'S COACHING HISTORY

Nebraska has had only 16 head coaches in 99 years of wrestling history, including current Husker coach Mark Manning. Combining for 701 dual wins, NU coaches have always set a standard of excellence in the wrestling community. Dr. R.G. Clapp was the Huskers' first wrestling coach and led the team for 11 years before moving on to promote wrestling with the National Wrestling Coaches Association. Jerry Adam coached Nebraska for the majority of the 1930's and 1940's, before giving way to B.R. Patterson.

Orval Borgialli headed the Huskers for 14 years from 1964 to 1978, amassing 72 dual wins, and Bob Fehrs took over the team until 1985. Fehrs finished with a .648 dual-winning percentage with 95 career dual wins at Nebraska. Tim Neumann racked up 199 dual victories from 1985 to 2000 before Manning took over. Manning has amassed a 234-88-3 mark in Lincoln and is the winningest coach in program history.

DR. R.G. CLAPP
NEBRASKA'S FIRST HEAD COACH (1911-26)

Nebraska's first wrestling coach, Dr. Raymond G. Clapp (1911-26), was more than just a mentor for the first athletes who enjoyed the sport at the university. He was a prominent figure locally and internationally in the world of wrestling.

In the 1890s, Clapp distinguished himself as an all-around athlete while a student at Williston Seminary and at Yale University, starring in football, track, gymnastics and tennis.

It was as a track athlete at Yale that he rose to national and world prominence. Clapp won the IC4A pole vault title twice, annexed the national A.A.U. championship, earned a Canadian title and in 1898, he topped all performances to set a then-world mark in the vault of nearly 12 feet.

Dr. Clapp's interest and ability in gymnastics probably were more responsible than any other one thing in creating his great interest in collegiate wrestling. In addition to his many athletic distinctions, Clapp was crowned the all-around individual gymnastics champion of the Eastern Intercollegiate Association in 1889.

As a member and eventual chairman of the NCAA Wrestling Rules Committee, Clapp was largely responsible for the efficient organization of collegiate wrestling tournaments in the 1930s and 1940s. Clapp pioneered the system that is used to run many of the meets that take place even today.

While Ed Gallagher was building wrestling popularity in the Southwest, and Charlie Maysen was doing likewise in the East and Midwest, Dr. Clapp initiated college wrestling at the University of Nebraska in the earliest days of the sport, serving as head coach from 1911 to 1926.

Known widely as a leader in the promotion of collegiate wrestling, Clapp served in the administrative branch of the National Collegiate Wrestling Association for numerous years.

In 1932 and 1936, Clapp was secretary of the American Olympic Wrestling Committee and in 1940 was elected chairman of the committee. As chairman of the USA-Pan American Wrestling Committee and the committee representative to the 1942 Pan-American Games Committee, Clapp became increasingly prominent in the wrestling community.

For over 30 years, Clapp freely and willingly gave his time and energy to popularize collegiate wrestling.



Bob Fehrs patrolled the mat for the Huskers from 1978 to 1985, racking up 95 dual wins and coaching 11 Nebraska wrestlers to All-America honors.



Tim Neumann coached Nebraska from 1985 to 2000, producing five top-10 finishes at the NCAA Championships, 40 Husker All-Americans and four NU national champions.

In July 2010, Ronnie Green was appointed as the Harlan Vice Chancellor of the UNL Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources and Vice President for Agriculture and Natural Resources of the University of Nebraska system. In June 2015, Dr. Green also assumed the interim role of Senior Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, the institution's chief academic officer.

Dr. Green was raised on a mixed beef, dairy, and cropping farm in southwestern Virginia. He received B.S. and M.S. degrees in animal science from Virginia Tech and Colorado State University, respectively. His doctoral program was completed jointly at the University of Nebraska–Lincoln and the USDA-ARS

U.S. Meat Animal Research Center in animal breeding and genetics.

Dr. Green has served on the animal science faculties of Texas Tech University and Colorado State University, as the national program leader for animal production research for the USDA's Agricultural Research Service, and as executive secretary of the White House's interagency working group on animal genomics within the National Science and Technology Council. Prior to returning to the University of Nebraska, he served as senior global director of technical services for Pfizer Animal Health's (now Zoetis) animal genomics business.

Dr. Green is an internationally recognized authority in animal genetics; he has published 130 refereed publications and abstracts, nine book chapters and 56 invited symposia papers; and has delivered invited presentations in 43 U.S. states and 21 countries around the world. He is a past-president of the American Society of Animal Science (ASAS) and has served in a number of leadership positions for the U.S. Beef Improvement Federation, National Cattlemen's Beef Association, National Pork Board, and National Research Council. He currently serves on the board of directors of the Association of Public Land-grant Universities (APLU), Neogen Corporation, and the national Alpha Gamma Rho fraternity. He has been honored as a Fellow of both ASAS and the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Ronnie and best friend Jane are the parents of four children, all graduates of, or enrolled at, the University of Nebraska–Lincoln. Justin, a political science/history graduate, is a political journalist in Washington, D.C.; Nate is a graduate of the College of Business and Nebraska Law and is with Hausmann Construction in Lincoln; Kelli is an advertising, public relations and global studies graduate and is preparing for the ministry at Princeton Theological Seminary; and Regan is a current student in human development and family science and agricultural communications. Collectively, members of the Green family hold or are pursuing a total of 15 University of Nebraska–Lincoln degrees.

Josephine (Jo) R. Potuto, the Richard H. Larson Professor of Constitutional Law, has been Nebraska's faculty representative (FAR) at the NCAA and conference level since May 15, 1997.

In 2002, Potuto was named Outstanding Faculty Athletics Representative by the All-American Football Foundation. From 2008-09 to 2011-12 she was president of the 1A FAR (FARs from FBS institutions). Among her NCAA positions, Potuto spent nine years (the maximum) on the NCAA Division I Committee on Infractions (chair her last two years). She was one of three Big 12 Conference representatives on the NCAA Division I Management Council, and served on the NCAA Men's Gymnastics Championship Committee and an NCAA-wide (all divisions) committee to advise NCAA staff on student-athlete issues and educational programming for coaches, staff, and student-athletes. She currently serves on the NCAA Interpretations Committee.

A sports law expert, Potuto regularly lectures on sports issues in general and NCAA processes in particular. She has presented to, among others, the Knight Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics, the National Association of College and University Attorneys, the Association of Public and Land Grant Universities, and the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics, as well at numerous university and law college conferences. She is an expert witness in litigation involving sports issues and a media "go-to" person. Potuto also lectures and consults on risk management and on free speech issues.

Potuto is a past adviser to the Uniform Law Commissioners Committee to draft a sports agent statute, has drafted rules governing search and seizure and hearings for the Nebraska Racing Commission, and also has written on issues of gender equity in college athletics. She has authored numerous articles on sports law issues. She just completed an article on how baseball hitting informs legal argument. The article is in the National Baseball Hall of Fame archives.

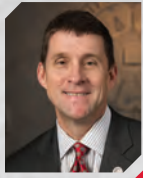
Potuto teaches constitutional law, procedure, federal jurisdiction, and sports law. She has been a visiting professor of law at the University of Arizona, Rutgers University, the Cardozo College of Law at New York's Yeshiva University, the University of Oregon, the University of North Carolina, and Seton Hall University. She currently teaches in the Summer Sports Law Institute at Oregon Law School.

Potuto was project director and a drafter of the Uniform Law Commissioners Sentencing and Corrections Act, as well as the drafter for the Nebraska Supreme Court Committee to Draft Criminal Jury Instructions. She is the author of three books. She was elected to membership in the American Law Institute, the Nebraska State Bar Foundation, and the Douglass Society.

Potuto earned her bachelor's degree in journalism at Rutgers' Douglass College, and her master's degree in English literature at Seton Hall. She earned her juris doctorate at the Rutgers Law College.

She is a member of the bars of Nebraska and New Jersey and is admitted to practice before the U.S. Supreme Court, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit, and the U.S. District Courts for Nebraska and New Jersey.

On January 12, 2015, the Board of Regents appointed lifelong educator Hank M. Bounds, Ph.D, as the seventh president of the University of Nebraska (NU). Bounds began his tenure on April 13, 2015, bringing a demonstrated record of expanding opportunities for students, improving higher education outcomes and efficiencies, and building successful partnerships with policymakers, donors and business leaders.

He has continued working to improve educational outcomes and build partnerships since his arrival in Nebraska. Bounds has connected with leaders within the university, in the private sector, in government and in the military to increase collaboration and innovation. In late 2015, he worked with the University of Nebraska Foundation to launch a two-year, \$200 million fundraising initiative to increase access and create success for current and future students. In 2015, Bounds also launched a university-wide Food for Health initiative—the first of several programs designed to increase collaborations across NU and incentivize new research that addresses critical issues important to Nebraskans and result in greater research funding opportunities. Supporting quality teaching is an important focus for Bounds, and in spring of 2016, he made a \$3.5 million strategic investment to hire additional faculty and expand NU’s online course offerings. And, Bounds announced in late 2015 that NU’s enrollment has grown to its highest level in 22 years — marking progress toward the Board of Regents’ goals to expand educational access to Nebraskans and attract more talent to the state to meet workforce needs.

Bounds grew up in Mississippi. His service in the Army National Guard helped him pay for college, and he earned bachelor’s and master’s degrees from the University of Southern Mississippi and a doctorate from the University of Mississippi.

Bounds has devoted his 25-year career to helping change students’ lives in the same way education opened doors in his own life. He began as a high school teacher, then rose to principal, superintendent and state superintendent before becoming Mississippi’s commissioner of higher education in 2009. In that role, he oversaw a complex system of eight public universities. Today, under his leadership, the University of Nebraska enrolls nearly 52,000 students, employs over 13,000 faculty and staff, and operates with an annual budget of \$2.5 billion - including \$235 million in research expenditures.

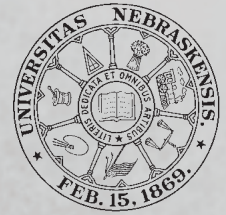
He has identified four cornerstones that will separate NU from the rest of higher education and define a new era in university history: 1) The University of Nebraska will be the best university in the nation to be a student. 2) The University of Nebraska will transform lives through research and innovation. 3) The University of Nebraska will work hand in hand with our partners to achieve our goals. 4) The University of Nebraska will win with people.

Bounds holds a faculty appointment in the College of Education and Human Sciences at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and courtesy faculty appointments in the Colleges of Education at the University of Nebraska at Omaha and the University of Nebraska at Kearney. He serves on the board of directors for several organizations, including the National Association of System Heads (NASH), the Robert B. Daugherty Water for Food Institute, the Nebraska Innovation Campus Development Corporation, the Nebraska Advanced Manufacturing Coalition and the Consultation Committee for US Strategic Command (USSTRATCOM). He is also on the Board of Governors for the Knights of AKSARBEN.

Bounds and his wife, Susie, are the parents of a son, Will, and a daughter, Caroline. They reside in Lincoln.

UNIVERSITY BOARD OF REGENTS

The Board of Regents consists of eight voting members elected by district for six-year terms, and four non-voting student Regents, one from each campus, who serve during their tenure as student body president. The board supervises the general operations of the university, and the control and direction of all expenditures. 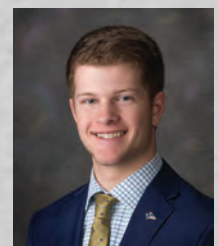

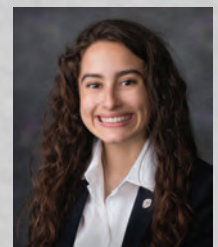

William H. (Bill) Moos was named Nebraska's Athletic Director on Oct. 15, 2017, and fully assumed those responsibilities on Oct. 23, 2017.

Moos, who became the 15th athletic director in the history of the storied Cornhusker program, brings nearly 25 years of experience as an athletic director at three Division I schools (Washington State, Oregon, Montana) with him to Nebraska. More importantly, he brings an impressive track record of success in building outstanding programs, developing long-term

relationships, and for doing what is best for his schools, its fans and most importantly, its student-athletes.

"When you name the top three, four, five athletic programs in the great positions as an athletic director, Nebraska is in that same breath," Moos said at his introductory press conference at Memorial Stadium. "I want you to know that my motto has always been, in the 25 years I have been a Division I athletic director and it will be here too is very simple - honor the past, live the present, create the future."

In his first six months at Nebraska, Moos made three coaching hires. He drew universal praise for hiring Scott Frost, the 2017 consensus national coach of the year, as Nebraska's head football coach in December. Following the spring semester, Moos also hired Mark Hankins to coach the men's golf team and Sean Maymi to lead the men's tennis program.

He also oversaw several team successes in his first six months in Lincoln. Moos watched the volleyball team win its fifth national title and second in three seasons in December. In 2018, both the men's and women's gymnastics teams finished in the top six at the NCAA Championships, while bowling finished third and rifle finished eighth. Nebraska also continued its excellence in the classroom, producing four CoSIDA Academic All-Americans, including three first-team selections. The awards increased Nebraska's nation-leading total to 333 all-time CoSIDA Academic All-Americans across all sports.

Moos came to Lincoln after spending seven-plus years at Washington State (2010-17). He previously served 12 highly successful seasons as the athletic director at Oregon (1995-2007). During his time at his alma mater, Moos wasted little time in making his impact felt in Cougar Athletics, spearheading a department-wide rebranding effort with Nike while securing a 10-year, \$35 million marketing rights agreement with IMG College. In addition, the 2004 WSU Alumni Achievement Award winner gained Regents approval for a \$130 million addition and remodel of Martin Stadium, featuring a remodeled press box with luxury seating, including suites, loge boxes and club room.

Also included in the project was a state-of-the-art video board and an 80,000-square-foot football operations building that served as the stadium's showpiece and opened in May 2014. As the dean of Pac-12 athletic directors, Moos was at the forefront of the conference's procurement of a 12-year, \$3 billion television contract with FOX and ESPN, a landmark agreement in college athletics. Under Moos' direction, the Cougar Athletic Fund's Annual Giving program saw an 81 percent increase in gifts while CAF donor members rose from nearly 4,000 to more than 7,500.

Additional facility enhancements under Moos included a center-hung video board in Beasley Coliseum that was installed prior to the 2011-12 season, giving Cougar basketball one of the premier fan experiences in the conference. An indoor golf hitting facility was also completed in early 2013, and Lower Soccer Field underwent a major renovation making the venue TV-ready while also providing one of the best playing surfaces on the West Coast, along with the addition of lights and a new scoreboard.

Other enhancements were made to the Moobery track facility, Bailey-Brayton Field, the basketball practice gym, Gibb Pool and the Simmelink Indoor tennis courts. In Moos' seven years at WSU, Cougar student-athletes and coaches accounted for 805 academic all-conference selections, 130 all-conference accolades, 45 All-America honors and three Pac-12 Coach-of-the-Year honors.

Moos served as Oregon's director of athletics from July of 1995 to 2007. While at Oregon he oversaw a 17-sport athletic department that grew to national prominence during his tenure. Oregon's annual athletic department budget grew from \$18.5 million in his first year to more than \$40 million by 2007, becoming 100 percent self-sufficient during that time. Under his direction the Duck Athletic Fund donor base increased from 4,930 to 12,290, resulting in an annual gifts increase from \$4.1 million to \$15.3 million.

Moos initiated more than \$160 million in facility improvements while at Oregon. Included in that was the \$90 million Autzen Stadium renovation in 2002, which added 12,000 new seats, 32 new suites, a new Club at Autzen and a new press box to the stadium. In his 12 years, the Ducks ranked first in Pac-10 football attendance 11 times, reaching 100 percent capacity in each of those seasons.

During Moos' tenure, Oregon athletics captured 13 Pac-10 championships across six different sports. He increased opportunities for women by adding two intercollegiate programs, soccer and lacrosse, and negotiated an all-inclusive shoe and apparel contract with Nike, one of only 14 in the country at the time. From an academic standpoint during Moos' tenure, Oregon student-athletes collected 722 academic all-conference selections, 34 Academic All-America selections, nine NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship recipients and one NCAA Top Ten Award.

During his first stint as a collegiate athletic director at Montana (1990-95), Moos created an academic support program and hired its first athletic academic coordinator, developed a facility enhancement plan that created more than \$4 million in improvements, and lifted the school's fund-raising efforts to show a 300 percent increase in private and corporate gifts. Academically, Montana student-athletes were equally successful as the athletic department achieved a graduation rate 20 percent higher than the general university enrollment. Under Moos' watch Montana garnered 269 academic all-conference selections, five Academic All-Americans and two NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship recipients.

Moos began his athletic career as an athletic administrator in 1982 as assistant athletic director at Washington State. He also served as the school's associate athletic director (1988-90). At Washington State, he was director of development for more than five years and associate director for nearly two years, supervising all external operations. Prior to that, he managed and owned private businesses in Washington and Oregon for eight years. He was a student assistant football coach at Washington State for the 1973 season, then spent part of 1974 in Washington, D.C., serving as a government intern.

Raised on a wheat and cattle ranch in eastern Washington, Moos attended high school in Olympia when his father served in the governor's cabinet. Moos earned his bachelor's degree in history from WSU and was a three-year letterman in football before concluding his collegiate career by representing Washington State in the 1972 East-West Shrine All-Star Game in San Francisco.

He served as co-captain on the Cougars' 1972 squad and garnered first-team All-Pac-8 Conference honors. Moos and his wife Kendra have three daughters, Christa, Brittany and Kaiti; and two sons, Bo and Benjamin.

The wrestling team practices at the Hendricks Training Complex, which is located on the southwest side of the Devaney Center. The Devaney Center is located on the west edge of Nebraska's Innovation Campus. To reach it from the Lincoln Municipal Airport, turn right on Northwest 12th Street as you drive out of the airport. Northwest 12th Street becomes Cornhusker Highway, which intersects with 14th Street. Exit south on 14th Street off Cornhusker Highway. Travel to Military Avenue and turn left. Continue a half mile and enter Innovation Campus. Take the first right turn before the Devaney Center and follow the access road to Lot 4 on the South Side of the arena. From Omaha's Eppley Airfield, follow the signs to downtown Omaha and I-480. Take I-480 West to I-80, then take I-80 West approximately 60 miles to I-180. Exit South on I-180, then exit East to Cornhusker Highway and follow the instructions above.

Limited press seating is available during wrestling matches at the Devaney Center. Please contact E.J. The Devaney Center media work room is located off the hallway at the southeast corner of the arena. The press room opens one hour before each meet.

THE BIG TEN CONFERENCE



James E. Delany
Commissioner

Known as one of intercollegiate sports' most successful undertakings, the Big Ten is home to a lineage of legendary names and an ongoing tradition of developing strong leaders. Even in its infancy, the conference established itself as the preeminent collection of institutions in the nation, where the pursuit of academic excellence prevailed as the definitive goal.

The history of the Big Ten traces back more than 120 years to the Palmer House hotel in Chicago, where on January 11, 1895, then-Purdue president James H. Smart and leaders from the University of Chicago, University of Illinois, University of Michigan, University of Minnesota, Northwestern University and University of Wisconsin set out to organize and develop principles for the regulation of intercollegiate athletics.

At that meeting, a blueprint for the administration of college athletics under the direction of appointed faculty representatives was outlined. The presidents' first known action "restricted eligibility for athletics to bonafide, full-time students who were not delinquent in their studies." That important legislation, along with other legislation that would follow in the coming years, served as the primary building block for intercollegiate athletics.

On February 8, 1896, one faculty member from each of those seven universities met at the same Palmer House and officially established the mechanics of the conference, which was officially incorporated as the "Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association" in 1905.

Indiana University and the State University of Iowa became the eighth and ninth members in 1899. In 1908, Michigan briefly withdrew its membership, and in 1912 Ohio State University joined the conference, bringing its membership total back to nine. Upon Michigan's return in 1917, the conference was first referred to as the "Big Ten" by media members, and that name was eventually incorporated in 1987.

As the 1900s opened, faculty representatives established rules for intercollegiate athletics that were novel for the time. As early as 1904, the faculty approved legislation that required eligible athletes to meet entrance requirements and to have completed a full year's work, along with having one year of residence.

In 1901, the first Big Ten Championship event was staged when the outdoor track and field championships were held at the University of Chicago. The debut event marked what is now a staple of conference competition. Today, the Big Ten sponsors 28 official sports, 14 for men and 14 for women, including the addition of men's ice hockey and men's and women's lacrosse over the last four years. Big Ten schools compete in a total of 42 different sports, furthering the conference's commitment to broad-based programming and providing more participation opportunities than any conference in the country.

One of the conference's proudest traditions began in 1902 when Michigan took on Stanford in the Rose Bowl, the nation's first bowl game. Big Ten teams only appeared in Pasadena twice before the conference signed an exclusive contract with the Tournament of Roses in 1946, making it the first bowl game with permanent conference affiliations. But Michigan's appearance in 1902 cultivated a relationship that has endured for more than a century. In January 2014, Michigan State defeated Stanford in the 100th Rose Bowl Game.

Coupling the academic goals set forth by the leaders of the charter members of the conference and their steadfast commitment to athletics, the conference instituted the Big Ten Medal of Honor in 1915. It is awarded annually by each conference institution to a student of the graduating class who has attained the greatest proficiency in scholarship and athletics. For more than 100 years, it has been the most prestigious honor a student competing in Big Ten athletics can receive.

In 1922, Major John L. Griffith became the conference's first "Commissioner of Athletics." Griffith was the first of five men to assume the role of commissioner in the conference's history, followed by Kenneth L. "Tug" Wilson in 1945, Bill Reed in 1961, Wayne Duke in 1971 and current commissioner James E. Delany in 1989.

After nearly 30 years with 10 members, the conference consolidated to nine schools when the University of Chicago formally withdrew its membership in 1946. Michigan State College (now Michigan State University) was added to the Big Ten three years later, bringing the number of affiliated conference schools to 10 once again.

In 1955, the Big Ten formulated a revenue-sharing model designed to pool all football television rights of its members and share those proceeds equally. The conference and its members continue to utilize a revenue-sharing model, dividing media rights, bowl payouts and other profits among all conference institutions.

While academics have always played an integral role in the conference, presidents of the Big Ten member institutions formalized the primacy of academics with the establishment of the Big Ten Academic Alliance (formerly the Committee on Institutional Cooperation) in 1958. The Big Ten Academic Alliance is an academic consortium of all Big Ten universities. Annually, the schools currently constituting the Big Ten Academic Alliance produced over \$10 billion in funded research, \$5 billion more than any other conference.

In one of Duke's first actions as commissioner, he oversaw the adoption of the Big Ten Advisory Commission in 1972, designed to study conference programs and make suggestions which would further Big Ten objectives.

The Advisory Commission enlists former students that competed in Big Ten athletics to serve as liaisons to the NCAA's Diversity and Inclusion Department, the Big Ten Student-Athlete Advisory Commission and other organizations.

In 1981, the conference presidents and chancellors endorsed a proposal that enabled universities to affiliate their women's intercollegiate programs with the conference, and the first conference championships for women were staged that fall. The Big Ten was the first conference to voluntarily adopt male and female participation goals after launching its Gender Equity Action Plan in 1992.

In December of 1989, the conference agreed in principle to invite Pennsylvania State University for membership. On June 4, 1990, the Council of Presidents officially voted to integrate Penn State into the conference, giving the Big Ten 11 members.

In 2004, the Big Ten implemented a pilot program of instant replay for college football. Following the season, the conference forwarded replay proposals to the NCAA regarding the future use of instant replay, where it approved country-wide testing in 2005. In 2006, the NCAA approved the use of instant replay for all conferences.

In 2006, Delany announced the creation of the first conference-owned television network, a 20-year agreement with FOX Networks to create what would become the Big Ten Network (BTN). Launched on Aug. 30, 2007, BTN now produces more than 1,500 events across all platforms each year. BTN is in more than 60 million homes in the U.S. and Canada via the nation's major cable, satellite and telco providers and more than 300 additional cable operators across the country. BTN2Go is the digital extension of BTN, delivering live and on-demand programming to computers, smartphones and tablets and also is accessible outside the U.S., Canada and the Caribbean via BTN2Go International.

On June 11, 2010, the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors (COP/C) approved a formal membership application by the University of Nebraska, expanding the conference to 12 institutions. Nebraska officially joined the Big Ten on July 1, 2011.

The conference expanded its footprint further in 2012 when the COP/C approved formal membership applications from the University of Maryland and Rutgers University on November 19 and 20, respectively. Maryland and Rutgers became official Big Ten members on July 1, 2014, giving the conference almost 9,500 students participating in intercollegiate athletics and more than 11,000 participation opportunities on 350 teams.

Since opening in the fall of 2013, the Big Ten conference center hosts more than 300 meetings annually for member institutions, Big Ten Academic Alliance (formerly CIC) related committees and coaches' groups. The headquarters also features an interactive digital museum - the Big Ten Experience - which brings the conference's storied academic and athletic history to life. For more information on the Big Ten Experience, go to bigten.org.

In June 2014, the Big Ten opened a second office in New York City, featuring both office and meeting space in Midtown Manhattan. Big Ten staff members are based in the New York City office to provide expanded coverage and service, while other conference and institutional administrators utilize the space as necessary when conducting business on the East Coast. The Big Ten and its member institutions also have access to satellite office space in Washington, D.C.

Delaney and his staff work to meet the educational needs of students competing in intercollegiate athletics to allow them to excel in all areas of their lives. The conference office manages 28 different championships and tournaments, offers legislative and compliance services, oversees the production and distribution of more than 1,400 events annually, provides staff services to coaching and administrative personnel and services media and fans interest for information on the Big Ten.

More than 120 years after its inception, the Big Ten remains a national leader in intercollegiate athletics on and off the field. Big Ten programs have combined to win more than 450 team and 1,800 individual national championships, consistently taking home individual honors for athletic and academic accomplishments and fulfilling the Big Ten's mission of academic achievement and athletic success.

NATIONAL PARTICIPATION

There are 77 NCAA member institutions that sponsor DI Wrestling and are eligible to compete in the National Championship. All 77 programs support approximately 2,400 Wrestling student-athletes across the country.

SELECTION PROCESS

A total of 330 wrestlers* will compete at the 2019 NCAA Division I Wrestling Championships in Pittsburgh, Pa. Of those 330 spots, 290* of them will be determined via automatic qualification. The remaining 40* spots will be selected at-large by the NCAA Division I Wrestling Committee.

Wrestlers will compete in the following 10 weight classes: 125 pounds, 133 pounds, 141 pounds, 149 pounds, 157 pounds, 165 pounds, 174 pounds, 184 pounds, 197 pounds, Heavyweights (183-285 pounds). The same 10 classes will be used in conference and regional qualifying meets.

Wrestlers can earn automatic qualification to the championships based on place finish at their respective qualifying tournaments, listed below.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 2019 NCAA Division I Wrestling Championships will be held March 21-23 at PPG Paints Arena in Pittsburgh, Pa.. A 33-man tournament will be conducted in 10 weight classes (125 pounds, 133, 141, 149, 157, 165, 174, 184, 197 and heavyweight) to crown individual national champions and the top eight finishers in the double-elimination format will be honored as All-Americans. Wrestlers also accumulate points for their institution with every win as they advance through the bracket to decide the team national champion.

Wrestlers will compete in seven minute matches and will advance through six different competition sessions with the individual national championship matches occurring in session 6 on Saturday evening, March 23.
