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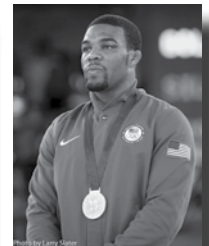
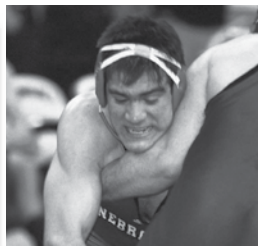
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THIS IS NEBRASKA

Three years after celebrating its first season as a member of the Big Ten Conference, the Nebraska wrestling program will look to continue its excellence both on and off the mat. Coach Mark Manning has continued a tradition of success in his 14 years at the helm of the Huskers. With hard work and a dedication to excellence, Manning has developed a program that consistently competes with the nation's best in collegiate wrestling.

Since its inaugural season in 1910-11, Nebraska has earned more than 650 dual victories, including 187 wins in the past 14 years under Manning. Over the past 14 years, the Huskers have finished in the top eight at the NCAA Championships five times and racked up 36 All-America honors, including five individual national titles. In the classroom, the 2012-13 Huskers finished second in the nation by NWCA for the highest grade-point average (3.32). NU wrestlers have earned 48 NWCA All-Academic Team selections en route to seven CoSIDA Academic All-America awards.

One reason NU has been able to develop such a successful program is its top-notch facilities. In the fall of 2011, the Husker wrestling program moved into the state-of-the-art Hendricks Training Complex, which provides four full-sized practice mats, new office suites and new areas for both strength and conditioning and athletic medicine. The Hendricks Complex is attached to the Devaney Center, which hosts the majority of Nebraska's duals this season. With a wealth of support and a history of success, Nebraska wrestling expects to contend for conference and national championships every year.

SUCCESS BEYOND WRESTLING

Nebraska coaches have always guided young men toward success on the mat while also teaching them to find success in life, and Mark Manning continues that with his coaching philosophies. Manning has helped young men grow into upstanding adults by teaching athletes that the values they learn on the mat can be transferred into their personal lives. Bryan Snyder (right) earned his Ph.D. in sociology after becoming NU's only four-time All-American. Snyder is now associate head coach for the Huskers.

The Scherr brothers were both national champions at Nebraska in 1984, before continuing their prosperity on the mat into their personal lives. Bill (above left) earned the collegiate title at 190 pounds and went on to win five medals in the Olympics and FILA World Championships before turning his attention to a professional career. He now serves as the vice president of a global investment banking and securities firm.

Jim (above right) won the national title at 177 pounds with a victory over Iowa's Duane Goldman and also continued his wrestling career onto the international stage. Jim claimed three medals between the Olympics and FILA World Championships and continued his involvement with the Olympics through 2008.

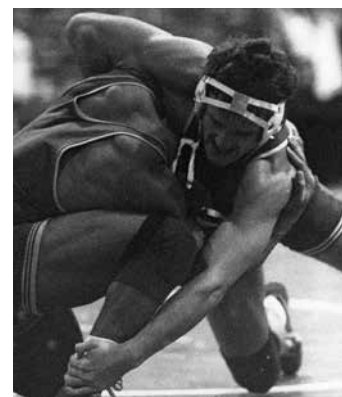

OLYMPIC GLORY

Nebraska wrestling has climbed its way into the Olympic spotlight during the past several Olympics. Former Huskers who have continued their careers on the international stage include 2012 freestyle gold medalist Jordan Burroughs and two-time Olympic medal-winner Rulon Gardner, who won a gold medal in 2000 and a bronze in 2004 in Greco-Roman. Overall, seven Nebraska wrestlers have participated on seven U.S. Olympic teams and claimed six medals.



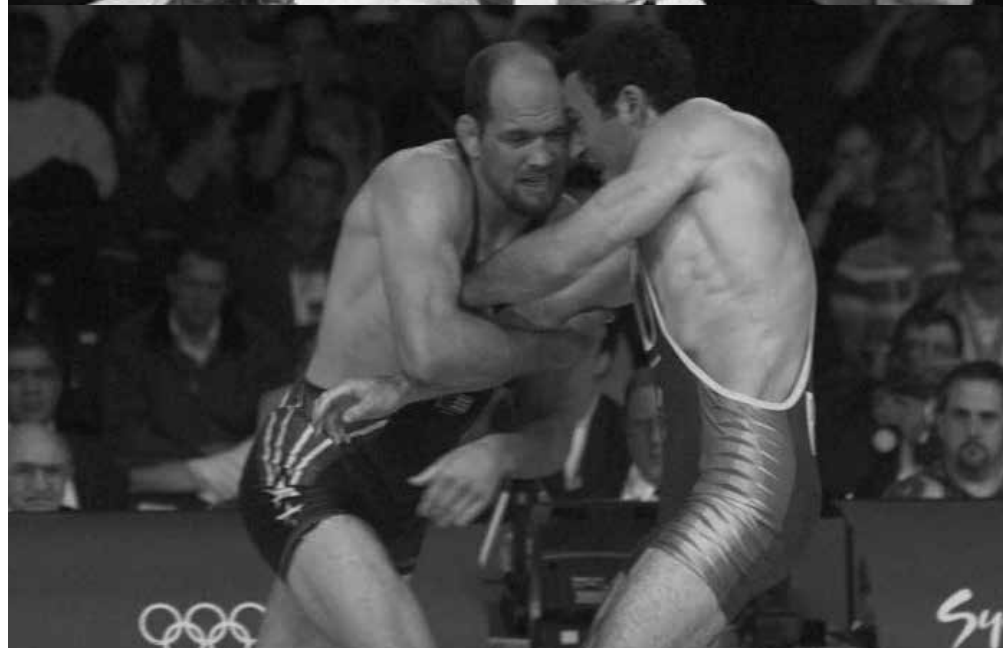

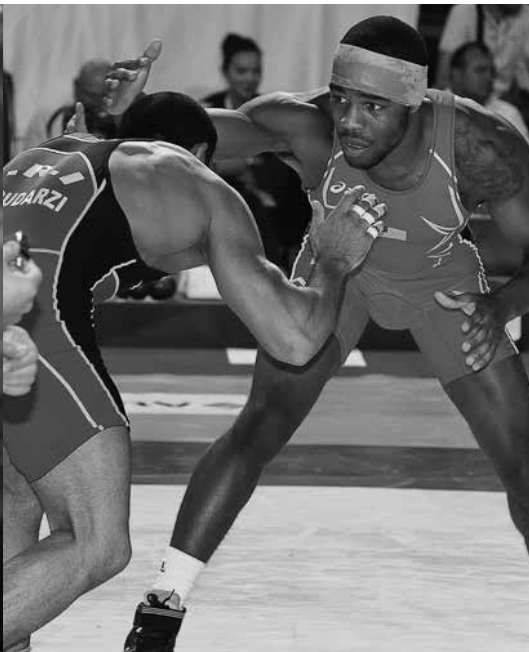

A three-time All-American and two-time national champion for Nebraska, Jordan Burroughs (top) won the gold medal in freestyle at 163 pounds in the 2012 Olympics in London.

A 1993 All-American at heavyweight for Nebraska, Rulon Gardner (middle) pulled off one of the most remarkable upsets in sports history with his victory over previously undefeated Alexander Karelin of Russia in the gold medal match in the 2000 Olympics in Sydney, Australia. Gardner also earned a bronze medal in the 2004 Olympics in Athens, Greece.

Matt Lindland (bottom) was a 1993 Big Eight champion for Nebraska and went on to earn a silver medal at the 2000 Olympics in Sydney, Australia. He was named the head coach of the U.S. Greco-Roman team in May 2014.





INTERNATIONAL EXCELLENCE

Numerous Nebraska wrestlers have continued their careers on the international stage after their time at NU. Huskers have won 17 medals at the FILA Championships, including titles by Bill Scherr in 1986, Rulon Gardner in 2001 and Jordan Burroughs in 2011 and 2013. Brad Vering was named the 2007 Greco-Roman Wrestler of the Year by USA Wrestling after his silver-medal performance at the 2007 FILA World Championships. Burroughs became the first American freestyle world champion since 2006. Burroughs (top) captured the world championship in 2011 and 2013 after finishing his career at Nebraska as the school's only two-time national champion. He added a bronze medal in 2014.

Justin Ruiz (middle-left), a two-time All-American for the Huskers, earned a bronze medal in the 2005 FILA World Championships in Budapest, Hungary. He has represented the United States in the last four FILA World Championships.

Tolly Thompson (middle-right) claimed a national title for Nebraska in 1995 and was a three-time All-American before going on to earn a bronze medal at the 2005 FILA World Championships.

After winning national titles at Nebraska in 1984, the Scherr brothers, Bill (bottom left) and Jim (bottom right) continued their wrestling careers by winning seven medals between them at the FILA World Championships, including a title by Bill in 1985.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

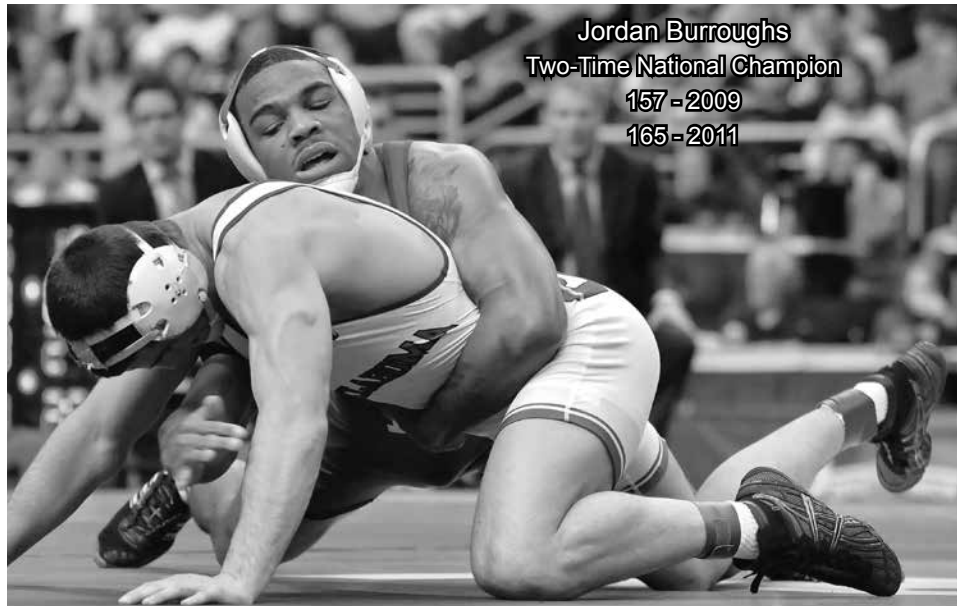
All-America Tradition

One of the nation's premier wrestling programs, Nebraska has produced 11 national champions, including five in the last 14 years. Husker wrestlers have earned 95 All-America honors, including 70 awards since 1990 and 36 since Coach Mark Manning took the reins of the program in 2000-01.

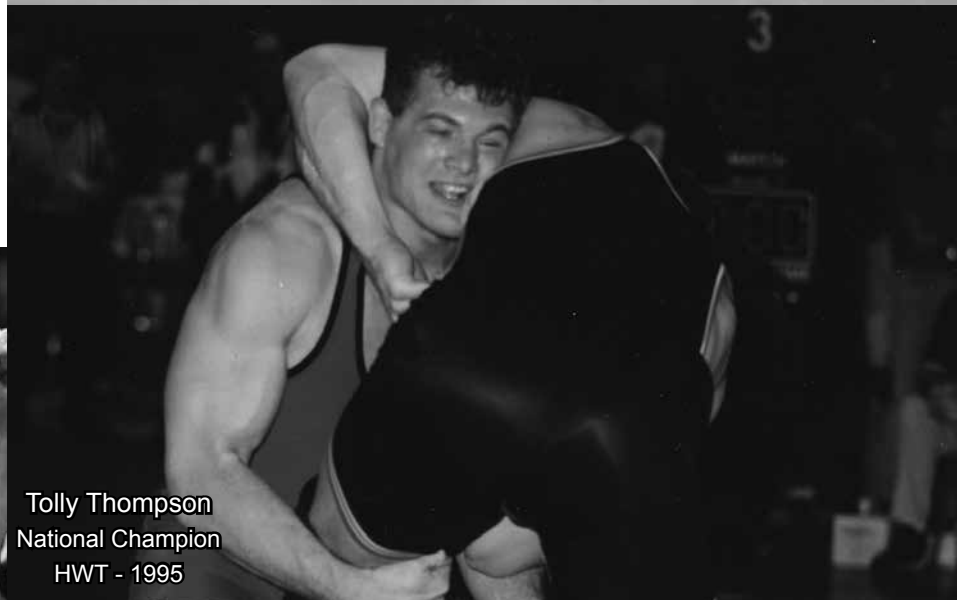
Top Right: Jordan Burroughs became Nebraska's first two-time national champion in 2011 at 165 pounds after winning the 157-pound title in 2009.

Middle: Heavyweight Tolly Thompson won the 1995 national title with an 8-0 major decision over Northern Iowa's Justin Greenlee. The Nebraska record holder for career wins, Thompson was a three-time Big Eight champion and All-American.

Bottom Left: Jason Powell capped his illustrious career as a three-time All-American, including a 125-pound national championship as a senior in 2004. Powell, who ended his career 109-24, took third in 2003 and fifth in 2002 before becoming the first national champion coached by Mark Manning at Nebraska.



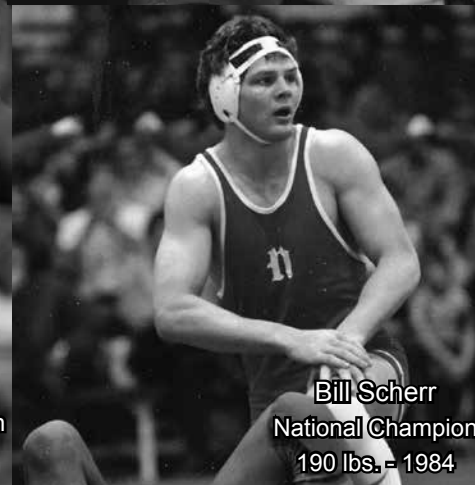

Bottom Right: The Scherr brothers were standouts for Nebraska from 1980 to 1984. Bill was NU's first three-time All-American and defeated Jim Baumgardner of Oregon State in the finals of the 1984 NCAA Championships at 190 pounds. Bill clinched his national title with a 36-1 senior season at NU. He was also a three-time Big Eight champion. Jim earned the Huskers' second individual title with his win over Iowa's Duane Goldman at 177 pounds in 1984.

Top Left: Jason Kelber (top left) led the Huskers to a 10th-place NCAA finish in 1991 with his national title at 126 pounds. He finished 32-2 as a senior, defeating Terry Brands in the NCAA final.

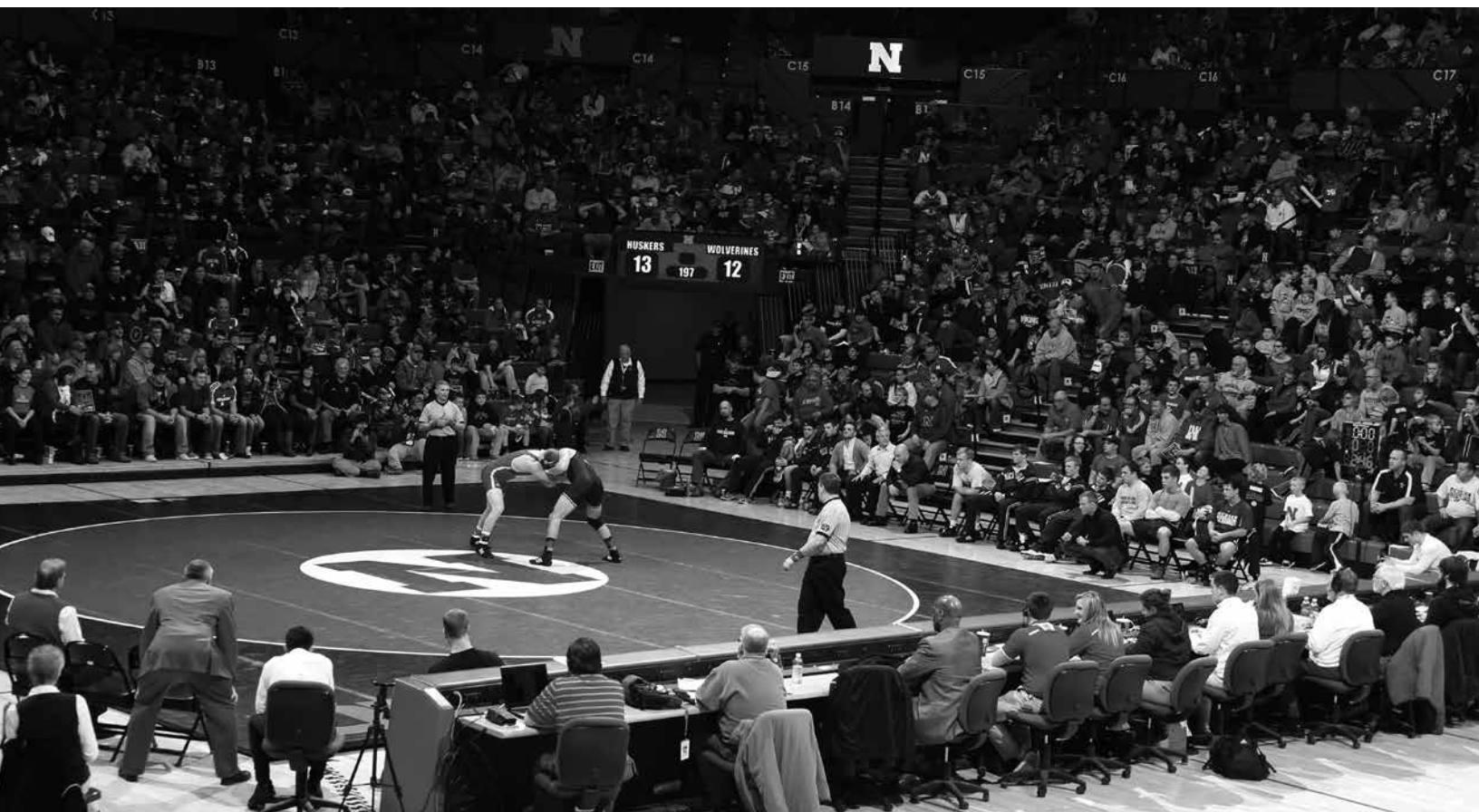
Middle Left: Mike Nissen was Nebraska's first national champion in 1963. Wrestling at 123 pounds, Nissen went 19-1 as a senior and closed his career with a perfect 36-0 dual mark.

Top Right: Tony Purler went 35-2 on his way to the 1993 NCAA title at 126 pounds. He defeated Arizona State's Shawn Charles to avenge his only losses of the year.

Bottom Right: Brad Vering was Nebraska's seventh NCAA champion, defeating Iowa State's Zack Thompson in a tiebreaker, 2-1, to claim the 197-pound title in 2000. A three-time All-American, Vering finished fifth all-time on Nebraska's career win list with a 124-26 mark.

WRESTLING FACILITIES

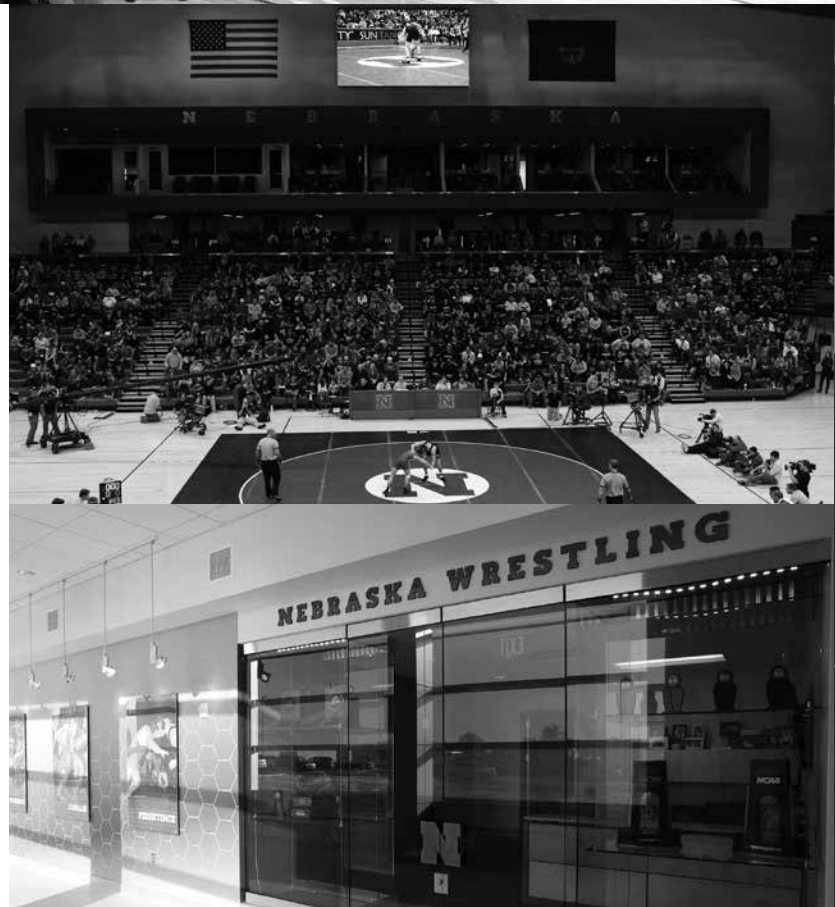


Nebraska Wrestling enjoyed a new home in 2013-14 when the Huskers moved to the Bob Devaney Sports Center. NU will host five duals this season at the newly renovated Devaney Center.

In addition to hosting duals, the Devaney Center and Hendricks Training Complex house the wrestling offices, locker room, weight room and wrestling room, all just steps from each other, providing an atmosphere conducive to elite training. The Hendricks Complex, which is connected to the Devaney Center, includes a practice facility, coaches' offices as well as strength and conditioning and athletic medicine areas.

Top and Middle: Nebraska made its new competitive home at the Bob Devaney Sports Center in 2013-14. The Devaney Center has received more than \$20 million in renovations to make the nearly 8,000-seat arena one of the best home atmospheres in the nation.

Bottom: Opened in the fall of 2011, the Hendricks Training Complex is home to the wrestling team, along with the men's and women's basketball squads.



HENDRICKS TRAINING COMPLEX

The Nebraska wrestling program experienced some major facility improvements in the fall of 2011, starting with the addition of the Hendricks Training Complex.

The Hendricks Training Complex provides four full-sized practice mats, new office suites and new areas for both strength and conditioning and athletic medicine attached to the Bob Devaney Sports Center. The facility was completed in October of 2011.

Top: The Husker wrestling locker room features 40 custom-made lockers with back-lit displays.

Middle: The Hendricks Complex features a new 5,000-square foot strength complex. The strength complex includes five Transformers, which are unique to Nebraska. The Transformers are fully automated, which helps student-athletes reach optimal training.

Bottom: The Nebraska wrestling room has four new mats that have a thicker underlayment, creating a safer environment for practice. The room also features an athletic medicine area and a cardio area adjacent to the mats.



CHAMPIONSHIP FACILITIES





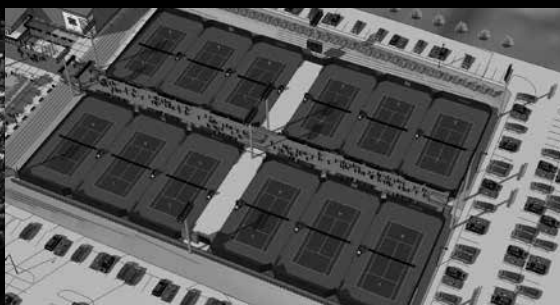
Nebraska's top facilities are not limited to the wrestling program. Nearly every Husker sport enjoys a venue that ranks among the nation's best. Nebraska provides its student-athletes top-notch game-day and practice atmospheres in every sport.

The nationally prominent Nebraska volleyball team moved into the Devaney Center for the first time in 2013, after the building received a \$20 million renovation. The baseball, softball, men's and women's basketball, volleyball and wrestling programs have all benefitted from new practice facilities the last three seasons.

Top: Memorial Stadium will close the 2014 with a nation-leading 340 consecutive sellouts. The stadium expanded by more than 5,000 seats in 2013, while adding an innovative academic/athletic research wing in the East Stadium. The Osborne Athletic Complex (bottom left) provides Nebraska student-athletes with top-notch training facilities. The main entrance to the Osborne Athletic Complex and Traditions Lobby features an impressive waterfall and a wall that honors those who contributed to the massive project, as well as memorabilia and trophies from all of Nebraska's bowl games.

Middle: Nebraska's teams compete in some of the nation's finest facilities in front of large crowds. The softball, wrestling and track and field programs enjoy some of the best practice and competition-day atmospheres in the country, while the volleyball team led the nation in attendance in its first season at the Devaney Center in 2013. The Nebraska soccer and tennis teams will benefit from new homes in 2014-15.

Bottom right: Hawks Field at Haymarket Park provides the Huskers with the finest baseball stadium in the Big Ten Conference. Nebraska shares its home ballpark with the Lincoln Saltdogs, an independent minor league team. The home of Nebraska softball, Bowlin Stadium, is right next to Haymarket Park and both the baseball and softball programs benefit from the new Alex Gordon Training Complex.

The model strength and conditioning program in the nation, Husker Power plays a major role in the continuing success of Nebraska athletics. Nebraska's strength program was the first in the nation. With 13 staff members, Husker Power is one of the most comprehensive strength and conditioning organizations in the nation. Nebraska's strength training facilities have set the standard in collegiate athletics since the early 1970s. The Ndamukong Suh Strength and Conditioning Center in the Osborne Athletic Complex has taken the Husker program to a whole new level in the past five years. The Hendricks Training Complex weight room is shown below.

HUSKER POWER

Three Reasons for Success

Program - The Husker Power Strength and Conditioning Program is geared for maximum improvement of performance on the field. Each athlete receives their own individual computerized program each year.

Supervision - The Husker Power staff has nine full-time strength and conditioning specialists and four interns. Former Nebraska NCAA Champion Jason Powell works directly with the wrestling program to help Huskers prepare for success.

Facilities - The Hendricks Training Complex features a 5,000-square foot weight room for the wrestling program, along with the men's and women's basketball programs. The new weight room is designed similar to the Ndamukong Suh Strength Complex in the Osborne Complex.



ATHLETIC MEDICINE

Providing expert care to more than 600 Husker student-athletes, Nebraska features one of the most well-trained and highly skilled athletic medicine staffs in the country.

Under the guidance of Director of Athletic Medicine Dr. Lonnie Albers and Head Athletic Trainer and Physical Therapist Jerry Weber, the 2014-15 Nebraska athletic medicine staff consists of five doctors, 13 athletic trainers and six graduate assistant athletic trainers.

Nebraska's team of orthopaedists is led by Chief of Staff Dr. Pat Clare, a nationally respected orthopaedic surgeon with more than 30 years of service to Husker athletics.



NUTRITION



Nebraska's Sports Nutritionists Lindsey Remmers and Ryan Reist work with all 24 of Nebraska's sports by educating athletes on topics such as increasing lean body mass, losing body fat, staying hydrated, nutritional strategies for competition, maximizing recovery following workouts and supplement use. Athletes are given individualized nutrition plans that can be applied in Nebraska's Performance Buffet at the Lewis Training Table, which was remodeled and expanded in the 2010 season. In addition to utilizing the Lewis Training Table each day for lunch and dinner, student-athletes also have access to fueling stations near strength and conditioning areas to provide fluids and nutritional foods before and after workouts to maximize performance and recovery.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

University of Nebraska student-athletes produced another outstanding year in competition, in the classroom and in the community, continuing NU's tradition of success in 2013-14. The Huskers increased their nation-leading total of all-time CoSIDA Academic All-Americans to 314 with a Big Ten-best seven academic All-Americans across all sports, while also claiming a Big Ten-leading four NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships in 2013-14.


Nebraska's seven CoSIDA Academic All-Americans ranked among the highest totals in the nation across all divisions. The Huskers maintained their lead of 76 all-time CoSIDA Academic All-Americans over national No. 2 Notre Dame. The only school in the nation with 300 academic All-Americans, Nebraska is one of just three schools across all divisions with 200 or more, joining Notre Dame and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT). NU leads the nation in CoSIDA Academic All-Americans since 2000 with 124, extending its nation-leading streak to 43 consecutive years with at least one academic All-American.

The Huskers also increased their nation-leading total of NCAA Top Ten Award winners to 17, as former women's tennis All-American Mary Weatherholt was honored during the 2013-14 academic year. Nebraska also ranks among the nation's best in the total of NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship winners, including five in 2013-14. Spencer Long (Football), Eric Schryver (Men's Gymnastics), Emily Wong (Women's Gymnastics), Sunny Russell (Rifle) and Anne Martin (Track and Field) all claimed the prestigious national awards. NCAA awards for the spring sports season have not been announced.

A total of 675 awards were issued for the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Fall (354) and Spring (321) Honor Roll, recognizing Husker student-athletes who produced a 3.0 GPA or better during a semester. Among that group, Huskers produced 87

perfect 4.0 GPA semesters. A total of 62 Nebraska student-athletes also were honored as Big Ten Distinguished Scholars for posting 3.7 grade-point averages or better and lettering in their respective sports in 2013-14.

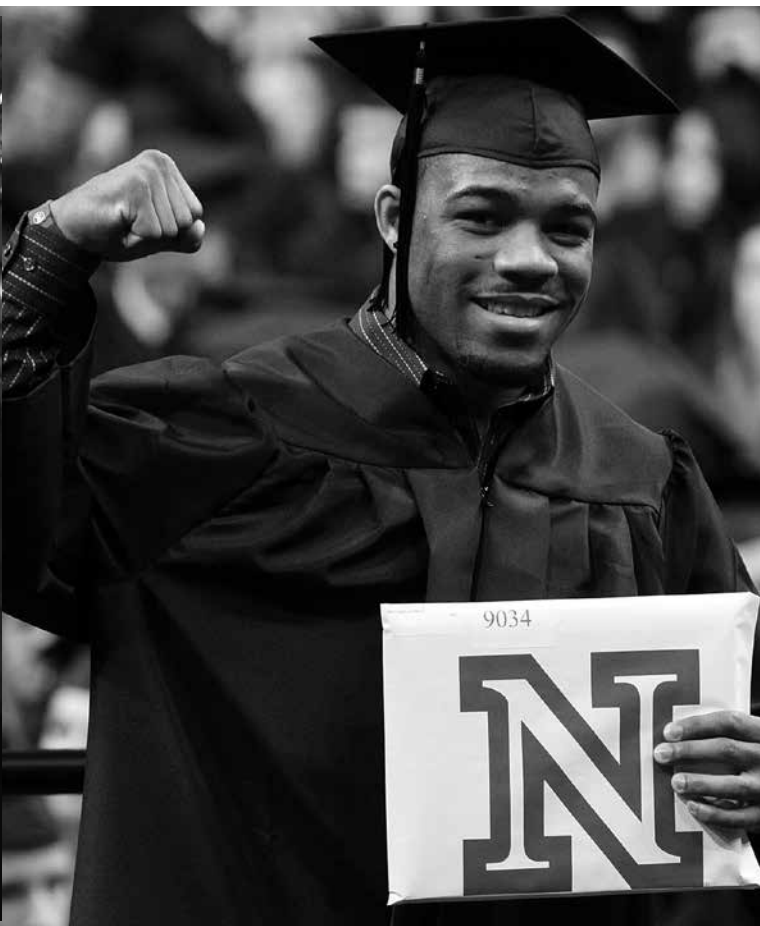
Nebraska's CoSIDA Academic All-America success continues to set the standard for the approximately 1,400 member institutions. The Husker football team leads all individual sport programs in the nation with 107 all-time CoSIDA Academic All-America awards, including 2013 first-team honoree Spencer Long and second-team selections Jake

Long and C.J. Zimmerer. Spencer Long added a prestigious National Football Foundation Postgraduate Scholarship worth \$18,000, along with prestigious NCAA Postgraduate (\$7,500) and Big Ten Wayne Duke Postgraduate (\$10,000) scholarships before being chosen in the third round of the 2014 NFL Draft. Zimmerer added a spot on the AFCA Good Works Team and claimed Nebraska's Big Ten Sportsmanship Award for his extensive community involvement.

The Nebraska men's and women's track and field program added three academic All-Americans, including first-teamers Levi Gipson and Anne Martin, along with second-team pick Cody Rush. Martin and John Welk swept the NCAA Elite 89 awards for the Huskers as the student-athletes with the top grade-point averages competing at the NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships for the second consecutive season. Nebraska's 38 combined CoSIDA Academic All-America honors since 2002 for the men's and women's track and field program lead the nation.

Emily Wong, an 11-time All-American in competition for the Nebraska women's gymnastics team, added a first-team CoSIDA Academic All-America award to cap one of the greatest all-around careers for a student-athlete in Husker history. A two-time academic All-American, Wong was named the winner of the 2014 AAI Award presented to the nation's top collegiate gymnast. The Honda Award finalist and Big Ten Gymnast of the Year earned prestigious NCAA Postgraduate (\$7,500) and Big Ten Wayne Duke Postgraduate (\$10,000) scholarships. Her achievements earned her Nebraska's Female Student-Athlete-of-the-Year Award and the Big Ten Medal of Honor. Men's track and field student-athlete Seth Wiedel was Nebraska's Male Student-Athlete of the Year and Big Ten Medal of Honor winner.

THE NEBRASKA ACADEMIC EXPERIENCE

From the day student-athletes decide the University of Nebraska is the right place to be, the athletic academic counseling unit provides personal and academic support to ensure that student-athletes will get the most out of their years as Huskers. Featuring one of the most innovative and comprehensive academic support systems in the country, Nebraska is dedicated to helping its student-athletes become outstanding leaders in their chosen fields. The academic support team is comprised of 13 full-time staff members and a tutorial staff of approximately 75 tutors addressing all subject areas.

Academic Counseling

Eight academic counselors and three assistant academic counselors are in place to monitor daily academic progress, receive consistent course feedback, assist with the advising/registration process and monitor continuing eligibility and progress toward graduation. Essentially, academic counselors assist student-athletes in navigating the University of Nebraska system.

Tutorial Support

A tremendous resource for all academic abilities, unlimited tutorial support is available from day one up to college graduation. Subject and mentor tutors help provide academic support and study strategies to be successful. Supplemental Instruction, a sub-component of the tutorial program, provides targeted group review sessions to help ease the transition to college academics while improving study strategies and building academic self-esteem.

Study Hall

Nebraska's study hall program is housed in the D.J. Sokol Enrichment Center within the Dick and Peg Herman Family Student Life Complex. Student-athletes attend a supervised, flex-time study hall that features day, evening and weekend hours. Each student-athlete is required to complete a specific number of study hours each week as determined by their academic counselor and/or coach. In addition, weekly study hall reports are provided to the coaching staff. Additional performance-based or tutor-based study hall may also be determined by the academic counselor.

Mentoring

Many student-athletes meet with a mentor on a weekly basis to assist in making a smooth transition from high school to college. Mentors collect syllabi, gather and report academic progress information and teach academic success strategies.

Educational Assessments

Assessments are administered upon the request of the student-athlete, academic counselor, or coach to determine student strengths and areas for improvement. Results allow academic counselors to develop a personalized academic support program and to determine if more in-depth testing is warranted. When additional assessments are necessary, referrals are made to a consulting psychologist who conducts the assessments. If it is determined that a student-athlete has a learning disability, appropriate accommodations are made through the Office of Services for Students with Disabilities.

Student-Athlete Orientation

The academic staff coordinates New Student-Athlete Orientation to help newcomers adjust to the multiple demands of being a college student-athlete. Presentations are made by academic counselors, compliance officials, NU faculty and administrators, business/community professionals and student-athletes.

Personal Counseling

Student-athletes will find a supportive and caring environment at Nebraska. Transitional issues, stress management, time management, academic focus and problem resolution are all addressed in a proactive manner throughout the year. If necessary, counseling referrals are also made to designated practitioners.

Computer Resources

Student-athletes enjoy a new state-of-the-art computer lab and technology center with 58 computers and professional supervision. Laptops are also available during team travel. Student-athletes have the benefit of ongoing education and assistance from a full-time computer technician.

NEBRASKA LIFE SKILLS - SERVING LEADERS

The Nebraska Life Skills program is committed to providing proactive education, resources and support throughout college and beyond, best preparing Husker student-athletes for life after sports. Services foster transition, retention, responsible decision-making, leadership, volunteerism and career development.

Nebraska has long been considered a pioneer in life skills support and programming. In 1998, Nebraska was one of five Division I schools nationally to win the prestigious Program of Excellence Award recognizing a strong commitment to total person development. In 2005, Keith Zimmer, Associate A.D. for Life Skills, was the recipient of the Dr. Gene Hooks Award recognizing him as the top life skills administrator in the country.

Life Skills Components

Proactive Education

Husker Life Seminar – All incoming student-athletes complete a 13-week fall semester seminar addressing a variety of life skills topics ranging from leadership to money to relationships and study skills. **Team Workshops** – Campus and community experts facilitate team-specific life skills education workshops. **Student-Athlete Assemblies** – Meetings featuring remarks from nationally recognized life skills trainers.

Personalized Support/Individual Sessions

Resume Development – Each student-athlete is assigned a Life Skills counselor who assists in the creation of a personalized resume for the student-athlete. Periodic follow-up meetings will take place through graduation to ensure a well-rounded college experience and marketability to realize career goals.

Community Outreach

Nebraska student-athletes combine to impact over 100,000 people statewide on an annual basis. **Team Service Requirement** – Each team participates in a minimum of two service projects per year. **School Outreach** – Individuals participate in numerous school outreach campaigns in both classroom and assembly settings. **Hospital Visits** – Huskers are frequent hospital visitors providing cheer and encouragement to a variety of patients. **Miscellaneous Outreach** – Outreach requests are received daily from the entire state requesting involvement from Husker student-athletes. **Mentoring Programs** – Typically requires one hour of service per week serving as a youth mentor.

Leadership/Citizenship

Life Skills promotes leadership development and provides recognition opportunities for extraordinary citizenship. **Student-Athlete Advisory Committee** – Elected team representatives from each of the 24 sports serve as the “voice” of the entire student-athlete population discussing student-athlete welfare, legislation and service events. **HERO Leadership Award** – Individual recognition to Huskers who have consistently gone above and beyond serving as an exemplary role-model. **Heart and Soul Award** – Presented annually to the top senior student-athlete leaders for extraordinary service throughout their college careers. **Tom Osborne Citizenship Team** – Individual recognition to Huskers across all sports who have completed at least six service projects during the academic year. **Nebraska Football Uplifting Athletes** – A recognized student organization initiated in 2012, Nebraska football players and UNL student leaders collaborate to raise funds and awareness for those with rare diseases. Nebraska running back Rex Burkhead was named the 2012 recipient of the National Rare Disease Champion Award and C.J. Zimmerer won the award in 2014. **Life Skills Award of Excellence** – Recognizes team services and leadership with the top men's and women's programs being honored on an annual basis.

Career Commitment

In addition to the creation of a personalized resume and game plan, the following career resources are available to every Husker. **Student-Athlete Career Fair** – Attended by approximately 25 companies. **Networking Night** – Former Husker student-athletes and other professionals thriving in their chosen career fields share valuable insights with sophomore student-athletes. **Assessments** – On-line assessments to help individuals discover talents and match with a major and career. **Practical Experience** – Programs in place to facilitate shadowing and internship placements. **Job Preparation** – Expert advice on cover letter writing, interviewing skills and evaluating the job offer.

Postgraduate Assistance

Commitment to helping student-athletes pursue postgraduate plans and scholarships. **Career Nights** – Learn from the experts to gain valuable insight on timelines, application procedures, entrance requirements, personal essays and more. **Scholarships** – Seniors in their final season of athletic eligibility can apply for numerous postgraduate awards.

LEADING THE WAY



As one of the nation's premier public institutions, the University of Nebraska is committed to undergraduate learning and world-class research. Quality instruction is emphasized in Nebraska's 157 undergraduate majors, which are spread through nine undergraduate colleges.

Nebraska, which officially joined the Big Ten Conference on July 1, 2011, is a member of the Committee on Institutional Cooperation, a consortium of Big Ten universities and the University of Chicago, which has generated unique opportunities for students and faculty by sharing expertise, leveraging resources and collaborating on programs.

The University of Nebraska was chartered by the Nebraska Legislature in 1869 as the state's public university and land-grant institution. Founded in Lincoln, the University of Nebraska was expanded in 1968 into a state educational system now comprising four campuses under the guidance of a Board of Regents and a central administration.

NEBRASKA'S NATIONAL POWER

Nebraska competed at the highest levels across the board in 2013-14, producing top-25 national finishes in 14 of its 24 varsity sports. Nebraska was one of only two NCAA Division I schools to advance to the NCAA Championships in the six major team sports of men's and women's basketball, baseball and softball, women's soccer and women's volleyball, while also playing in a football bowl game. The Huskers won NCAA Tournament games in five of those sports, while also winning their bowl game, a feat no other school in the country matched in 2013-14.

In addition to the success of Husker teams, Nebraska produced its most All-Americans in more than a decade with 42 student-athletes capturing national honors across all sports in 2013-14. Nebraska's 42 All-Americans included 29 first-team award winners in their respective sports, led by 2014 NCAA 400-meter hurdles champion Miles Ukaoma. The Big Red's All-Americans came from 17 U.S. states, including eight from the Cornhusker State, and three foreign countries to claim a total of 51 All-America awards.

Not only did the Huskers enjoy success across many fields of competition, Nebraska fans supported the Big Red in record numbers as the volleyball (1st), football (9th), women's basketball (11th), men's basketball (13th), baseball (15th) and softball programs all ranked among the nation's top 20 in attendance. The football (333) and volleyball (200) teams also carried NCAA sellout streaks into their 2014 seasons.

Coach Bo Pelini's Nebraska football program notched its sixth consecutive nine-win season by defeating Georgia in the Gator Bowl. The Big Red closed the season with a 9-4 record and finished at No. 25 in the USA Today Coaches Top 25. Coach Tim Miles claimed Big Ten Coach-of-the-Year honors in his second season at Nebraska by leading the Huskers to their first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1998. Coach Darin Erstad led the Nebraska baseball team to the NCAA Tournament in his third season at his alma mater. The former Major League All-Star and Gold Glove winner guided the Huskers to a 41-21 record and runner-up finishes in the Big Ten regular season and at the tournament held at TD Ameritrade Park.

Coach John Cook's traditionally powerful volleyball program marched to the NCAA Elite Eight and finished No. 7 nationally in the AVCA Top 25. The Huskers featured Big Ten Player of the Year and first-team AVCA All-America outside hitter Kelsey Robinson. Connie Yori claimed Big Ten Coach-of-the-Year honors for the second straight season while leading the women's basketball program to its first conference tournament title. The Huskers advanced to the NCAA Tournament second round and finished No. 13 in the final AP rankings behind Big Ten Player of the Year and first-team WBCA All-America forward Jordan Hooper.

John Walker added Big Ten Coach-of-the-Year honors of his own for leading the Nebraska soccer program back to prominence. The Huskers swept the Big Ten regular-season and tournament crowns before advancing to the second round of the 2013 NCAA Tournament while finishing 13th in the final NSCAA Top 25. Jordan Jackson was named the Big Ten Midfielder of the Year, while Ari Romero captured Big Ten Defender-of-the-Year honors. Big Ten Coach of the Year Rhonda Revelle led the Husker softball team to an NCAA Super Regional for the second straight year after sharing the Big Ten regular-season title and finishing 17th in the final national rankings. The Huskers featured first-team All-America catcher Taylor Edwards and her twin sister, third-team All-America pitcher Tatum Edwards.

The traditional national power Husker bowling team took second at the NCAA Championships with first-team All-American Lizabeth Kuhlkin leading the way for Coach Bill Straub's team. Great America Rifle Conference Coach of the Year Stacy Underwood led the Huskers to a fifth-place finish at the NCAA Championships with young All-Americans Lauren Phillips, Denise Martin and Rachel Martin leading the way.

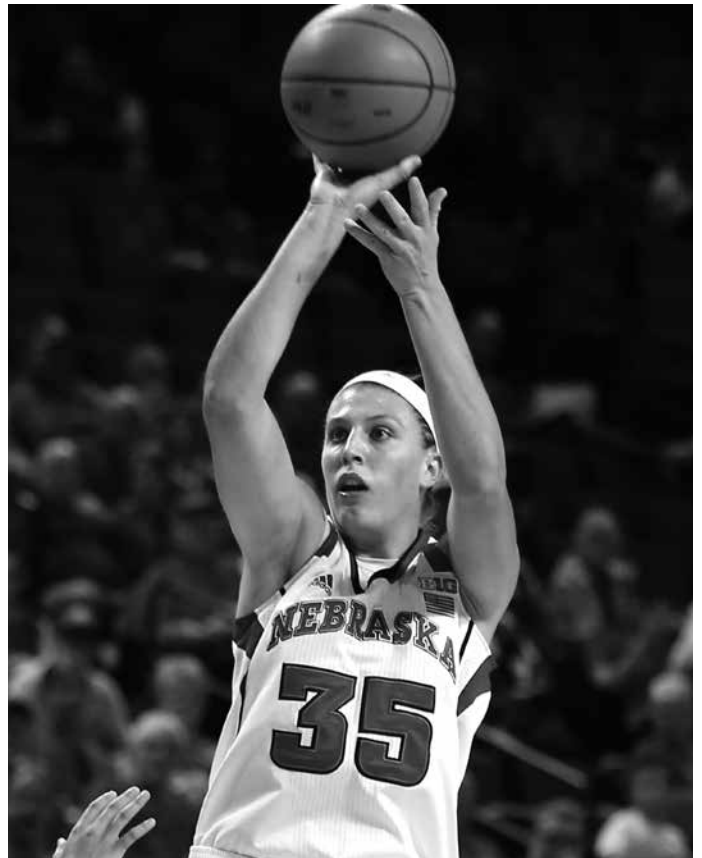
One of the greatest women's gymnasts in Nebraska history, Emily Wong powered Coach Dan Kendig's squad to the NCAA Super Six. Wong finished her career as an 11-time All-American by capturing three All-America awards in 2014. The Big Ten Gymnast of the Year was also the AAI Award winner as the nation's top gymnast. The women's outdoor track and field team capped the season with a 19th-place finish at the NCAA Championships thanks to first-team All-America performances by Maggie Malone (Javelin), Jazmin McCoy (Long Jump) and Ellie Ewere (Triple Jump).

Coach Chuck Chmelka's men's gymnastics team took eighth at the NCAA Championships behind a first-team All-America performance in the all-around from Wyatt Aycock. Coach Mark Manning guided the wrestling team to an outstanding season. The Husker wrestlers finished 11th at the NCAA Championships with All-Americans James Green (3rd, 157) and Robert Kokesh (4th, 174) leading the way.

Nebraska capped its 2013-14 campaign by receiving the top individual performance of the year from senior hurdler Miles Ukaoma at the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships. Ukaoma raced to the 2014 NCAA title in the 400-meter hurdles to help the Husker men take 12th as a team at the outdoor championships. Coach Gary Pepin's squad also tied for 17th at the NCAA Indoor Championships. Overall, eight Husker men's track and field athletes captured first-team All-America honors.



A unanimous All-Big Ten pick in 2013-14, Terran Petteway led the conference in scoring at 18.1 points per game. Petteway and the revitalized Huskers made their first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1998, while ranking among the nation's best in attendance.



Jordan Hooper capped her illustrious career by becoming just the third Husker to earn first-team WBCA All-America honors. The Alliance, Neb., native set a school record with 295 three-pointers, while finishing second in points (2,357) and rebounds (1,110).

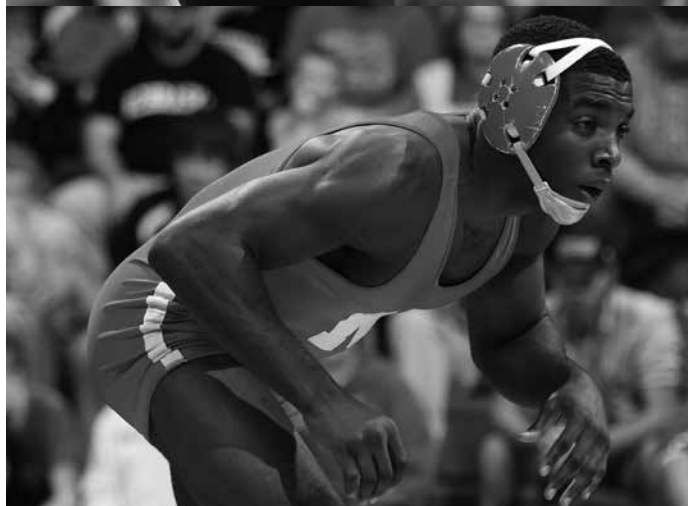

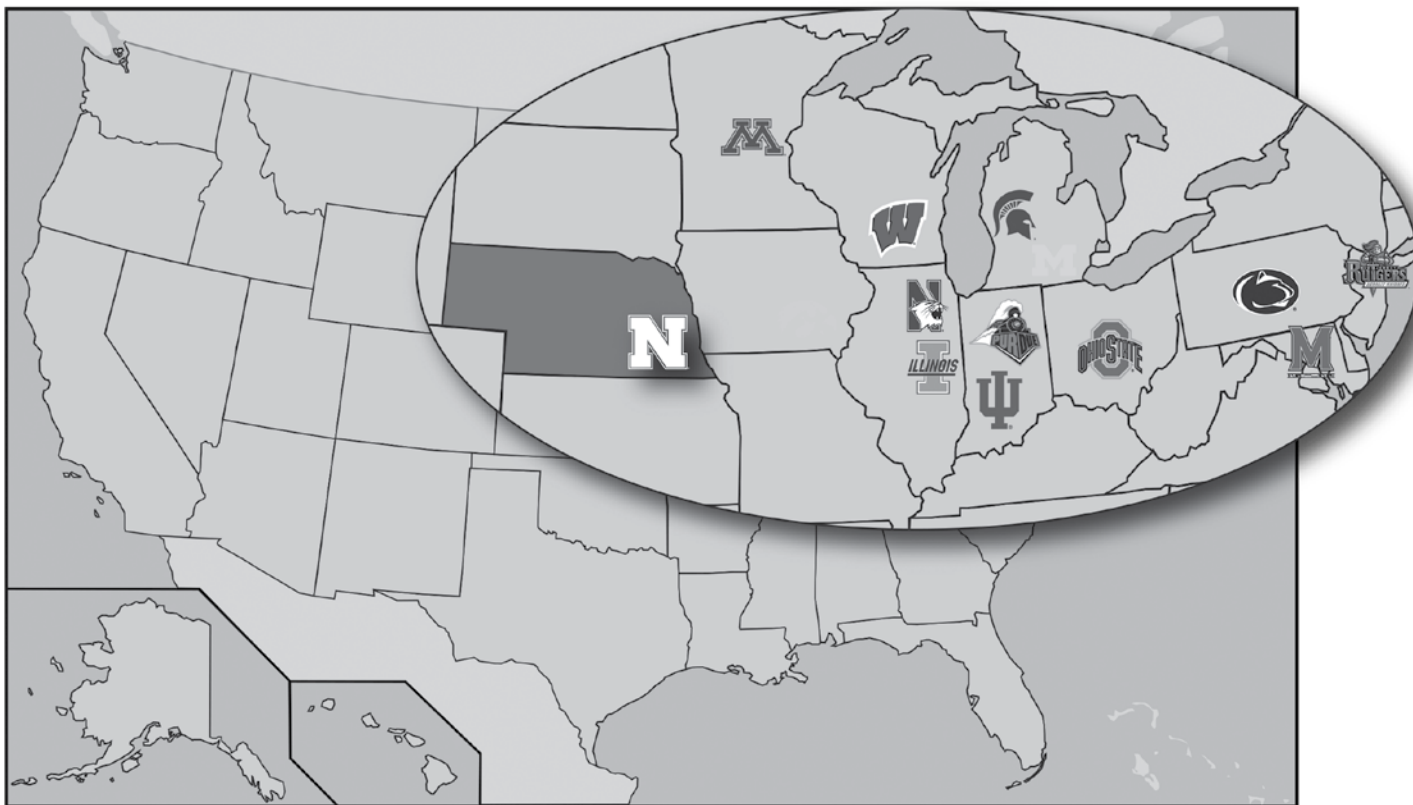

BIG TEN CONTINUES TO EXPAND NATIONAL REACH



On July 1, 2011, the University of Nebraska became an official member of the Big Ten Conference, increasing the Big Ten's membership to 12 institutions for the first time in conference history. The addition of Nebraska marked the Big Ten's first expansion since Penn State joined the conference in June of 1990. The nation's oldest conference continued to grow with the addition of Maryland and Rutgers in the summer of 2014. The Big Ten Conference is a union of 14 world-class academic institutions – who share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. The conference's 100-plus years of history, strong tradition of competitive intercollegiate athletic programs, vast and passionate alumni base, and consistent leadership in innovations position the Big Ten and its entire community firmly on the Big Stage.

The Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness in all aspects of its student-athletes' lives, with the ultimate goal of ensuring that each individual has the opportunity to live a Big Life.

Big Ten Conference Highlights

- Big Ten universities provide approximately \$200 million in direct financial aid to nearly 9,500 student-athletes on 350 teams across 42 sports.
- The Big Ten sponsors 28 official conference sports, 14 for men 14 for women, including the debut of lacrosse this academic year.
- Over the past 10 years, current Big Ten institutions have won national championships in 18 sports.
- The Big Ten leads the nation in total student-athletes and participation opportunities, while sponsoring more official sports than all conferences other than the Ivy League.
- Nearly 1,400 Big Ten student-athletes and coaches have participated in the Olympics, winning at least 480 medals, including nearly 250 gold.
- Big Ten fans are some of the nation's most supportive, with nearly 10 million patrons attending conference home contests for football, men's and women's basketball and volleyball during 2013-14. During 2013-14, the Big Ten led the nation in men's basketball, women's volleyball, hockey and wrestling attendance, while ranking second nationally in football and women's basketball attendance.
- The Big Ten leads all conferences with more than 5.7 million living alumni and 520,000 students.



Big Ten Wrestling Facts

- Every school in the Big Ten Conference fields a wrestling team. With the addition of Nebraska (2011-12), Maryland (2014-15) and Rutgers (2014-15), the Big Ten is a 14-team wrestling conference in 2014-15.
- Big Ten Conference schools have captured the last eight NCAA championships. Penn State claimed its fourth straight title in 2014. Penn State broke Iowa's streak of three consecutive titles in 2011. Minnesota won the crown in 2007. Overall, the Big Ten has won 31 total team national championships, including 19 since 1990. The only non-Big Ten school to win a team title since 1990 is Oklahoma State.
- Nearly half of the All-America honors awarded at the 2014 NCAA Championships were presented to Big Ten wrestlers, as the conference claimed 34 of 80 individual All-America awards. The Big Ten had at least three All-Americans in nine of the 10 weight classes, including five of the eight All-Americans at 285 pounds. Nebraska's James Green (3rd, 157) and Robert Kokesh (4th, 174) earned All-America honors for the Huskers in 2014.
- In addition to the 34 Big Ten All-Americans in 2014, Maryland and Rutgers each featured one All-American. In fact, 13 of the 14 Big Ten schools in 2014-15 had at least one All-American in 2014. Purdue was the only Big Ten team without an All-American last season.
- In 2014, seven Big Ten programs finished in the top 15 at the NCAA Championships, including Penn State (1st), Minnesota (2nd), Iowa (4th), Ohio State (6th), Northwestern (8th), Nebraska (11th) and Illinois (13th).
- Eleven of the 14 Big Ten wrestling teams in 2014-15 finished in the top 25 at the 2014 NCAA Championships, including Wisconsin (16th), Michigan (17th), Maryland (20th) and Indiana (T-25th). Michigan State (32nd), Rutgers (34th) and Purdue (39th) put all 14 Big Ten schools in the top 40 at last year's national championships.



The Big Ten Network brings unprecedented coverage to wrestling across the conference, including the Big Ten Championships. The Chicago-based network is also bringing increased national exposure to Nebraska student-athletes across all sports.

Big Ten Network

Headquartered in Chicago, the Big Ten Network is the first internationally distributed television network dedicated to covering one of America's premier collegiate conferences.



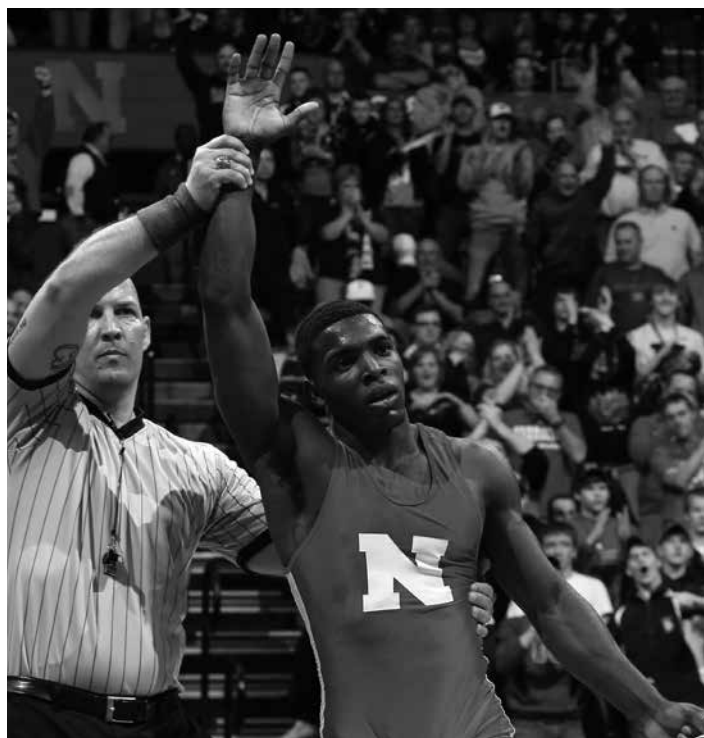
With more than 400 live sports events, and virtually all of them in high definition, the Big Ten Network is the ultimate destination for Big Ten fans and alumni across the country. The network is on the air 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

The network is available to an estimated 60 million households. The network is carried by all major cable, satellite and telecommunications providers and BTN2Go is also available on smartphones, tablets and the internet.

Big Ten Network Facts

MORE TELEVISION EXPOSURE

- The Big Ten's media agreements with BTN, ABC/ESPN, CBS, FOX and NBC Sports Network provide the conference with more than 1,200 events that are produced and distributed nationally on an annual basis.
- In 2006, the Big Ten created the first national conference-owned television network devoted to the athletic and academic programs of a single conference. The Big Ten Network launched on Aug. 30, 2007, and became the first new network in cable or satellite television history to reach 30 million homes in its first 30 days.
- Since the current media agreements began in 2007-08, every home football and men's basketball game has been produced while women's basketball has received more coverage than any other conference.
- The Big Ten's new media agreements have resulted in the broadcast of nearly 1,200 events nationally and regionally on an annual basis, compared to 300 events in the final year of the previous agreements.

Season Outlook

Experienced Huskers Seek National Titles in 2014-15



Nebraska returns all seven of its NCAA qualifiers from last season, including All-Americans James Green (157) and Robert Kokesh (174).

The Nebraska wrestling team returns all seven of its NCAA qualifiers from last season, as the Huskers set their sights on contending for championships in 2014-15.

Reigning All-Americans James Green (157) and Robert Kokesh (174) each earned top-four finishes at the 2014 NCAA Championships, and enter their final season in a Husker singlet along with three-time NCAA qualifier Jake Suefloh (149). All three made it to the 2014 Big Ten Finals, with Green and Kokesh capturing crowns in their respective weight classes.

The Huskers finished 11th at the national tournament with 43.5 points after taking fifth at the Big Ten Championships. Nebraska went 12-2 in dual competition, with a 6-2 mark in Big Ten duals.

Green compiled a 35-2 record in 2013-14, and spent much of the year as the top-ranked wrestler at 157 pounds. Kokesh went 37-3 and compiled a perfect 14-0 dual record, while leading the team in pins with nine. Suefloh also accomplished the 30-win mark, going 31-6 overall, with all of his losses coming to ranked opponents. He led the team in major decisions with 11.

NCAA qualifiers Tim Lambert (125), Austin Wilson (165), TJ Dudley (184) and Collin Jensen (HWT) also return and are each projected to start in 2014-15. Lambert, Dudley and Jensen will all be sophomores, while Wilson begins his junior campaign this season.

Lambert went 24-13 in his first year in the NU lineup, posting a 9-5 record in duals. He finished fifth at the Big Ten Championships. He turned in runner-up finishes at the Reno Tournament of Champions and Warren Williamson/Daktronics Open.

Dudley compiled a 26-8 record, which included a 13-1 mark in dual competition. He was second on the team in pins with eight, and also had eight major decisions. Dudley finished second at the Cliff Keen Las Vegas Invitational and third at the Daktronics Open.

Wilson placed in three tournaments, including the Big Ten Championships, on his way to a 23-16 record. He took sixth at the conference tournament, and added a runner-up finish at the Reno Tournament of Champions. Wilson notched a fifth-place result in Las Vegas.

Jensen opened his season by capturing the Daktronics Open title in his native state of South Dakota, and placed fifth in Reno en route to a 20-15 mark.

The Huskers will see competition for the starting spot at 133 and 197 pounds, while Anthony Abidin is projected to start at 141 pounds. Abidin went 18-3,

which included a perfect 5-0 dual record, last season. He earned runner-up finishes at the Daktronics Open and Cliff Keen Invitational as a sophomore, while adding a third-place result at the Reno Tournament of Champions.

Sophomore Eric Montoya and freshman Hayden Tuma will battle at 133 pounds. Montoya, a 2013 NCAA qualifier from Campbell, collected a pair of open tournament titles on his way to Nebraska Redshirt-of-the-Year honors in 2013-14. Tuma won four consecutive Idaho state titles at Centennial High School.

Senior Spencer Johnson and sophomore Micah Barnes are likely to face off for the 197-pound starting spot. Johnson went 25-8 last season, which included a 3-2 dual mark. Barnes moved up from 165 pounds, where he went 9-1 last season, and captured a pair of tournament crowns.

Head Coach Mark Manning enters his 15th year at Nebraska and his 18th season overall as a head coach. He is 13 wins shy of his 200th victory at Nebraska. Manning added Olympic Gold Medalist Jordan Burroughs to his staff in July. Burroughs, a two-time world champion and two-time national champion, will be an assistant coach for the Huskers in 2014-15. Associate Head Coach Bryan Snyder begins his fifth season on staff this season.

The Huskers open their 2014-15 campaign on Friday, Oct. 31 by hosting the Coaches Clinic/Intrasquad. On the following day, Green and Kokesh will compete at the NWCA All-Star Classic at the Palestra in Philadelphia, Pa.

Nebraska's first dual is set for Friday, Nov. 7 at Wyoming. NU holds a 33-14-0 record in the all-time series with the Cowboys, which includes last season's 26-12 triumph. The Huskers will stay in Laramie, Wyo., the next day for the Cowboy Open.

NU's first home dual will be held at the NU Coliseum on Nov. 16, as the Huskers welcome Big Ten newcomer Maryland. NU leads the all-time series against the Terrapins, 3-1-1. Nebraska's five other home duals will be contested at the Bob Devaney Sports Center.

On Nov. 22, the Huskers hit the road to face Duke and N.C. State. NU will wrestle the Blue Devils at noon in Durham, N.C., before battling the Wolfpack at 6 p.m., in Raleigh, N.C. The meeting between the Huskers and Duke will be the first in series history, while NU has a 3-0-0 advantage all-time against NC State.

Nebraska opens December at the Cliff Keen Las Vegas Invitational, Dec. 5-6. The Huskers finished

second at last year's tournament, as Green earned the 157-pound title. NU also hosts Wisconsin on Dec. 13 before the start of the New Year. Last season, the Huskers topped the Badgers by a 22-15 margin in Madison, Wis.

The Huskers are slated to compete at the Southern Scuffle, Jan. 1-2 in Chattanooga, Tenn., before returning home to host Purdue on Jan. 9. Nebraska leads the all-time series with the Boilermakers, 7-1, including last season's 28-9 win on the road.

On Jan. 23, NU visits Illinois before grappling against Big Ten newcomer Rutgers at home on Jan. 25. Nebraska leads the series against Illinois, 4-3-0, and against the Scarlet Knights, 2-0-0. The Huskers' final matchup of January will be on the 30th at Northwestern.

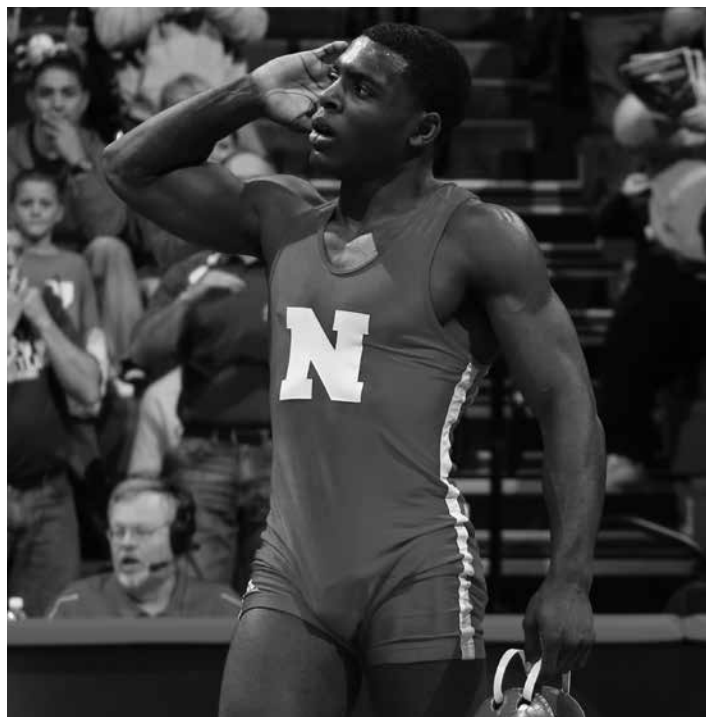
Nebraska will host Indiana on Feb. 1, before taking a road trip to the Great Lakes State for a pair of matches on the following weekend. NU faces Michigan on Feb. 6 before squaring off with Michigan State on Feb. 8.

Senior Day at the Devaney Center is scheduled for Feb. 13 against Stanford. Nebraska's final pair of duals will be on Feb. 21, as the Huskers face Drexel in Philadelphia, Pa., at noon before wrestling against Princeton in Princeton, N.J., at 7 p.m.

The 2015 Big Ten Championships are March 7-8 in Columbus, Ohio. The Huskers are making their fourth all-time appearance in the tournament since joining the conference in 2011. Last season, Green and Kokesh became the first two Big Ten champions in Nebraska history, and led NU to a fifth-place finish.

The 2015 NCAA Championships will be held at Scottrade Center in St. Louis, Mo., March 19-21. NU seeks to crown its first national champion since 2011, when Burroughs won the 165-pound title.

Eleven Huskers have been crowned national champions all-time, while 95 have racked up All-America honors, including Green and Kokesh, who accomplished the feat in 2014. As a team, Nebraska has 18 top-10 finishes, with the most recent coming in 2009.

Nebraska's Projected Starters

125 Pounds: Sophomore Tim Lambert



Tim Lambert started all 14 duals last season on his way to qualifying for the NCAA Championships at 125 pounds. He went 9-5 in dual competition, and compiled a 24-13 mark overall. Mitchell Maginnis will provide depth at 125 pounds, and Jack Gropp is a candidate to redshirt for the Huskers.

165 Pounds: Junior Austin Wilson



Austin Wilson, a two-time NCAA qualifier, went 23-16 last season at 165 pounds and is projected to start this season. Wilson placed in three tournaments last season, including the Big Ten Championships, where he took sixth place. Brandon Wilbourn, Dustin Williams and Ian Ousley will provide depth for the Huskers.

133 Pounds: Sophomore Eric Montoya/Freshman Hayden Tuma



2013 NCAA qualifier Eric Montoya earned Nebraska Redshirt-of-the-Year honors last season after going 11-2, and will battle newcomer Hayden Tuma for the starting spot at 133 pounds. Tuma comes from Centennial High School in Boise, Idaho, where he won four consecutive state titles. Eric Coufal will add depth in the weight class, while Jack Gropp, Sean Murphy, Brian Peska, Darrian Schwenke and Aris Shino are all excellent candidates to redshirt.

174 Pounds: Senior Robert Kokesh



Two-time All-American Robert Kokesh begins his final season at Nebraska as the starter at 174 pounds. The reigning Big Ten champion compiled a perfect 14-0 dual record last season and went 37-3 overall. He had nine pins, five technical falls and 10 major decisions as a junior. Eric Engler adds depth for the Huskers, while Nick Null is a candidate to redshirt.

141 Pounds: Junior Anthony Abidin



Anthony Abidin is projected to start at 141 pounds after going 18-3 last season. Abidin, who captured the NJCAA national title in 2012, finished in the top three in all three tournaments he competed in last season, and went 5-0 in duals. Colton McCrystal, Colton Adams and Tyrell Galloway will provide depth for the Huskers at 141 pounds.

184 Pounds: Sophomore TJ Dudley



2014 NCAA qualifier TJ Dudley is expected to start at 184 pounds again this season after going 26-8 as a redshirt freshman. Dudley managed eight pins and eight major decisions last season, and placed in two tournaments. Aaron Studebaker provides depth for NU, while Jake Anderson is likely to redshirt.

149 Pounds: Senior Jake Suefloh



Jake Suefloh begins his final season in a Husker singlet at 149 pounds after qualifying for the NCAA Championships in each of his first three seasons. Last year, he went 31-6 and posted a 13-1 dual record, while leading the team in major decisions with 11. Justin Arthur, Luis DeAnda and Gage Anderson add depth for NU, while Tyler Berger is a candidate to redshirt.

197 Pounds: Senior Spencer Johnson/Sophomore Micah Barnes



Spencer Johnson and Micah Barnes will battle for the starting spot at 197 pounds. Johnson went 25-8 last season at 197 pounds, while Barnes competed at 165 pounds, going 9-1. Josh Kettel and Derek White are likely to redshirt for the Huskers.

157 Pounds: Senior James Green



Three-time All-American James Green has his sights set on a national title in 2015 after a third-place finish at the 2014 NCAA Championships. The reigning Big Ten champion, Green went 35-2 last season and posted a 12-1 dual record. John Svoboda adds depth, while Nick Bennett and Austin Chauncey will redshirt.

HWT: Sophomore Collin Jensen



Collin Jensen, one of Nebraska's seven returning NCAA qualifiers, begins his second season in the NU lineup after going 20-15 last season. Jensen earned five pins and three major decisions, and placed in three tournaments. Senior Nyle Bartling adds depth at heavyweight for the Huskers.

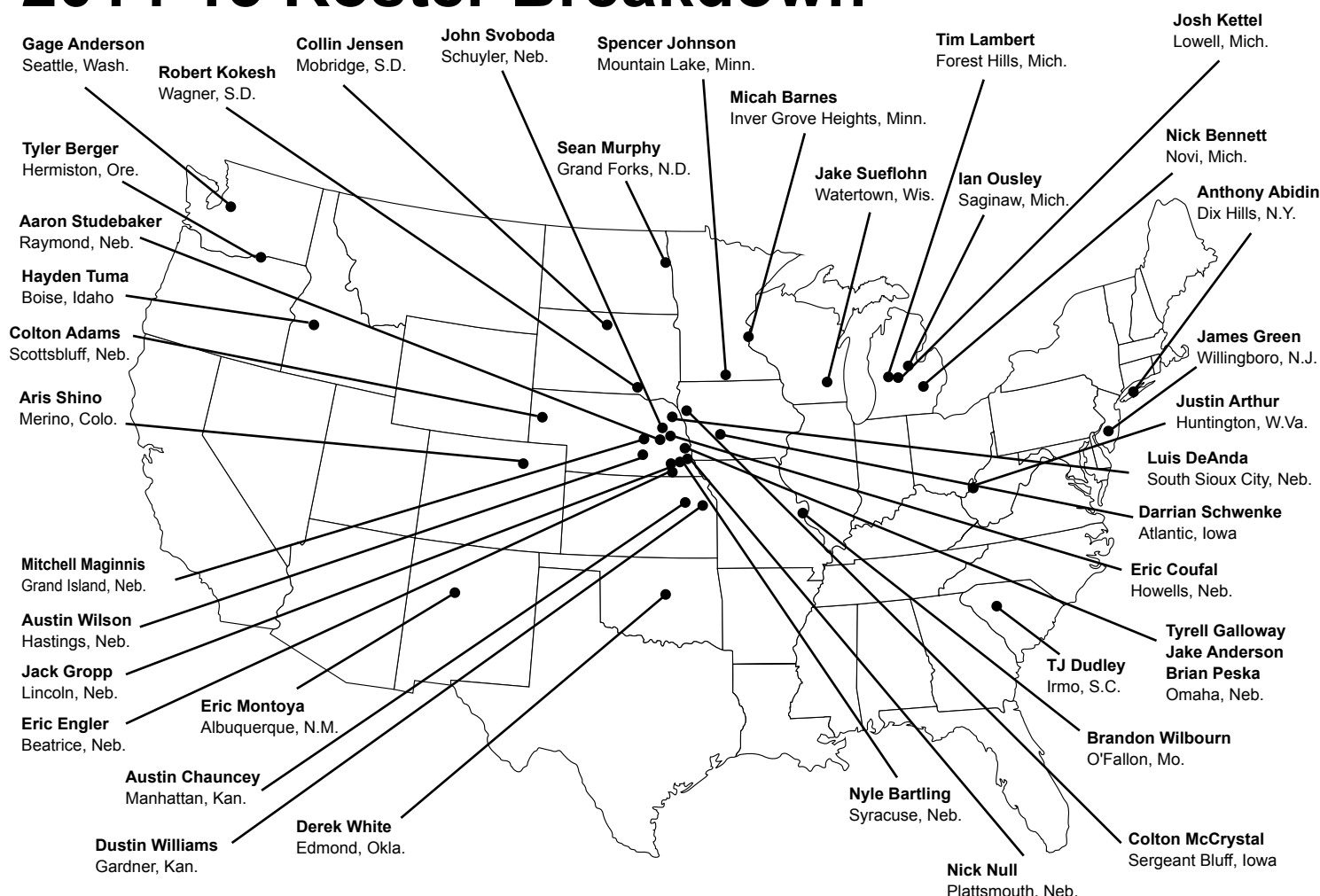

Mark Manning

The Leader

With over 100 years of history, Nebraska wrestling is one of the most storied programs in the collegiate wrestling ranks. Head Coach Mark Manning has taken the Huskers to new heights in his tenure and has established himself as one of the top wrestling coaches in the nation.

The NU record book is a testament to Manning's accomplishments in Lincoln. In his 14 years at the helm, he has coached 36 of Nebraska's 95 All-Americans. He has led the Huskers to five top-eight finishes at the NCAA Championships, compared to just eight for the 14 NU coaches before him. He is the second winningest coach in Husker history with a dual-winning percentage of .717 and a record of 187-73-3 at NU. He is 13 wins away from becoming the winningest coach in program history. He won back-to-back Big 12 Coach-of-the-Year awards (2008 and 2009) after guiding Nebraska to a share of the conference crown in 2009 and a runner-up finish in 2008. NU went on to finish fourth at the NCAA Championships both seasons with nine Huskers earning All-America honors, and Jordan Burroughs capturing the 157-pound national title with a perfect 35-0 record in 2009.

Manning earned one of the top coaching honors in the entire sport when he was named the 2011 FILA Freestyle Coach of the Year after helping Burroughs capture the gold medal at the World Championships in Istanbul, Turkey. Burroughs also captured gold at the 2012 London Olympics, where Manning served as a volunteer coach for the U.S. Freestyle Team. Burroughs went on to win a second world title in 2013, and added a bronze medal in 2014.

Records go on paper and in books and get tucked away. More important to Manning is the fact that he has helped numerous young men grow into upstanding adults by teaching them the correct principles of life. Regarded as one of the nation's top recruiters, Manning usually finds the correct wrestler for his program. He has a keen eye for finding the athletes with the right work ethic and dedication that he can develop. His recruiting and coaching abilities have allowed him to quickly find success at both programs he has led.

Manning's coaching philosophy focuses on developing wrestlers to reach their potential. A wrestler who brings a positive attitude and work ethic to the room can use goal setting and responsibility to develop into an upstanding citizen who is committed to excellence. Manning works daily with the team on every detail in and out of practice, while keeping in mind the long-term interests of his student-athletes.

Known for his fiery nature on the edge of the mat, Manning instills in his wrestlers a sense of determination and pride through his actions and demeanor. His guidance teaches his athletes to become winners in life, which translates into success in the classroom, on the mat and in their lives beyond wrestling. Manning works to instill life-long values in his wrestlers and it shows.

In addition to their success on the mat, Husker wrestlers under Manning have earned 69 academic all-conference selections, including 28 academic All-Big Ten awards during Nebraska's first three seasons in the conference. Three Huskers were named to the 2014 NWCA All-Academic Team. In 2012, Nebraska turned in the nation's best team grade-point average (3.46) for the first time in school history. Manning's beliefs and values in developing student-athletes is

evident right outside his office, where former Husker All-Americans Bryan Snyder, Jason Powell and Burroughs are members of the NU coaching staff.

Manning's coaching philosophy is one that he began during his competitive days, developed during his time as an assistant coach and continues to modify during his time as head coach at Nebraska.

Manning's Mark at Nebraska

Manning began teaching his methods immediately when he was hired at Nebraska in May of 2000. His efforts first paid dividends when he led Nebraska to back-to-back eighth-place team finishes at the NCAA Championships in 2001 and 2002. Four Huskers (Todd Beckerman, Bryan Snyder, Ati Conner and Brad Vering) claimed All-America honors in Manning's first year coaching the Huskers in 2000-01, as NU finished with an 11-6 dual record. Powell and Snyder also gave Manning his first two Big 12 Conference champions that year.

During the 2001-02 season, Manning led the Huskers to their third consecutive third-place finish at the Big 12 Championships. Justin Ruiz and Powell earned their first All-America accolades under Manning, while Snyder became Nebraska's first four-time All-American with his second-place finish at 157 pounds.

Nebraska claimed a 16-7 dual record in 2002-03, as Manning guided NU to seven victories over ranked opponents, including a 20-17 victory over fifth-ranked Illinois at the Virginia Duals. At the 2003 NCAA Championships, Manning led a young lineup that included two juniors, five sophomores and three redshirt freshmen to a 13th-place showing. The finish marked the eighth time in nine seasons that NU had claimed a spot in the top 15 in the nation.

The 2003-04 Huskers and Manning posted one of the best wrestling seasons ever at NU with a 19-3 overall record, tying the second-highest win total in NU history. The Huskers posted two team titles during the season, winning the prestigious Las Vegas Invitational behind individual titles from Powell, Travis Shufelt and Travis Pascoe and winning the Virginia Duals with a 25-13 defeat of Lehigh in the finals. Manning directed the Huskers to second at the Big 12 Championships, while qualifying eight wrestlers for the NCAA Tournament, where NU earned a fifth-place finish. Manning coached his first national champion at Nebraska, as Powell claimed the title at 125 pounds with a 17-2 technical fall in the finals.

The Huskers' success continued in 2004-05, with Nebraska winning 19 duals for the second straight year. NU's 19-2-1 dual record was the second-best mark in school history. The Huskers started the campaign with eight straight dual wins, and ended the season by winning 12 of the last 13 duals. Nebraska posted eight wins over ranked foes, including a 16-15 upset of No. 2 Iowa State to end the dual season.

Manning's 2005-06 squad was relatively inexperienced, but the Huskers earned a solid 12-5 dual record and a third-place finish at the National Duals. NU claimed third at the Big 12 Championships and two Huskers went on to finish as All-Americans. Manning's legacy continued to grow in 2006-07, as he watched his second Husker claim a national title. Paul Donahoe earned the crown at 125 pounds to lead Nebraska to a 10-7-1 dual record.

The 2007-08 Husker campaign was one of the best ever under Manning. NU finished second at the Big 12 Championships with three individual champions

and claimed fourth at the NCAA Championships with five Huskers finishing as All-Americans. That success would no doubt be a challenge to match, but the 2008-09 Nebraska wrestling team did just that. The Huskers won a share of the Big 12 championship for the first time in school history behind individual titles from Burroughs, Brandon Browne, Craig Brester and Vince Jones. Seven NU wrestlers qualified for the NCAA Championships, where the Huskers finished fourth with All-America accolades going to Burroughs (1st, 157), Brester (2nd, 197), Browne (4th, 174) and Jones (6th, 184).

In 2010, Nebraska fought through a rash of injuries, including a season-ending setback to Burroughs. Despite the unfortunate luck, the Huskers still qualified five wrestlers for the NCAA Championships and finished 12th in the team standings, marking the seventh top-15 finish under Manning.

History was made in 2011, when Manning helped Burroughs become the first two-time national champion in school history by winning the 165-pound title at the NCAA Championships in Philadelphia, Pa. After the season, Burroughs was awarded the school's first-ever Hodge Trophy, given annually to the nation's top wrestler. As a team, the Huskers qualified seven total wrestlers for the national tournament and finished in 12th place for the second consecutive season.

In 2011-12, the Huskers finished 21st at the NCAA Championships as two wrestlers (Josh Ihnen and James Green) earned All-America accolades. Senior Tucker Lane became the 20th member of Nebraska's 100-win club on Feb. 19.

In 2012-13, Robert Kokesh led Nebraska with a 38-4 record and a third-place finish at the NCAA Championships at 174 pounds. Green captured his second consecutive All-America honor at 157 pounds to help NU to a 13th-place finish. Ihnen fell one match short of All-America status but picked up his 100th collegiate win at the national tournament. The Huskers, who wrestled at the NU Coliseum for the final time, compiled an 11-6 dual record.

Green and Kokesh repeated as All-Americans in 2014, as Green took third at 157 pounds and Kokesh earned a fourth-place finish at 174. The pair also took home Big Ten titles, becoming the first Husker champions in three seasons as members of the conference. The Huskers returned to the newly renovated Devaney Center for all of their home duals after years of wrestling at the NU Coliseum. NU finished the dual season with a 12-2 record before finishing 11th at the NCAA Championships.

The Road to Lincoln

Manning showed his ability to develop a top-notch program was universal, as he led a turnaround in the tradition-rich Northern Iowa program in his first head coaching position. Manning coached three seasons for the Panthers from 1997 to 2000 in Cedar Falls, Iowa. Under Manning, UNI compiled a 23-24-2 dual record and improved its mark in each of his seasons. His rebuilding effort with the Panthers included strong showings at the NCAA Championships. Northern Iowa tied for 30th in Manning's first year, but improved to a 17th-place showing in 1998 and added an 11th-place finish at the 2000 NCAA Tournament, which was the school's best showing in seven seasons.

Individually, several UNI wrestlers excelled on the national stage under Manning. In each of his last two seasons, the Panthers had a pair of All-Americans, including Tony Davis. A two-time NCAA finalist, Davis was the national champion at 149 pounds in 2000 and finished second in 1999.

Manning returned the Northern Iowa program to national prominence by attracting some of the nation's top wrestling talent. His first Panther recruiting class was ranked second in the nation, while his second class was tabbed as the top class in the nation in 2000.

Before his appointment as the head coach at UNI, Manning had extensive experience as an assistant coach, including ties to the Big 12 Conference. Manning

spent four seasons on Jack Spates' staff at Oklahoma from 1993 to 1997 before accepting Northern Iowa's head position. Manning helped guide the Sooners to three top-10 team finishes at the NCAA Championships during his tenure, including a seventh-place showing at the 1997 national tournament. He assisted in coaching 14 OU wrestlers to All-America accolades, and five Sooners to the NCAA finals. John Kading also claimed the 1996 190-pound title under him. Manning aided in the recruitment of three top-five national recruiting classes while in Norman.

Manning began his coaching career as an assistant at North Carolina from 1985 to 1993. While pursuing his master's degree in sports administration, Manning assisted Coach Bill Lam in guiding 15 Tar Heel wrestlers to All-America honors, including four NCAA finalists and a pair of national champions. UNC posted top-10 NCAA finishes in 1986, 1987 and 1993 with Manning on staff, and captured four Atlantic Coast Conference titles. He also helped attract the nation's top recruiting class to Chapel Hill, N.C., in the spring of 1990.

In addition to his extensive collegiate coaching experience, Manning has been selected numerous times to coach the United States in international competition. He has coached on two U.S. Olympic teams as an assistant in 1996 and 2000, while also being named the head coach at U.S. Olympic Festivals in 1991, 1993 and 1995. Manning was chosen to head the U.S. freestyle team at the 2001 FILA World Championships and was an assistant on the U.S. delegation to the FILA World Championships eight times. He has also been active at the FILA Junior level, serving as the head coach twice, and traveling to the 2008 FILA Junior World Championships in Turkey as an assistant coach, where he coached Burroughs to a 10th-place finish. In 2009, Manning was a coach for the U.S. Freestyle World Team at the World Wrestling Championships in Herning, Denmark.

Molding Manning

Manning had plenty of experience to build his coaching philosophies, as he was one of the top wrestlers in the nation during his competitive career. Manning wrestled collegiately at Nebraska for one year, before transferring to the University of Nebraska-Omaha. After redshirting a season, Manning went on to become a two-time NCAA Division II national champion and three-time All-American under Coach Mike Denney. Manning posted a 121-23 record for the Mavericks, while capturing titles at 150 pounds in 1983 and 1985. Manning helped UNO earn a third-place team finish in 1983 and runner-up honors in 1985. While competing for the Mavericks, he was the leader of UNO's chapter of Fellowship of Christian Athletes for four years. Manning was inducted into the NCAA Division II Hall of Fame for his accomplishments as a wrestler and coach in 1999.

Manning's competitive career also extended beyond the collegiate ranks. He was a member of the U.S. freestyle team from 1986 to 1989. He won a silver medal at the 1989 Pan American Games.

The Vermillion, S.D., native received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Nebraska-Omaha in 1985, with a specialization in exercise science. Manning was the recipient of an NCAA postgraduate scholarship following his graduation from UNO and earned his master's degree in sports administration from North Carolina in 1989.

Manning and his wife, Carrie, were married in August of 2006. Mark has four sons, Matthew, Connor, Ryan and Will.

Citizenship: Each team member is expected to represent themselves, their family, university, teammates, coaches and community in a first-class manner.

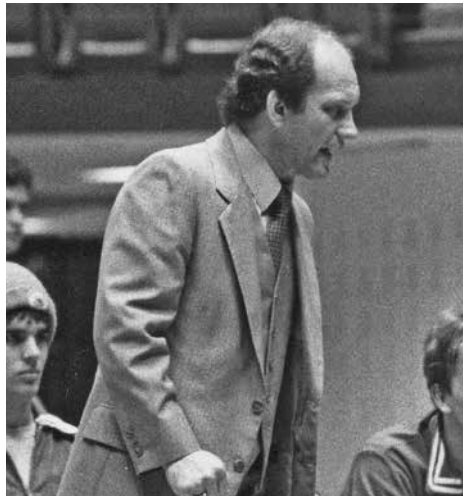
Commitment to Excellence: Demonstration of total effort and concentration whereby each team member gives their absolute best during practice, competition and in the classroom, regardless of result.

Coaching History

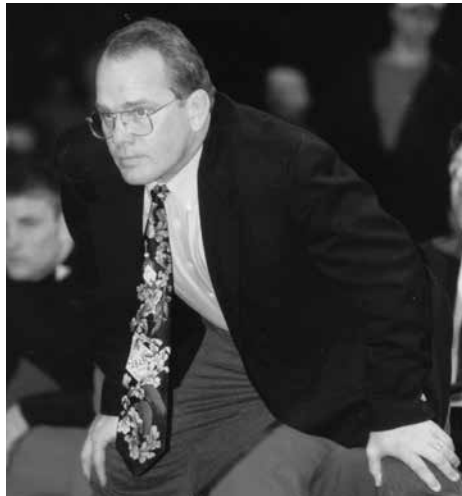
Nebraska has had only 15 head coaches in 103 years of wrestling history, including current Husker coach Mark Manning. Combining for 654 dual wins, NU coaches have always set a standard of excellence in the wrestling community. Dr. R.G. Clapp was the Huskers' first wrestling coach and led the team for 11 years before moving on to promote wrestling with the National Wrestling Coaches Association. Jerry Adam coached Nebraska for the majority of the 1930's and 1940's, before giving way to B.R. Patterson.

Orval Borgialli headed the Huskers for 14 years from 1964 to 1978, amassing 72 dual wins, and Bob Fehrs took over the team until 1985. Fehrs finished with a .648 dual-winning percentage with 95 career dual wins at Nebraska. Tim Neumann racked up 199 dual victories from 1985 to 2000 to become NU's all-time leader in dual wins. Manning took over in 2000 and has amassed a 187-73-3 mark in Lincoln, while leading the Huskers over the 600-win plateau during the 2009-10 season.

Dr. R.G. Clapp

NU's First Head Coach (1911-26)
Former Chairman
NCAA Wrestling
Rules Committee

Nebraska's first wrestling coach, Dr. Raymond G. Clapp (1911-26), was more than just a mentor for the first athletes who enjoyed the sport at the university. He was a prominent figure locally and internationally in the world of wrestling.

In the 1890s, Clapp distinguished himself as an all-around athlete while a student at Williston Seminary and at Yale University, starring in football, track, gymnastics and tennis.

It was as a track athlete at Yale that he rose to national and world prominence. Clapp won the IC4A pole vault title twice, annexed the national A.A.U. championship, earned a Canadian title and in 1898, he topped all performances to set a then-world mark in the vault of nearly 12 feet.

Dr. Clapp's interest and ability in gymnastics probably were more responsible than any other one thing in creating his great interest in collegiate wrestling. In addition to his many athletic distinctions, Clapp was crowned the all-around individual gymnastics champion of the Eastern Intercollegiate Association in 1889.

As a member and eventual chairman of the NCAA Wrestling Rules Committee, Clapp was largely responsible for the efficient organization of collegiate wrestling tournaments in the 1930s and 1940s. Clapp pioneered the system that is used to run many of the meets that take place even today.

While Ed Gallagher was building wrestling popularity in the Southwest, and Charlie Mayser was doing likewise in the East and Midwest, Dr. Clapp initiated college wrestling at the University of Nebraska in the earliest days of the sport, serving as head coach from 1911 to 1926.

Known widely as a leader in the promotion of collegiate wrestling, Clapp served in the administrative branch of the National Collegiate Wrestling Association for numerous years.

In 1932 and 1936, Clapp was secretary of the American Olympic Wrestling Committee and in 1940 was elected chairman of the committee. As chairman of the USA-Pan American Wrestling Committee and the committee representative to the 1942 Pan-American Games Committee, Clapp became increasingly prominent in the wrestling community.

For over 30 years, Clapp freely and willingly gave his time and energy to popularize collegiate wrestling.

Bryan Snyder

Associate Head Coach • Fifth Season Overall • Nebraska (2002)

Bryan Snyder enters his fifth season as a coach for the Nebraska wrestling program and his second season as associate head coach in 2014-15. He served as an assistant coach on Head Coach Mark Manning's staff from 2010-11 to 2012-13 following one of the most decorated wrestling careers in school history.

In his first season at NU as a coach, Snyder played a key role in helping Jordan Burroughs win his second national championship with a perfect 36-0 record. Snyder also helped Burroughs win the 2011 74-kilogram freestyle World Championship in Istanbul, Turkey, becoming the first U.S. wrestler to win a freestyle title since 2006. Additionally, Snyder helped Burroughs win the freestyle gold medal at the 2012 London Olympics and take first place at the 2013 FILA World Championships.

From 2011-12 to 2013-14, Snyder assisted in helping six wrestlers become All-Americans. James Green has earned All-America accolades three times, while Robert Kokesh is a two-time All-American and Josh Ihnen earned All-America status in 2012. Green and Kokesh also collected the first two Big Ten titles in school history in 2014. The Huskers compiled a 38-12 dual record during that three-year stretch.

The Easton, Pa., native spent the 2009-10 season as the head assistant coach at Arizona State and helped guide five Sun Devils to the NCAA Championships in Omaha. Snyder

began his coaching experience as an assistant at Harvard in 2002-03, while returning to the Husker wrestling program as a graduate assistant coach for two seasons (2003-04 and 2004-05), as NU went 38-5-1 in duals and finished fifth at the 2004 NCAA Championships. He helped coach eight All-Americans at NU during that time.

Snyder graduated from Nebraska with a bachelor's degree in sociology and communication studies in 2002. He earned a Master of Arts in 2005 before earning a Ph.D. in 2012.

As a wrestler, Snyder ranks No. 1 on Nebraska's all-time winning percentage chart (.925), compiling a 136-11 record from 1999 to 2002. One of 22 members of Nebraska's 100-win club, he claimed All-America accolades and a Big 12 championship all four years, while finishing as the NCAA runner-up at 157 pounds in 2001 and 2002.

He amassed more than 30 wins in a season three times, including his 43-3 record as a sophomore that stands as the second-best single-season mark in school history. A four-time NWCA All-Academic selection, Snyder was named the 2002 Nebraska Male Student-Athlete of the Year and was also a four-time first-team academic All-Big 12 selection.

Prior to Nebraska, Snyder was a three-time state place-winner and a 1997 state champion at Easton (Pa.) High School. He finished with a 112-12 record and was one of the nation's most highly regarded recruits.



Jordan Burroughs

Assistant Coach • First Season • Nebraska (2011)

Olympic Gold Medalist Jordan Burroughs enters his first season as an assistant coach for the Huskers in 2014-15 after being hired to the staff in July 2014. He previously served on the Nebraska wrestling staff as an administrative assistant for the 2012-13 season.

Burroughs returns to Nebraska in the midst of one of the most successful international freestyle wrestling careers in U.S. history. In addition to claiming the 74-kilogram Olympic Gold Medal at the 2012 Games in London, England, Burroughs won a pair of FILA World Championships in 2011 and 2013. He is also the three-time defending U.S. Open champion and two-time reigning World Cup champion.

Burroughs has earned several other titles during his post-collegiate career, including the 2011 and 2013 Pan American Championships, 2011 U.S. World Team Trials, 2012 Olympic Trials, 2013 Alexander Medved Championships and 2013 Stephan Sargsyan Championships. In addition, he won his first 69 matches on the senior circuit.

Following the IOC's initial recommendation to drop wrestling from the Olympics in February 2013, Burroughs became a key advocate to keeping the sport in the Games. In September

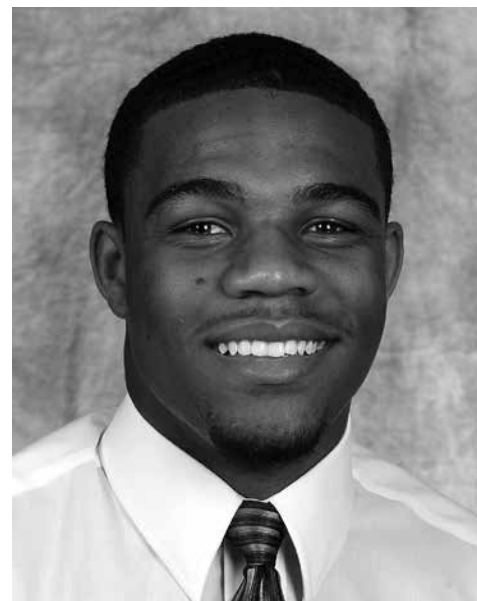
2013, the decision was overturned and wrestling will remain in the Olympics.

In 2011, Burroughs completed his decorated collegiate career with a second national title and claimed the Hodge Trophy Award. He went 36-0 as a senior at 165 pounds and also captured 2011 InterMat Wrestler-of-the-Year honors.

Burroughs' first NCAA crown came in 2009, when he posted a perfect 35-0 record at 157 pounds. In 2009-10, his season was cut short by a torn PCL and LCL after racing to a 7-0 start.

The three-time All-American finished third at the 2008 NCAA Championships with a 34-6 record. He won a Big 12 title during the same season and added conference crowns in 2009 and 2011. Burroughs completed his college career with a 128-20 record, the fourth-most victories in school history. He also holds the fifth-best career winning percentage in Nebraska history at .865.

A native of Sicklerville, N.J., Burroughs graduated from the University of Nebraska with a degree in sociology in May 2011. He and his wife Lauren were married on Oct. 12, 2013. They have an infant son, Beacon, who was born on July 19, 2014.

Jason Powell enters his sixth season as the strength and conditioning coach for the Huskers in 2014-15.

In his time on the Nebraska staff, the Huskers have gone 61-28-0 in dual competition, while crowning nine wrestlers as All-Americans.

A native of Midwest City, Okla., Powell was one of the most decorated wrestlers in school history, claiming the 2004 national championship at 125 pounds with a 17-2 technical fall over Kyle Ott of Illinois. The win wrapped up a 26-2 season for Powell, as he helped lead NU to its first top-five finish at the NCAA Championships since 1996. As a junior, Powell finished third at the 2003 national meet following a fifth-place finish in 2002. He ranks 10th on NU's all-time win chart with 109.

A 2004 graduate of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln with a degree in sociology, Powell was a three-time All-American and four-year team captain before furthering his career with a fourth-place finish at the U.S. Nationals in the freestyle competition. After graduation, Powell spent time as a volunteer coach for the Huskers and as an assistant coach at Oregon and Maryland.

Powell and his wife, Hannah, were married in August of 2012.

Pat Norris

Pat Norris began working as the equipment manager for the Bob Devaney Sports Center in 2004. A member of the American Equipment Managers Association (AEMA), Norris passed his certification test in 2009 and currently holds an E.M.C. designation. Within the Devaney Center, he is responsible for overseeing the day-to-day operations for equipment checkout and upkeep for seven Husker teams, including the men's basketball team. He worked in a similar position as a student from 1997 to 1999.

Harvey Perlman, J.D. Josephine Potuto, J.D.

Harvey Perlman was named the 19th Chancellor of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln on April 1, 2001. He had served as Interim Chancellor of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln since July 16, 2000.

A former dean of the University of Nebraska College of Law (1983-98), Perlman has also served as interim senior vice chancellor for academic affairs at UNL (1995-96).

A Nebraska native, Perlman was raised in York, and earned a bachelor of arts in history and a juris doctorate from the University of Nebraska. During



his law school years, he was editor in chief of the Nebraska Law Review and was elected to the Order of the Coif, a law honors society.

He joined the NU law faculty in 1967 after spending a year as a Bigelow Teaching Fellow at the University of Chicago Law School. He served on the Nebraska law faculty until 1974 when he joined the faculty at the University of Virginia Law School. He returned to Nebraska in 1983 when he accepted the deanship of the Nebraska Law College, a post he held until 1998 when he returned to the professoriate. He has also served as a visiting professor at Florida State University College of Law, the University of Puget Sound School of Law and the University of Iowa College of Law.

In 2011, Perlman was named an Honorary University Professor of Xi'an Jiaotong University, in Xi'an, China. This rare lifetime appointment entitles Perlman to privileges at the university, with which UNL has many institutional ties. Perlman also will occasionally lecture and teach at Xi'an Jiaotong University. The title is the highest honor the university awards to a foreign scholar, and recognizes Perlman as an accomplished scholar or professional of important international reputation. The award also recognizes Perlman for his significant efforts in globalizing UNL and Xi'an Jiaotong University through joint research and partnership degree programs.

His area of legal expertise lies in torts and intellectual property. He is a member of the Nebraska State and American Bar Associations and is a Life Fellow of the American Bar Association. Perlman is co-author of "Intellectual Property and Unfair Competition" (5th edition, 1998) and co-reporter for the American Law Institute's "Restatement of Unfair Competition" (1994). He serves on the Council of the American Law Institute, a leading national law reform organization and as one of Nebraska's Commissioners of Uniform State Laws. He previously served as a member of the NCAA Board of Directors and is past chair of the Bowl Championship Series Presidential Oversight Committee. He serves on the Board of Directors of the Lincoln Chamber of Commerce and is Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Nebraska Innovation Campus Development Corporation. He received the George Turner Award from the Nebraska State Bar Association for contributions to the legal profession and the Roger T. Larson Community Builder Award from the Lincoln Chamber of Commerce.

Perlman and his wife, Susan, an NU alumna, are the parents of two daughters. Anne, who earned degrees from UNL and the University of Nebraska Medical Center, practices medicine in Lincoln and is married to UNL alumnus David Spinar; they have three children; Will, Ava, and Marco, Husker fans all. Daughter Amie, who received bachelors and juris doctorate degrees from UNL, is a Nebraska assistant attorney general and is married to UNL alumnus Ron Larson; they are the parents of Caleb and Finn.

Josephine (Jo) R. Potuto, the Richard H. Larson Professor of Constitutional Law, has been Nebraska's faculty representative (FAR) at the NCAA and conference level since May 15, 1997.

In 2002, Potuto was named Outstanding Faculty Athletics Representative by the All-American Football Foundation. From 2008-09 to 2011-12 she was president of the 1A FAR (FARs from FBS institutions). Among her NCAA positions, Potuto spent nine years (the maximum) on the NCAA Division I Committee on Infractions (chair her last two years) and currently substitutes when a member cannot serve. She was one of three Big 12 Conference representatives on the NCAA Division I Management Council, served on the NCAA Men's Gymnastics Championship Committee, and currently serves on an NCAA-wide (all divisions) committee to advise NCAA staff on student-athlete issues and educational programming for coaches, staff, and student-athletes.

A sports law expert, Potuto regularly lectures and consults on sports issues in general and NCAA processes in particular. She is an expert witness in litigation involving sports issues. She testified before the House Subcommittee on the Constitution regarding due process in NCAA infractions hearings.

In the past year she has appeared in media reports in the NY Times, LA Times, USA Today, Washington Post, CBSSports.com, and the Chronicle of Higher Education, among others. She has presented to the Knight Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics, the Texas Commission of Higher Education, NCAA regional conferences, law conferences and law firms, NACDA, and to universities and law colleges, including the Universities of Istanbul, Washington, Maryland, Oklahoma, Santa Clara, Baltimore and Mississippi.

Potuto is a past adviser to the Uniform Law Commissioners Committee to draft a sports agent statute, has drafted rules governing search and seizure and hearings for the Nebraska Racing Commission, and also has written on issues of gender equity in college athletics. She has authored numerous articles on sports law issues. She just completed an article on student-athlete use of their names/likenesses with an econometrician and tax professor.

Potuto delivered the 2012 Chancellor's Distinguished Lecture. She serves on the senate's intercollegiate athletics committee. She is a past member of the UNL academic senate and also served on Nebraska's NCAA site certification steering committee.

Potuto teaches constitutional law, procedure, federal jurisdiction, and sports law. She has been a visiting professor of law at the University of Arizona, Rutgers University, the Cardozo College of Law at New York's Yeshiva University, the University of Oregon, the University of North Carolina, and Seton Hall University. She has worked as an assistant prosecutor in both the Essex and Morris County (N.J.) prosecutor's offices.

Potuto was project director and a drafter of the Uniform Law Commissioners Sentencing and Corrections Act, as well as the drafter for the Nebraska Supreme Court Committee to Draft Criminal Jury Instructions. She is the author of three books. She was elected to membership in the American Law Institute, the Nebraska State Bar Foundation, and the Douglass Society.

Potuto earned her bachelor's degree in journalism at Rutgers' Douglass College, and her master's degree in English literature at Seton Hall. She earned her juris doctorate at the Rutgers Law College.

She is a member of the bars of Nebraska and New Jersey and is admitted to practice before the U.S. Supreme Court, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit, and the U.S. District Courts for Nebraska and New Jersey.

Shawn Eichorst

Director of Athletics • Second Year • Wisconsin-Whitewater (1990)

Shawn Eichorst was named Nebraska's 14th Director of Athletics on Oct. 4, 2012, by Chancellor Harvey Perlman. Eichorst leads a tradition-rich athletic program of 24 varsity intercollegiate teams, 600-plus student-athletes and more than 275 full-time employees. Nebraska's reputation as a world-class academic institution and its stature as one of the strongest and most balanced athletic departments in collegiate athletics supports Eichorst's top priority, which is to ensure all Husker student-athletes have the necessary support to succeed in academics, athletics and life.

Since taking over for the legendary Tom Osborne as Director of Athletics on Jan. 3, 2013, Eichorst has immersed himself in Nebraska's rich traditions. He has made nearly 300 public appearances, including nearly 200 speaking engagements in Nebraska. He serves on the Chancellor's Senior Administrative Team and regularly meets with campus administrators and deans. Eichorst's monthly radio show and Connecting on Campus column promote the university's academic and athletic successes, along with the academic and community achievements of Husker student-athletes.

Eichorst was also the first Director of Athletics to visit the Big Ten-based Committee on Institutional Cooperation (CIC) at its Champaign, Ill., headquarters. The CIC is a highly successful academic-based consortium of 15 schools, including all 14 in the Big Ten Conference. Nebraska is leading the Big Ten and the CIC in several areas, including the Digital Humanities and head injury research.

Under Eichorst's watch, Nebraska extended its nation-leading total of CoSIDA Academic All-Americans to 314, including seven in 2013-14. NU also increased its nation-leading total to 17 NCAA Top Ten Award winners, as Mary Weatherholt (women's tennis) earned the honor in 2014. A total of 279 Huskers were honored at the Student-Athlete Recognition Banquet, and 208 Husker student-athletes earned Academic All-Big Ten honors in 2013-14, an increase of 20 from 2012-13.

In 2013-14, Nebraska became one of only two NCAA institutions – and the first Big Ten program in history – to qualify for a football bowl game, and advance to NCAA postseason in the major team sports of volleyball, soccer, men's and women's basketball, baseball and softball. Nebraska was the only institution to win a postseason game in six of those seven sports.

The Nebraska football team completed its sixth straight nine-win season, while playing in its third consecutive New Year's Day bowl game, a win over Georgia. The volleyball team advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight in its first season at the Bob Devaney Sports Center. The Husker soccer team qualified for the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2005, and advanced to the second round after winning Big Ten regular-season and tournament titles.

The women's basketball team captured Nebraska's first-ever conference tournament title while earning an NCAA Tournament win for the second straight year. The Huskers also hosted an NCAA Regional at Pinnacle Bank Arena – the first time since 1993 that NCAA Tournament basketball came to Lincoln. The men's basketball team earned Nebraska's first trip to the NCAA Tournament since 1998, following a top-four Big Ten finish. The men's and women's basketball teams qualified for the NCAA Tournament in the same season for the first time since 1998.

The bowling team earned an NCAA runner-up finish, and the rifle team finished fifth at the NCAA Championships. The women's gymnastics program made the NCAA Super Six and earned a share of the Big Ten title. The men's gymnastics team added an eighth-place NCAA finish, while the wrestling team claimed 11th at nationals – its top showing at the NCAA Championships since 2009.

The softball team shared the Big Ten regular-season title and advanced to an NCAA Super Regional for the second straight season. The baseball team earned its first NCAA Tournament bid since 2008. It marked the first time in school history the baseball and men's basketball teams advanced to the NCAA Tournament in the same season.

The men's track and field team finished 12th at the NCAA Outdoor Championships, after finishing 17th at the indoor meet. The women added a 19th-place finish at the NCAA Outdoor Championships.

The Huskers produced 42 All-Americans who won 51 awards, including 29 first-team honors – NU's highest All-America totals in more than a decade.

Nebraska ranked in the top 20 nationally in attendance in football (90,933, 9th), volleyball (8,175, 1st), men's basketball (15,419, 13th), women's basketball (6,161, 11th), baseball (3,241, 15th) and softball (963) in 2013-14. NU's football, men's basketball and volleyball attendances were all school records, and the Huskers extended NCAA-record home sellout streaks in both football (333) and volleyball (200).

Nebraska is focusing on improving the game-day atmosphere at every venue, including a \$12.3 million upgrade of its wireless networks in and around Memorial Stadium in 2014. It is the largest wireless network system installation at a college stadium in history. The upgrade includes a new sound system, IPTV system installation and innovative smartphone applications.

In the summer of 2013, Memorial Stadium expansion increased capacity while adding the innovative Nebraska Athletic Performance Laboratory (NAPL) inside East Stadium next to the Center for Brain, Biology and Behavior (CB3). The men's and women's basketball teams became the primary tenants at Pinnacle Bank Arena, and the renovated Devaney Center became the home of the Husker volleyball, wrestling and men's and women's gymnastics programs.

The next major facility project is a world-class, \$20.4 million Nebraska Soccer and Tennis Complex, located just north of the Devaney Center and Innovation Campus. When completed in 2015, the facilities will rank among the best in the Big Ten.

Eichorst came to Nebraska after serving as Director of Athletics at Miami in 2011 and 2012. During his tenure, Eichorst helped grow the academic reputation of an already sterling program with NCAA Top 10 recognition in Academic Progress Rates (APR) for five programs – football, baseball, men's diving, women's cross country and women's golf. Miami's Hurricane Club grew to more than 5,000 nationwide. A total of \$19 million in student-athlete support was generated in 2011-12, and \$14.2 million in capital gifts was raised for the Center for Athletic Excellence.

Eichorst hired legendary men's basketball coach Jim Larrañaga, and the Hurricanes advanced to the NIT second round. The women's basketball program posted the highest national ranking in school history (No. 5) and advanced to the NCAA second round. The women's tennis team advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight for the fourth straight season, and the baseball team made its 40th consecutive NCAA appearance. The women's soccer team posted the first NCAA Tournament win in history, and the volleyball team made its third straight NCAA Tournament trip.

Before heading to Miami, Eichorst was the Deputy Athletics Director at Wisconsin from 2009 to 2011. He was the Chief Operating Officer and oversaw the day-to-day operations (23 intercollegiate programs, 850 student-athletes, 320 full-time employees) under Director of Athletics and former Husker Barry Alvarez. Eichorst was involved in the design and planning of a new ice hockey and swimming facility, and the Student-Athlete Performance Center at Camp Randall Stadium.

At South Carolina, Eichorst oversaw daily operations of the department and supervised Lou Holtz's and Steve Spurrier's football programs and Ray Tanner's baseball program. The football team was bowl-eligible each season, and the baseball team competed in the 2004 College World Series. Additionally, he coordinated and supervised multi-million dollar facility projects, including a football training facility.

From 1999 to 2003, Eichorst served as the Director of Athletics at Wisconsin-Whitewater, which produced four top 10 percent NACDA Directors Cup finishes, one NCAA team title, two NCAA runner-up finishes and five individual national champions. The program also featured 11 CoSIDA Academic All-America selections,

seven NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship winners and 74 All-Americans.

Senior Associate Athletic Director Bob Burton enters his 17th season with the Nebraska athletic department, since joining the Husker staff in 1998.

Burton reports to the Director of Athletics and serves on Nebraska's senior management team. He assists in NU's financial and facilities master plans, providing supervision to the Athletic Business Office, Concessions, Capital Planning and Construction and Information Technology/Computing Service areas. He also oversees complimentary ticket and gift-in-kind approvals and reconciliation.

Burton, who serves on the Big Ten Sports Management Council, is the Athletic Department's contract administrator, including all game/event agreements, and serves as the department's liaison to the NU General Counsel Office. He also plays a major role in NU's risk management program, while overseeing the operations of Nebraska's camps and clinics.

Burton acts as the department's liaison to Haymarket Park. Working with the Lincoln SaltDogs, he helps set the budget for field and stadium operation costs and create strategic plans for the facility.

Burton is Nebraska's sport administrator for wrestling, bowling, men's and women's track and field and cross country.

Burton joined the athletic department in 1998 as an associate athletic director for compliance/sports administration. He served in that role until 2007, ensuring that the conduct and operations of Nebraska's athletic teams were in compliance with NCAA, Big 12 and institutional rules and regulations. He also performed as the primary sports administrator for many of Nebraska's teams.

Burton filled a similar position at Oklahoma State as the assistant athletic director for sports administration and compliance from 1993 to 1997. He oversaw OSU's Olympic sports programs as well as the training and strength and conditioning, wrestling, men's and women's track and field and men's and women's tennis programs.

Burton came to Nebraska from Texas Tech, where he served as an associate athletic director for compliance for one year. While at Texas Tech, Burton helped complete the NCAA investigation into the Red Raider athletic department and analyzed the entire compliance system at the institution. He also helped identify and implement financial aid and eligibility systems, including changes in personnel and restructuring of the compliance department.

Burton, who was a member of the NCAA Division I women's soccer committee for three years and was a member of the NCAA Division I bowling committee, served as a legislative administrator for the NCAA from 1989 to 1993. At the NCAA, he was involved in the development of legislation, interpretation of regulations and reviewed legal issues related to the application of the association's regulations. He served as an NCAA liaison to committees and conducted comprehensive education to several intercollegiate athletic conferences. He has served on the National Association of Athletic Compliance Coordinators Executive Committee and the subcommittee of Big 12 Directors of Compliance.

He received his bachelor's degree in finance from Nebraska in 1985 and his juris doctorate from the Nebraska College of Law in 1989. A native of Falls City, Neb., Burton and his wife, Krista, have a daughter, Elly Kathryn, and sons Robert Falk, McClain John and Abram Lawslo.

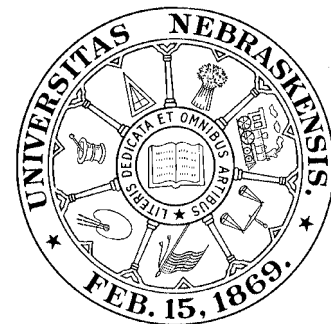
Board of Regents

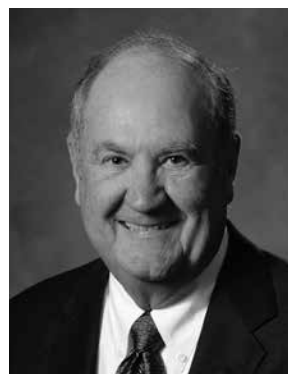

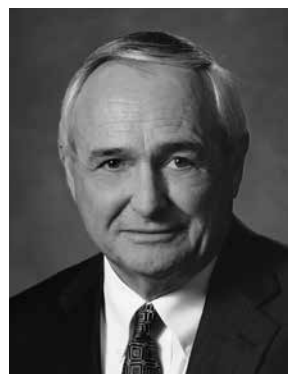

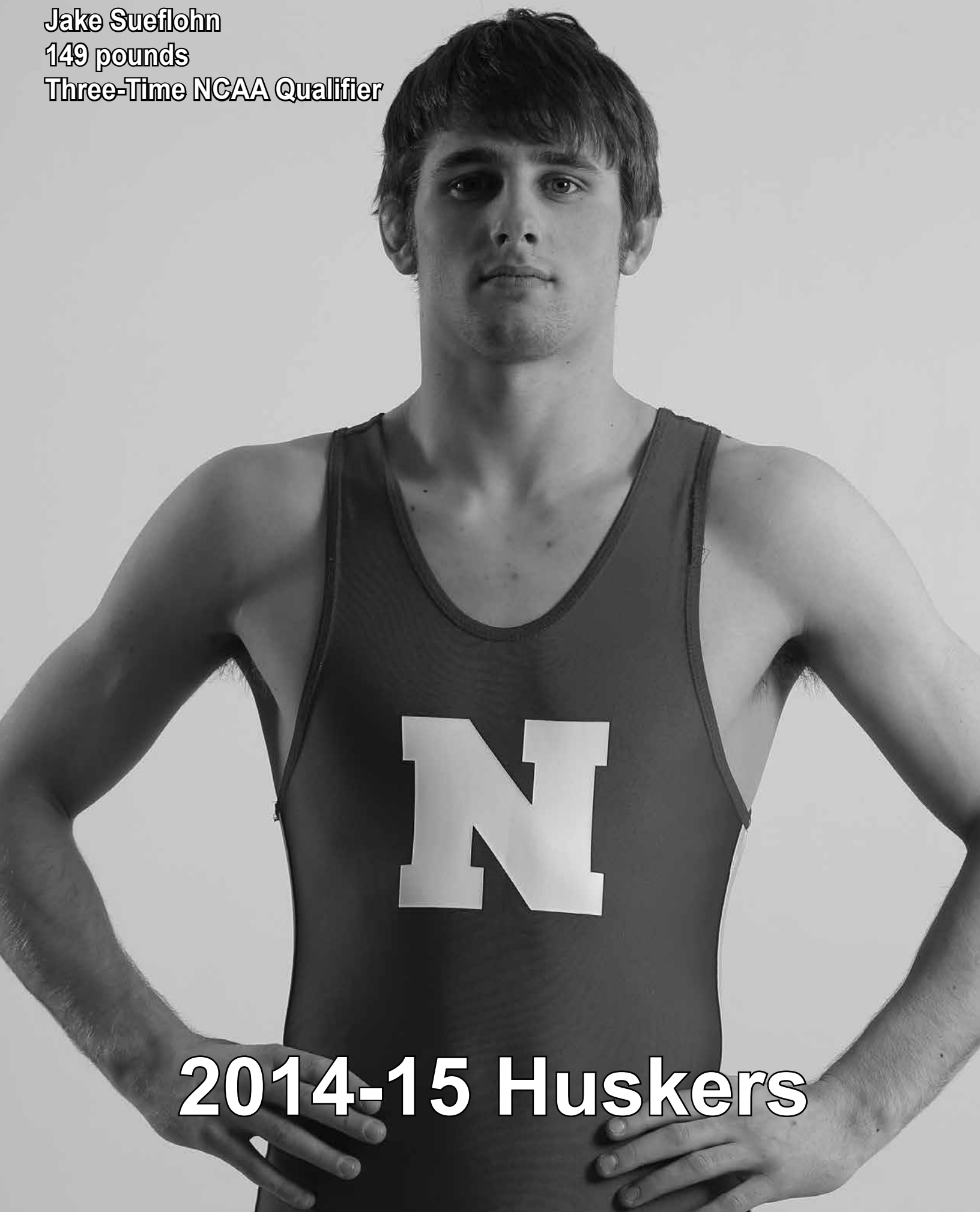

2014-15 Outlook

Three-time All-American James Green begins his final season in a Husker singlet at 157 pounds in 2014-15. After compiling 94 wins in his first three years, Green seeks to become Nebraska's first national champion since 2011. He took third place in 2014 after finishing seventh during both his sophomore and freshman seasons. He could also become NU's second four-time All-American.

2013-14 (Junior)

NCAA Championships

For the third consecutive season, Green collected All-America honors, finishing third as a junior with a 6-1 mark. Green, the No. 1 seed, notched a pair of major decisions to open his tournament against Air Force's Joshua Kreimier and Illinois' Zac Brunson. Green's run at the title came to an end in the quarterfinals when he was pinned by ninth-seeded Dylan Ness of Minnesota.

Green dominated all four of his opponents in the consolation bracket, notching four bonus-point victories by a combined score of 40-3 and a medical forfeit. After taking down 14th seed Joseph LaVallee of Missouri, 12-2, Green avenged a loss from earlier in the season to fifth-seeded Isaac Jordan of Wisconsin, 15-0. In the third-place match, Green won a 13-1 major decision over No. 4 seed Ian Miller of Kent State.

Big Ten Championships

Green was one of two Huskers to claim Big Ten titles in 2014, joining 174-pounder Robert Kokesh to become the first two Big Ten champions in school history. Green pinned Illinois' Zac Brunson in 2:15 in his opening match before a pair of decisions to wrap up the title. He took down No. 6 Dylan Ness of Minnesota, 7-3, before defeating No. 4 Derek St. John of Iowa, 7-4, in the championship match.

Regular Season

Green opened his season with 26 consecutive wins before suffering his first loss, and completed the 2013-14 campaign with a 35-2 record. He captured the Warren Williamson/Daktronics Open, Cliff Keen Las Vegas Invitational and Reno Tournament of Champions titles to go along with his 12-1 dual record. Green had 10 major decisions, five pins and four technical falls as a junior. He was 13-2 against ranked opponents.

On Jan. 18, Green defeated top-ranked Derek St. John of Iowa, 9-7, to become the No. 1 wrestler at 157 pounds in every major poll across the country. During the week of his ascent, Green also captured USA Wrestling Athlete of the Week and Flowrestling.com's Brute Wrestler-of-the-Week Award. He held the top spot for four weeks before falling to Isaac Jordan of Wisconsin by sudden victory 2. Green was also named to the Hodge Trophy's Sensational Six List on Feb. 3.

2012-13 (Sophomore)

NCAA Championships

Green garnered All-America accolades at 157 pounds for the second consecutive season, finishing seventh in 2013. His NCAA Championships appearance got off to a rocky start with a 6-5 tiebreaker loss to Missouri's Kyle Bradley in the first round. Green responded in the wrestleback bracket, reeling off four consecutive dominating victories. He won a 21-6 technical fall over Navy's Bobby Barnhisel before a major decision over Indiana's Taylor Walsh, a pin over Purdue's Tommy Churchard and a 14-4 major decision over Dylan Alton of Penn State.

Having already clinched All-America honors, Green was pinned by Virginia's Jedd Moore in 6:15. Green bounced back in the seventh-place match to win a 14-4 major decision over Clarion's James Fleming.

Big Ten Championships

Green opened with a 15-5 major decision over Indiana's Taylor Walsh before upsetting No. 2 Derek St. John of Iowa by a 5-4 decision in the semifinals. Green battled No. 1 Jason Welch in a back and forth championship match before Welch pinned him in the third period. Green finished second at the conference tournament with a 2-1 record.

Regular Season

Green completed his sophomore season at 157 pounds with a 25-6 record, which included an 11-2 dual mark. He achieved one pin, four technical falls and nine major decisions in 2012-13. He tore through his first 11 matches of the season, picking up the 157-pound title at the Warren Williamson/Daktronics Open but an injury at the Cliff Keen Invitational led to an eighth-place finish.

Green returned six weeks later to help the Huskers defeat ranked conference foes Michigan and Northwestern on the road. He handed No. 2 Jason Welch of Northwestern his first loss of the season in a 9-8 decision in Evanston, Ill. Green stepped up to wrestle at 165 pounds in Nebraska's win over No. 11 Virginia. He won a 5-2 decision over No. 7 Nick Sulzer.

2011-12 (Freshman)

NCAA Championships

Green earned All-America honors in his first season as a Husker, taking seventh place at the NCAA Championships at 157 pounds. He opened with a major decision victory over Lehigh's Brian Tanen before defeating No. 6 seed James Fleming of Clarion by an 8-3 decision in overtime. In the following round, Green lost by a 2-1 decision to No. 3 seed Jason Welch of Northwestern.

In the wrestleback bracket, Green won a 3-1 decision over North Dakota State's Steven Monk before losing a 4-3 decision to No. 7 seed Dylan Alton of Penn State. In the seventh-place match, Green won by major decision over Harvard's Walter Peppelman, 9-1.

Big Ten Championships

Green took fifth at the Big Ten Championships, going 3-2 in his first appearance. After opening with a 15-2 major decision over Wisconsin's Shawn Perry, Green lost a 6-4 sudden victory to Iowa's Derek St. John, the No. 6 seed. Green responded in the wrestleback bracket with a 9-6 decision over Purdue's Tommy Churchard, advancing to wrestle No. 4 seed Anthony Jones of Michigan State.

Green was pinned by Jones in 4:44, but ended his Big Ten Championships with an 8-3 decision over Ohio State's Josh Demas in the fifth-place match.

Regular Season

Green won a team-high 34 matches as a freshman, going 14-4 in duals. He earned one pin and won 13 matches by major decision, also a team high. Green started his Husker career on a high note, winning the Warren Williamson/Daktronics Open at 157 pounds. He outscored his opponents 76-26, winning three matches by major decision and the other one by technical fall.

Green suffered a pair of dual losses before achieving another open tournament title at the Nebraska-Kearney Holiday Inn Open. At the Cliff Keen Invitational, Green went 5-1 and earned a third-place finish. He reeled off a 13-match winning streak that included four victories over ranked opponents and five major decisions. Green went 8-1 in Big Ten duals.

As a senior at Willingboro High School, Green became the first wrestler in school history to win a state championship after a perfect 29-0 season. Green capped his title run with a 16-4 major decision win over Nicholas Alpher of Paramus in the 145-pound finals. Green closed his career with a 148-8 overall record. During his senior year, Green recorded 13 pins and three technical falls to go along with five major decisions. He was the state runner-up at 140 pounds his junior season, and took fourth place at 130 pounds as a sophomore. Green finished his high school career by winning the 145-pound national title at the NHSCA Senior National Wrestling Championships. Green was a four-time District 26 champion in New Jersey and a two-time regional champion.

2014-15 Outlook

Two-time All-American Robert Kokesh looks to cap his Husker career with a national title in 2015 at 174 pounds. Kokesh, the defending Big Ten champion, has a chance to climb up numerous school career lists, including all-time victories. Kokesh finished fourth at the 2014 NCAA Championships after taking third at the 2013 tournament.

2013-14 (Junior)

NCAA Championships

Kokesh, the No. 3 seed, went 5-2 at the NCAA Championships to collect All-America honors for the second consecutive season and finish fourth. He opened with a pair of major decisions over West Virginia's Jacob Scheffel and Rider's Conor Brennan to advance to the quarterfinals. Facing fellow South Dakota native and No. 6 seed Logan Storley of Minnesota, Kokesh dropped a 6-4 match by tiebreaker 2.

In the consolation bracket, Kokesh battled a torn ACL, but managed three wins to advance to the third-place match. He took down Illinois' Tony Dallago, No. 7 seed Tyler Wilps of Pittsburgh and fourth-seeded Mike Evans of Iowa. In the third-place match, Kokesh battled Storley to extra time for the second time in the tournament. Storley emerged victorious again, winning by tiebreaker 1, 3-1.

Big Ten Championships

Kokesh was one of two conference champions for the Huskers in 2014, joining 157-pounder James Green to become the first Big Ten champions in school history. In Kokesh's first match, he pinned Michigan's Collin Zeerip in 4:28. Kokesh notched a 3-2 decision over No. 6 Logan Storley of Minnesota before taking down No. 5 Mike Evans of Iowa, 6-4, in the championship match. Kokesh's win in the title match marked the 100th of his college career at Nebraska.

Regular Season

Kokesh went 37-3 and posted a perfect 14-0 dual record as a junior. In addition to leading the team in both of those categories, Kokesh finished first among the Huskers in dual points (67), pins (9) and tied for first in technical falls (5). Kokesh tied for second on the team in major decisions with 10. He won his first 14 matches of the season, 13 of which were bonus-point victories, before falling to then-No. 1 Andrew Howe of Oklahoma to finish second at the Cliff Keen Las Vegas Invitational.

Kokesh responded to the loss by reeling off 20 consecutive victories before dropping his quarterfinal match at the NCAA Championships. He captured titles at the Warren Williamson/Daktronics Open and Reno Tournament of Champions. In addition, Kokesh went 9-3 against ranked opponents in 2013-14.

2012-13 (Sophomore)

NCAA Championships

Kokesh earned All-America honors for the first time in his Husker career, finishing third at 174 pounds in 2013. He pinned Penn's Ian Korb in the first round before winning an 8-3 decision over Cody Walters of Ohio. In the quarterfinals, Kokesh won an 11-3 major decision over No. 5 seed Josh Asper of Maryland. Kokesh battled No. 1 seed Chris Perry of Oklahoma State to a 2-2 tie in the semifinals that headed into sudden victory. Kokesh was taken down in the extra period to fall, 4-2, and head to the wrestleback bracket.

Having clinched All-America honors, Kokesh faced No. 3 seed Mike Evans of Iowa in the consolation semifinals. The pair traded escapes for a 1-1 tie in the third period before a late Kokesh takedown that led to a 3-2 decision. In the third-place match, Kokesh faced No. 6 seed Logan Storley of Minnesota. Kokesh and Storley headed to sudden victory in a 1-1 tie, and the Husker sophomore took down the Gopher in the extra time to prevail.

Big Ten Championships

Kokesh fell in the first round of the Big Ten Championships to Illinois' Jordan Blanton by an 8-2 decision but won his next four matches en route to a third-place finish. In the wrestleback bracket, Kokesh defeated Indiana's Cheney Dale (MD, 13-2), Purdue's Chad Welch (D, 7-3) and Michigan's Dan Yates (MD, 10-1) to set up a rematch with Blanton. This time Kokesh got the better of Blanton, winning a 4-3 decision.

Regular Season

Kokesh led the Huskers in several categories during the 2012-13 campaign: wins (38), dual wins (15), dual points (63), pins (9) and major decisions (10). His 38 wins put him in a tie for seventh on Nebraska's season victories list and gave him the second-most wins in a season by a Husker sophomore. From Nov. 18 to Feb. 1, Kokesh won 22 consecutive matches.

He tied for first at the Warren Williamson/Daktronics Open in November, pinning two of his three opponents in the process. Kokesh added first-place finishes at the Cliff Keen Invitational and Midlands Invitational, outscoring his opponents in the latter tournament, 46-7, while adding two pins. Kokesh's two regular-season losses came against Minnesota's Logan Storley and Iowa's Mike Evans. Kokesh avenged both losses at the NCAA Championships.

2011-12 (Redshirt Freshman)

NCAA Championships

No. 8 seed Kokesh won back-to-back matches to start his NCAA Championships on the right note. In the first round, Kokesh defeated Missouri's Zach Toal by a 4-1 decision before powering past Oklahoma's Patrick Graham, 5-4.

However, Kokesh suffered back-to-back losses to end his trip to the NCAA Championships. He was pinned by No. 1 seed David Taylor of Penn State in 30 seconds, before dropping a narrow 4-3 decision in the wrestleback bracket to Appalachian State's Kyle Blevins.

Big Ten Championships

Kokesh took third at the Big Ten Championships with a 3-1 record. After a bye in the first round, the third-seeded Kokesh posted a 12-4 major decision over No. 13 Daniel Yates of Michigan. After a 17-2 technical fall loss to Iowa's Mike Evans, Kokesh responded with two victories, including a 4-1 decision over No. 12 Conrad Polz of Illinois.

Regular Season

Kokesh went 30-7 as Nebraska's starter at 165 pounds, including a 17-2 dual record. He went 7-2 in Big Ten duals. He opened his redshirt freshman campaign with six straight victories before losing a 6-2 decision to No. 2 Shane Onufer of Wyoming in the title match at the Nebraska-Kearney Holiday Inn Open.

At the Cliff Keen Invitational, Kokesh started with a pair of pins before being pinned by Northern Colorado's Stephen Burak. Kokesh took third at the tournament and reeled off 10 consecutive wins following the loss to Burak.

Kokesh earned a team-high 68 dual points for the Huskers in 2011-12, while pinning a team-best seven opponents. His quickest pin, which occurred in 20 seconds, was the fastest by any Husker starter. In addition, Kokesh's 11 major decisions ranked second on the squad.

2010-11 (Redshirt)

Regular Season

Kokesh unleashed one of the most dominant redshirt seasons in recent Nebraska history by going 34-1 and recording 29 bonus-point victories. Kokesh's only loss of the season came to fellow Husker Jordan Burroughs in the finals of the Harold Nichols Open to start the season, when Kokesh forfeited for medical reasons. Kokesh's 34 victories ranked second on the team behind Burroughs, while leading the team in pins with 19. Kokesh also

2014-15 Outlook

Jake Sueflohn remains at 149 pounds for his senior season in search of his first appearance on the podium at the NCAA Championships. He went 31-6 last season, and made his third NCAA appearance. Sueflohn is 20 wins away from the 100th of his career at Nebraska.

2013-14 (Junior)

NCAA Championships

Sueflohn went 2-2 at 149 pounds, with both losses coming by narrow decisions to seeded opponents. Sueflohn, the No. 6 seed, opened with a 16-0 technical fall over North Carolina's Christian Barber to get his tournament off on the right note. In the second round, he fell to 11th-seeded Joshua Kindig, 7-5, to move into the consolation bracket.

Sueflohn responded with another shutout, posting an 8-0 major decision over Bloomsburg's Bryce Busler. Sueflohn was eliminated in his next match, a 7-6 loss to third-seeded Chris Villalonga of Cornell.

Big Ten Championships

For the second consecutive season, Sueflohn collected runner-up honors at 149 pounds at the conference tournament. He breezed past Michigan State's Nick Trimble in his first match, 17-5, before notching an 8-6 decision over No. 8 Eric Grajales in the semifinals. In the championship match, Sueflohn dropped a 6-2 decision to No. 5 Jason Tsirtsis of Northwestern.

Regular Season

Sueflohn started every dual at 149 pounds, compiling a 13-1 record with his only loss coming to eventual NCAA champion Jason Tsirtsis of Northwestern. Sueflohn went 31-6 overall during the 2013-14 campaign, and captured the Reno Tournament of Champions title on Dec. 22. He finished second at the Warren Williamson/Daktronics Open and Cliff Keen Las Vegas Invitational. After his loss in Las Vegas, Sueflohn reeled off 16 consecutive victories before his Big Ten Championships loss.

Sueflohn led the team in major decisions with 11, while collecting three pins and three technical falls. All six of his losses during the season came against ranked opponents.

2012-13 (Sophomore)

NCAA Championships

Sueflohn fell one match short of All-America honors in 2013 at 149 pounds. He opened the NCAA Championships with a 16-3 major decision over Pittsburgh's Ronnie Garbinsky before taking down No. 8 seed Nick Brascetta of Virginia Tech, 4-2.

In the semifinals, Sueflohn fell by an 11-3 major decision to eventual champion Jordan Oliver of Oklahoma State. In the wrestleback bracket, Sueflohn suffered his second straight loss in a 5-3 decision against No. 6 seed Dylan Ness of Minnesota.

Big Ten Championships

Sueflohn finished second at 149 pounds with a 2-1 showing at the Big Ten Championships. He won a pair of decisions over Penn State's Andrew Alton and Ohio State's Ian Paddock to earn a spot in the championship match. However, Minnesota's Dylan Ness pinned Sueflohn in 3:37 for the 149-pound title.

Regular Season

Sueflohn opened the season with six consecutive wins, capturing the Warren Williamson/Daktronics Open title in the process. He added a third-place finish at the Cliff Keen Invitational and was the only Husker to claim victories at No. 1 Penn State and No. 2 Iowa. He pinned the Nittany Lions' No. 3 Andrew Alton in 5:33 and

added an 8-0 major decision over the Hawkeyes' Brody Grothus. Sueflohn wrapped up the regular season with a pair of wins over ranked opponents at the NWCA National Duals against Virginia and Cornell.

Sueflohn finished the season with a 24-7 record and went 11-3 in dual competition. He managed two pins and six major decisions during his sophomore campaign.

2011-12 (Freshman)

NCAA Championships

Sueflohn wrestled at 141 pounds and went 1-2 in his first appearance at the NCAA Championships. He narrowly lost a 6-5 decision to Virginia Tech's Zach Neibert before responding in the wrestleback bracket with a 6-2 decision over Appalachian State's Mike Kessler. Sueflohn's first trip to the NCAA Championships came to an end with a 5-4 loss to Rutgers' William Ashnault.

Big Ten Championships

Sueflohn finished fifth at 141 pounds with a 4-2 record at the Big Ten Championships. He opened with a 9-6 decision over Northwestern's Colin Shober before losing by sudden victory against Minnesota's Nick Dardanes, 8-6. Sueflohn pinned Brian Gibbs of Michigan State, in 4:54, in his first wrestleback match.

Sueflohn won a 5-3 decision in the following round before dropping a 7-4 decision to third-ranked Hunter Stieber of Ohio State. Sueflohn closed the Big Ten Championships with a 15-10 decision over Illinois' Daryl Thomas.

Regular Season

Sueflohn compiled a 25-11 record at 141 pounds, including a 13-4 dual record. In his first match as a Husker, the Watertown, Wis., native achieved his first pin over Bucknell's Alex Pellicciotti in 4:35. It was Sueflohn's first of three pins on the season. At the Nebraska-Kearney Holiday Inn Open, Sueflohn earned runner-up honors, going 2-1.

Sueflohn took third at the Cliff Keen Invitational with a 5-2 record. Three of his five victories came against top 15 opponents. He went 5-3 in Big Ten duals, earning two victories by major decision. On the season, Sueflohn won six major decisions, which was good for third among the Husker starters.

Sueflohn was named to the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll for his work in the classroom during the fall 2011 semester.

Before Nebraska

Sueflohn was a two-time Wisconsin state champion after winning the Division I 140-pound title as a senior by going a perfect 48-0. He also claimed the 135-pound title as a junior. Sueflohn was the No. 2 wrestler in the nation at 140 pounds as a senior according to InterMat. As a freshman, Sueflohn finished third at the state championships at 119 pounds, while recording a 50-4 record. His sophomore season saw him finish in the runner-up spot at the 125-pound weight division going 38-5. After his senior season, Sueflohn finished third at 145 pounds at the Junior Freestyle National Championships in Fargo, N.D.

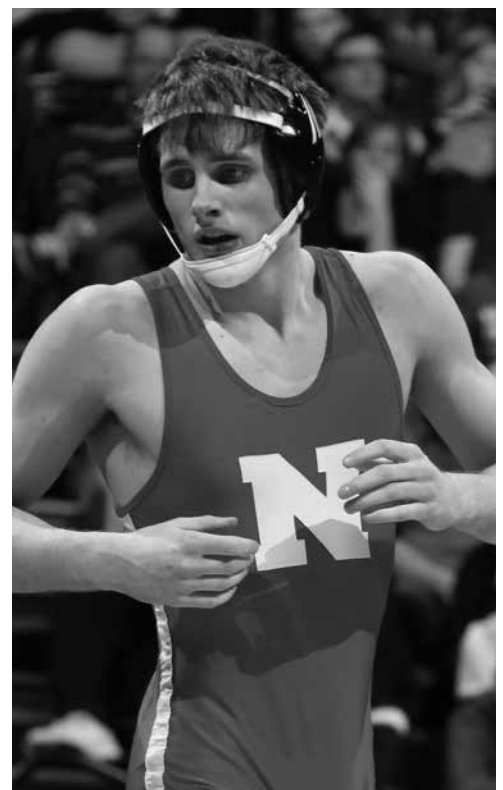

Two-year starter Austin Wilson will compete for the Huskers at 165 pounds as a junior after going 23-16 last season. The two-time NCAA qualifier finished sixth at the 2014 Big Ten Championships, and earned a pair of top-five tournament finishes.

2013-14 (Sophomore)

NCAA Championships

Making his second NCAA Championships appearance, Wilson went 1-2 at 165 pounds. In the first round, he fell by a 5-3 decision to 10th-seeded Cooper Moore of Northern Iowa to fall to the consolation bracket. Wilson responded with a 6-1 decision over Missouri's Zach Toal before being eliminated by ninth-seeded Joseph Booth of Hofstra by a 4-2 sudden victory.

Big Ten Championships

After opening with a 4-1 decision over Purdue's Pat Robinson, Wilson fell to top seed and eventual NCAA champion David Taylor of Penn State, 22-4. In the wrestleback bracket, Wilson managed a 10-2 major decision over Ohio State's Joe Grandominico before taking down No. 10 Dan Yates of Michigan, 5-1.

Wilson suffered a 4-2 loss to No. 20 Danny Zilverberg of Minnesota to move into the fifth-place match. Wilson fell by a 6-2 decision to No. 13 Jackson Morse of Illinois to take sixth place at 165 pounds.

Regular Season

Wilson finished his sophomore season with a 23-16 record and had five technical falls, which tied for the team lead. He collected two pins and three major decisions. Wilson took runner-up honors at the Reno Tournament of Champions and finished fifth at the Cliff Keen Las Vegas Invitational. Wilson started every dual for the Huskers at 165 pounds, compiling a 7-7 record.

2012-13 (Redshirt Freshman)

NCAA Championships

Wilson battled to a 3-2 mark in his first NCAA Championships appearance at 165 pounds. He fell by a 6-2 decision to Missouri's Zach Toal in the first round to fall to the wrestleback bracket. Wilson responded with three consecutive victories before losing a major decision to No. 5 seed Steven Monk of North Dakota State, 9-1. Wilson's wins came over Central Michigan's Mike Ottinger (D, 6-2), Buffalo's Mark Lewandowski (F, 2:01) and Chattanooga's Josh Condon (D, 10-7).

Big Ten Championships

Wilson suffered losses to Ohio State's Mark Martin and Indiana's Ryan LeBlanc at the Big Ten Championships. Martin won a 6-2 decision, and LeBlanc notched a 9-2 decision over Wilson.

Regular Season

Wilson went 27-14 at 165 pounds, compiling a 7-4 dual mark in the process. He pinned three opponents in 2012-13, while adding four technical falls and four major decisions. Wilson opened the season with a second-place showing at the Warren Williamson/Daktronics Open before winning three of his first four dual starts. Wilson also notched a third-place finish at the Grand View Open in January.

In the final dual at the NU Coliseum, Wilson pinned Michigan State's Nick Proctor in the final match to give the Huskers a come-from-behind 23-19 win. For his

work in the classroom, Wilson garnered a spot on the academic All-Big Ten team.

2011-12 (Redshirt)

Regular Season

Wilson went 10-3 while wrestling in three open tournaments at 165 pounds as a redshirt in 2011-12. He opened the season with four consecutive wins before losing the championship match at the Warren Williamson/Daktronics Open. He did not place at the Harold Nichols Cyclone Open, but won the Nebraska-Kearney Holiday Inn Open. He recorded one pin and three major decisions on the season.

Wilson was named to the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll for his work in the classroom during both semesters.

Before Nebraska

Wilson finished his high school career as one of the most prolific wrestlers in Nebraska high school history after amassing a state record 180 wins. He lost just three times while capturing three Class C state championships. Wilson capped his career by winning the 160-pound title as a senior, while tying his own state record for wins in a single season by going 48-0. Ranked as the No. 18 wrestler in the country at 160 pounds by InterMat, Wilson finished his career by winning his final 143 high school matches, also a Nebraska high school record. As a junior, Wilson won the 145-pound state championship with a 48-0 record, and took home the title as a sophomore at 130 pounds going 47-0. Wilson captured second place at the 2011 NHSCA Senior National Wrestling Championships at 160 pounds in Virginia Beach, Va.

Austin is majoring in biology at Nebraska and has twice earned a spot on the Academic All-Big Ten team. 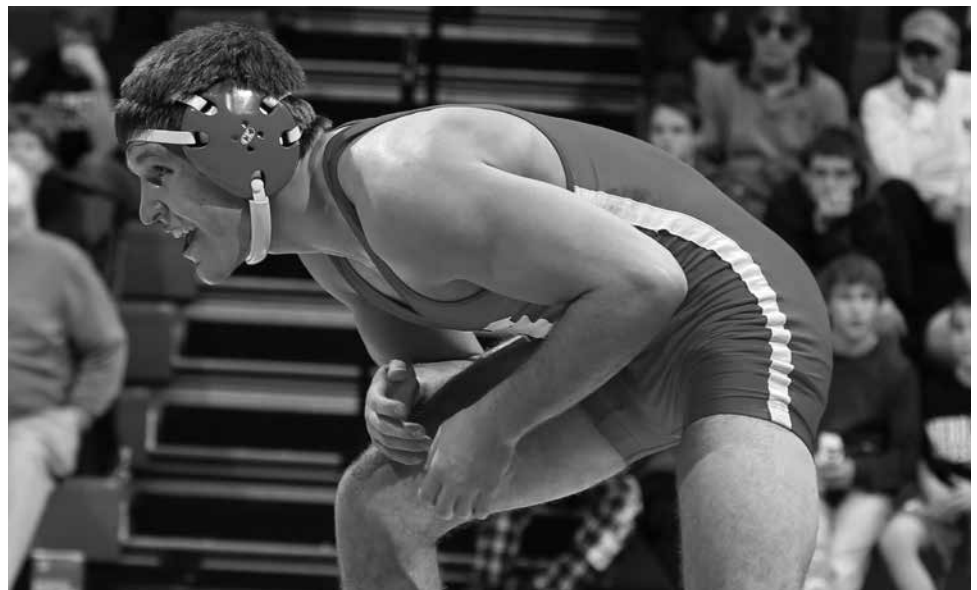

Johnson wrestled in six open tournaments at 197 pounds, compiling a 23-6 overall record. He captured titles in three of the six tournaments and placed in the top five in the other three, recording seven pins and seven major decisions in the process. Following a loss to Northern Iowa's Taylor Kettman in the second round of the UNI Open, Johnson reeled off 16 consecutive victories. He won the Quality Hotel Open, Viking-Warrior Open and York College Open in that stretch.

Year in Review

Green, Kokesh Repeat as All-Americans for Huskers in 2013-14

Juniors James Green (157) and Robert Kokesh (174) each collected All-America honors for the second consecutive season to lead Nebraska to an 11th-place finish at the 2014 NCAA Championships. The Huskers earned 43.5 points at the national tournament at Chesapeake Energy Arena in Oklahoma City, Okla.

Green picked up his third All-America accolade by taking third place at 157 pounds. He breezed through the first two rounds with major decisions before being pinned by No. 9 seed Dylan Ness of Minnesota. Green responded in the consolation bracket by reeling off four consecutive bonus-point victories. He finished the 2013-14 campaign with a 35-2 record.

Kokesh also opened his appearance with a pair of major decisions before a heartbreaker in the quarterfinals to sixth-seeded Logan Storley of Minnesota, 6-4. In the consolation bracket, Kokesh defeated Illinois' Tony Dallago, 8-2, but suffered a torn ACL in the match. Kokesh won two more matches before falling to Storley again in the third-place match by a 3-1 margin in tiebreaker 1. Kokesh earned his second All-America honor and finished the season with a 37-3 mark.

Five additional Huskers qualified for the NCAA Championships, but fell short of All-America status. Junior Jake Sueflohn went 2-2 at the tournament at 149 pounds to finish the season 31-6. He made his third NCAA Championships appearance.

Sophomore 165-pounder Austin Wilson made his second showing at the NCAA Championships, going 1-2. His consolation win over Missouri's Zach Toal was bookended by losses to top-10 seeded opponents.

A trio of redshirt freshmen qualified for the NCAA Championships: Tim Lambert (125), TJ Dudley (184) and Collin Jensen (HWT). Lambert managed a 2-2 record in his first NCAA appearance. Dudley opened with a major decision before suffering back-to-back losses. Jensen fell in both of his matches in Oklahoma City.

During the dual season, Nebraska compiled a 12-2 record, going 6-2 in the Big Ten. The Huskers were one win shy of a three-way tie for first in the conference. The two losses on the season tied the fewest by Nebraska in a season under Head Coach Mark Manning, who completed his 14th year.

The Huskers opened 2013-14 at the Warren Williamson/Daktronics Open on Nov. 3 in Brookings, S.D. Kokesh, Green and Jensen each captured titles to lead the way for Nebraska, while Lambert, Sueflohn and Anthony Abidin (141) took second place in their respective weight classes.

On Nov. 17, Nebraska competed in its first dual of the season, hosting No. 19 Northwestern at the newly renovated Bob Devaney Sports Center after years of competing at the NU Coliseum. True freshman Colton McCrystal (133) won a 7-6 overtime decision in his first appearance in the NU lineup. Five additional Huskers posted victories, including Dudley, who pinned the Wildcats' Jacob Berkowitz in 3:42. Despite losing the final two bouts of the dual, Nebraska posted a 25-16 triumph over Northwestern.

The following weekend, Manning picked up his 200th career victory in his home state when the Huskers cruised to a 36-6 win over South Dakota State in Brookings. Fellow South Dakota natives Kokesh and Jensen each earned pins for Nebraska as nine Huskers posted victories.

The Huskers swept the Stanford Duals on Nov. 30 in Stanford, Calif., defeating Utah Valley, No. 18 Stanford and Bakersfield by a combined score of 106-18. In the opening dual, the Huskers split the first four matches against Utah Valley before adding bonus points in five of the last six matches for a 36-6 victory.

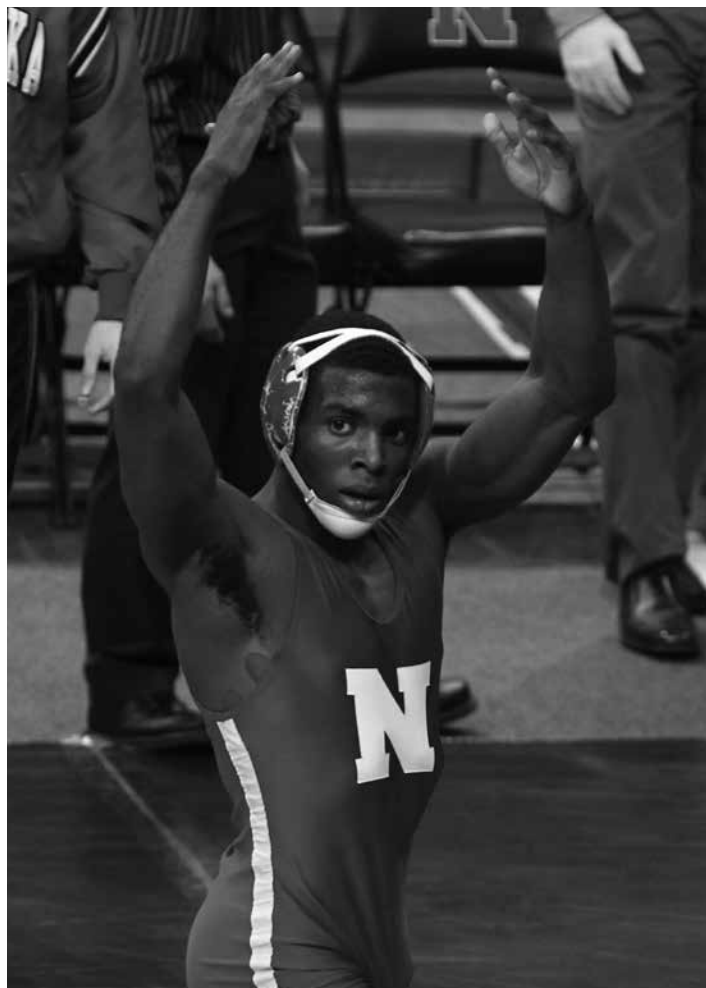
Nebraska also faced a tie after four matches against the Cardinal, but Sueflohn and Green notched major decisions and Kokesh earned a technical fall to help NU take down Stanford, 28-12. Abidin added a pin at 141 pounds. Against Bakersfield, Kokesh and Dudley's pins led the way for seven Huskers who won by bonus points in a 42-0 shutout of the Roadrunners.

After completing November with a perfect 5-0 dual record, the Huskers spent December at a pair of tournaments in Nevada. At the Cliff Keen Las Vegas Invitational, Dec. 6-7, Green won the 157-pound title to lead the Huskers to a runner-up finish. Kokesh, Abidin, Sueflohn and Dudley each advanced to the finals before ultimately falling. For Kokesh, the loss against top-ranked Andrew Howe of Oklahoma marked his first of the season after a 14-0 start.

Tim Lambert went 24-13 and qualified for the NCAA Championships during his first season in the Nebraska lineup at 125 pounds.

Kokesh came back two weeks later, along with Green and Sueflohn, to capture weight class titles at the Reno Tournament of Champions on Dec. 22. Nebraska won the tournament with 159 points. Lambert and Wilson added second-place finishes at 125 and 165 pounds, respectively.

The Huskers opened the 2014 slate by hosting four duals, the first of which came against Wyoming on Jan. 3. Nebraska trailed the Cowboys 12-9 after five matches before reeling off five consecutive wins to close out the dual with a 26-12 victory. Ranked wrestlers Sueflohn, Green, Wilson, Kokesh and Dudley earned victories during the closing run. Jensen and Colton McCrystal won in the second and fourth matches, respectively.

The following weekend, Indiana and Penn came to Lincoln, but the Huskers won both duals to improve to 8-0 on the season. McCrystal and Dudley each earned pins against the Hoosiers in a 30-10 rout on Jan. 10. Sueflohn, Green, Kokesh and Spencer Johnson (197) won decisions, while Lambert notched a forfeit victory.

On Jan. 11, Nebraska topped Penn, 30-9, in front of 2,746 fans in the first-ever "Tumble N Rumble" event, which occurred simultaneously with the women's gymnastics meet against Northern Illinois. After dropping the first match, Jensen, Lambert and Shawn Nagel (133) produced victories in the next three to build a 10-3 advantage. Sueflohn and Kokesh earned pins, while Green added a technical fall and Dudley notched a decision to finish off the Quakers.

No. 3 Iowa wrestled Nebraska on Jan. 18 in front of a school-record 3,946 fans at the Devaney Center. Despite the Hawkeyes handing the Huskers their first loss of the season, 22-9, Green stole the show with his 9-7 decision over top-ranked defending national champion Derek St. John. With his win, Green improved to 22-0 on the season and ascended to the No. 1 spot at 157 pounds in every major NCAA wrestling poll the following week. He also collected USA Wrestling Athlete of the Week and Flowrestling.com's Brute Wrestler-of-the-Week Award after the win.

Sueflohn and Kokesh also managed victories against ranked Hawkeyes in the dual. Sueflohn defeated then-No. 13 Brody Grothus, 5-2, while Kokesh notched a 7-3 decision over then-No. 6 Mike Evans.

Following its four-match home stand, Nebraska traveled to Columbus, Ohio on Jan. 24 and West Lafayette, Ind., on Jan. 26 to close out January against a pair of ranked Big Ten foes. Seven Huskers posted victories against No. 11 Ohio State en route to a 28-12 win over the Buckeyes. Lambert and Dudley each pinned ranked opponents, while Green added bonus points with a major decision.

NU's momentum continued two days later as the Huskers picked up their 10th win of the season in a 28-9 triumph over No. 21 Purdue. Eight Huskers, led by Nagel, who pinned over then-No. 14 Cashe Quiroga, managed wins against the Boilermakers. Kokesh won by major decision in the final bout of the night.

The Huskers opened February in Champaign, Ill., against 17th-ranked Illinois, and went home with a 22-13 win over the Fighting Illini. Sueflohn, Green, Kokesh and Dudley helped Nebraska build a 15-4 lead at the halfway point of the dual, as Jensen and McCrystal (141) fended off a late

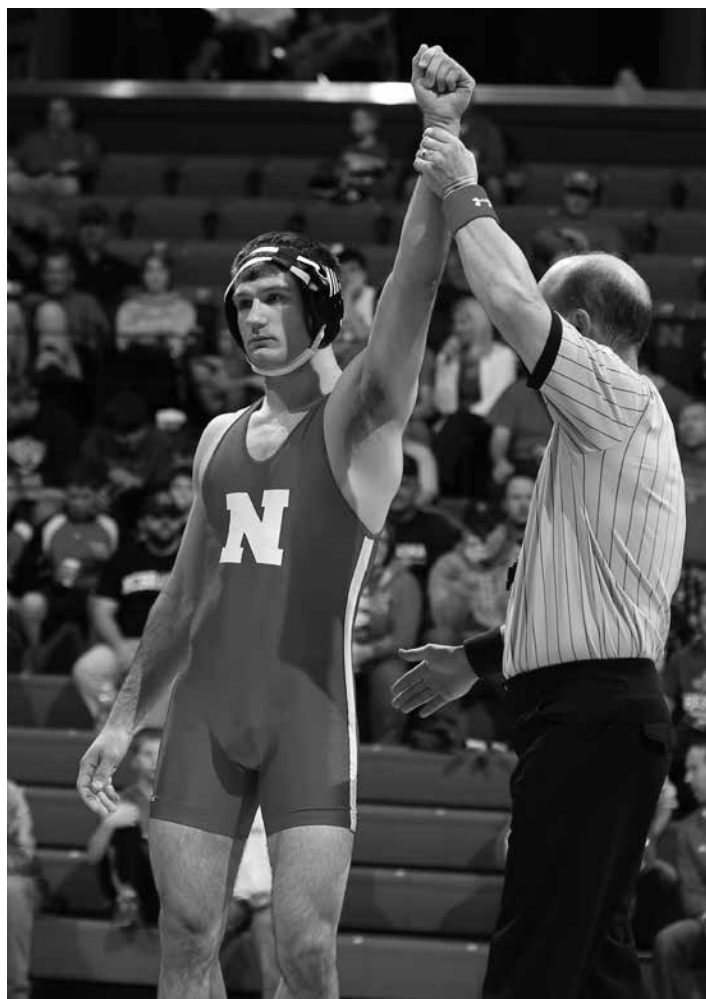
Illini rally. Caleb Kolb (197) and Lambert each battled to extra time in their respective matches before falling.

Nebraska returned home for its Feb. 7 Senior Night dual against No. 11 Michigan in front of 2,667 fans at the Devaney Center. Seniors Kolb, Nagel and Adam Joseph were honored before the match. The Huskers and Wolverines split the 10 matches, but Michigan edged NU on technical points, 56-52, to end Nebraska's chance at a share of the Big Ten regular-season title. Sueflohn, Green and Kokesh helped the Huskers cut the lead to 12-10 after NU dropped the first three bouts. Dudley managed a sudden victory over then-16 Dominic Abounader and Kolb won a 5-4 decision over Chris Heald to give Nebraska a four-point lead before falling at heavyweight.

Two weeks later, the Huskers bounced back by knocking off No. 15 Wisconsin, 22-15, in Madison, Wis., in the final dual of the season. Nagel earned a pin to lead five Huskers who posted victories against the Badgers. Sueflohn, Wilson, Kokesh and Dudley also helped propel Nebraska to victory. At 157 pounds, Green suffered his first loss of the season after a 26-0 start. Seventh-ranked Isaac Jordan won in sudden victory 2 over the top-ranked Husker.

Green responded at the Big Ten Championships, March 8-9, by taking home the title with another win over St. John in the finals. Kokesh also claimed a conference crown with his victory over Evans as the pair became the first Huskers to ever win Big Ten titles since NU joined the conference in 2011. Kokesh's victory marked the 100th of his career.

Sueflohn advanced to the finals at 149 pounds, but fell by decision to Northwestern's Jason Tsirtsis in the title match. Lambert finished fifth at 125 pounds, while Wilson took sixth at 165 pounds. The Huskers finished fifth as a team with 79 points.



Robert Kokesh garnered All-America honors for the second consecutive season at 174 pounds. He finished fourth in 2014 despite tearing his ACL during the tournament.

No. 10 Nebraska won all three of its matchups at the Stanford Duals on Saturday, Nov. 30, defeating Utah Valley, No. 18 Stanford and Bakersfield.

In the opening dual, the Huskers split the first four matches against Utah Valley before adding bonus points in five of the last six matches for a 36-6 victory.

The dual started at heavyweight, where Collin Jensen fell by sudden victory, 7-5, to Adam Fager. No. 15 Tim Lambert (125) came back to tie the score with his 11-5 decision over Bracken Nipko. At 133 pounds, Ben Morgan lost a 16-13 decision before Anthony Abidin notched a 12-7 decision at 141 pounds.

Junior 157-pounder James Green upset top-ranked Derek St. John, but No. 8 Nebraska suffered its first loss of the season in a 22-9 setback to No. 3 Iowa in front of 3,946 fans on Saturday, Jan. 18, at the Devaney Center.

Green's victory came in the fifth match of the night after 149-pounder Jake

Suefloh earned the first victory for Nebraska in the previous bout. Green, the No. 3 wrestler in InterMat's rankings, earned a takedown against St. John in the first period to take an early 2-0 lead against the defending national champion.

In the second period, St. John escaped to cut the lead to 2-1 before another takedown by Green made the score 4-1. In the third period, Green managed two more takedowns to notch a 9-7 victory over St. John. Green, a two-time All-American, improved to 22-0 on the season, while St. John suffered his first loss of the 2013-14 campaign after a 20-0 start.

Suefloh, the No. 5 wrestler in InterMat's poll, took down No. 13 Brody Grothus by a 5-2 decision in the third match of the night to cut Iowa's lead to 10-3. Suefloh earned two takedowns against the Hawkeye and improved to 22-3 on the season with an 8-1 mark in duals.

No. 4 Robert Kokesh (174) earned Nebraska's third win of the evening with a 7-3 decision over No. 6 Mike Evans. Kokesh, a junior All-American, notched three takedowns in the bout and moved to 24-1 on the year, with a 9-0 dual record.

The Huskers suffered losses in the first three matches of the dual, as No. 9 Tim Lambert (125) and Colton McCrystal (141) fell by decision and Shawn Nagel (133) lost by major decision.

Lambert battled No. 3 Thomas Gilman to a scoreless first period, before Gilman earned a second-period escape. Lambert chose down to start the third period and earned an escape, but Gilman earned a point for riding time and managed a 2-1 victory over the Husker redshirt freshman.

Nagel fell to No. 3 Tony Ramos, 15-4, and McCrystal dropped a 9-2 decision to No. 13 Josh Dziewa.

Following Green's victory at 157 pounds, Nebraska trailed Iowa 10-6 at the halfway point. At 165 pounds, Austin Wilson fell to No. 4 Nick Moore, 8-2. After Kokesh cut Iowa's lead to 13-9, the Hawkeyes won narrow matches in each of the final three bouts.

No. 11 TJ Dudley (184) suffered his first dual loss of the season in a 6-4 sudden victory at the hands of Sammy Brooks. Caleb Kolb (197) earned a third-period escape against No. 16 Nathan Burak in the subsequent match, but the Hawkeye managed a 3-1 victory. At heavyweight, Collin Jensen lost to No. 3 Bobby Telford, 2-0.

Suefloh battled No. 18 Ian Paddock to a 4-4 tie after two periods before the Husker junior exploded in the third period for a 9-4 triumph. Suefloh started the period in the down position and earned a reversal before adding nearfall points and tacking on a riding time point.

At 157 pounds, Green used seven takedowns in his 16-4 major decision over Randy Languis.

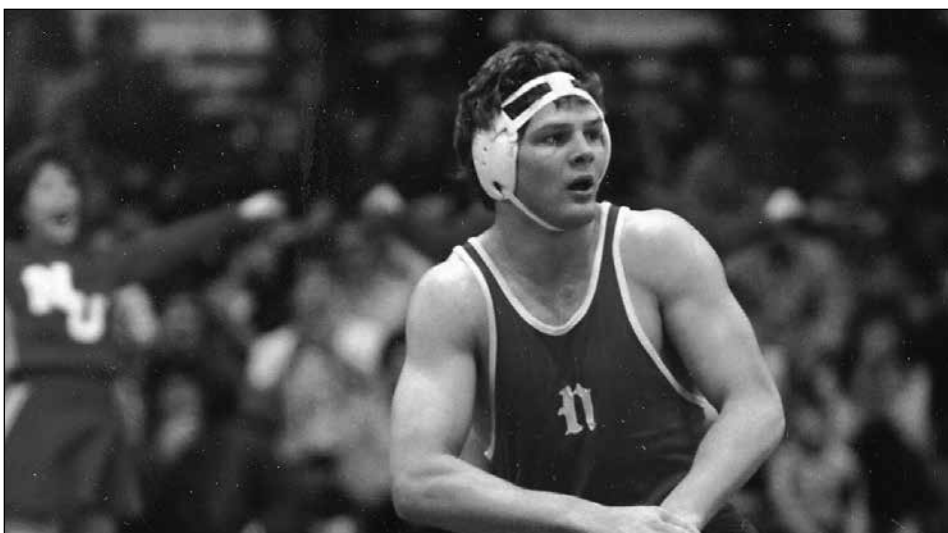

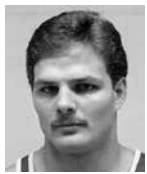


Bryan Snyder was Nebraska's first four-time All-American from 1999 to 2002. Snyder sits atop Nebraska's all-time winning percentage list (.925).

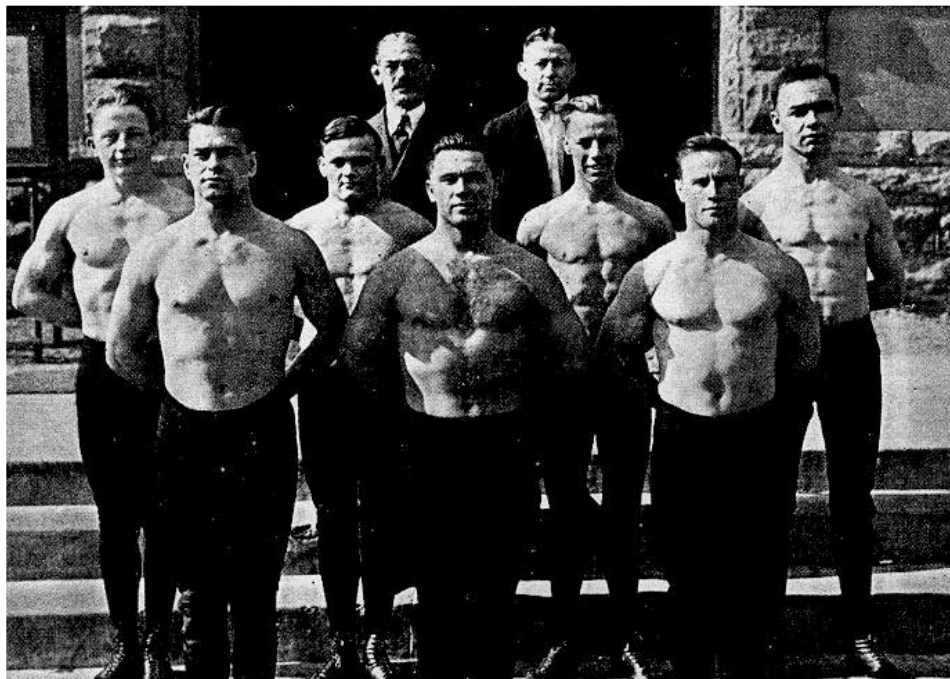

The mission of the University of Nebraska Athletic Department is to serve our student-athletes, coaches, staff and fans by:

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln does not discriminate based on gender, age, disability, race, color, religion, marital status, veteran's status, national or ethnic origin or sexual orientation.

Facility Use Restrictions

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln has an interest in protecting its facilities, property and reputation associated with its intercollegiate sports. Therefore, no person shall be permitted to access or use the arenas, facilities and other University of Nebraska intercollegiate athletic venues without first securing the permission of the Athletic Director or his/her designee. The only exception is an individual who records an image (e.g. photograph, videotape) for his/her non-commercial use. In no case shall any person be permitted to use these venues for the purposes of promoting the sale or manufacture of alcohol or tobacco or the promotion of any venture associated directly or indirectly with legal or illegal gaming or gambling.

Compliance Guidelines

The University of Nebraska Athletic Department takes great pride in abiding by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and the Big Ten Conference rules and guidelines that govern Division I competition. For the benefit of the many alumni, fans and booster club members who are so active in supporting and assisting the Huskers throughout the year, we would like to remind everyone of a few definitions and rules that apply to all athletic representatives and boosters.

NCAA Principles Institutional Control

It is the responsibility of the University of Nebraska to control its intercollegiate athletic program in compliance with the rules and regulations of the NCAA and the Big Ten Conference.

Responsibility

The University of Nebraska's responsibility for the conduct of its program includes responsibility for the actions of its staff members and for the actions of any other individual, booster or organization engaged in activities promoting the athletic interests of the institution.

Compliance

The University of Nebraska must monitor its program to assure compliance and to identify and report to the NCAA instances in which compliance has not been achieved. An institution found to have violated NCAA rules is subject to disciplinary and corrective actions as determined by the NCAA.

Question and Answers for Fans, Boosters, Alumni and Representatives of Athletic Interests

Definitions

Q: What is a booster?

A: Someone who belongs to a University of Nebraska athletic booster club; promotes or makes financial donations to the athletic department or a specific Husker team; assists in the recruitment of prospective student-athletes; employs, gives benefits to, or provides services to a student-athlete, a prospective student-athlete or the relative/friends of either. REPRESENTATIVE OF ATHLETIC INTERESTS (I.E., BOOSTERS), NCAA BYLAW 13

Q: What is a Prospective Student-Athlete?

A: A prospective student-athlete is a student who has started classes for the ninth grade or above, including students in prep schools and junior colleges as well as students who have officially withdrawn from a four-year institution and plan to transfer to another institution. In addition, a student who has not started classes for the ninth grade becomes a prospective student-athlete if the institution or a Nebraska booster provides the individual or the individual's relatives or friends with any financial assistance or benefits that the institution does not provide to prospective students in general. A good rule of thumb is to treat ALL STUDENTS as prospects.

Q: What is a Student-Athlete?

A: A student-athlete is a student whose enrollment was solicited by a member of the Nebraska athletic staff or other representative of athletic interests with a view toward the student's ultimate participation in the intercollegiate athletic program. A student begins status as a student-athlete with enrollment in the summer prior to the initial date of full-time enrollment or the first semester of full-time enrollment, whichever is earlier.

Q: What is a contact?

A: Contact is ANY face-to-face encounter between a prospect, or the prospect's parent or legal guardian, and a Nebraska staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs.

Q: What is recruiting?

A: Recruiting is any solicitation of a prospect or a prospect's family member (or guardian) by an institutional staff member or by an athletic representative of the institution, for the purpose of securing the prospect's enrollment and ultimate participation in Nebraska's intercollegiate athletic program.

Guidelines

Q: What constitutes impermissible contact by a Booster?

A: Phone calls to prospects (9th to 12th grade) and their relatives placed for recruiting purposes (questions about the athletic program at UNL must be directed to the coach); writing, paging, text messages or instant messages to

a prospect to encourage UNL attendance; contact with a prospect at a high school or club contest; contact with a prospect via any form of social media (e.g. Twitter, Facebook); contact with a prospect or his/her coach, principal, or counselor to evaluate the prospect; visiting the prospect's educational institution to pick up videotape or transcripts for evaluation purposes; contacting a prospect to congratulate him/her for signing a National Letter of Intent to attend UNL; giving anything of value to a prospect to induce him/her to attend UNL; contact of any kind while the prospect is on the UNL campus for an official or unofficial visit. RECRUITING CONTACTS, NCAA BYLAW 13

Q: What are the rules of employment for a student-athlete?

A: A student-athlete may be employed during the academic year or summer vacation period; receive compensation equal to the going rate for similar services in the locale; receive compensation only for work performed; receive benefits provided to all other employees; teach sport-related individual skill instruction or fee-for-lesson sessions. A student-athlete may not conduct personal sport camps or promote, market, advertise or endorse a commercial business or product.

Only benefits that are authorized by NCAA legislation shall be provided to and accepted by a student-athlete. It is not permissible for a student-athlete to receive a benefit that is the result of a "special" arrangement by an institutional employee, booster, employer or fan. EMPLOYMENT, NCAA BYLAW 12

Q: What are non-permissible benefits?

A: Free or reduced-fee housing/rent including the use of vacation or seasonal homes; free or reduced-fee meals; loans or cash advances in pay or salary; tuition costs or school supply expenses; gifts or presents of any type regardless of the occasion or purpose; use of telephone for long distance or use of telephone cards and cell phones; free use of any motor vehicle, boat or recreational vehicle; free use of services (i.e., automobile repair, hair care, laundry, copying, faxing, etc.); free or reduced-fee memberships at golf courses, health clubs, etc. (This list is not exhaustive. Only benefits that are authorized by NCAA legislation shall be provided to and accepted by a student-athlete. It is not permissible for a student-athlete to receive a benefit that is the result of a "special" arrangement by an institutional employee, booster, employer or fan.) BENEFITS AND PREFERENTIAL TREATMENT, NCAA BYLAW 16

Q: What type of promotional activities may the student-athlete be permitted to participate?

A: Charitable, educational or non-profit promotions and events with requested approval from the Athletic Compliance Office prior to the event.

Q: What types of promotional activities are not permissible?

A: Any fundraising activity that supports a high school organization or group that assists prospective-aged students; use of his/her name or picture; or appear to promote or market a commercial business or product. PROMOTIONAL ACTIVITIES, NCAA BYLAW 12

Big Ten Conference

Only the Big Ten's fifth commissioner since its founding in 1896, James E. Delany enters his 26th year with the conference. He has led the Big Ten through significant periods of growth that have helped the conference maintain its preeminent position as one of the nation's leaders in providing quality academic and athletic experiences for young men and women.

The Big Ten has grown to 14 member institutions during Delany's tenure, including the additions of Penn State in June 1991, Nebraska in July 2011 and Maryland and Rutgers in July 2014. With the conference's footprint now stretching from the Colorado border to the Atlantic Ocean and more than five million alumni across the country, Delany has focused on strengthening traditional relationships while building a presence in a new region.

In October 2013, the Big Ten moved to a new headquarters and meeting center in Rosemont, Ill. In April 2014, the conference announced it would open a second office in New York City and secured satellite office space in Washington, D.C. Throughout the summer of 2014, the Big Ten unveiled future basketball tournament sites in Chicago and Indianapolis, along with an East Coast destination in Washington, D.C. In May, the Big Ten Baseball Tournament set attendance records in Omaha, Neb., while the inaugural Big Ten Hockey Tournament was held in Saint Paul, Minn., in March and will be played in Detroit, Mich., next year. In addition, the Big Ten will take part in the largest and most diverse postseason football lineup in conference history beginning in 2014-15, with 12 different bowl partners spread across the country.

Under Delany's guidance, the Big Ten has been a national leader in broad-based programming, student-athlete welfare, gender equity and innovation. The Big Ten administers nearly \$200 million in direct financial aid to almost 9,500 student-athletes for more than 11,000 participation opportunities on 350 teams in 42 different sports. The Big Ten debuted men's ice hockey last year, and men's and women's lacrosse begins competition during the 2014-15 academic year, with Johns Hopkins University joining as the conference's first sport affiliate member for men's lacrosse in July 2014. The Big Ten now sponsors 28 official sports, more than every conference but the Ivy League.

Under Delany, the Big Ten has been a champion for Title IX. The conference was the first to voluntarily adopt participation goals for female student-athletes as the Big Ten initiated the Gender Equity Action Plan in 1992. The Big Ten leads all conferences with more than 4,300 female student-athletes and features nearly 500 televised or streamed women's athletic events. Big Ten women's teams have claimed more than 110 NCAA titles.

The Big Ten also developed the first collegiate football version of instant replay, which was implemented during the 2004 season. The conference has applied numerous initiatives under Delany's leadership, including Sportsmanship Awards beginning in 2003 and Postgraduate Scholarships starting with the 2012-13 academic year. In the summer of 2012, the Big Ten announced a partnership with the Ivy League to study the effects of head injuries in sports.

The Big Ten has seen unprecedented levels of national television coverage during Delany's tenure, highlighted by the creation of the Big Ten Network (BTN). Launched in August 2007 as a joint-venture with FOX, BTN was the first national conference-owned television network. Delany has also negotiated media agreements with ABC, CBS Sports, ESPN and NBC Sports Network, while FOX serves as the official broadcast partner of the 2011-16 Big Ten Football Championship Games. Through these agreements, more than 1,200 events are produced and distributed annually.

Delany has seen teams from 25 different sports win national championships, with seven claiming national titles during the 2013-14 academic year. The top 10 single-season football attendance records have been established in his tenure, while men's basketball has led the country in attendance for the last 38 seasons through the 2013-14 campaign. Each year more than 10 million patrons attend Big Ten home contests, as the conference leads the nation in attendance for hockey, volleyball and wrestling in addition to men's basketball. The Big Ten has also added tournaments for men's and women's basketball, men's ice hockey and men's and women's lacrosse, as well as challenge series with various conferences.

Delany and the Big Ten have been active in the community, creating the school outreach program SCORE (Success Comes Out of Reading Everyday).

For the last 25 years, the conference has partnered with Chicago elementary schools to improve reading performance. The Big Ten has also established numerous community programs surrounding its men's and women's basketball tournaments and football championship game.

The 66-year old Delany is a native of South Orange, N.J. He received his undergraduate degree in political science from the University of North Carolina in 1970 and juris doctorate degree from the University of North Carolina School of Law in 1973. At UNC, Delany was a three-year member of the varsity basketball team, serving as tri-captain in 1970 and twice participating in NCAA Final Four competition. In September 2012, Delany received the UNC Distinguished Alumni Award.

After earning his law degree, Delany served as counsel for the North Carolina Senate Judiciary Committee from 1973 to 1974, and was staff attorney for the North Carolina Justice Department from 1974 to 1975.

Delany's distinguished career in administering intercollegiate athletics began at the NCAA where he was employed as an enforcement representative from 1975-79. For the next decade, he served as commissioner of the Ohio Valley Conference.

Media Services

Hendricks Training Complex

The Nebraska wrestling program will practice at the Hendricks Training Complex, which is connected to the Devaney Center. To reach the facility from Lincoln Municipal Airport, turn right on Northwest 12th Street as you drive out of the airport. Northwest 12th Street becomes Cornhusker Highway, which intersects with 14th Street. Exit south on 14th Street off Cornhusker Highway. Travel to Court Street, turn left, and go two blocks east to the arena, which is on the north side of Court Street. From Omaha's Eppley Airfield, follow the signs to downtown Omaha and I-480. Take I-480 west to I-80, then take I-80 west approximately 60 miles to I-180. Exit South on I-180, then exit east to Cornhusker Highway and follow the instructions above.

Bob Devaney Sports Center

All but one of Nebraska's home matches in 2014-15 will be contested at the Devaney Center. To get to the Devaney Center from Lincoln Municipal Airport, exit the airport on W. Adams Street, the main road leading out to Cornhusker Highway. Follow W. Adams Street to the first stoplight and turn right on Cornhusker Highway. Follow Cornhusker Highway and take a right on 14th Street. Proceed on 14th Street and take a left on West Entrance Road to enter the state fairgrounds and Devaney Center. To get to the Devaney Center from Omaha's Eppley Airport, exit the airport to the stoplight and turn right onto Abbott Drive. Go approximately one mile to Storz Expressway (Abbott Drive turns into Storz Expressway). Proceed approximately three miles to I-480 South. Follow the signs onto I-80 West to Lincoln. Follow I-80 for approximately 60 miles and take the 27th Street Exit. Follow 27th Street south to Cornhusker Highway and turn right. Follow Cornhusker Highway and take a right onto 14th Street. Proceed on 14th Street and take a left on West Entrance Road.
