Compliance Guidelines for NU Boosters

The University of Nebraska Athletic Department takes great pride in abiding by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and the Big 12 Conference rules and guidelines that govern Division I competition. For the benefit of the many alumni, fans and booster club members who are so active in supporting and assisting the Huskers throughout the year, we would like to remind everyone of a few definitions and rules that apply to all athletic representatives and boosters.

NCAA Principles

Institutional Control

It is the responsibility of the University of Nebraska to control its intercollegiate athletic program in compliance with the rules and regulations of the NCAA.

Responsibility

The University of Nebraska's responsibility for the conduct of its program includes responsibility for the actions of its staff members and for the actions of any other individual, booster or organization engaged in activities promoting the athletic interests of the institution.

Compliance

The University of Nebraska must monitor its program to assure compliance and to identify and report to the NCAA instances in which compliance has not been achieved. An institution found to have violated NCAA rules is subject to disciplinary and corrective actions as determined by the NCAA.

NCAA Definitions

Athletic Representative/Booster

You are considered to be a University of Nebraska athletic representative if you:

- Are a present or past member of a University of Nebraska booster club or agency that promotes the Huskers' intercollegiate athletic program;
- Have made financial contributions to the athletic department or to an athletic booster organization of the University of Nebraska;
- Are, or have been, providing benefits (e.g., summer jobs, meals etc.) to enrolled student-athletes, their family members or friends;
- Are, or have been involved in any manner of promoting the University of Nebraska intercollegiate athletic program.

Please note: Once an individual is identified as an athletic representative, that person retains that identity indefinitely. The University of Nebraska is ultimately responsible for the acts of all "representatives of athletic interests" in relation to NCAA rules and regulations.

Prospective Student-Athlete

A prospective student-athlete is a student who has started classes for the ninth grade or above, including students in prep schools and junior colleges as well as students who have officially withdrawn from a four-year institution and plan to transfer to another institution. In addition, a student who has not started classes for the ninth grade becomes a prospective student-athlete if the institution or a Nebraska booster provides the individual or the individual's relatives or friends with any financial assistance or benefits that the institution does not provide to prospective students in general. A good rule of thumb is to treat ALL STUDENTS as prospects.

Student-Athlete

A student-athlete is a student whose enrollment was solicited by a member of the Nebraska athletic staff or other representative of athletic interests with a view toward the student's ultimate participation in the intercollegiate athletic program.

Contact

A contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect, or the prospect's parent or legal guardian, and a Nebraska staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs.

Recruiting

Recruiting is any solicitation of a prospect or a prospect's family member (or guardian) by an institutional staff member or by athletic representative of the institution, for the purpose of securing the prospect's enrollment and ultimate participation in Nebraska's intercollegiate athletic program.

Guidelines and Reminders for Boosters

- A booster may not contact the prospect, prospect's coach, principal or counselor in an attempt to evaluate or recruit the prospect.
- A booster may not expend funds to entertain or provide transportation for a prospective student-athlete, the prospect's family members or friends.
- A booster may not become directly or indirectly involved in making arrangements for a prospect, or the prospect's relative or friends to receive money or financial aid of any kind.
- A booster may not contact a prospective student-athlete through letter writing, e-mail, telephone calling, text messaging, other forms of communication, etc.

However, here are a few ways that a Husker booster may be involved:

- You may discuss summer employment opportunities with a prospect after he/she has signed a National Letter of Intent with the University of Nebraska.
- You may attend high school athletic events without contacting prospective student-athletes.
- You may continue existing friendships with families and friends of prospective student-athletes.
- You may send recommendation letters, newspaper clippings or similar information about prospective student-athletes to Husker coaches.

Extra Benefit Guidelines and Reminders for Boosters

Extra Benefit

An extra benefit is any special arrangement by a Nebraska employee or an athletic representative to provide a student-athlete or the student-athlete's relative or friend a benefit not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation.

Boosters may not provide any special arrangement considered to be an extra benefit by NCAA definition. Examples of extra benefits include but are not limited to:

- Providing cash or loans of any amount;
- Signing or co-signing for a loan or other forms of financial assistance;
- Providing use of a telephone or calling card to make local or long distance calls;
- Transporting a student-athlete or providing the use of a vehicle;
- Providing free or reduced rent housing;
- Giving gifts of any kind (i.e. birthday, Christmas, Valentine's Day);
- Promising a student-athlete postgraduate education or employment;
- Offering free services (i.e. clothing, airline tickets, laundry, car repair, haircuts, restaurant meals);
- Providing payment to a student-athlete for a booster club speaking engagement;
- Providing employment for a prospect's relatives or friends.

Here are a few ways that a Husker booster may help:

- Do invite a student-athlete to participate in non-profit, charitable or educational events, but make sure to contact the compliance office for approval before the event.
- Do invite a student-athlete into your home for an occasional meal.
- Do pay a student-athlete the commensurate rate for actual and legitimate employment.

If you choose to assist in any of the ways described above, please contact the compliance office to receive prior approval.

THE BIG 12 CONFERENCE

Success On the Field and in the Classroom

The Big 12 Conference has been synonymous with success in competitive play and in the classroom. As the league enters its 12th season, member schools envision greater success in 2007-08.

In the first 11 years of the Big 12, the conference boasts 30 team and more than 350 individual NCAA champions. In 2006-07, the Nebraska volleyball team and Colorado men's cross country team added to the Bigs 12's NCAA crowns.

Over the past three seasons, Big 12 teams have hoisted 11 NCAA trophies, with at least one national title won in each of the past 10 seasons.

Through the first nine Bowl Championship Series title games, the Big 12 leads all conferences with five appearances in the contest. Big 12 squads have played for the football national championship five times in the last eight years, with berths in 12 BCS games overall.

In basketball, eight men's and women's teams have advanced to their respective Final Fours in the past six seasons.

Numerous national honors have been won by men's and women's student-athletes in Big 12 history. In 2006, Nebraska's Sarah Pavan was named the AVCA National Player of the Year on the court and the CoSIDA Academic All-American of the Year in the classroom. Pavan also won the Honda-Broderick Cup as the National Women's Athlete of the Year across all sports. Pavan and 2005 AVCA National Player of the Year Christina Houghtelling return for their senior seasons to lead the Husker volleyball team in 2007.

The Big 12 is committed to a competitive environment where sportsmanship and fair play take center stage. Whether on the field, in the classroom, or in the community, the student-athletes, administrators, coaches and game officials of the Big 12 support the highest ideals in sportsmanship.

Big 12 student-athletes also do well in garnering national academic recognition.

In fact, Nebraska leads the nation in the number of CoSIDA Academic All-Americans across all sports with 252 entering the 2007-08 season.

Competitive excellence, scholarship and sportsmanship are all components of the Big 12 philosophy. All-Big 12 teams and academic All-Big 12 squads are named for each sport.

At the end of each academic year, the conference honors its top male and female student-athletes with the Big 12 Athlete-of-the-Year and Big 12 Sportsperson-of-the-Year awards.

Institutions can also nominate student-athletes for the prestigious Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships at the end of each academic year. A total of 177 scholars have received more than \$1 million in postgraduate financial aid through the first 10 years of the program.

The Big 12 sponsors 21 sports. Men's squads include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, swimming and diving, tennis and wrestling. Women's teams are fielded in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The conference is made up of 12 institutions that have shared traditional rivalries throughout their histories. Member schools include - Baylor, Colorado, Iowa State, Kansas, Kansas State, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Texas, Texas A&M and Texas Tech.

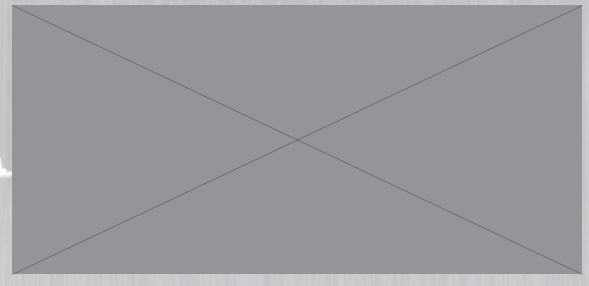
The institutions created a league that encompasses seven states, over 42 million people and more than 18 million television households within its geographic footprint.

The conference conducts championships for 20 of its 21 sports. Each championship helps to determine teams and/or individuals that will represent the Conference in national postseason competition. The winner of the Big 12 football championship game earns the league's berth into the prestigious Bowl Championship Series.

The Big 12 has developed additional football bowl agreements and expanded television opportunities for all sports through contracts with ABC/ESPN, FSN and CSTV. Most recently, the league renewed and expanded its multi-year arrangement with ABC/ESPN, Inc.

In its 11-year history, the conference has distributed \$913.2 million to its 12 member institutions.

The Big 12 staff administers to over 4,600 student-athletes in 21 sports. The conference is headquartered in Irving, Texas.

Nebraska Soccer Field

The Nebraska Soccer Field is adjacent to the northeast end of Memorial Stadium, in the center of the Ed Weir Track.

Press Room and Postgame Interviews

The Nebraska Soccer Field press area is located in the northeast concourse of Memorial Stadium. Nebraska soccer players and coaches will be available directly on the field following a brief cooling off period.

Interviews

All media requests for interviews with Nebraska soccer players should be directed to Amil Anderson of the Nebraska Media Relations office (office phone: (402) 472-7781; e-mail: aanderson@huskers.com; cell phone: (218) 371-6717), at least one day in advance. Through the fall season, requested soccer student-athletes will be available for interviews, pending class and meeting schedules, at Tuesday press luncheons in the Don Bryant Media Facility on Level 6 of Memorial Stadium. Soccer student-athletes are usually available for telephone interviews early afternoons and evenings. The best time for in-season interviews is before and after practice. With advance notice, interviews can be arranged for other hours.

Walker Interview Time

During the week, the best time to reach Head Coach John Walker for an interview is from 7:30 a.m. to noon or after practice. Interviews with Coach Walker should be coordinated through Amil Anderson in the Nebraska Media Relations Office at (402) 472-7781. Coach Walker's office telephone number is (402) 472-0456.

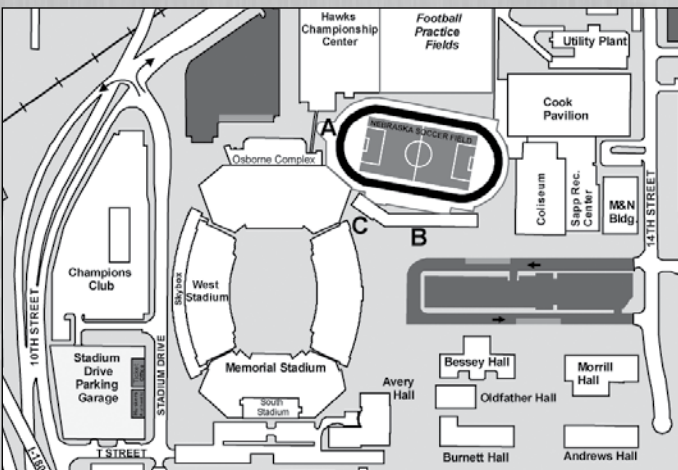

Award-Winning Publications



The Nebraska Media Relations Office is one of the best programs in the nation for producing award-winning media and recruiting guides for its 23 varsity sports. It earned 18 publication awards from the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). Nebraska's 18 CoSIDA awards led the nation, as the NU Media Relations Office has finished among the top five schools nationally in the overall publications contest for seven consecutive years.

Among Nebraska's impressive list of award-winning publications, five Husker media and recruiting guides were ranked "Best in the Nation" for their respective sports, while seven other publications ranked among the top five nationally in their contests.

The Nebraska baseball media guide created and designed by Assistant Media Relations Director Shamus McKnight was voted "Best in the Nation," as was intern Matt Smith's Nebraska softball media and recruiting guide. 2007 Introduction

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RULES OF THE GAME

Game Basics

Game Length: An NCAA soccer game is 90 minutes, consisting of two halves of 45 minutes. The halftime interval is 10 minutes. If at the end of regulation time the score is tied, the teams will play up to two extra periods of 10 minutes each. If at the end of two 10-minute overtime periods the score remains tied, the game is declared a tie. In NCAA Tournament play, there is a maximum of two 10-minute overtime periods. If the score remains tied at the end of two overtime periods, a round of five penalty kicks for each team follows. If the contest is still tied, then the match goes to sudden victory penalty kicks.

Starting the Game: The game is started by a kickoff, which requires a player to kick the ball into the opponent's half of the field. A goal may not be scored directly from a kickoff. Kickoffs are used to restart the game after a goal or any halftime or overtime interval.

Ball In and Out of Play: The ball is designated out of play when the entire ball has crossed outside the entire boundary line. The ball is put back into play by a corner kick, a goal kick or a throw-in.

Scoring: A goal is scored when the whole of the ball has passed over the goal line, between the goal posts and under the crossbar, provided it has not been intentionally thrown or carried by an attacking player.

Offside: A player is in an offside position if that player is nearer to the opponent's goal line than the ball, unless the player is in her own half of the field of play, or there are at least two opponents as near to their own goal line as the opposing player. A player shall be declared offside and penalized for being in an offside position only if at the moment the ball

touches or is played by a teammate, the player is, in the opinion of the referee, interfering with play, or seeking to gain an advantage by being in that position.

Number of Players: The game is played by two teams of 11 players each, one of whom is the goalkeeper.

Substitutions: Either team can substitute up to 11 players at a time. Either team may substitute on a goal kick, corner kick, after a goal has been scored, between periods, when a player has been cautioned, when a player has been ordered off the field for an equipment change and in the event of an injury.

Violations and Misconducts: A player shall be penalized if she intentionally handles the ball, holds or pushes an opponent, violent or dangerous charging, fouling a goalkeeper or any dangerous play. A player shall be penalized if that player intentionally spits, kicks, strikes, attempts to kick or strike, uses blood or bleeding injuries improperly against an opponent or jumps at an opponent.

Soccer Terminology

Caution (Yellow Card): A disciplinary action taken by the referee, signaled with a yellow card and officially recorded, against a player guilty of misconduct. A second offense warrants ejection from the match (red card).

Corner Kick: A direct free kick taken from a corner area by a member of the attacking team if the ball goes out-of-bounds across a goal line and was last touched by a member of the defending team.

Defender: Players forming the last line of defense, immediately in front of the goalkeeper. Their main job is to repel attacks on goal. Defenders are also called fullbacks.

Direct Free Kick: A free kick that may score a goal directly; that is, without the ball first being touched by another player. Also a specific penalty called for fouls and misconduct.

Dropped Ball: A dropped ball is used to restart the game after a temporary stoppage in play due to an infraction other than a foul. The referee drops the ball onto the ground between two opposing players. Play restarts when the ball touches the ground.

Ejection (Red Card): Sending a player off the field. A disciplinary action taken by the referee, signaled with a red card and officially recorded, against a player guilty of a personal foul or handballing. Usually results in expulsion from at least one future match.

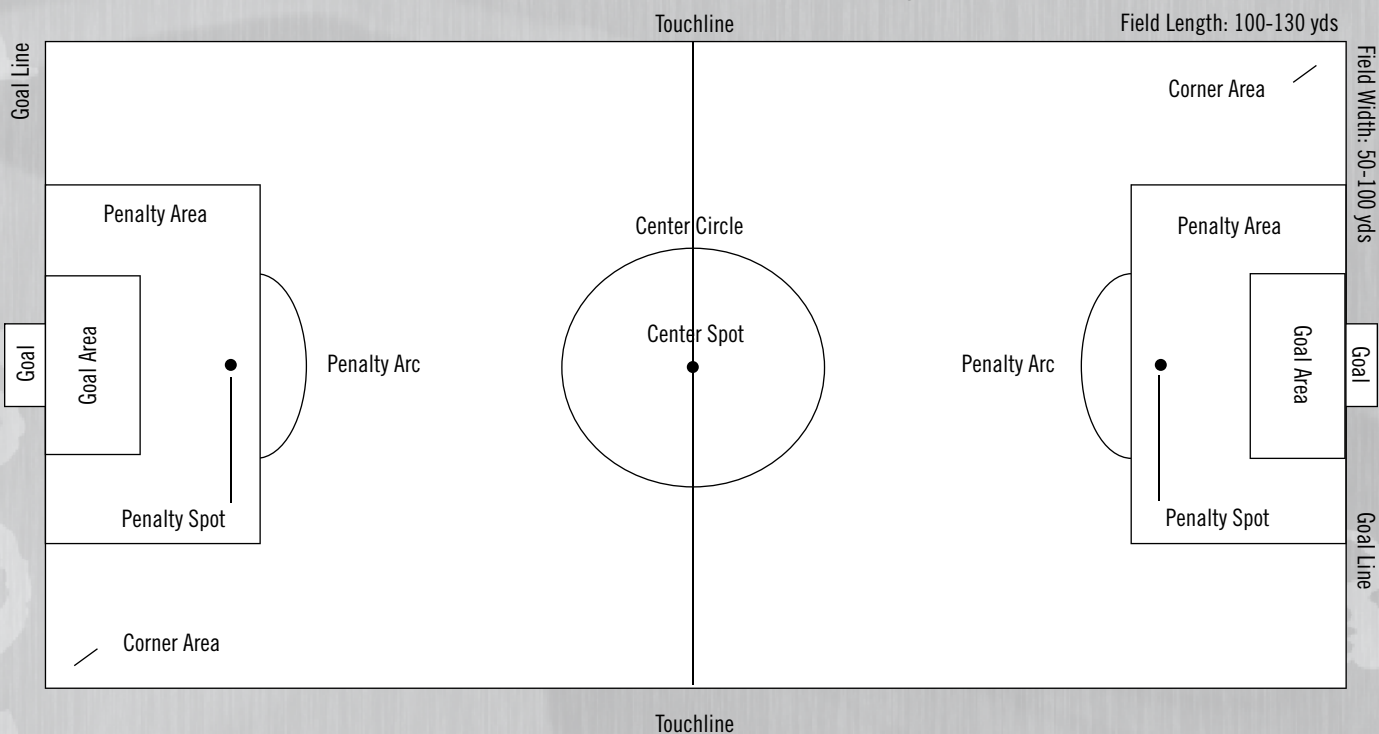
Forwards: Players who function primarily in the attacking third of the field and whose main responsibility is to score goals.

Free Kick: A placekick awarded to a team when a player of the opposing team is penalized. A free kick is either a direct kick, called for a serious offense, or an indirect kick, called for a minor infraction. Players on the offending team must remain 10 yards away from the ball until it is put into play, unless they are on their own goal line between the goalposts.

Fullbacks: Players forming the last line of defense, immediately in front of the goalkeeper. Their main job is to repel attacks on goal. Fullbacks are also called defenders.

Goal: The eight-yard-wide by eight-foot-high area into which field players must send the ball into in order to score. Two goalposts, a crossbar and netting form the goal, which is positioned midway along each goal line and extends beyond the official playing field.

The Pitch: The Soccer Field of Play



RULES OF THE GAME

Goalkeeper: The team's last line of defense. Primary responsibility is to prevent the opponent's ball from entering the goal for a score. The only player allowed to use her hands, provided she is within the penalty area.

Goal Kick: A placekick taken from the goal area by a member of the defending team when the ball goes out-of-bounds across the goal line and was last touched by a member of the attacking team or when it goes straight into the defenders' goal after a kickoff. All opposing players must stay outside the penalty area until the ball is in play. A goal cannot be scored directly from a goal kick.

Goal Line: The boundary line at each end of the field. When the ball completely crosses the goal line between the goalposts and under the crossbar, a goal is scored. When the ball completely crosses the goal line elsewhere, play is stopped and restarted either by a corner kick or a goal kick.

Halfway Line: The line drawn across the center of the field, parallel with the goal line, and separating the attacking and defending zones. Also called the center line.

Handballing: A major violation, the intentional use of the hands other than by a goalkeeper. The penalty is a direct free kick.

Indirect Free Kick: A free kick that cannot score a goal without the ball first being touched by a player other than the kicker. It is also a specific penalty called for minor infractions.

Kickoff: A placekick taken from the center spot to start the match and the second half or restart play after a goal has been scored. Opposing players must remain outside of the center circle until the ball is in play. A goal may not be scored directly from a kickoff.

Linesmen: The two officials who assist the referee. The linesmen patrol the touchlines and carry flags to signal the referee when a ball has gone out-of-bounds, or an offside or a foul has been committed that the referee might not have seen.

Midfielders: Players who function primarily in the central part of the field and whose main responsibility is to link the defense and the attack. There are three types of midfielders; defending, playmaking and attacking. Midfielders are also referred to as halfbacks and linkmen.

Obstruction: Deliberately impeding the progress of an opponent instead of playing the ball. The penalty is an indirect free kick.

Offside: A player is offside if she is between her opponent's goal line and the ball at the moment the ball is played unless she is in her own half of the field, at least two opponents (including the goalkeeper) are nearer their own goal line than she is or she received the ball directly from a corner kick, goal kick, throw-in or drop-ball situation. The penalty is an indirect free kick.

Soccer Officiating Signals



Penalty Area: An 18-by-44-yard area located directly in front of each goal. The goalkeeper may handle the ball in this area, and penalty kicks are taken from here.

Penalty Kick: A direct free kick taken from the penalty spot. It is awarded to the attacking team if a defender commits a major offense within her own penalty area. Except for the goalkeeper, who must remain stationary between the goalposts on her own goal line while the kick is being taken, all players must be outside of the penalty area and at least 10 yards from the penalty spot until the ball is in play.

Pitch: The traditional name for the soccer field.

Referee: The official in complete charge of a soccer match. The referee is assisted by two linesmen.

Save: A successful effort by the goalkeeper to prevent a possible score by stopping or deflecting a ball aimed at the goal.

Striker: Players who function primarily in the attacking third of the field and whose main responsibility is to score goals. Strikers are also called forwards.

Throw-In: The method of putting the ball back into play after it has gone out-of-bounds over the touchline. A member of the opposing team that last touched the ball must throw it onto the field from over her head, using both hands and keeping a part of each foot on the ground either behind or on the touchline. The ball is

thrown in from the point where it went out-of-bounds. A goal cannot be scored directly from a throw-in.

Touchlines: The boundary lines at each side of the field. If a ball goes completely over the touchline, play is stopped and restarted by a throw-in from the place where it went out-of-bounds. Touchlines are also called sidelines.

Wall: A human barrier of at least three players used to aid the goalkeeper in defending against free kicks, when they are specifically so awarded. Players may line up 10 or more yards from the ball to form a barrier between the kicker and the goal.

NEBRASKA SOCCER FEATURES NEW LOOK IN 2007

2007 Introduction

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The Nebraska women's soccer team returns to the field with a fresh new look in 2007 for its 14th season under Coach John Walker. The returning contributors will be joined by several players coming back from injury as well as 14 true freshmen.

Abby Penas is back for her senior season after redshirting last year and looks to boost the Huskers' defense. Sophomore Lauren Isenhower, returning in September, will add offense to the Husker attack after a knee injury sidelined her last year. Meghan Hungerford joins the comeback trail after sitting out last season. She'll look to build on her past experience and step into the starting lineup in 2007.

The veterans will be joined by an exceptional ensemble of 14 freshmen. The group boasts a collection of awards and honors, while having a distinctly local flavor.

Two Lincoln natives, Jamie Sanchez, a graduate of Lincoln Lutheran, and Pius X graduate Alexa Cardona join the Huskers in 2007, while five Omaha athletes add their talent to the squad as well. Other freshmen include 6-0 forward Jaclyn White and goalkeeper Jessica Mills, who graduated early from high school to join the Huskers. NU also add's Michaela Fulmer, Missouri's state goal-scoring record holder with 169 her junior season. A former U.S. National Team player, Brittany Goosen rounds out a solid freshman class.

Those fresh faces will be integrated into the Husker program through the experience and leadership of senior Jessie Bruch and juniors Aysha Jamani and Selenia Iacchelli. Bruch looks to cap her Husker career with a deep run into postseason play, while Jamani and Iacchelli will attempt to step into roles as leaders on and off the field.

The many new faces on the field will be joined by two new figures on the sideline. Wally Crittenden and Michelle Demko joined the Nebraska staff as assistant coaches in the offseason, Crittenden as the goalkeeper coach and Demko as NU's primary recruiter. Both bring an energy and creativity to the staff that will help unite and direct the Huskers.



Senior Jessie Bruch will lead the Husker midfield in 2007.

Crittenden, a native of Houston, Texas, brings an impressive resume as a goalkeeper coach to Nebraska. He worked with the Oklahoma women's program in 2005 and 2006, helping the Sooners to 14 shutouts over the last two seasons. Prior to his time at OU, Crittenden was active at various levels of soccer, including high school, Olympic Development and Division II. Add to that his time spent as a player at Florida International University and on the U.S. U-20 Men's National Team and Crittenden emerges as an impressive asset to the Huskers this year.

Demko joined the Nebraska staff after a four-year stint at North Carolina State. She helped the Pack improve from a 9-9-1 record in 2003, to an 11-9-1 mark in 2006. Complementing her coaching skills is her impressive resume as a player. Demko played professionally with the Philadelphia Charge in the WUSA for two years. She also had success overseas, playing in Germany, after her collegiate career at the University of Maryland. Demko's experience at the highest levels of competitive soccer could help provide NU's players with invaluable skills for future success.

The whole Husker squad has new motivation for the 2007 season. The talented team of experienced upperclassmen and promising freshmen will have an opportunity to prove themselves after a disappointing 2006 season. The Huskers finished the year 10-7-3 and failed to qualify for the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1996.

Following the loss of three-time Big 12 Player of the Year Brittany Timko and 2006 second-team All-Big 12 team selection Tanya Dennis to graduation, starting spots and major reserve roles are wide open in 2007. The season will be a fresh start for the Huskers and potentially the beginning of another long string of NCAA Tournament runs.

>> FORWARDS

The Huskers lost their offensive specialist Brittany Timko to graduation following 2006, but Nebraska will still have plenty of talent and experience at forward in 2007.

The Huskers return junior Aysha Jamani as their top striker from a year ago, while junior Sari Raber will add her wealth of experience and sophomore Lauren Isenhower returns to the pitch after several frustrating injuries. Add freshman Michaela Fulmer, one of the top high school players in Missouri last season, and Jaclyn White, a physically imposing force up front, and the Huskers could have a more potent offense this season.

Jamani spent the last two years as a complement to Timko. Now Jamani enters her junior year with a chance to step into the spotlight. In 2006, she finished second to Timko in goals and assists with four of each. This season she becomes the Huskers' most viable offensive threat.

Nebraska will look for her in the box in 2007, hopefully allowing her more touches and more shots. Jamani has recorded 11 goals and eight assists in two seasons while starting 37 games. That consistency has earned her selections to the Big 12 All-Newcomer Team while becoming a two-time second-team All Big-12 pick. More importantly it has earned her a chance to step into a leadership role on and off the field in 2007.

After missing the entire 2006 season with a knee injury, Isenhower may be poised to make a return to the Huskers' starting lineup. The sophomore will add the kind of offensive firepower the Huskers seek, as she recorded seven points in just 14 starts in 2005. She moved to the

defense after injuries put her offensive development on hold, but she enters the 2007 season with renewed energy.

Raber has seen action across the pitch for the Huskers. Gaining time as a defender, midfielder and forward, the junior has proven herself a valuable commodity no matter where she plays.

That value was recognized by those outside of the Nebraska program. Raber has spent extensive time with Canadian National teams and has played with the W-League's Vancouver Whitecaps. That experience will come in handy this year for the Huskers, as Raber can help guide the six freshmen forwards the Huskers have acquired.

Several of those freshmen may eventually challenge for playing time. Fulmer brings a goal-scoring ability from O'Hara High School in Kansas City, Mo., that should definitely benefit the Huskers. She owns the Missouri high school state record for career goals and her explosiveness and courage in tight areas make her a strong prospect to bolster the Husker offense. One of her freshman counterparts, Jaclyn White, brings her own style of goal scoring to the field. White possesses an impressive 6-0 frame and brings an added dimension to the Husker front line in 2007. She joins Nebraska from Torrance, Calif., and may quickly become a target in the set plays for which the Huskers have a reputation.

>> MIDFIELDERS

Nebraska welcomes all of its 2006 starters back in the midfield and adds a talented group of potential contributors. The solid trio of Jessie Bruch, Selenia Iacchelli and Meghan Hungerford will attempt to create more offense to help ease the loss of Timko. They will have help in that endeavor from a large crop of incoming freshmen who feature a distinctly local flavor.

The middle of the pitch will once again be controlled by Bruch, who returns for her senior season as one of Nebraska's leaders. At 5-11, Bruch uses her physical stature to make herself a target on set plays for the Huskers. Many of her 43 shots last year came off free kicks or corner kicks. She knows how to pass the ball too, racking up three assists last season. She will look to be a key distributor to her teammates this fall.

Iacchelli, a junior, has shown improvement in every season at NU and looks to continue that trend this season. She has worked toward becoming the complete package at the central midfielder position, as her ball-winning skills have improved thanks to her energy and physical play. Iacchelli, a contributor from day one, has started all 42 of her games at NU. Added experience has come from time with Canadian National Teams and the Vancouver Whitecaps of the W-League. That experience will help her develop a large group of newcomers in the midfield position this year.

Meghan Hungerford, a former utility player who has spent time all over the field, will concentrate on the midfield this season. A solid player off the bench in previous years, the junior will look to step into the starting lineup this year. She rejoins the Huskers after receiving a medical redshirt in 2006 for an injury sustained prior to the season. Hungerford will look to build on her 2005 season when she recorded 11 shots, seven of which were on goal.

The well-traveled upperclassmen are joined by a contingent of five freshmen midfielders in 2007. The group will not be far from home as three of them are from Omaha, including a set of twins. Katie and Colleen Goetzmann add



their skills to the Husker talent pool after leading Millard North High School to a state title in 2006. Colleen, known for her range on the field, brings good distribution skills to the Nebraska midfield. Katie roams the midfield with strong defensive and aerial skills, possibly making her a future candidate for a move to defense.

>> **DEFENDERS**

The Husker defense should be stout with three starters returning in 2007. The defensive corps are led by senior Abby Penas and sophomores Lindsay Poehling, Carly Peetz and Anna Caniglia. They'll be joined by experienced underclassmen and talented freshmen as the Huskers hope to remain one of the top defenses in the Big 12.

Poehling started all 20 games last season and helped the Huskers hold opponents to fewer than 13 shots per game. Poehling added offensive punch in spring exhibition action with goals against Minnesota and Kansas and topped it off with an assist.

Penas returns for a second senior season after suffering a season-ending injury during Nebraska's opening exhibition game at Louisville in 2006. After receiving a medical redshirt, Penas looks to help fill the void left by two-time All-Big 12 selection Tanya Dennis. Known for her aggressive play, Penas adds a tone of physical toughness to the 2007 team.

Peetz looks to increase her impact on the field and in the locker room as a leader for the Husker defenders in 2007. Peetz had a stellar freshman year, starting all 20 games for Nebraska and earning a spot on the Big 12 All-Newcomer Team. She showed her prowess in the classroom as well by being named to the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll for the fall and spring semesters. She returns to the Huskers with added international experience after spending the off-season with the U.S. Under-20 and 21 National Teams.

Caniglia started all 20 games as a freshman in 2006 and will look to capitalize on her early experience this year. Now the sophomore will help lead a group of underclassmen that solidify the defender position as one of the deepest for Nebraska.

Freshmen Rachel Hawryluk and Meredith Shuman add even more talented depth for NU at defender. Hawryluk comes to Nebraska from Trinity Christian Academy in Dallas, Texas, while Shuman will challenge for playing time after breaking several school records at Bellevue West in Omaha.

>> **GOALKEEPERS**

The Husker goalkeeper position is up for grabs this season, as sophomore Brittany Pfeil and freshman Jessica Mills compete for the job. Both look to step in after the departure of two-year starter Jamie Klages.

Pfeil gained limited playing time behind Klages, but played well in Nebraska's spring exhibition games. She posted a mark of 3-1-1, allowing just five goals in five games. Pfeil posted a 3-0 shutout of South Dakota State and ended her spring on a confident note with a 3-0 shutout of Big 12 opponent Colorado. The Buffaloes advanced to the Sweet 16 in last year's NCAA Tournament and finished the season ranked No. 12.

Mills brings a strong resume and abundant experience to the Husker program. The 5-7 freshman is one of two Texas natives to join NU's 2007 recruiting class, along with Hawryluk.

Mills is the youngest member of the Husker squad, after

graduating from high school a year early to join Nebraska. She may be young, but Mills posted a 17-2 record in her final season in high school and has played extensively with the Texas Olympic Development program and the Region III team.

>> **SCHEDULE**

The 2007 schedule features 10 home games for the Huskers at the Nebraska Soccer Field. The field will be the home of the Huskers for the third year. Located conveniently between Memorial Stadium and the NU Coliseum, the field will feature primarily Friday late afternoon and Sunday afternoon games.

The Huskers' road schedule features eight squads that qualified for the 2006 NCAA Tournament, including an exhibition match with Louisville on Aug. 25 to start the season.

Nebraska travels to the USC Tournament in Los Angeles, Calif., early in the season to face two tough SEC schools in Tennessee and Georgia. The Huskers return from the tournament for their longest homestand from Sept. 21 to Sept. 30. Nebraska faces two tournament qualifiers, Saint Louis and Florida, and kicks off its Big 12 schedule in those nine short days. Nebraska hosts conference foes Oklahoma and Oklahoma State, Sept. 28 and 30, before traveling to Colorado and Texas.

The Huskers' conference schedule includes home games against Baylor and Iowa State, while traveling to Texas Tech, Kansas and Missouri. A home match against Texas A&M late in the season will be a key game for the Huskers, as A&M won the Big 12 regular-season title last year and advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament before falling to eventual champion North Carolina.

The Huskers begin postseason play Nov. 7 at the Big 12 Championship in San Antonio, Texas, as Nebraska seeks its sixth Big 12 title. Nebraska's success in the conference tournament has historically been a stepping stone to the NCAA Tournament. The first round of the 2007 tournament

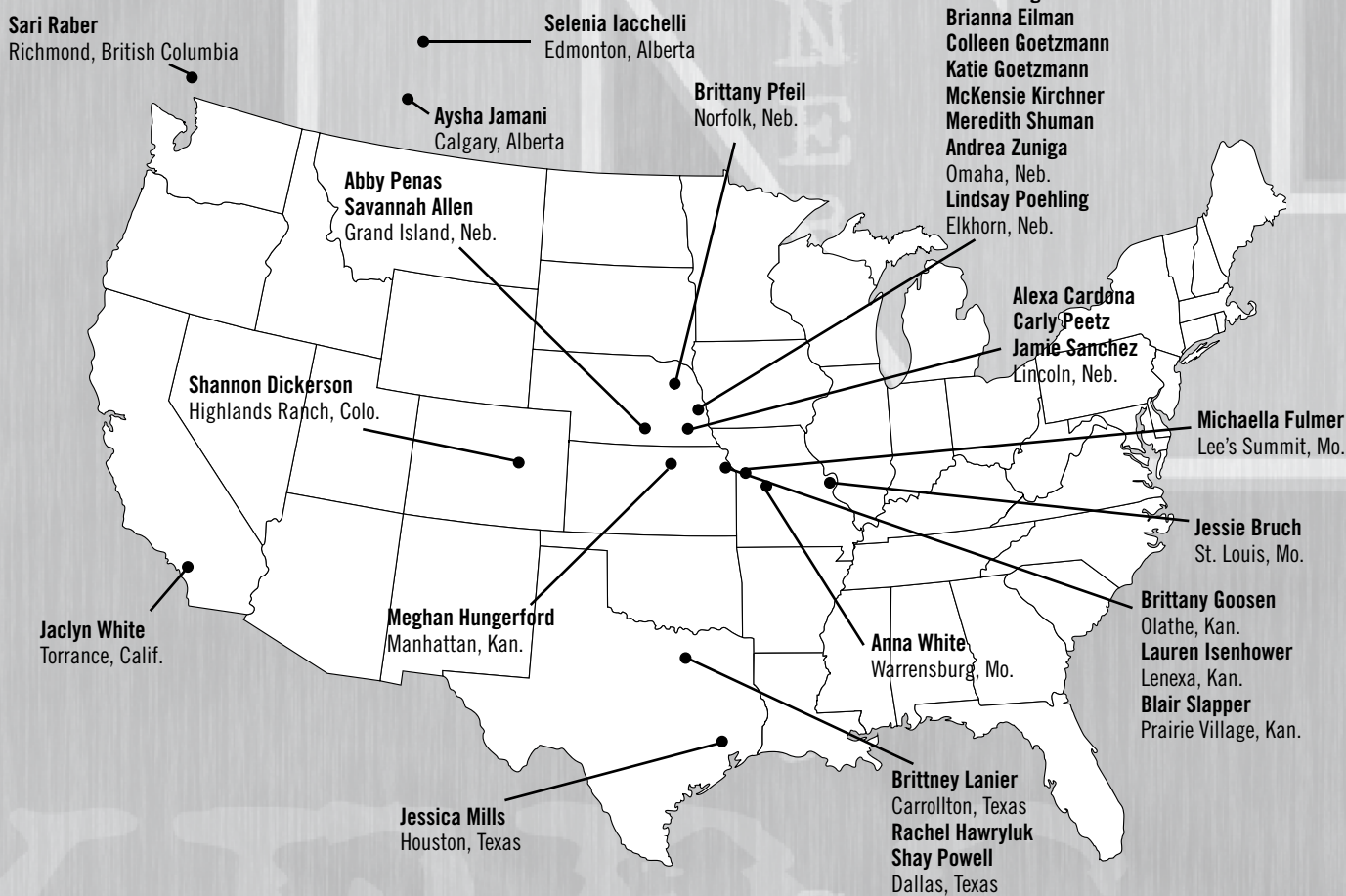

2007 Big 12 Soccer Tournament

The 2007 Big 12 Championship will begin on Wednesday, Nov. 7 and will continue through Sunday, Nov. 11. Only the top eight teams in the regular-season standings advance to the tournament, held at Blossom Soccer Stadium in San Antonio, Texas.

This year's tournament marks the 12th anniversary of the event. Historically, Nebraska has enjoyed tremendous success at the tournament, enjoying five titles and a 17-5 record. The first round will be played on Nov. 7, with the winners advancing to play on Nov. 9. The championship game will then be played on Nov. 11.

Nebraska's five Big 12 titles came in 1996, 1998, 1999, 2000 and 2002. The Huskers also claimed regular-season crowns in 1996, 1999, and 2000.

2007 NCAA Soccer Tournament

The 2007 NCAA Tournament will consist of 64 teams, beginning on Nov. 16, and ending with the national championship game on Dec. 9 in College Station, Texas.

The first through quarterfinal rounds will take place at campus sites around the country. The first and second rounds will be held Nov. 16-19 at campus sites. The Nebraska Soccer Field was chosen as one of those sites in 2005, as the Huskers hosted Creighton, Iowa State and Portland in first-round action on Nov. 11 and 13, 2005.

Third-round games will be contested at eight host institutions Nov. 23-25. The tournament quarterfinals take place Nov. 30-Dec. 2 at four campus sites.

Texas A&M will host the 26th annual Women's

College Cup. The semifinals will be played on Dec. 7, and the 2007 national champion will be crowned in College Station, Texas, on Dec. 9

Nebraska has been host to opening-round action on seven occasions from 1996 to 2006, advancing to six straight Sweet 16 appearances from 1996 to 2001 and eight in the last 11 years overall.
