### 2007 Outlook

Midfielder Jessie Bruch (pronounced BROOK) returns for her senior season in 2007 as one of Nebraska's most dominant midfielders. A leader on the field, Bruch commands great respect at her position and has historically done a tremendous job of controlling the middle of the pitch for the Huskers.

At 5-11, Bruch is extremely competitive in the air, especially on NU's notoriously successful set plays, where she is often targeted for headers. This aggressive play in the box resulted in four goals for the St. Louis, Mo., native last season, many of which came off set plays. Bruch also improved her passing game in 2006 with three assists, developing what is expected to be a powerful weapon for the Huskers in 2007.

### 2006 Season

After establishing serious offensive potential in 2005, Bruch came back to the pitch in 2006 as a major scoring threat. In 12 games, Bruch scored four goals while firing 12 shots on goal. The 5-11 midfielder also became a solid set-up player, earning three assists, including two in Nebraska's 2-1 league win over Texas Tech.

Bruch tied for second in goals on the season with Aysha Jamani, trailing only All-American Brittany Timko (11).

Bruch also tied with Timko and Jamani in game-winning goals with two. She netted the winning ball against both Western Carolina and TCU. In all, three of Bruch's four goals were assisted by Timko, who often found the midfielder's imposing 5-11 target in the middle of the pack on set plays. During Big 12 play, Bruch repaid the favor, as both of Bruch's assists against Texas Tech resulted in Timko goals.

Despite a terrific start to the season, Bruch was forced to sit out in seven of Nebraska's 10 Big 12 matches with a knee injury. However, Bruch returned to the pitch in the Huskers' 3-2 win over Loyola-Chicago to end the regular season, taking two shots in her first-half appearance. Bruch needs just one more shot to enter the top 10 on Nebraska's all-time career shots chart.

### 2005 Season

After missing the 2004 season recovering from off-season knee surgery, Bruch returned in 2005 to bolster a Husker midfield that lost two starters from the previous season. Bruch scored two goals at Colorado, marking her first goals of the season and the first multi-goal game of her career. Bruch's two goals led the Huskers to a 2-1 victory with her game-winning goal coming in the 82nd minute. Bruch matched that effort with two goals in the Huskers' loss to Texas A&M in the semifinals of the Big 12 Tournament. She scored a goal in each half and her second-half goal marked her first of the season that was not scored on a set play. Bruch added the game-winning goal in the Huskers' 3-1 win over Kansas in the first round of the Big 12 Tournament. She finished with three goals and six points at the tournament and was named to the Big 12 All-Tournament team for her efforts.

### 2004 Season

Bruch took a medical redshirt while recovering from a torn anterior cruciate ligament.

### 2003 Season

Bruch was sensational for the Huskers in 2003, leading NU with 19 points. She was named to the Big 12 All-Newcomer Team for her outstanding play in her first season at Nebraska. The St. Louis, Mo., native produced 19 points on nine goals and one assist on the season. Bruch led the team with 73 shots and 28 shots on goal. She had a flare for the dramatic with five of her goals coming in the last 11 minutes of a contest, including five game winners. Bruch's most dramatic goal of the season came against Oklahoma State, when she scored the game winner with just five seconds remaining in regulation, giving NU a 3-2 win.

Bruch posted her first game-winning goal in her first official game in a Husker uniform, when she scored an early goal at the 8:33 mark to defeat DePaul, 1-0. The freshman also put the ball in the net against Iowa, Murray State, Texas Tech, Texas and Washington. She was the only freshman to start all 22 games in 2003.

Bruch scored her first postseason goal to give the Huskers a 1-0 lead against Washington in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. She also scored with less than eight minutes remaining in the semifinals of the Big 12 Tournament against Missouri with a header off a corner kick from Jenna Cooper.

### High School

Bruch was named an all-conference, all-metro and all-state player as a junior and senior at Nerinx Hall High School. Throughout her high school career, Bruch played all over the field and spent most of her senior season as a defender. She showed a knack for scoring by putting in the game-winning goal to win the Class 4A district championship, sending her team to the sectional finals in 2002.

She was the team captain as a junior and senior, as well as winning team most valuable player awards in consecutive years. Bruch earned four letters in soccer and was named to the second honor roll for her work in the classroom.

### Other Information

Bruch spent time training with the U.S. Under-19 National Team in 2003. She won five state championships as a member of the Busch soccer club. Bruch served as the team captain for her club team throughout her career starting with her Under-12 season.

### Personal Information

The daughter of Kevin and Rebecca Bruch, Jessie has one sister, Stephanie, 23, and one brother, Kevin, 19. Jessica was born on Sept. 25, 1984, in St. Louis, Mo. She is majoring in animal science at Nebraska.

### 2007 Outlook

Abby Penas (pronounced PEN-yahs) returns to the pitch in 2007 determined to make the most of a second attempt at her senior year after suffering a season-ending injury during Nebraska's exhibition opener in 2006. Penas received a medical redshirt for the season and spent the rest of the year rehabilitating with the hopes of getting back into the Husker lineup this season.

Now healthy and poised for an explosive senior season, Penas' return is well-timed as the Husker defense is in need of a replacement following the loss of two-time All-Big 12 selection Tanya Dennis. Penas should help lead the NU defenders, as the Grand Island, Neb., native is vocal on the field, while also leading by example with her aggressive, physical style of play.

### 2006 Season

Penas was granted a medical redshirt in 2006 after suffering an injury in Nebraska's season-opening exhibition game at Louisville on Aug. 25.

### 2005 Season

Penas, who filled in at defender for the first time during NU's postseason run in 2004, was again a key

contributor to the Husker defense in 2005. She started the first five games, including the full 90 minutes in the season opener against Minnesota on Aug. 26. In addition to the five starts to open the year, Penas tallied four more starts on the season, with her last coming against Oklahoma on Oct. 22.

Against the Gophers in the season opener, Penas pushed forward and added an assist on the first goal of the season, marking the second assist of her career. She attempted her first shot of the season against San Diego State on Sept. 6, and fired her only shot on goal of the season against Oklahoma State on Oct. 23.

Off the field, Penas earned second-team academic All-Big 12 honors and a spot on the Big 12 Commissioner's Fall and Spring Honor Rolls.

### 2004 Season

Penas was a solid player off the bench in 2004, appearing in 21 of Nebraska's 23 games, including her first career start against Texas in the first round of the Big 12 Tournament on Nov. 4. Penas also started all three of Nebraska's NCAA Tournament games. She logged a season-high 90 minutes against the Longhorns, playing defender for the first time in her career.

Although Penas played well in her switch to defender, she showed she still had a hand in Nebraska's offense. In the second round of the NCAA Tournament against Kansas, Penas found Nikki Baker with a long pass to set up the game-winning goal in overtime. The assist was the first of Penas' career.

Penas scored the first goal of her career to cap the Huskers' 3-0 victory over Texas Tech on Oct. 15. She attempted nearly three times as many shots in 2004 as she did in 2003.

A dedicated player, Penas also earned the Husker Power Award, which is annually presented to the most dedicated weightlifter on the team.

### 2003 Season

Penas saw action in 12 games as a freshman in 2003. She supplied a consistent boost to the Huskers coming off the bench during her rookie campaign.

Penas posted a perfect shots-on goal percentage, putting all four of the shots she attempted on goal in 2003.

### High School

The top scorer for Grand Island High School, Penas garnered several accolades during her high school career. She was named honorable-mention all-state in 2001 and 2002 and was named to the Class A second team in 2002.

Penas contributed 34 goals and 14 assists in her career, with her best production coming as a sophomore, when she scored 12 goals. Her high school team won the 2001 district title.

Penas also lettered in basketball and softball for three years. She was named to the All-Nebraska second team in softball in 2000. She also set a Grand Island High School record for single-season assists on the hardwood with 110 and the record for single-game assists with 10.

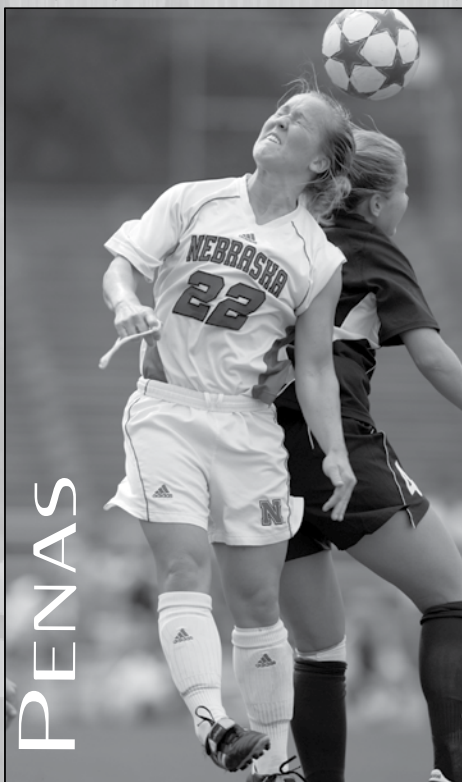
She was also impressive in the classroom, finishing in the top 15 percent of her class. Penas was a member of the National Honor Society.

### 2007 Outlook

Junior Meghan Hungerford will get back in the game for the Huskers in 2007 after receiving a medical redshirt in 2006 due to an injury she sustained prior to the season. Hungerford's return means increased depth and experience at several positions for Nebraska, as the Manhattan, Kan., native has earned time at forward, midfield and defense in her three-year career.

Hungerford's previous experience working in the NU defensive unit makes her a viable candidate for this role. The 5-7 junior gained limited minutes at both defender and midfi elder this past spring and following a solid summer of training is ready to get back into action for Nebraska.

### 2006 Season

Hungerford received a medical redshirt in 2006 following an injury she sustained prior to the start of the regular season.

### 2005 Season

Hungerford appeared in 19 games in 2005, after seeing time in 13 games - including three postseason

starts - as a freshman in 2004. She logged a conference season-high 33 minutes during a hard-fought 1-0 overtime loss at Texas on Oct. 16.

Hungerford had a career night at Oral Roberts on Oct. 14. After not recording a point in her first 24 career games, Hungerford broke out with a pair of goals while playing a season-high 63 minutes, 30 minutes more than her previous season high. The Manhattan, Kan., native also fared well at Texas on Oct. 16, playing 33 minutes.

Off the field, Hungerford was named a 2005 first-team academic All-Big 12 selection and was named to the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll in both the fall and spring semesters.

### 2004 Season

Hungerford saw significant playing time in her freshman season, competing in 14 of Nebraska's 23 games. She started the first game of her career in the opening round of the Big 12 Tournament, playing a career-high 71 minutes. She also started each of Nebraska's three NCAA Tournament games, playing well in a highly competitive and pressure-packed environment, including road matches against ranked teams at Kansas and Illinois.

Off the field, Hungerford was named to the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll in both the fall and spring semesters.

### High School

A three-time all-state selection for Manhattan High School, Hungerford led her team to the state championship in each of her four seasons. Hungerford also earned all-region and all-conference honors. She finished her senior season with 64 points to lead all high school players in the state of Kansas.

### Other Information

Hungerford was also a member of the Manhattan Patriots and Topeka Ballistics club teams.

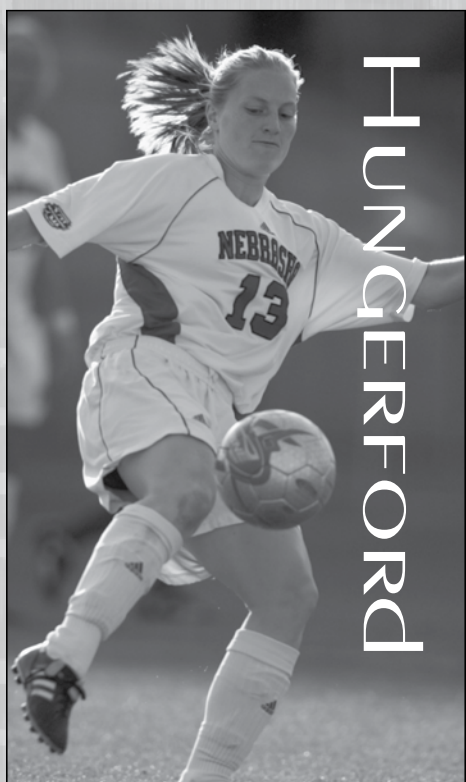

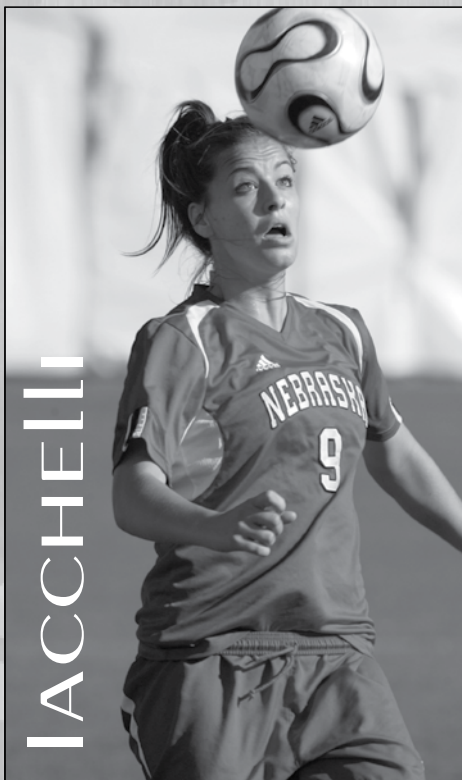

## 2007 Outlook

One of three returning starters in the midfi eld for NU, Selenia Iacchelli (pronounced Seh-LEN-yuh YUH-kel-ee) is back for her junior season in 2007 and brings with her the level of familiarity with the Nebraska system the Huskers will need to educate a large group of newcomers this season.

Nebraska's midfi eld is the only position to welcome all of its 2006 starters back to the lineup, including Iacchelli, who has started all 42 of her games at NU. The 5-7 junior also boasts incredible international experience, spending three years on the Canadian Under-20 National Team and playing with the Vancouver Whitecaps along with Husker teammates Carly Peetz, Anna Caniglia and Sari Raber this past summer.

An impressive athlete with great energy and physicality, Iacchelli possesses excellent close control and is willing to run all day in her central midfi eld position, allowing her to play the game with great range. Her ball-winning skills also improved rapidly in the last year, as has her speed of play, as she develops into the complete package at central midfi elder for the Huskers.

## 2006 Season

After playing at the 2006 FIFA World Championships with the Canadian U-20 team, Iacchelli returned to the Huskers in 2006 and started in 19 games. She has started all 42 games she has played during her career at Nebraska.

A strong attacking midfielder, Iacchelli put 16 of her 46 shots on goal in 2006 and earned a pair of goals. Iacchelli's first goal of the season came in Nebraska's 4-1 win over Drake on Sept. 10. She added another toward the end of the season on Oct. 22 to lift the Huskers to a 1-0 shutout over Oklahoma. The goal was the first game-winner of her career.

Iacchelli's offensive production intensified over the last two weeks of the regular season. In addition to her goal, she led Nebraska against Oklahoma State on Oct. 20, as she tallied four shots, including two of NU's three shots on goal. In NU's final regular-season match against Loyola-Chicago, Iacchelli took four shots, including one on goal and earned an assist on the Huskers' fi rst goal of the contest.

The assist was her second of the season, after notching the game-winning set-up against Texas Tech on Oct. 8. With her two goals and two assists, Iacchelli ranked fourth on the Husker points chart with six, trailing behind Brittany Timko, Jessie Bruch and Aysa Jamani.

## 2005 Season

Iacchelli had a leg up on the 10 other freshmen in the Huskers' 2005 class after enrolling at NU in January and joining the team for the spring season, which included road trips to perennial powers Duke, Florida, North Carolina and Ohio State.

Iacchelli also benefitted from extensive top-level international experience with the Canadian Under-20 and Under-19 National Teams. At Nebraska, she scored four goals while starting all 21 games in the midfield. Her nine points ranked second among all freshmen, and she was one of 10 Huskers and three freshmen to score a goal in 2005.

A native of Edmonton, Alberta, Iacchelli enjoyed a career game against Missouri on Oct. 2. In addition to scoring her third goal of the season, Iacchelli picked up the first assist of her career and finished with a career-best three points. Her fi nal goal came against Oklahoma State on Oct. 23.

Iacchelli's first goal was a highlight-reel finish. Iacchelli took a cross from Jamani and sent a diving header into the back of the net that capped a 3-1 Husker victory over Rice on Sept. 11. The second goal of her career tied NU's Sept. 18 game with UC Irvine at 1-1.

In addition to starting every game, Iacchelli played 75 or more minutes in 10 contests in 2005, including a career-high 110 minutes against Kansas on Sept. 30. For the season, Iacchelli ranked third on the team with 43 shots and fourth with 17 shots on goal.

Off the field, Iacchelli earned a spot on the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll in both the Spring of 2005 and 2006, and in the fall of 2005.

## High School

Iacchelli attended St. Francis Xavier high school where she participated in the soccer academy in each of her three years at the school. Iacchelli was awarded the Golden Ball Award, presented to the top player in the academy.

Off the fi eld, Iacchelli was named to the academic honor roll in each of her three years at St. Francis Xavier.

## Other Information

Iacchelli was a three-year member of the Under-20 Canadian National Team. She helped lead Canada to the CONCACAF Under-19 World Championship in 2004 and was also a member of Canada's 2003 Pan-American Games team and its 2006 U-20 World Championships squad.

Additionally, Iacchelli has spent two seasons with the W-League's Vancouver Whitecaps, scoring one goal and one assist in 10 games.

### 2007 Outlook

Lauren Isenhower is hopeful to return for her sophomore season in 2007. The Lenexa, Kan., native has suffered a number of injuries over the last year, but has undergone rehabilitation and is expected to join the Huskers for at least part of the season.

Isenhower's hard luck first hit prior to the 2006 season, leaving her out of the lineup following a spectacular freshman year that included two goals and three assists. The 5-9 forward had barely set foot back on the pitch this past spring when she again suffered a knee injury and was forced back into rehabilitation. She has since made tremendous progress and is poised to ease back into the lineup in 2007.

Isenhower's return would mark a major boon for the Huskers, as she brings the kind of offensive firepower Nebraska is searching for this season. Her seven points in 2005 came in just 14 starts at forward, as the Lenexa, Kan., native also spent four games at defense in her freshman campaign. This variety of experience fits well with the current Husker roster, which features a number of players who compete at multiple positions.

### 2006 Season

Isenhower missed the entire 2006 season after suffering a knee injury while playing in Europe during the offseason.

### 2005 Season

Isenhower made an immediate impact in her first season at Nebraska, scoring two goals and adding three assists, which tied for third on the team. Isenhower was moved to defense after injuries depleted the Huskers' backline, but reappeared at forward against Kansas on Sept. 30, and primarily played up front the rest of the season.

In her first game as a Husker, Isenhower scored her first goal, which proved to be the game winner in NU's 3-1 win over Minnesota on Aug. 26.

Isenhower then became a distributor in the Huskers' second game, tallying a pair of assists in a 4-0 Nebraska victory over UAB on Aug. 28. The Lenexa, Kan., native was one of the first players off the bench early in the season and provided another excellent offensive option for NU.

She earned the first start of her career Sept. 11 against Rice and started every game the rest of the season.

Isenhower scored the second goal of her career in the Huskers' 6-0 rout at Oral Roberts on Oct. 14. She increased her role in the offense toward the end of the season, taking as many shots on goal in a four-game stretch from Oct. 2 to Oct. 14 as she did in the first 11 games combined.

Offensively, 12 of Isenhower's 23 shots were on goal and her three assists tied for the lead among all freshmen. The 5-9 Shawnee Mission Northwest grad totaled seven points to rank fifth on the team and second among first-year players.

Due to injuries in the backline, Isenhower, who recorded the fastest 40-yard dash on the team and was known for her physical play, was moved to defender, where she started four games before starting her first game at forward against Kansas.

Isenhower's quickness and ability to win balls proved useful in a variety of roles. She also showed the ability to sustain her level of play for long periods of time, playing a career-high 83 minutes against Kansas on Sept. 30.

### High School

Isenhower scored nine goals in 2003 en route to being named Shawnee Mission Northwest's Player of the Year. Previously, Isenhower earned Best Newcomer, Most Skilled Player and MVP honors. In her final season, she was a co-captain and led the team with 17 goals and nine assists after missing almost the entire 2004 season with an injury.

She helped lead Northwest to a 9-6-1 record in her senior season while earning first-team All-Johnson County and All-Sunflower League honors and adding second-team All-Metro accolades.

### Other Information

Isenhower played club ball for the six-time Kansas state champion Kansas City Dynamos. Isenhower was also a three-year member of the Kansas Olympic Development Program and was a member of the Region II team.

## 2007 Outlook

Junior Aysha Jamani (pronounced EYE-sha JUH-mon-ee) is back in the Nebraska lineup as its top returning striker in 2007. Jamani has spent the last two seasons running a close second to three-time Big 12 Player of the Year Brittany Timko in both goals and assists. In 2007, she may emerge as NU's most potent offensive threat.

Jamani owns 11 goals and eight assists in two seasons and has started at forward in 37 games. A former Big 12 All-Newcomer Team member and two-time second-team All-Big 12 selection, Jamani has consistently performed at the highest level for the Huskers and will be looked at to increase her contributions and lead a young Husker offense in 2007.

## 2006 Season

Jamani was an offensive catalyst for Nebraska in 2006. On the season, Jamani had four goals and four assists for 12 points, which ranked second on the team behind only senior All-American Brittany Timko.

Jamani scored her first goal of the season in NU's 2-2 tie with Wisconsin, gathering her second goal in the same weekend to give Nebraska its first win of the season over Iowa, 1-0.

Jamani tallied the fourth game-winning goal of her career as she netted a ball in the 91st minute of the game to give Nebraska a 2-1 overtime win over Baylor. Jamani's goal just 51 seconds into overtime was the fastest overtime goal in school history. She is just two game-winning goals away from joining the Husker top 10 for career game-winners.

The 5-3 forward's last goal perhaps best demonstrated her amazing speed and talent. Against Loyola-Chicago, Jamani took a ball from goalkeeper Jamie Klages near midfield and raced through the entire Rambler defensive unit before ripping an off-balance shot for Nebraska's second goal of the contest.

Jamani put a lot of work into her goals in her sophomore year, taking a team-best 64 shots, including the 100th shot of her career against Baylor. Although she proved her scoring ability with four goals in 19 games in 2006, she increased her creativity by notching four assists as well, including two that resulted in game-winning goals.

## 2005 Season

Jamani was anything but shy in her first year at Nebraska. She ranked second on the team with 58 shots and 35 shots on goal and tied for second with seven goals. Her 18 points also ranked second on the team and were the most by a freshman since Jessie Bruch totaled 19 points her freshman campaign in 2003.

Jamani was honored as a second-team All-Big 12 selection, as well as being named to the Big 12 All-Newcomer Team.

In her first postseason action, Jamani scored a goal just 12 minutes into the Huskers' match with Kansas in the first round of the Big 12 Tournament on Nov. 2. The goal was her seventh of the season, a total that tied defender Sasha Andrews for second on the team.

Jamani scored two first-half goals in the Huskers' 3-0 rout of Missouri, marking her second multi-goal game of the year. Jamani's two goals tied a career high, while her first goal was her second game-winning goal of the season.

She provided a spark off the bench for the first three games of the season, bursting onto the scene with two goals against UAB, the first multi-goal game in the history of the Nebraska Soccer Field. That goal also proved to be the first game-winning goal of her career.

Her outstanding play earned her the first start of her career against San Diego State, and she started every game the rest of the season. She added her first career assist against Rice, and scored the Huskers' lone goal in a 2-1 loss at Purdue. At Oral Roberts on Oct. 14, Jamani notched her second career assist. She followed that with the first game-winning assist of her career against Oklahoma. She tied for third on the team with

Jamani is a member of the Canadian Under-20 and Senior National Teams.

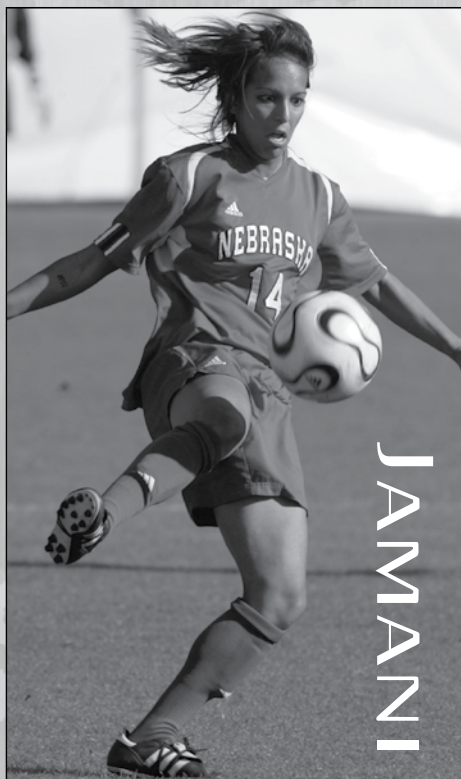
A native of Calgary, Alberta, Jamani brings a wealth of international experience to Nebraska. She has appeared in 11 games with the senior team, scoring seven goals.

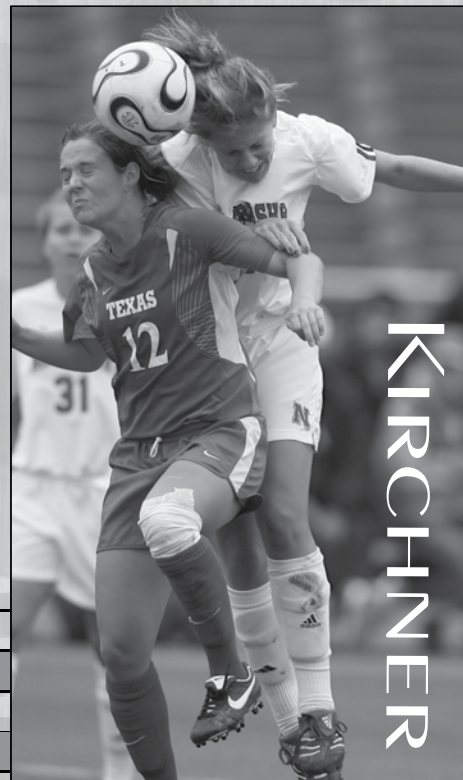

## 2007 Outlook

Lindsay Poehling's (pronounced PAY-ling) return to the Husker defense for her sophomore season is perhaps one of the most highly anticipated of any NU player this season. Poehling made the return to Nebraska's active roster in 2006 following ACL surgery and became one of NU's top defenders, starting in all 20 games and helping the Huskers hold opponents to fewer than 13 shots per game.

Poehling's work on the right side of the defense made her a key component in the lineup, which consisted of four main starters all last season, three of whom return in 2007. Poehling will return to the defense along with sophomores Carly Peetz and Anna Caniglia, and welcomes senior Abby Penas back the lineup after a season-long injury in 2006.

In addition to her defensive aptitude, Poehling has also proven herself as an offensive threat. During the spring, the 5-7 sophomore nabbed a pair of goals and one assist. Poehling's offensive effectiveness comes in large part from her ability to strike balls from long range.

## 2006 Season

Poehling was back in a big way for the Huskers in 2006 after sitting out most of the 2005 season with an injury. Poehling used her aggression and great ball control to earn a starting defensive spot with NU's core defensive foursome of Poehling, Tanya Dennis, Carly Peetz and Anna Caniglia.

Although a defender, Poehling was still offensively active. In fact, she took more shots than any other Husker defender with four shots on goal in 12 shots on the season. Poehling produced one shot on goal among her three shots in Nebraska's loss to Oklahoma State on Oct. 20, and again put a shot on goal in NU's win over Loyola-Chicago on Oct. 25.

Poehling also set up many scoring opportunities for the Huskers by pushing into the midfield where she gained

possession of the ball and was able to cross it toward the net for far post runs. This style of play earned Poehling the first assist of her career with a game-winning set-up to freshman Brittney Lanier against Drake on Sept. 10.

## 2005 Season

Poehling played in five games for Nebraska before an injury forced her to the sideline for the rest of the season. She applied for and was granted a medical hardship by the Big 12 Conference.

## High School

Poehling was the 2003 and 2004 Nebraska Gatorade Player of the Year at Elkhorn High School. She also earned Omaha World-Herald first-team All-Nebraska honors. In 2004, Poehling led the state by scoring 24 goals. She also led Class B and was tied for the state lead with 58 total points. Poehling added 10 assists as a junior in 2004. In 2005, Poehling produced 17 goals and 12 assists.

She was a four-time all-state and all-conference selection, as well as a two-time All-Omaha and Super-State honoree. Poehling also earned an invitation to participate in the Nebraska Shrine Soccer Classic in 2005.

In the classroom, she was a four-time member of the honor roll.

### 2007 Outlook

Raber has seen action in the backline, at midfielder and up front in her career. With a young Husker squad this season, Raber may be asked to play utility for Nebraska, providing leadership across the pitch.

Raber owns extensive international experience, including playing with the Canadian U-19/U-20 and Senior National Teams. ### 2006 Season

She added an assist in NU's 4-1 win over Drake on Sept. 10 for a total of three points on the season. Overall, Raber took seven shots, including two on goal.

### 2004 Season

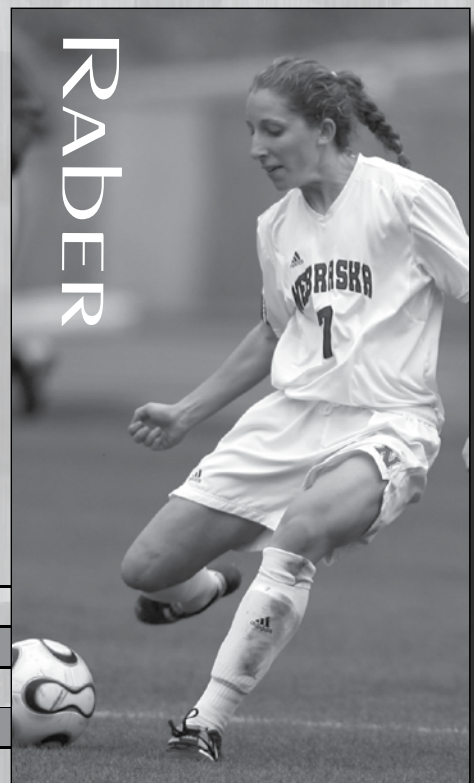
