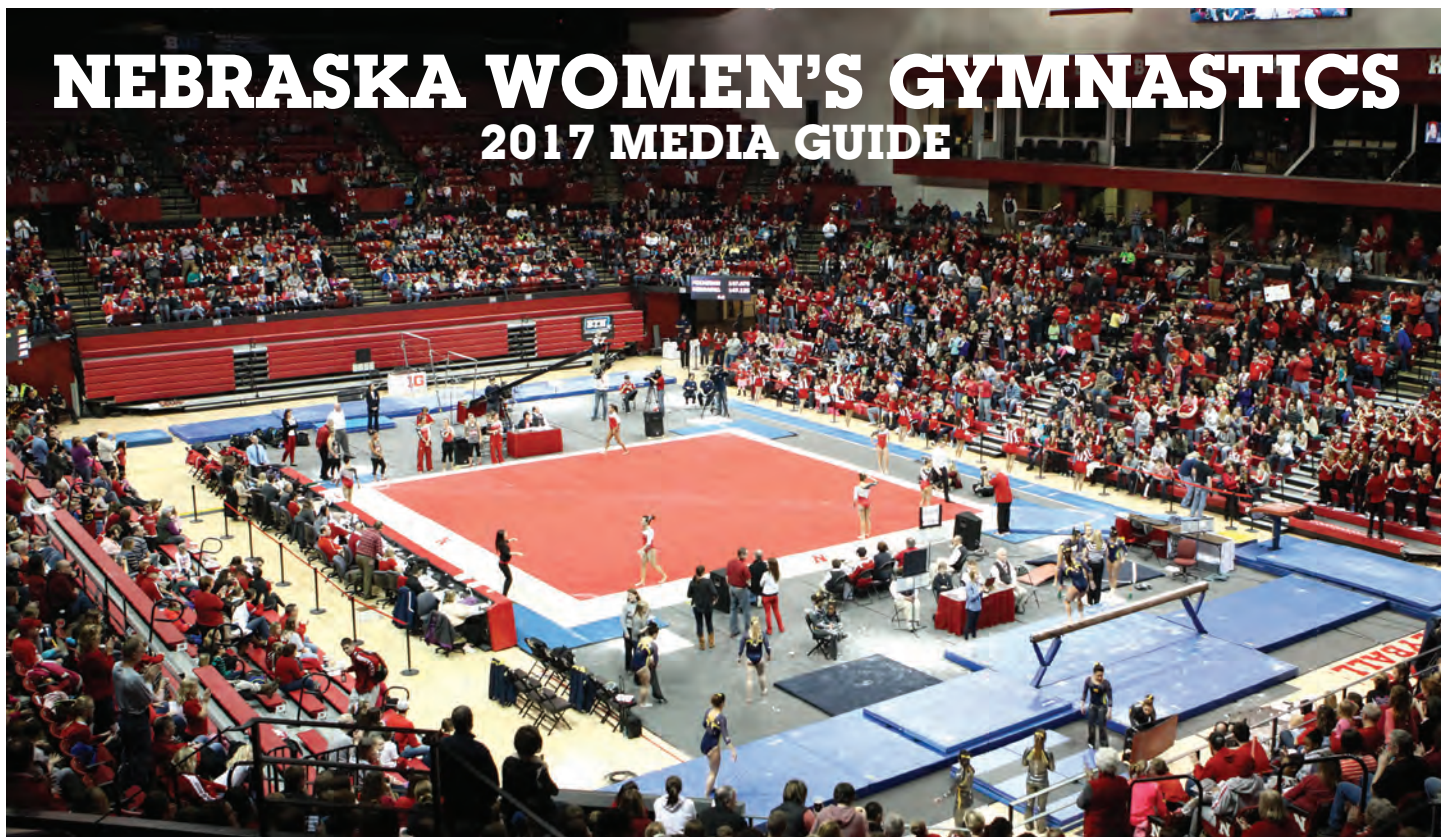

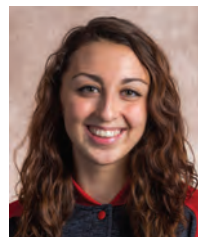

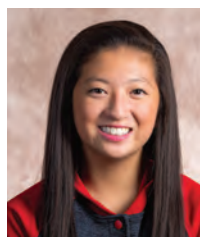

THE BIG TEN CONFERENCE

Known as one of intercollegiate sports' most successful undertakings, the Big Ten is home to a lineage of legendary names and an ongoing tradition of developing strong leaders. Even in its infancy, the conference established itself as the preeminent collection of institutions in the nation, where the pursuit of academic excellence prevailed as the definitive goal.

The history of the Big Ten traces back 120 years to the Palmer House hotel in Chicago, where on January 11, 1895, then-Purdue president James H. Smart and leaders from the University of Chicago, University of Illinois, University of Michigan, University of Minnesota, Northwestern University and University of Wisconsin set out to organize and develop principles for the regulation of intercollegiate athletics.

At that meeting, a blueprint for the administration of college athletics under the direction of appointed faculty representatives was outlined. The presidents' first known action "restricted eligibility for athletics to bonafide, full-time students who were not delinquent in their studies." That important legislation, along with other legislation that would follow in the coming years, served as the primary building block for intercollegiate athletics.

On February 8, 1896, one faculty member from each of those seven universities met at the same Palmer House and officially established the mechanics of the conference, which was officially incorporated as the "Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association" in 1905.

Indiana University and the State University of Iowa became the eighth and ninth members in 1899. In 1908, Michigan briefly withdrew its membership, and in 1912 Ohio State University joined the conference, bringing its membership total back to nine. Upon Michigan's return in 1917, the conference was first referred to as the "Big Ten" by media members, and that name was eventually incorporated in 1897.

As the 1900s opened, faculty representatives established rules for intercollegiate athletics that were novel for the time. As early as 1904, the faculty approved legislation that required eligible athletes to meet entrance requirements and to have completed a full year's work, along with having one year of residence.

In 1901, the first Big Ten Championship event was staged when the outdoor track and field championships were held at the University of Chicago. The debut event marked what is now a staple of conference competition. Today, the Big Ten sponsors 28 official sports, 14 for men and 14 for women, including the addition of men's ice hockey and men's and women's lacrosse the last two years. Big Ten schools compete in a total of 42 different sports, furthering the conference's commitment to broad-based programming and providing more participation opportunities than any conference in the country.

One of the conference's proudest traditions began in 1902 when Michigan took on Stanford in the Rose Bowl, the nation's first bowl game. Big Ten teams only appeared in Pasadena twice before the conference signed an exclusive contract with the Tournament of Roses in 1946, making it the first bowl game with permanent conference affiliations. But Michigan's appearance in 1902 cultivated a relationship that has endured for more than a century.

Coupling the academic goals set forth by the leaders of the charter members of the conference and their steadfast commitment to athletics, the conference instituted the Big Ten Medal of Honor in 1915. It is awarded annually by each conference institution to a student of the graduating class who has attained the greatest proficiency in scholarship and athletics. It is the most prestigious honor a student competing in Big Ten athletics can receive.

In 1922, Major John L. Griffith became the conference's first "Commissioner of Athletics." Griffith was the first of five men to assume the role of commissioner in the conference's history, followed by Kenneth L. "Tug" Wilson in 1945, Bill Reed in 1961, Wayne Duke in 1971 and current commissioner James E. Delany in 1989.

After nearly 30 years with 10 members, the conference consolidated to nine schools when the University of Chicago formally withdrew its membership in 1946. Michigan State College (now Michigan State) was added to the Big Ten three years later, bringing the number of affiliated conference schools to 10 once again.

In 1955, the Big Ten formulated a revenue-sharing model designed to pool all football television rights of its members and share those proceeds equally. The conference and its members continue to utilize a revenue-sharing model, dividing media rights, bowl payouts and other profits among all conference institutions.

While academics have always played an integral role in the conference, presidents of the Big Ten member institutions formalized the primacy of academics with the establishment of the Committee on Institutional Cooperation (CIC) in 1958. The CIC was formed as an academic consortium of all Big Ten universities and founding conference member Chicago. In 2013, the 15 schools currently constituting the CIC produced over \$10 billion in funded research, \$4 billion more than any other conference.

In one of Duke's first actions as commissioner, he oversaw the adoption of the Big Ten Advisory Commission in 1972, designed to study conference programs and make suggestions which would further Big Ten objectives. The Advisory Commission enlists former students that competed in Big Ten athletics to serve as liaisons to the NCAA's Diversity and Inclusion Department, the Big Ten Student-Athlete Advisory

Commission and other organizations.

In 1981, the conference presidents and chancellors endorsed a proposal that enabled universities to affiliate their women's intercollegiate programs with the conference, and the first conference championships for women were staged that fall. The Big Ten was the first conference to voluntarily adopt male and female participation goals after launching its Gender Equity Action Plan in 1992.

In December of 1989, the conference agreed in principle to invite Pennsylvania State University for membership. On June 4, 1990, the Council of Presidents officially voted to integrate Penn State into the conference, giving the Big Ten 11 members.

In 2004, the Big Ten implemented a pilot program of instant replay for college football. Following the season, the conference forwarded replay proposals to the NCAA regarding the future use of instant replay, where it approved country-wide testing in 2005. In 2006, the NCAA approved the use of instant replay for all conferences.

In 2006, Commissioner Delany announced the creation of the first conference-owned television network, a 20-year agreement with Fox Networks to create what would become the Big Ten Network (BTN). Launched on Aug. 30, 2007, BTN now produces more than 1,000 events across all platforms each year. BTN is in more than 60 million homes in the U.S. and Canada via the nation's major cable, satellite and telco providers and more than 300 additional cable operators across the country. BTN2Go is the digital extension of BTN, delivering live and on-demand programming to computers, smartphones and tablets and also is accessible outside the U.S., Canada and the Caribbean via BTN2Go International.

On June 11, 2010, the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors (COP/C) approved a formal membership application by the University of Nebraska, expanding the conference to 12 institutions. Nebraska officially joined the Big Ten Conference on July 1, 2011.

The conference expanded its footprint further in 2012 when the COP/C approved formal membership applications from the University of Maryland and Rutgers University on November 19 and 20, respectively. Maryland and Rutgers became official Big Ten members on July 1, 2014, giving the conference almost 9,500 students participating in intercollegiate athletics and more than 11,000 participation opportunities on 350 teams.

In the fall of 2013, the Big Ten opened a new conference headquarters and meeting center in Rosemont, Ill. The newly constructed building is located 10 minutes from O'Hare Airport and has been designed to fully service the needs of more than 350 meetings annually for Big Ten and CIC related committees and coaches groups. The new headquarters also features an interactive digital museum - the Big Ten Experience - which opened to the public on June 7, 2014, and brings the conference's storied academic and athletic history to life. In June 2014, the Big Ten opened a second office in New York City, featuring both office and meeting space in Midtown Manhattan. Three Big Ten staff members are based in the New York City office to provide expanded coverage and service, while other conference and institutional administrators utilize the space as necessary when conducting business on the East Coast. The Big Ten and its member institutions also have access to satellite office space in Washington, D.C.

Delany and his staff work to meet the educational needs of students competing in intercollegiate athletics to allow them to excel in all areas of their lives. The conference office manages 28 different championships and tournaments, offers legislative and compliance services, oversees the production and distribution of nearly 1,400 events annually, provides staff services to coaching and administrative personnel and services media and fans interest for information on the Big Ten Conference.

More than 120 years after its inception, the Big Ten remains a national leader in intercollegiate athletics on and off the field. Big Ten programs have combined to win more than 450 team and 1,800 individual national championships, consistently taking home individual honors for athletic and academic accomplishments and fulfilling the Big Ten's mission of academic achievement and athletic success.

MEDIA PARKING

Parking for the media is located next to and across the street from the Bob Devaney Sports Center in a portion of Lot 52. Enter on 14th Street and follow to the west side of Devaney Center.

DEVANEY CENTER DIRECTIONS

The Bob Devaney Sports Center is located on the west edge of Nebraska's Innovation Campus. To reach it from the Lincoln Municipal Airport, turn right on Northwest 12th Street as you drive out of the airport. Northwest 12th Street becomes Cornhusker Highway, which intersects with 14th Street. Exit south on 14th Street off Cornhusker Highway. Travel to Military Avenue and turn left. Continue a half mile and enter Innovation Campus. Take the first right turn before the Devaney Center and follow the access road to Lot 4 on the South Side of the arena. From Omaha's Eppley Airfield, follow the signs to downtown Omaha and I-480. Take I-480 West to I-80, then take I-80 West approximately 60 miles to I-180. Exit South on I-180, then exit East to Cornhusker Highway and follow the instructions above.

POST-MEET INTERVIEWS

Nebraska gymnasts and coaches are generally available on the gym floor immediately following the presentation of team and individual event awards.

NEBRASKA

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2017 SEASON PREVIEW

The Nebraska women's gymnastics team returns to action in 2017 looking to return to the NCAA Super Six for the first time since 2014. The Cornhuskers return 10 letterwinners from last year's team that finished eighth overall, and complement the deep group of upperclassmen with five talented newcomers.

NU must replace six-time All-American Hollie Blanske, but three All-Big Ten performers return in 2017.

"I think our outlook is kind of the same as it is year in and year out: to take things one meet at a time," Nebraska Coach Dan Kendig said. "I think we've just got to focus on each and every practice, each and every week, and try to do things to maximize our ability and worry about what we need to do. I believe that, obviously, unless outside circumstances occur, injuries or who knows what, we'll be where we need to be at the end of the year."

The Huskers schedule features the always-tough Big Ten slate in addition to a non-conference visit to defending NCAA champion Oklahoma. The Huskers will host four meets at the Devaney Center this season, including the NCAA Lincoln Regional on April 1.

TALENTED NEWCOMERS COMPLEMENT STRONG GROUP OF RETURNERS

The Big Red roster features a good mix of upperclassmen and fresh faces in 2017. Two seniors and three juniors will look to provide leadership and experience to the team this season, while three sophomores will try to take the next step. Three redshirt freshmen and four true freshmen will look to break into the lineups for the first time in hopes of helping Nebraska back to the NCAA Championships this season.

Seniors Jennie Laeng and Ashley Lambert plan to provide leadership to the Huskers in 2017 in addition to their prominent roles in multiple lineups. One of Nebraska's most consistent performers as a junior, Laeng earned second-team All-Big Ten honors after winning 12 individual event titles in 2016. A second-team All-American on floor in 2015, Lambert battled injuries as a junior, but still managed to post career highs on bars and beam last season. Lambert is a strong vaulter who became the first Husker to hit perfect 10s on the same event in back-to-back weeks when she scored a pair of 10s on vault in 2015.

Three talented juniors will also be featured in Nebraska's lineups, with each possessing all-around experience. Grace Williams earned first-team All-Big Ten honors in 2016, earning 13 individual event titles, including Big Ten and NCAA Regional co-championships on beam. Williams performed in the all-around in 11 of 13 meets last season, posting career highs on three events and in the all-around. She figures to anchor Nebraska's beam lineups in 2017. Danielle Breen came on strong as an all-arounder in the second half of 2016, earning six individual event titles including a pair of all-around crowns. She was named second-team All-Big Ten for her efforts, which included a second-place finish in the all-around at the Big Ten Championships. Breen posted career highs on all four events and in the all-around as a sophomore.

Abbie Epperson joins the Huskers in 2017 as a

transfer from Maryland, where she was a two-time NCAA Regional qualifier. She will be eligible to compete as a junior this season, and figures to be featured in multiple lineups. Epperson has strong Husker ties, as both of her parents were Husker gymnasts, and her brother, Austin, is a senior on the Nebraska men's gymnastics team.

Three Huskers return as sophomores, looking to take the next step in 2017. Sienna Crouse put forth strong performances as the season went along, earning Big Ten all-championship team honors for her performance on bars at the conference meet. She also tied for third on floor at the NCAA Iowa City Regional, helping Nebraska earn a berth in the NCAA Championships. Crouse is a strong candidate on vault, bars and floor in 2017 and could see action as an all-arounder. Catelyn Orel was the lone freshman to compete on all four events and in the all-around in 2016, and picked up her first event title as a Husker in the process. Orel could see action on all four events and in the all-around again as a sophomore. Megan Schwehofer competed on vault and beam in every meet as a freshman, and looks to reach new heights in 2017. Schwehofer won three individual event titles last season, and posted the top vault score for Nebraska at the NCAA Regional. She figures to fit into both lineups as a sophomore, and will be looked upon to be an all-around contributor as well.

Three Huskers redshirted last season and look to break into the lineups in 2017. Kelli Chung was sidelined by an elbow injury in 2016, but is healthy and could contribute on multiple events as a redshirt freshman. Two others, Megan Kuo and Kami Shows, saw exhibition action last season. Kuo earned a pair of midseason exhibition spots on beam, and is in strong consideration for multiple lineups in 2017. Shows performed in exhibition twice on bars and once on beam last season, and is in the running to fit into those lineups as a redshirt freshman.

Four freshmen will join the Nebraska program this season hoping to contribute to an NCAA

Championship run in 2017. Sierra Hassel joins the Huskers from Johnston, Iowa, and could break into multiple lineups as a freshman. Taylor Houchin, from Republic, Mo., comes to Nebraska following an impressive club career in which she won the all-around title at the J.O. National Championships in 2016. She is in the running to see action on all four events as a freshman and has all-around potential for this season and beyond. Alexa Clark is a freshman from Golden, Colo., and will look to provide strong depth on each event this season. Laura Oh, from Shoreview, Minn., will also look to add depth to the Husker lineups in 2017.

Head coach Dan Kendig returns for his 24th season at the helm of the program, looking to lead his team back to the NCAA Championships for a 19th time. He will be joined by associate head coach Heather Brink, the 2000 NCAA all-around and vault champion, who is in her second year in her current role and sixth as a member of the Nebraska staff. Assistant coach Dan Miller also returns for his sixth year at Nebraska. Kendig oversees the bars squad, while Miller is in charge of vault and floor and Brink coaches the beam lineup.

SCHEDULE HIGHLIGHTED BY NCAA REGIONAL

NU's schedule is highlighted by four home events, including the NCAA Lincoln Regional in early April. The Huskers open the season on Jan. 15, hosting Big Ten rival Penn State. The meet is a part of the Tumble N Rumble, as the Nebraska wrestling team will welcome Michigan to the Devaney Center.

The Huskers will then hit the road to face Rutgers on Jan. 21 in a quadrangular meet with Brown and West Chester. The following week, NU will face defending Big Ten champion Michigan at the Crisler Center in Ann Arbor, Mich. The Huskers knocked off the third-ranked Wolverines by a score of 196.775-196.550 in a dual meet last season at the Devaney Center.

In early February, the Huskers will travel to Norman, Okla., to take on former Big Eight rival

and defending national champion Oklahoma. Denver and Texas Woman's University also will compete at the quadrangular meet, which takes place Feb. 3.

That same weekend, the Huskers will return home to face Big Ten foe Iowa on Feb. 5.

The Huskers will travel to Minnesota on Feb. 11 to take on the defending Big Ten regular-season champion Golden Gophers. The following week, NU will head to St. Charles, Mo., for a quad meet with Lindenwood, Brown and Seattle Pacific, scheduled for Feb. 17.

The 27th-annual Masters Classic will take place on Feb. 25, as the Huskers welcome California, Southeast Missouri and Utah State. The Golden Bears finished seventh nationally last season, while the Huskers took down Utah State in a quad meet in 2016. NU has not faced Southeast Missouri since 1997. It will also be the final home meet of the season, as Nebraska will honor seniors Laeng and Lambert for their contributions to the program as part of its Senior Night celebration.

NU will travel to Champaign, Ill., on March 11 for the B1G Five qualifier, as the Huskers will battle with Illinois, Maryland, Michigan State and Ohio State for seeding in the next week's Big Ten Championships. The 2017 Big Ten Championships are set for March 18 in New Brunswick, N.J.

NCAA Regional competition is set for April 1. Lincoln is one of six campus sites that will host an NCAA Regional in 2017. NU last hosted a regional in the 2005 season. The top three teams from each regional will qualify for the NCAA Championships, which take place April 14-15 in St. Louis.

NEBRASKA LOOKS TO VAULT TO NEW HEIGHTS IN 2017

The Huskers return most of their talented vault lineup from last season, but must find a way to replace Blanske's strong and consistent scores on

the event. Laeng and Lambert should be mainstays in the vault lineup this season, with Laeng posting four vault titles last season and Lambert owning a pair of 10s on the event in her career. Breen and Williams will also be in the vault lineup this season. Breen didn't vault in competition until the Masters Classic last February, but proceeded to win the event and post solid scores the rest of the way. Schwehofer figures to slot into the vault lineup as well, but the final spot is up for grabs. Orel gained valuable experience on vault last season, while Chung or one of the other talented freshmen could be featured in the lineup in 2017. Blanske won first-team All-America honors and the Big Ten championship on vault in 2016, but the Huskers should field a strong vault lineup once again.

"The optimistic thing for us going into this season is, we simply have more bodies and more depth on vault this season," Miller said. "This summer, the girls have put forth a great effort, so as they say, 'so far so good,' and we'll see how that carries through. Right now, simply having more bodies and an attitude of wanting to improve and willing to upgrade their tumbling and their vaulting is pretty exciting for me as a coach."

NU'S BARS SQUAD WILL BE SOLID AGAIN

Uneven bars will again be a strong area for the Huskers, with multiple veterans on the event returning in 2017. Laeng should lead the way on bars, as she is healthy from an injury she suffered on the event at the NCAA Championships last season. She was the co-champion on bars at the 2015 Big Ten Championships. Breen, Crouse, Lambert and Orel are strong contenders for the bars lineups in 2017, as each scored above 9.85 last season. Orel posted the Huskers' top bars score at the NCAA Championships. Williams has the potential to be among Nebraska's best

bar workers, but her recovery from offseason shoulder surgery could keep her out of the bar lineups in 2017. Williams was in the bar lineups in every meet in 2016. The Huskers must look to replace the consistency of Blanske and Madison McConkey, but Epperson, Schwehofer and Shows could slot into the bars lineups at different points this season. Hassel and Houchin also bring strong bars experience from their club careers.

"We lost two bar workers to graduation, but having said that, I believe there's more depth on bars right now than we've had in a while," Kendig said. "I think at the end of the day, we'll have six pretty good bar workers. Even with some of the injuries we've had, I still feel like our depth is pretty good on bars."

HUSKERS HOPE TO DAZZLE ON BEAM THIS SEASON

The Huskers were one of the top beam squads in the country last season, and the potential is there for NU to have another strong beam lineup in 2017. The Huskers must replace the solid routines that Blanske and McConkey gave throughout their careers, but Williams and Breen should pick up the slack, with each scoring above 9.90 in 2016. Williams earned eight individual event titles on beam a season ago, while Breen picked up three beam titles of her own. Laeng, Orel and Schwehofer figure to fit into the beam lineups this season, and Lambert and Epperson bring experience in the event. Kuo and Shows both provided exhibition routines on beam last season, and the quartet of freshmen should provide valuable depth on the event this season.

"Beam has been consistently probably the event with the most depth on it on a yearly basis," Brink said. "We lost Maddie and Hollie, and having that maturity and experience is going to be something that we have to look to fill. How that develops this season is going to be how the ball gets rolling this year, and hopefully we start out on a strong foot and beam can be the event that can help make a difference."

HUSKERS LOOK TO FINISH STRONG ON FLOOR

The Huskers' floor lineup is packed with potential heading into the 2017 season. Gone is Blanske, who won two All-America awards on floor in her career, but seven Huskers who provided floor routines return in 2016 and multiple newcomers could contribute as well. Lambert was an All-American on floor in 2015, but injuries hampered her success in 2016. She looks to bring a powerful routine to the lineup this season. Williams and Laeng each earned event titles on floor last season, while Breen, Orel, Schwehofer and Crouse return experience on the event. Epperson is also a strong contender on the event, as are each of the four freshmen.

"It will be nice having Ashley back in the lineup her senior year," Miller said. "She's very explosive, very powerful on floor. She's got a great routine, gets the crowd energized, so if we can keep her healthy, I think that's going to be a great asset. We lost Hollie, but the team is working hard and I think the transition is going to be good. Hopefully we'll have a great floor crew this year."

GUIDE TO WOMEN'S GYMNASTICS

Six gymnasts from each team compete on each of the four events. The team score is obtained by adding the five highest scores on each event. Common deductions are landing deductions. One tenth is taken away for each step that the gymnast takes, while half a tenth is taken for a small hop, and two tenths are deducted for a large hop, step or jump. Other deductions include bent arms, legs, toes or leg separation. Falls that occur are deducted five tenths each time. Finally, a gymnast can receive a neutral deduction on balance beam and floor exercise. Neutral deductions are one tenth and are received for being over time on beam and floor and for stepping out of bounds on the floor exercise. They occur each time a gymnast violates these rules. Each event, with the exception of vault, has a series of four (bars), five (beam) and four (floor) special requirements (SRs), and omission of any of these requirements results in a two tenths deduction from the start value.

START VALUES

Start value for college: 9.5, extra .5 earned through bonus

- All judges determine start value
- It is not mandatory that the start values agree

BONUS

Special Connections

- Achieved through unique and difficult combinations
- Special connections have a value of 0.10 or 0.20.
- Bonus points for special connections will be awarded only for good technical presentation

Additional "D/E"

- A maximum of 0.40 may be awarded as bonus points for additional "D/E"
- Additional "D" elements will receive 0.10 bonus points
- Additional "E" elements will receive 0.20 bonus points

VAULT

Vault requires speed, quickness and explosive power. Unlike the other events, each vault has its own start value. Deductions are taken from the start value for technical errors in the pre-flight (approach), the block (the rise from the horse), the post-flight (height and distance from the horse) and the landing. Each gymnast will perform only one vault, but has a maximum of three attempts to go over the vault table one time.

Special Requirements

- Must touch the vault table with both hands
- Must land on feet first

UNEVEN BARS

A bars routine must contain at least two bar changes for the first two SRs. A bar change is when the gymnast moves from the high bar to the low bar or vice versa. It must also contain two release moves. A release move is defined as when the gymnast lets go of the bar with both hands and flips or twists and regrips either bar. Uneven bar routines must contain change of direction that is at least 180 degrees or more for the fourth SR. The final SR is a dismount. A bar routine must contain at least 10 skills.

Special Requirements

- At least two bar changes
- Two flight elements (minimum of two different "C" elements or a "D" and "B")
- One element with LA (longitudinal axis) turn, minimum of "C"
- A "C" dismount

BALANCE BEAM

A gymnast works to move on the beam like they would when performing on the floor. The beam is 16 feet long, four feet high and four inches wide. Performing on the beam requires precise movement and intense concentration. A beam routine cannot be more than 90 seconds. The first SR a beam routine must contain is a tumbling series. It must also contain a dance series of two leaps and/or jumps, one of which must have a value of "C" or higher. The gymnast must complete a turn of at least 360 degrees for the third SR. The fourth SR is a leap with large amplitude, which may be part of the dance series or on its own. Finally, the gymnast must dismount the beam as the final SR.

Special Requirements

- One acro series with a minimum of two flight elements (both must start and finish on the beam; one element must be a "C" with or without hand support)
- One dance series of two or more elements (one element at least "C" or higher)
- Minimum of 360 degree turn – no hand support permitted
- One leap, jump or hop requiring a 180 degree split (front or side)
- "C" dismount or "B" dismount preceded by and directly connected to any "C" element (acro/dance)

FLOOR EXERCISE

Floor exercise is a combination of dance and tumbling to music on a 12 meter by 12 meter space. The duration of a floor routine should be between 70 and 90 seconds. A floor routine must contain at least two tumbling passes (first SR), one of which contains two saltos (second SR). It must also contain three different saltos within the two tumbling passes (third SR). The final SR is that the routine contains a dismount commensurate with the rest of the routine.

Special Requirements

- One tumbling series with two saltos, same or different
- Three different saltos within the exercise
- Dance series with a minimum of two elements (one "C" element or higher)
- "C" dismount or "B" dismount preceded by and directly connected to any "C" element (acro/dance)

Nebraska gymnastics has built a reputation as one of the nation's elite programs. The Huskers are one of only seven teams to qualify for the Super Six Finals at least 10 times in the last 23 seasons.

The Huskers have won 14 conference titles in the past 23 years, while advancing to the NCAA Championships 18 times during that span. Overall, NU has won 23 conference titles and qualified for 24 NCAA Championships.

But winning titles is just a small part of Nebraska's all-around success. Husker gymnasts have captured 15 CoSIDA Academic All-America honors and have won the most prestigious academic honors the NCAA has to offer - including the NCAA Today's Top Ten Award and the AAI Award.

Husker gymnasts are also outstanding citizens who regularly volunteer their time to give back to the community and prepare for success in life after sports.

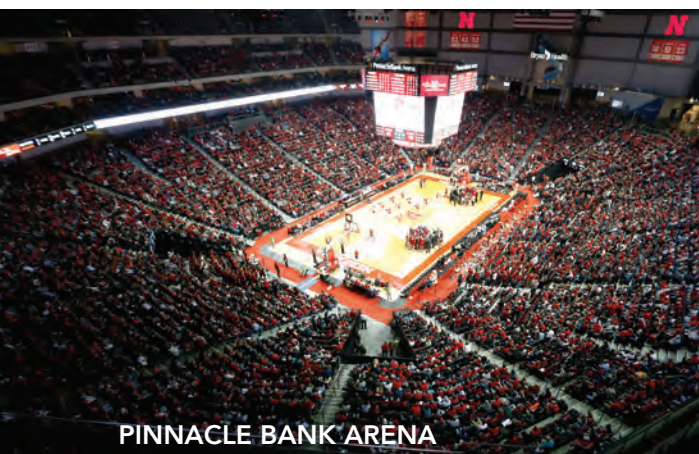

The Nebraska volleyball team captured its fourth NCAA title with a win over Texas in the championship match at the CenturyLink Center in Omaha on Dec. 19, 2015. Five Husker volleyball players, including NCAA Tournament Most Outstanding Player Mikaela Foecke, earned All-America honors in 2015. Volleyball's championship was the first of seven top-10 NCAA team finishes for Husker programs in 2015-16.



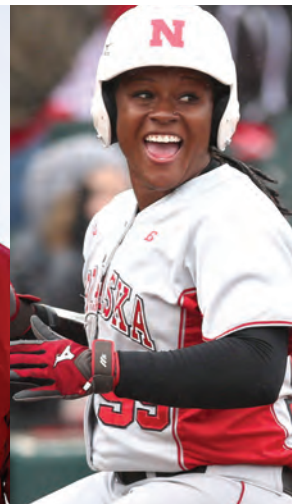

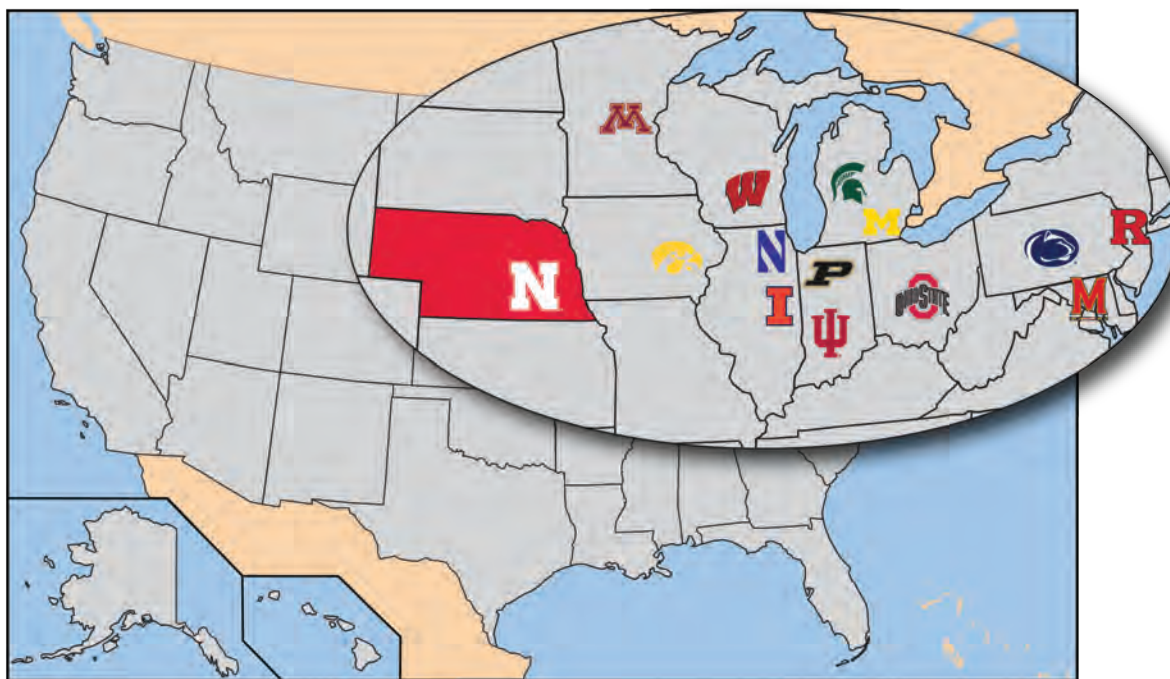

BIG TEN EXPANDS NATIONAL EXPOSURE



On July 1, 2011, the University of Nebraska became an official member of the Big Ten Conference, increasing the Big Ten's membership to 12 institutions for the first time in conference history. The addition of Nebraska marked the Big Ten's first expansion since Penn State joined the conference in June of 1990. The nation's oldest conference continued to grow with the addition of Maryland and Rutgers in the summer of 2014. The Big Ten Conference is a union of 14 world-class academic institutions – who share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. The conference's 100-plus years of history, strong tradition of competitive intercollegiate athletic programs, vast and passionate alumni base, and consistent leadership in innovations position the Big Ten and its entire community firmly on the Big Stage.

The Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness in all aspects of its student-athletes' lives, with the ultimate goal of ensuring that each individual has the opportunity to live a Big Life.

Big Ten Conference Highlights

- Big Ten universities provide approximately \$200 million in direct financial aid to nearly 9,500 student-athletes on 350 teams across 42 sports.
- The Big Ten sponsors 28 official conference sports, 14 for men 14 for women, including the debut of lacrosse in 2015.
- Big Ten programs have combined to win more than 450 team and 1,800 individual national championships
- Big Ten leads all conferences in Academic All-Americans with over 1,600, including more than 45 in 2015-16
- Nearly 1,550 Big Ten student-athletes and coaches have participated in the Olympics, winning at least 500 medals, including nearly 270 gold.
- The Big Ten leads all conferences with more than 5.7 million living alumni and 520,000 students.



Big Ten Women's Gymnastics Facts

- Nebraska won back-to-back Big Ten titles in 2012 and 2013. In its first season of conference competition in 2012, the Huskers snapped Michigan's streak of five straight Big Ten women's gymnastics crowns. Nebraska became just the third school since 1991 to win a Big Ten women's gymnastics team title, joining Michigan (19) and Minnesota (3).
- In 2016, Nebraska finished second in the Big Ten before qualifying to NCAA Regionals in Iowa City, Iowa and the NCAA Championships in Fort Worth, Texas.
- In 2012, Nebraska's Dan Kendig was named the Big Ten Coach of the Year in the Huskers' inaugural conference season, while Jessie DeZiel captured Big Ten Freshman-of-the-Year honors. In 2013, Emily Wong won her second straight Big Ten all-around title, before being named Big Ten Gymnast of the Year in 2014.
- In its sixth season in the Big Ten, Nebraska will be one of 10 conference schools competing in women's gymnastics, including Illinois, Iowa, Maryland, Michigan, Michigan State, Minnesota, Ohio State, Penn State and Rutgers.
- Michigan leads the league all-time (dating back to 1982) with 22 team crowns, while Minnesota (5), Ohio State (5), Nebraska (2) and Illinois (1) have also claimed top honors. Iowa, Maryland, Michigan State, Rutgers and Penn State have never won Big Ten women's gymnastics titles.
- At least one Big Ten Conference team has finished among the top 10 teams at the NCAA Championships for 22 consecutive seasons (since 1992). Michigan owns 20 top-10 NCAA finishes over the past 21 years, including a Big Ten-best tie for second in 1995. Penn State has added six top-10 showings over the past 25 years, including a fourth-place finish in 1992. Nebraska took eighth at the NCAA Championships in 2016.
- Nebraska leads the Big Ten with 24 all-time NCAA Championship appearances. Michigan (23), Penn State (8), Ohio State (7), Illinois (5), Iowa (3), Michigan State (2) and Minnesota (2), have also represented the Big Ten at the NCAA Championships.

BIG TEN NETWORK



The Big Ten Network brings unprecedented coverage to women's athletics across the conference, including Nebraska women's gymnastics. The Chicago-based network is also bringing increased national exposure to Nebraska student-athletes, like Grace Williams (pictured above), across all sports.

Big Ten Network



Headquartered in Chicago, the Big Ten Network is the first internationally distributed television network dedicated to covering one of America's premier collegiate conferences.

With more than 400 live sports events, and virtually all of them in high definition, the Big Ten Network is the ultimate destination for Big Ten

fans and alumni across the country. The network is on the air 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

The network is available to an estimated 60 million households. The network is carried by all major cable, satellite and telecommunications providers and BTN2Go is also available on smartphones, tablets and the internet.

Big Ten Network Facts

- The Big Ten's media agreements with BTN, ABC/ESPN, CBS, FOX and NBC Sports Network provide the conference with more than 1,200 events that are produced and distributed nationally on an annual basis.
- In 2006, the Big Ten created the first national conference-owned television network devoted to the athletic and academic programs of a single conference. The Big Ten Network launched on Aug. 30, 2007, and became the first new network in cable or satellite television history to reach 30 million homes in its first 30 days.
- Since the current media agreements began in 2007-08, every home football and men's basketball game has been produced while women's basketball has received more coverage than any other conference.
- The Big Ten's new media agreements have resulted in the broadcast of nearly 1,200 events nationally and regionally on an annual basis, compared to 300 events in the final year of the previous agreements.

ATHLETIC MEDICINE



ATHLETIC MEDICINE

Providing expert care to more than 600 Husker student-athletes, Nebraska features one of the most well-trained and highly skilled athletic medicine staffs in the country. Under the guidance of Director of Athletic Medicine Dr. Lonnie Albers, Head Athletic Trainer and Physical Therapist Jerry Weber, the 2016-17 Nebraska athletic medicine staff consists of five doctors, 14 full-time athletic trainers, seven graduate assistant athletic trainers, two full-time in-house athletic psychologists and sports psychiatry consultants who work directly with student-athletes.

Nebraska's medical facilities have long been among the nation's best, and NU's athletic medicine center within the Tom and Nancy Osborne Athletic Complex will keep the Huskers on the front line of technology for decades to come. In addition to Nebraska's North Stadium facility, Haymarket Park, the Bob Devaney Sports Center, Pinnacle Bank Arena and the Nebraska Soccer and Tennis Complex all feature athletic medicine areas. The Devaney Center's Athletic Medicine facility underwent an extensive expansion as part of the Hendricks Training Complex addition in 2011.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

Nebraska increased its nation-leading total of CoSIDA Academic All-America awards to 325, adding five Huskers in 2015-16. Senior guard Shavon Shields (Olathe, Kan., Biological Sciences) earned his second consecutive first-team Academic All-America award in men's basketball before being named Nebraska's Male Student-Athlete of the Year. Shields (pictured right with Director of Athletics Shawn Eichorst) was also a member of the Allstate NABC Good Works Team for his outstanding community service. He was joined by Nebraska Female Student-Athlete-of-the-Year Mattie Fowler (Tucson, Ariz., Finance) as a first-team Academic All-American in 2015-16. Fowler (pictured below) was the President of the Nebraska Student-Athlete Advisory Board in 2014-15. She and Shields were Nebraska's Big Ten Medal of Honor winners in 2015-16.

The Nebraska men's track and field team continued its extraordinary run of CoSIDA Academic All-America success with three-time first-team honoree Levi Gipson (Lincoln, Neb., Nutrition, Exercise and Health Science) and fellow first-team award winner Cody Rush (Grand Island, Neb., Nutrition Science). Rush, who earned second-team CoSIDA Academic All-America accolades in 2014, joined baseball outfielder Ryan Boldt (Red Wing, Minn., Nutrition Science) as a two-time honoree. Boldt also earned third-team recognition in 2015.

Graduation is the ultimate achievement, and 109 Husker student-athletes earned undergraduate and graduate degrees in three commencement exercises at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2015-16.



A total of 109 Nebraska student-athletes earned their degrees in 2015-16, including 62 in May 2016, 39 in December 2015 and eight in August 2015. Jessie DeZiel (above left) earned her bachelor's degree as a nutrition, exercise and health science major from Nebraska in May of 2016. A nine-time All-American, DeZiel was Nebraska's Female Student-Athlete of the Year in 2015. Desiré Stephens (above right) earned her degree from Nebraska in December of 2015 after majoring in advertising and public relations. The Omaha, Neb., native was a Big Ten Distinguished Scholar and a Nebraska Heart & Soul Award winner as one of the most committed Huskers across all sports to community service.

HONORING ACHIEVEMENT



Eight Huskers earned Outstanding Scholar Awards in 2015-16. The seniors with 3.900 GPAs or better were Melanie Blum (Track and Field), Michaela Cunningham (Swimming and Diving), Levi Gipson (Track and Field), Lane Hovey (Football), Ryan Irick (Men's Gymnastics), Katie Kraeutner (Soccer, pictured above), Ethan Lottman (Men's Gymnastics) and Cody Rush (Track and Field).



Nebraska student-athletes regularly earn prestigious postgraduate scholarships from the Big Ten and NCAA. That tradition continued in 2015-16, as two-time CoSIDA Academic All-American Cody Rush earned a \$10,000 Wayne Duke Postgraduate Scholarship from the Big Ten before claiming an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship worth \$7,500. Rush was also an 11-time All-American on the track.



In 2015-16, 109 Huskers earned their college degrees including senior track and field standout Levi Gipson. Gipson became just the second three-time first-team CoSIDA Academic All-American across all sports at Nebraska, while adding prestigious NCAA and Big Ten Postgraduate scholarships worth a total of \$15,000. Gipson was also a seven-time All-American.



Junior outfielder Ryan Boldt earned his second CoSIDA Academic All-America award in 2016, after helping the Nebraska baseball team to the NCAA Tournament. Boldt, who was a member of the Golden Spikes Award Midseason Watch List, was a second-round pick of the Tampa Bay Rays in the 2016 Major League Baseball Draft.

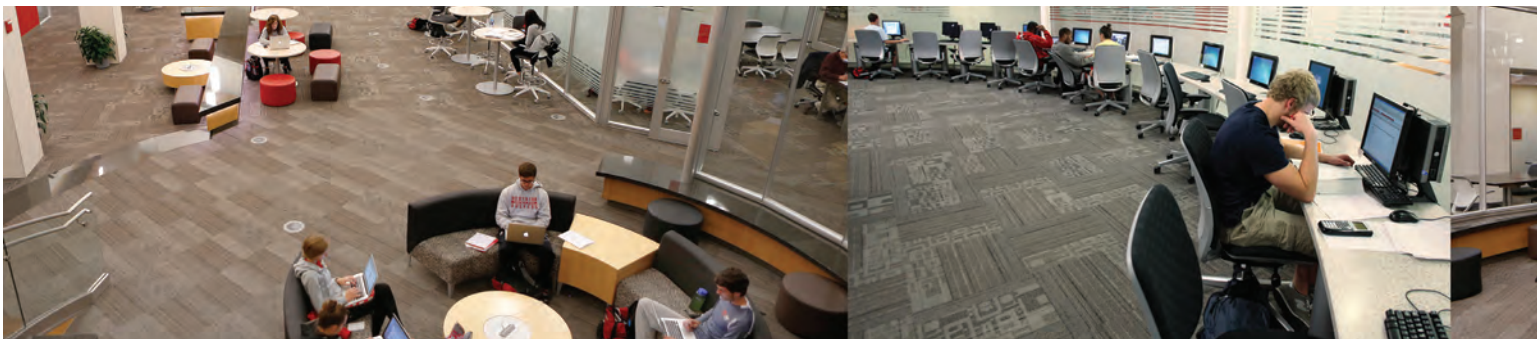

The athletic academic unit, located in the Dick and Peg Herman Family Student Life Complex, provides personal and academic support to ensure that student-athletes will get the most out of their years as Huskers. Featuring one of the most innovative and comprehensive academic support systems in the country, Nebraska is dedicated to helping its student-athletes become outstanding leaders in their chosen fields. The academic support team is composed of 14 full-time staff members and is certified by the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletics (N4A).

ACADEMIC COUNSELING

Seven academic counselors, three learning specialists and two assistant academic counselors are in place to monitor daily academic progress, receive consistent course feedback, assist with the advising/registration process and monitor continuing eligibility and progress toward graduation.

TUTORIAL SUPPORT

A tremendous resource for all academic abilities, unlimited tutorial support from approximately 120 tutors on staff is available from day one up to college graduation in all subject areas. The tutorial program is certified as a model tutoring program by the College Reading and Learning Association.

STUDY HALL

Nebraska's study hall program is housed in the D.J. Sokol Enrichment Center within the Student Life Complex. Student-athletes attend a supervised, flex-time study hall that features day, evening and weekend hours. Student-athletes are required to complete a specific number of study hours each week as determined by their academic counselor and/or coach. Additional performance-based or tutor-based study hall also may be determined by the academic counselor.

MENTORING

Academic support staff serve as mentors to all incoming student-athletes and a select group of returning student-athletes. Student-athletes meet with their mentor weekly to develop time management skills, gather and report academic progress information, and discuss academic success strategies.

EDUCATIONAL ASSESSMENTS

Assessments are administered upon the request of the student-athlete, academic counselor, or coach. Learning specialists are available to administer and score informal assessments, which include a reading comprehension and a writing assessment. When more in-depth assessments are necessary, referrals are made to a consulting psychologist who conducts the assessments. If it is determined a student-athlete has a learning disability or another medical condition that impedes the student from reaching their academic potential, appropriate accommodations are implemented by the Office of Services for Students with Disabilities.

STUDENT-ATHLETE ORIENTATION

Each new student-athlete attends an orientation at the beginning of their academic career. Student-athletes are introduced to staff, faculty, administrators, and a variety of resources that help facilitate the transition into college while enhancing awareness of support services in the Athletic Department and across campus.

PERSONAL COUNSELING

Student-athletes will find a supportive and caring environment at Nebraska. Transitional issues, stress management, time management, academic focus and problem resolution are all addressed in a proactive manner throughout the year. If necessary, counseling referrals are also made to designated practitioners.

COMPUTER RESOURCES

The Herman Student Life Complex has two computer labs for student-athletes. The Scott Technology Center features two tech tables for use on group computer projects and group study sessions. Additionally, each student-athlete is provided a laptop for use throughout their academic career at Nebraska.

STUDENT-ATHLETE LIFE

In May of 2016, 20 Husker student-athletes, a Nebraska letterwinner alum and four staff members participated in a service trip abroad to the Dominican Republic. The Huskers spent time with members of the community of Las Pajas to create a local sports court and create a mural at a community center.



In August of 2014, the NCAA Division I Board of Directors restructured the way member institutions and conferences, including the Big Ten, govern themselves. Nebraska has a great history and tradition of providing unmatched benefits and support to student-athletes. However, this change in governance, and subsequent legislation, paved the way for Nebraska to enhance the benefits and experiences for student-athletes. A few examples of these enhanced benefits are:

- All scholarship student-athletes across all sports have their scholarship calculated based on the full cost of attendance.
- Each student-athlete is offered an Apple MacBook Air laptop computer to enhance their learning opportunities.
- Nebraska has increased resources and support in all academic and performance related areas including but not limited to Academic Services, Life Skills, Athletic Medicine, Athletic Training, Strength and Conditioning, Nebraska Athletic Performance Laboratory, Nutrition and Dining Services (Training Table) and Sports Analytics.
- Nebraska created the first-known Post-Eligibility Opportunity (PEO) program, where every student-athlete graduate who has exhausted their athletic eligibility has the opportunity to pursue (with Nebraska support) an internship, participate in a study abroad program or attend graduate school.



HUSKERS FOR LIFE

Nebraska Associate Head Coach Heather Brink was inducted into the Nebraska Athletics Hall of Fame in 2016. A two-time NCAA Champion, Brink earned 11 All-America honors as a Husker and was the recipient of the 2000 Honda Award as the nation's top female collegiate gymnast.

EXPERIENCE THE WORLD

SERVICE TO A MUCH LARGER COMMUNITY

The Nebraska Life Skills program offered its second service trip abroad in 2016, taking 20 student-athletes to the Dominican Republic to help the community of Las Pajas. Student-athletes from across Nebraska's 24 varsity sports participated in the memorable trip.



SUCCESS IN COMPETITION, CLASSROOM, COMMUNITY

The Nebraska women's gymnastics team is committed to succeeding in the gym, in the classroom and in the community. The Huskers were honored for athletic, academic and community achievement at the Big Ten Championships Banquet, held at Nebraska's Memorial Stadium prior to the Big Ten Championships at the Bob Devaney Sports Center in March.

NEBRASKA LIFE SKILLS

Regarded as the premier and most comprehensive Life Skills program in college athletics, the Husker program is committed to providing proactive education, resources and support throughout college and beyond, promoting total person development and preparation for life after sports. Five full-time staff members coordinate a wide array of services benefiting Husker student-athletes.

PROACTIVE EDUCATION

The Life Skills team organizes several orientations aimed at acclimating student-athletes to college life. Additionally, all incoming student-athletes attend the fall semester Husker Life Seminar. This interactive class promotes responsible decision-making, personal brand, financial literacy, leadership, involvement and service.

INDIVIDUAL MEETINGS

Every Nebraska student-athlete is assigned a Life Skills Coordinator who arranges individual meetings during the academic year to enhance personal and career development. The meetings help student-athletes identify a career focus and implement a plan to increase career marketability.

CAREER COMMITMENT

Annually, Nebraska Life Skills organizes a Student-Athlete Career, Networking Night and other career events aimed at connecting Huskers with companies desiring competitive, hard-working, accountable candidates. Athlete Network and Husker Hire Link provide opportunities to explore career opportunities across the country.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Nebraska student-athletes readily accept the role-model challenge, giving more than 2,500 hours annually to impact 25,000 across Nebraska. Outreach events include hospital visits, mentoring, school assemblies, statewide rallies (including the Sportsmanship 4 Life Pep Rally, Make-A-Wish, NFL Play 60 and Husker Heroes).

LEADERSHIP

Nebraska Life Skills provides student-athletes with opportunities to enhance leadership skills while distinguishing themselves from the competition. Student-athletes can participate in the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, Uplifting Athletes or Husker Distinction Council. UNL offers more than 600 recognized student organizations allowing athletes to collaborate with campus leaders for common goals. Nebraska Life Skills funds and coordinates an annual one-week service abroad trip that allows 20 student-athletes to work toward a common goal while enriching cultural competencies.

RECOGNITION

In 2015-16, a record 347 Husker student-athletes were named to the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team for completing a minimum of six service projects in the calendar year. A host of other recognition opportunities at the institutional, Big Ten and NCAA levels that all reflect the high ideals, character and servant leadership nurtured through community involvement also are available.

POST-ELIGIBILITY OPPORTUNITIES

Effective December 2015 and beyond, student-athletes who letter and graduate have a three-year window to benefit from one of three post-eligibility opportunities (\$7,500 each). Upon completion of required seminars, graduates can either study abroad, complete an internship or begin graduate school within the University of Nebraska system.

DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION

The Life Skills program is responsible for all Diversity and Inclusion initiatives for Husker Athletics. The first Diversity and Inclusion Summit occurred in January of 2016 and reached all student-athletes and staff with a message of acceptance and unity.

WELCOME TO LINCOLN

One of the nation's largest 75 cities, Lincoln features many of the benefits of an urban setting and is only minutes away from the scenic beauty and wide open spaces of America's Heartland. The third-largest city in the Big Ten, Lincoln enables Nebraska student-athletes to enjoy the benefits of city life while residing in a community which is widely regarded as one of the top places to live in the United States.

Jennie Laeng returns to Nebraska looking to cap her career by leading the Huskers back to the NCAA Championships in 2017. A strong all-around performer as a junior, Laeng will look to provide leadership and experience to the young Huskers as one of two seniors on the team in addition to her role as an all-arounder.

2016 (JUNIOR)

Following a strong sophomore campaign, Laeng pushed through to compete as an all-around performer in her junior season. She was a consistent contributor on vault and was

able to provide strong scores on uneven bars, balance beam and floor exercise for the Big Red in 2016, earning second-team All-Big Ten honors.

She was at her best to begin the season at Arizona State, winning each event and hitting a career-high score of 39.350 to win her first all-around title. She was named Big Ten Co-Gymnast of the Week on Jan. 11 for her performance.

Known for her beautiful uneven bars routine, Laeng earned Big Ten all-championship team accolades for her 9.90 bar routine at the championships. She produced career highs on beam with scores of 9.90 twice throughout the season and on floor with a 9.925 routine at the B1G Five meet in Columbus, Ohio.

Laeng was also named Big Ten Event Specialist of the Week on Feb. 1 after winning vault and bars titles in helping Nebraska take down third-ranked Michigan.

She continued her strong work outside of the gym, earning NACGC/W Scholastic All-America honors for a third time. Laeng also earned a Big Ten Distinguished Scholar Award in 2016. She was named academic All-

Big Ten for the second-consecutive season, and was a member of the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll both semesters. Laeng also grabbed a spot on the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team for the third consecutive year.

2015 (SOPHOMORE)

Coming off a strong freshman campaign, Laeng provided the Huskers with solid routines to boost them to a top-10 national finish. As a three-event specialist, Laeng consistently contributed strong scores across the board and was especially prominent on bars.

At the 2015 Big Ten Championships, Laeng took home her first conference crown after posting a career-high 9.95 routine on bars. She also earned Big Ten all-championship team accolades, the only Husker to achieve such an honor. A strong vaulter, Laeng posted personal bests of 9.90 in the leadoff position twice in 2015. She also tallied a season-best 9.875 on beam twice.

Laeng continued to provide leadership in the classroom and the community in 2015,



earning the Nebraska HERO Leadership Award for outstanding service. Laeng was also one of six Huskers to earn NACGC/W Scholastic All-America honors in 2015. She was named academic All-Big Ten for the first time, in addition to earning spots on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll both semesters and the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team in 2015.

2014 (FRESHMAN)

Laeng provided a surprising spark to the Husker lineup during the 2014 season. She started her freshman campaign outside of every Husker lineup and finished the season competing as a three-event specialist on vault, bars and beam. In her collegiate debut against Michigan, Laeng took second place on bars behind All-American Emily Wong by hitting a 9.875 and remained in the rotation for the rest of the season.

Laeng showed her prowess on bars early in the year, as she became one of the Huskers' most consistent performers on the event by scoring a 9.80 or better seven times throughout the season. In addition, Laeng competed in the all-around competition three times, earning her best performance at the Big Ten Quad with a 39.325 to boost the Huskers' efforts to claim the Big Ten regular-season conference title.

She contributed important floor routines as well, recording her season-high 9.85 against Arkansas in the final home meet. Laeng capped her freshman season at the Super Six Finals where she notched a personal-best 9.90 on beam.

She became the first Nebraska gymnast to post 10s on a single event in back-to-back weeks. She was named Big Ten Event Specialist of the Week after her second perfect 10.00 at Rutgers for the week of Jan. 26. She was also named Big Ten Event Specialist of the Week on Feb. 23 after notching a career high 9.95 on floor to tie for the event title at UCLA. In postseason competition, Lambert tied for third at the NCAA Ames Regional with her stellar 9.90 floor performance.

She was named academic All-Big Ten and earned spots on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll in both semesters. She was also named to the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team in 2015.

When Nebraska Head Coach Dan Kendig was hired in 1993, his goals were to return the Nebraska gymnastics program to national prominence and to have Nebraska in a position to win a national title, while also maintaining the highest standards of academic excellence for Husker student-athletes.

Kendig has not only accomplished those goals, but made them a standard for excellence in his 23-year tenure, as Nebraska is considered among the nation's elite in both the gym and the classroom.

In the 23 seasons of the existence of the NCAA Super Six Finals, Nebraska is one of only seven programs, along with Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Michigan, UCLA and Utah to qualify for 10 or more team finals, and the Huskers have earned NCAA Championship berths in 15 of the past 18 years. Under Kendig, 40 NU gymnasts have combined to earn 142 All-America honors since 1995, more than 15 times NU's previous total during the program's first 18 seasons.

At the conference level, the results are equally as impressive. Nebraska has won 15 conference titles during Kendig's tenure, including an unprecedented six straight Big Eight/Big 12 crowns from 1994 to 1999. In addition, Nebraska has had at least one individual conference champion in each of the past 20 seasons and 10 all-around champions, while seven gymnasts have been conference newcomers of the year.

Since Kendig arrived at NU, his teams have compiled an outstanding 545-207-4 (.721) record, including a 358-79-2 regular-season record and a 187-128-2 postseason mark. He has also earned national, regional or conference coach-of-the-year honors in 10 of the past 20 seasons.

Twelve of Nebraska's 15 CoSIDA Academic All-America awards in women's gymnastics have come under Kendig, while he has also guided two NCAA Woman of the Year finalists -- Shelly Bartlett in 1997 and Richelle Simpson in 2005. In addition, Kendig coached Joy Taylor when she became the 1996 CoSIDA Academic All-American of the Year, as well as Simpson, who was recognized with a 2005 NCAA Top Eight Award. Kendig has guided numerous other academic all-conference and NACGC/W Scholastic All-America honorees in his time at Nebraska.

For his accomplishments with the Husker gymnastics program, Kendig was honored by his peers as the NCAA Coach of the Year in 1999 and 2003.

ANOTHER CHAMPIONSHIPS APPEARANCE IN 2016

Kendig led Nebraska to another successful season in 2016, which culminated with an eighth-place finish at the NCAA Championships. The Huskers finished the season with a record of 31-12, including a record of 23-4 in the regular season. NU appeared at the NCAA Championships for the 24th time in program history, and the 18th time under Kendig. The Huskers posted a team score of 195.775 to finish fifth in their NCAA semifinal. Hollie Blanske earned three All-America honors at the national meet, including first-team honors on vault and second-team honors on floor exercise and in the all-around. Blanske ended her distinguished career as a six-time All-American. NU finished second at the Big Ten Championships in Lincoln with a score of 196.900, with Blanske taking the vault title and Grace Williams winning the beam crown. Four Huskers were named All-Big Ten and six Huskers earned academic All-Big Ten honors in 2016. Nebraska was also recognized by the NCAA for achieving an Academic Progress Rate (APR) in the top 10 percent nationally across all women's gymnastics teams.

THE FIRST DECADE: SETTING A STANDARD

Kendig's first decade at Nebraska produced its share of memorable moments, including nine conference titles, eight NCAA Championships appearances and the NACGC academic team title in 1995.

In his first season as head coach in 1994, Kendig led the Huskers to their first Big Eight title since 1990, while earning conference coach-of-the-year honors. Seven gymnasts, including Kim DeHaan, who was selected the Big Eight Newcomer of the Year, earned all-conference honors, and Nebraska's fourth-place regional finish was its best in four years.

In 1995, Nebraska continued to move toward national prominence. Behind conference titles from Martha Jenkins and DeHaan, Nebraska repeated as Big Eight champions. At the Midwest Regional held in Lincoln, NU finished second, allowing the Huskers to return to nationals for the first time since 1990. The Huskers placed 11th at the NCAA Championships, and Taylor became the sixth Husker in school history to earn All-America honors, placing 15th on bars.

Kendig's 1995 squad also earned considerable praise in the classroom. Nebraska was named NACGC academic gymnastics team champions, compiling a 3.561 team grade-point average, while seven Huskers were named to the Big Eight Academic Honor Roll, including Nicole Duval, who earned first-team CoSIDA Academic All-America honors, and Taylor, who was named a second-team CoSIDA Academic All-American.

The 1996 Huskers closed the book on the Big Eight with a dominating performance at the final conference meet. Kendig was named Big Eight Coach of the Year for the third straight season, and NU won its 12th and final Big Eight title. Individually, DeHaan and Taylor combined to win all four individual event titles, marking the first time that NU swept all four crowns at the conference meet. Taylor also won the all-around, while Misty Oxford was named Big Eight Newcomer of the Year.

After advancing to the NCAA Championships for the second straight season, the Huskers barely missed a bid to the Super Six by the slimmest of margins -- .025 of a point -- finishing 10th. DeHaan earned All-America honors on bars by finishing 11th. The 1996 squad also boasted a pair of first-team CoSIDA Academic All-Americans in Taylor and DeHaan, marking the third straight season NU had at least one academic All-American. Taylor, who was selected as the CoSIDA Academic All-American of the Year, and DeHaan both sported perfect 4.0 GPAs.

In 1997, Kendig's Huskers rewrote the record book, setting school records on each apparatus in posting a 22-2 regular-season mark, NU's best record in seven years. The Huskers, behind seven all-conference selections, captured the inaugural Big 12 title, as Shelly Bartlett won the all-around title and two event titles, while Heather Brink tied Bartlett for the bars crown and was selected as the Big 12 Newcomer of the Year.

After finishing third at regionals, the Huskers recorded one of the most memorable moments in school history at the NCAA Championships in Gainesville, Fla. After missing the Super Six Finals the previous year, the Huskers claimed a berth in the team championship by hitting all 24 routines in the preliminary session, forcing a tie with top-ranked Utah. Nebraska won the tiebreaker, which was the score of the sixth gymnast in each event, 234.725-234.350, to make its first appearance in the Super Six Finals in program history. The Huskers finished sixth, as Bartlett, Brink, Oxford and DeHaan captured 10 All-America awards.

In 1998, NU posted a 14-4 regular-season mark and won its fifth straight league title to mark the first time in Big 12 history a women's gymnastics team had won five titles in a row. Nebraska also paced the Big 12 in the classroom, as eight gymnasts earned academic All-Big 12 honors, including seven first-team honorees. Courtney Brown, Laura Ohlendorf and Oxford were named NACGC Scholastic All-Americans.

In 1999, Nebraska enjoyed one of the most successful seasons in program history, going 26-10, winning the Big 12 title and qualifying for the NCAA Championships. NU returned to the Super Six and finished sixth overall, as Brink, Oxford and Brown earned eight All-America honors. In addition, four gymnasts captured Scholastic All-America honors, while all 10 student-athletes who were eligible for academic all-conference honors earned first-team or honorable-mention accolades.

The 2000 season was a special one for Kendig and the Huskers, as Nebraska celebrated its program's silver anniversary season with a 36-9 record, the first regional title since 1983 and a fourth-place finish at the NCAA Championships, equaling the best finish in school history. NU was ranked as high as third nationally, and set numerous team and individual school records. Individually, Heather Brink won the NCAA all-around and vault titles

and became the first Husker gymnast to win the Honda Award, emblematic of the nation's top gymnast.

The Huskers reached new heights in 2001, smashing the school total team score record by more than three quarters of a point with a 197.750. NU topped the previous record team score seven times that year, highlighted by a commanding performance at the Big 12 Championships, where Nebraska set school records on bars (49.725) and team away scores (197.650).

In 2002, the Huskers finished with a 23-8 record, a fifth Big 12 title, a third consecutive regional title and a fifth-place finish at the NCAA Championships. NU's 2002 team excelled in the classroom as well, earning a team GPA of 3.4015.

Kendig's 2003 squad, arguably the strongest team Nebraska has ever produced, finished with a 27-4 overall record, a sixth Big 12 title, a fourth consecutive regional title and a fourth-place finish at the NCAA Championships at the Devaney Center. The Huskers set school team records on vault, floor and total scores with a stellar 198.300 against Iowa State. Simpson captured the NCAA all-around and floor titles to lead a group of seven gymnasts who earned a total of 16 All-America honors, the most awards Nebraska has received in a single year.

THE NEXT CHAPTER OF SUCCESS

Kendig entered his second decade as the Husker head coach in 2004, and NU compiled a 15-9-1 record and a second-place finish at the NCAA Southeast Regional in Lincoln. NU traveled to its sixth consecutive NCAA Championships, where the Huskers finished in 10th place. Four gymnasts earned first- and second-team All-America awards at the NCAA Championships - Libby Landgraf (V, UB), Jamie Saas (BB), Kristi Esposito (AA, BB) and Michele Zabawa (V). Gina Bruce earned NU's only perfect 10.0 score of the season on vault against Missouri on Jan. 31.

In 2005, NU followed up with a sixth-place finish at the NCAA Championships, working through adversity with the loss of an injured Simpson in the postseason. Four gymnasts grabbed seven All-America awards, as Emily Parsons came away with first-team honors on floor and second-team accolades in the all-around, beam and vault. Esposito was a first-team honoree on beam, while Zabawa and Desiré Sniatynski earned second-team recognition on bars. Simpson, a nine-time All-American, was honored as the AAI Award winner, making her the first Nebraska gymnast to accomplish such a feat. Simpson was also named Nebraska's Female Student-Athlete of the Year, earned a prestigious NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship and was honored with the NCAA Top Eight Award.

The 2006 season saw the Huskers go 26-11-1 in a fifth-place NCAA Championships finish. On the first day of national championship competition, NU finished first in its preliminary session for the program's best opening performance since 2003. Seven Huskers took home 10 All-America awards to close the year, with Parsons leading the way with first-team honors on vault, floor and the all-around. Tricia Woo was a first-team honoree on floor and a second-team winner on beam, while Vanessa Meloche took home first-team accolades on bars. Zabawa and Sniatynski also earned second-team All-America status on bars, while Stephanie Carter and Kylie Stone were named to the second team on floor and vault, respectively.

Nebraska gave a strong finish to the 2007 season at the NCAA Championships in Salt Lake City, Utah, placing sixth in the team competition and taking away an overall record of 26-12 in the year. Four Huskers earned six All-America honors at the event, while three competitors qualified for individual event finals. Nebraska's appearance at the NCAA Championships was its ninth in a row and 18th overall. Parsons continued her dominance through her junior year, as she was named a first-team All-American on vault and floor exercise, bringing her career total to nine All-America awards. Woo earned first-team All-America honors on beam, giving her a career total of three All-America nods. Zabawa was the third Husker to take first-team All-America honors, being named to the vault team, and also earning a second-team spot on bars. In addition, Sniatynski garnered second-team All-America status on bars for the third consecutive year.

In 2008, Kendig led the Huskers to a third-place finish at the NCAA Southeast Regional in their 25th straight NCAA postseason appearance and a 13-9 overall record. Two Huskers earned three All-America honors and qualified for event finals at the NCAA Championships. Parsons captured a first-team nod on beam and second-team recognition in the all-around and Sniatynski also garnered first-team All-

America honors on bars. Additionally, Woo captured her first Big 12 title on beam.

In 2009, Kendig's Husker squad made a third-place showing at the NCAA Southeast Regional in their 26th straight NCAA postseason appearance. Junior Kylie Stone tallied the second All-America award of her career at the NCAA Championships in Lincoln. Throughout the season, the Huskers saw strong performances from veteran leaders as well as a glimpse of a bright future with NU's strong freshman class. As a result of the accomplishments of his team, Kendig was named the 2009 Big 12 Coach of the Year.

Nebraska gave a strong finish to the 2010 season at the NCAA Championships in Gainesville, Fla., placing seventh in the team competition and taking away an overall record of 23-8 on the year. Six Huskers earned seven All-America honors at the event, while two competitors (Lora Evenstad and Brittany Skinner) qualified for individual event finals. Nebraska's appearance at the NCAA Championships was its 19th overall in program history.

Kendig and the Huskers posted another strong season in 2011, finishing with a 22-12 record overall. Kendig guided the Huskers to a fourth-place showing at the NCAA Championships, matching their best finish in school history. Nine Huskers earned 11 All-America honors at the event, while seven competitors (Erin Davis, Janelle Giblin, Jamie Schleppenbach, Maria Scaffidi, Emily Wong and Evenstad) qualified for individual event finals. In NU's final season in the Big 12 Conference, Kendig was honored as the 2011 Big 12 Coach of the Year, the seventh such accolade of his career. He also guided the Huskers to their ninth Big 12 Championship - and the first since 2007.

Nebraska put together another outstanding season under Kendig's leadership in 2012, posting a 24-7 record. The Huskers qualified for the NCAA Championships where the team notched an eighth-place finish. Three Huskers garnered a total of eight All-America honors, and all three All-Americans (Jessie DeZiel, Wong and Giblin) qualified for the individual event finals. Nebraska's appearance at the NCAA Championships was its 21st overall in program history. In Nebraska's first season of competition in the Big Ten Conference, Kendig guided the Big Red to the Big Ten Championship, while five Huskers earned All-Big Ten honors. In recognition of his work in the gym throughout the season, Kendig was named the 2012 Big Ten Coach of the Year.

Kendig continued his impressive coaching career in 2013, as the Huskers captured another Big Ten Conference title and six All-America awards at the NCAA Championships, finishing with an overall record of 19-5. The Huskers qualified for NCAA postseason competition for the 29th time in program history, finishing third at the NCAA Morgantown Regional. The 2013 squad posted three of the highest team scores in school history throughout the year while consistently being ranked as one of the nation's top-10 squads.

Under Kendig's coaching Nebraska earned its third consecutive conference title at the 2013 Big Ten Championships where the Huskers posted their conference championship record score of 197.800. Emily Wong captured her second consecutive Big Ten all-around title, and the team hit an event high 49.725 score on the vault with four gymnasts tying for top honors. Nebraska sent three competitors to the 2013 NCAA Championships in Wong, Jessie DeZiel and Brittany Skinner. Wong placed third overall in the all-around competition and 10th on vault. Wong also took home four All-American awards, while DeZiel pulled down two.

The 2014 season was an exciting one for Kendig and the Huskers, as Nebraska battled its way into the Super Six Finals for the 11th time in school history. NU finished the season with a 27-11 overall record and the Big Ten Conference regular season title. Four Huskers took home seven All-America honors at the NCAA Championships, as DeZiel came away with first-team honors on beam and second-team in the all-around. Blanske and Schleppenbach both added first-team honors on beam, while Schleppenbach finished third overall at the event finals. Wong tacked on three honors, finishing eighth on floor, 14th on

beam and fifth in the all-around competition.

Under Kendig's leadership, Wong capped one of the most successful seasons by a Nebraska gymnast in school history. Through the regular season she captured 32 event titles, including 10 all-around crowns. Wong was the 2014 AAI Award winner, an honor given annually to the nation's top gymnast on the basis of athleticism, academic excellence and civic responsibility.

In 2015, NU compiled its best season winning percentage in four seasons with a 28-9 record. Nebraska earned its 17th NCAA Championships bid under Kendig, finishing the season with a 15-1 regular-season record, an eighth-place finish at the NCAA Championships and three All-Americans. Blanske earned first-team All-America honors on floor after earning a berth into the event finals, finishing 11th overall. Blanske also grabbed second-team accolades in the all-around. DeZiel closed out her collegiate career with a bang, taking home first-team honors in the all-around with a sixth-place overall finish and a second-team award on vault. Ashley Lambert garnered her first career All-America accolades after a record-setting season, earning second-team honors on floor.

KENDIG'S HUSKER CONNECTION

Kendig's ties to Husker gymnastics date back to 1981, when he served as an assistant under Judy Schalk for three seasons. In his first stint at Nebraska, the Huskers won two Big Eight titles and made NCAA appearances in 1982 and 1983. The 1983 squad was one of only five NU squads in school history to win an NCAA regional.

In 1983, Kendig became the head coach at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, where he stayed until 1992. His teams captured NCAA Division II national titles in 1988 and 1989, won six regional titles and produced 37 All-Americans.

During the 1993 season, Kendig served as head coach at Cornell, where he coached three academic All-Americans. Kendig, who earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from Kentucky in 1979, then returned to his NU roots after the 1993 season. At that time, he also became an instructor at the Woodward Gymnastics Camp in Woodward, Pa. In his 25 years at Woodward, Kendig has advanced from an instructor to a program director to a master staff instructor.

HEATHER BRINK

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH | SIXTH SEASON | NEBRASKA (2001)

Heather Brink enters her second season as Nebraska's associate head coach and her sixth season as a member of the Husker coaching staff. An 11-time All-American at NU, Brink is the Huskers' beam coach and assists with floor choreography and has numerous responsibilities including recruiting, travel accommodations and academics.

She has not only helped develop one of the most talented beam squads in the nation during her tenure on Nebraska's staff, but Brink has also demonstrated unprecedented leadership in and out of the gym. With over 30 years of gymnastics experience, Brink plays an important role in recruiting, program development and team building. Her dedication to the rich program tradition is unparalleled, as she looks to continue leading the Huskers to success in the years to come.

In 2016, Brink's first season as associate head coach, Nebraska finished eighth nationally with a record of 31-12. The Huskers' beam squad was among the strongest in the country, ranking in the top-10 for most of the season. Grace Williams captured eight beam titles on the season, including the Big Ten beam title. Brink also helped Hollie Blanske to first-team All-America honors on vault and second-team All-America honors on floor exercise and in the all-around.

In 2015, Brink helped guide the Huskers to an eighth-place national finish and a third-place finish at the Big Ten Championships. Nebraska's beam lineup posted a season-high score of 49.475 at the B1G Five qualifier, while the Huskers captured six individual beam titles on the season. Brink was instrumental in helping to develop Blanske, Jessie DeZiel and Ashley Lambert into All-America performers in the 2015 season.

Brink helped Nebraska's beam lineup to a record-breaking performance at the 2014 NCAA Championships, as the Huskers posted a 49.450 to secure their spot in the Super Six finals. In addition, Blanske, DeZiel, Jamie Schleppebach and Emily Wong took home All-America honors on the event. NU collected nine event titles on beam including a Big Ten champion in Wong.

Brink contributed to Nebraska's continued success in 2013 as the Huskers claimed 13 beam titles including the Big Ten Championship beam title with Wong and Jennifer Lauer posting 9.90 scores. Wong went on to claim second-team All-America accolades on the event.

In her first season as an assistant with the Huskers in 2012, Brink helped coach Wong to first-team All-America honors on beam. Brink's assistance with NU's floor routines also guided DeZiel to first-team All-America honors and Wong to second-team honors on the event



BEFORE NEBRASKA

Brink, who competed for the Huskers from 1997 to 2000, permanently etched her name in the Nebraska record books by winning two national titles at the 2000 NCAA Championships in Boise, Idaho. Brink became the first Husker female to win an all-around national title and the second to win a vault national title in leading the Huskers to the Super Six Finals and a fourth-place national finish. Brink was selected as the Honda Award winner in 2000, representing the nation's top female collegiate gymnast. Brink owns the third-highest uneven bars score in program history and the eighth-highest all-around score. She became the first Husker gymnast to score a 10.0, and recorded three perfect scores during her senior season. She closed her collegiate career as one of the most decorated gymnasts in school history, earning two NCAA titles, 11 All-America awards, six regional titles and eight conference crowns. Brink was inducted into the University of Nebraska Athletics Hall of Fame in 2016.

Assistant coach Dan Miller enters his sixth season with the Nebraska women's gymnastics program in 2016-17. Miller coaches Nebraska's vault and floor squads.

In 2016, Miller helped lead Nebraska to another NCAA Championships appearance, while guiding the vault and floor squads to unprecedented success. Miller helped guide Hollie Blanske to three All-America awards in 2016, including first-team honors on vault and second-team honors on floor exercise and in the all-around. Blanske also won the Big Ten vault championship under Miller's watch, with a 9.975 routine that tied Nebraska's conference championship record.

Miller guided the Husker vault and floor squads to new heights during the 2015 season, helping NU to an eighth-place national finish. Under Miller's leadership, the Huskers set a program record on vault against Penn State with a whopping 49.750 score. In addition, an incredible seven members of NU's deep vault team earned or tied career highs throughout the season. Ashley Lambert helped break vaulting records of her own after becoming the first gymnast in program history to earn perfect 10.0s on a single event in back-to-back weeks.

Miller also provided key guidance in the postseason throughout 2015. Blanske earned first-team All-America honors on floor after earning a berth into the event finals, finishing 11th overall at the NCAA Championships. Blanske also grabbed second-team accolades in the

all-around, the first of her career. Jessie DeZiel closed out her collegiate career with a bang, taking home first-team honors in the all-around with a sixth-place overall finish and a second-team award on vault. Lambert garnered her first career All-America accolades after a record-setting season, earning second-team honors on floor. Thanks to Miller's leadership, Nebraska spent most of the season among the top-10 on both vault and floor nationally.

Miller guided Nebraska's vault and floor lineups to great success in 2014, aiding NU in compiling a 27-11 overall record. Several Huskers posted career highs on vault and floor, continually setting the bar high all the way into postseason competition. DeZiel captured NACGC/W regular-season All-America honors, while Emily Wong collected her third consecutive All-America award at the NCAA Championships.

Miller helped Nebraska's vault and floor lineups continue to dominate in 2013. At the Big Ten Championships, the Huskers posted four individual vault scores of 9.95 and a team high 49.725, which helped secure them the Big Ten conference title. Miller guided Brittany Skinner to her individual vault appearance at the NCAA Championships, while Wong and DeZiel earned All-America awards on their events.

During his first season at Nebraska in 2012, Miller guided DeZiel to first-team All-America honors on floor and second-team honors on vault. He also assisted in the development of Janelle Giblin, who earned first-team honors on vault, and Wong, who earned second-team honors on floor exercise. Under Miller's tutelage, the Huskers garnered a total of 15 floor titles and 14 vault titles throughout 2012.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Before arriving at Nebraska, Miller served as owner and head coach for 12 years at Arena Gymnastics in Joliet, Ill. While at Arena, he coached over 50 Level 10 national qualifiers and 16 national team members. In addition, he guided six gymnasts to Level 10 all-around championships and qualified more than 20 gymnasts to Region 5 All-Star teams. With over 30 years of coaching experience, Miller saw more than 30 athletes receive full-ride scholarships.

In addition to his tenure at Arena, Miller served on the Region 5 Board and as the Region 5 Camp Director for over 10 years. He was honored six times as the Region 5 Junior Olympic Coach of the Year and was awarded the five-and 10-year service award from USA

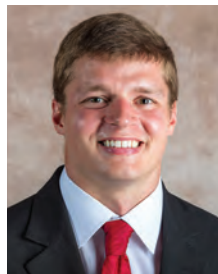

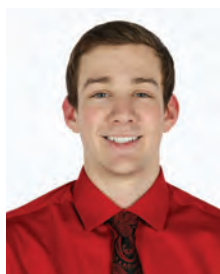

He received one of the top honors in college athletics in September of 2006, when he was chosen for the Dr. Gene Hooks Award as the Life Skills Administrator of the Year. Zimmer has also served as an NCAA Life Skills trainer and is active with the National Consortium for Academics and Sport.

Zimmer oversees the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and remains active in the Ventures In Partnership program, where student-athletes are integrated into various outreach initiatives with Lincoln Public Schools. Zimmer also pioneered the annual "School is Cool" Jam, which reached more than 100,000 middle-level students in the 12-year existence of the event.

Shawn Eichorst was recruited and hired by the University of Nebraska in 2012 and quickly displayed an incredible passion for the University and for its student-athletes as well as the State of Nebraska. As the leader of a tradition-rich athletic program with 24 intercollegiate teams, 600-plus student-athletes and more than 325 full-time employees, Eichorst has relied on a strong value system and a student-centered approach to lead the department. Nebraska's primary mission is to provide student-athletes with the resources and support they need to be successful in academics, athletics and life. The health, safety and welfare of student-athletes are priority one and the essence of every decision made at Nebraska. Since Eichorst arrived in Lincoln, resources and services in every student-athlete support unit have been reviewed, improved and enhanced, including academics, athletic medicine, life skills, nutrition, sports psychology, strength and conditioning and performance/research (i.e. Nebraska Athletic Performance Laboratory (NAPL) and the Center for Brain, Biology and Behavior (CB3)).

Eichorst has continued to move Nebraska forward aggressively with several new initiatives to enhance the student-athlete experience. Beginning in the summer of 2015, Nebraska became the first athletic department in the country to offer laptop computers to every student-athlete and created a data analytics department. Husker student-athletes in all sports now receive four-year, full cost of attendance-based scholarships. Nebraska was also the first-known department of athletics to create a post-eligibility opportunity (PEO) program, where every Husker letterwinner who graduates and has exhausted his or her eligibility has an opportunity to pursue either an internship, study abroad or graduate school program valued at \$7,500. Nebraska was also one of the first institutions to create a spring service abroad trip, taking a team of student-athletes and staff to Guatemala in 2015 and to the Dominican Republic in 2016.

Eichorst is in high demand and has made more than 500 public appearances around the state and country and

his monthly radio show and "Connecting on Campus" online column provide opportunities to connect and share the incredible activities, initiatives and accomplishments happening at the greater University and in the department. As a member of the Chancellor's Senior Administrative Team, Eichorst maintains a strong connection and collaboration between the University and athletics.

A highly respected national leader, Eichorst was appointed in 2015 to the Division I Football Oversight Committee. Most recently, Eichorst was named co-chair of the NCAA Division I Football Recruiting ad hoc working group. He also serves on the Big Ten Conference Program and Budget Review Committee. Eichorst was the first Director of Athletics from any conference to visit the Big Ten Conference-based Academic Alliance (formerly known as the Committee on Institutional Cooperation) at its Champaign, Ill., headquarters. The Big Ten Academic Alliance is a highly successful academic-based consortium of 15 schools, including all 14 in the Big Ten Conference. Nebraska is leading the Big Ten and the Big Ten Academic Alliance in several areas, including Digital Humanities and head injury research.

Under Eichorst, Nebraska extended its nation-leading total of CoSIDA Academic All-Americans to 325 and its nation-leading total of NCAA Top Ten Award winners to 17. More than 700 awards were presented at the 26th Annual Student-Athlete Awards Show—A Night at the Lied. In 2015-16, 109 student-athletes earned undergraduate or graduate degrees and the Big Ten Conference honored 209 Husker student-athletes with academic All-Big Ten awards. For the first time in school history, all Nebraska teams had an NCAA Academic Progress Rate (APR) of 960 or higher and the overall Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 86 percent is the highest in program history. In addition, seven Husker teams (women's basketball, golf, gymnastics, softball, tennis and volleyball and men's tennis) had a GSR of 100 percent as reported in the fall of 2015.

During Eichorst's tenure, Nebraska has won three NCAA team Championships, increasing its total to 27. In 2012-13 and in 2014-15, the Nebraska women's bowling team earned the program's fourth and fifth NCAA titles, while the Husker volleyball team won the 2015 NCAA Championship, the program's fourth national title.

In 2016, the Husker men's track and field team swept the Big Ten Indoor and Outdoor Championships and 14 Nebraska teams competed in NCAA postseason action, including bowling, football, volleyball, women's swimming and diving, wrestling, softball, baseball, men's and women's gymnastics, rifle, and men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field. In 2015-16, Nebraska produced 41 All-Americans who won 49 national awards, including 21 first-team honorees.

In 2013-14, Nebraska became one of only two NCAA institutions – and the first Big Ten program in history – to qualify for a football bowl game, and advance to NCAA postseason in the major team sports of volleyball, soccer, men's and women's basketball, baseball and softball. Additionally, Nebraska was the only institution to win a postseason game in six of those seven sports.

Nebraska's fan support continues to be unparalleled in college athletics. In 2015-16, top 15 national rankings for average attendance were reached across 10 sports—football, volleyball, men's and women's basketball, wrestling, soccer, softball, baseball and men's and women's gymnastics. Nebraska is the only school in the country to rank among the top 15 nationally in both football and men's basketball attendance and in volleyball and women's basketball. A tribute to loyal Husker fans, two sports lead the nation with consecutive home sellout streaks. Football had 347 consecutive sellouts and volleyball had 204 consecutive regular-season sellouts at the start of the 2016-17 season.

Under Eichorst's leadership, Nebraska continues to focus on improving its facilities and the game-day experience at all athletic venues. In August of 2015, Hibner Stadium and Barbara Hibner Field for soccer and the Sid and Hazel Dillon Tennis Center were completed. A new center-hung video board and sound system was installed in the Devaney Center in 2015 to improve the game-day experience for volleyball, wrestling and men's and women's gymnastics. In 2014, the largest wireless network system at a college football stadium in history was installed in Memorial Stadium, along with a state-of-the-art sound system. In the summer of 2013,

Memorial Stadium expansion added the innovative NAPL inside East Stadium next to the Center for Brain, Biology and Behavior (CB3). That same year, Nebraska's men's and women's basketball teams became the primary tenants at Pinnacle Bank Arena, and the renovated Devaney Center became the home for Husker volleyball, wrestling and the men's and women's gymnastics programs.

Eichorst came to Nebraska after serving as Director of Athletics at Miami in 2011 and 2012. He hired legendary men's basketball coach Jim Larranaga, who led Miami to the NIT Second Round in his first season and ACC regular-season and tournament titles as well as the NCAA Sweet 16 in his second. The women's basketball program posted its highest national ranking in school history (No. 5) and advanced to the Second Round of the NCAA Tournament. The Miami women's tennis team advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight for the fourth straight season, and the baseball team made its 40th consecutive NCAA appearance. The Hurricane women's soccer team posted its first NCAA Tournament win in school history, and the volleyball team made its third straight NCAA Tournament trip.

Before heading to Miami, Eichorst was the Deputy Athletics Director at Wisconsin. He was the Chief Operating Officer and oversaw the department's daily operations, as well as the men's basketball program under the direction of Director of Athletics and former Husker Barry Alvarez.

From 2004 to 2006, Eichorst served as the Senior Associate Athletics Director for Administration at South Carolina, overseeing the department's daily operations, as well as the football and baseball programs under legendary coaches Lou Holtz, Steve Spurrier and Ray Tanner, respectively.

From 1999 to 2003, Eichorst served as the Director of Athletics at Wisconsin-Whitewater, which produced four top 10-percent finishes in the NACDA Directors Cup, one NCAA team title and two NCAA runner-up finishes. The program also featured 11 CoSIDA Academic All-America selections.

A native of Lone Rock, Wis., Eichorst was an all-conference defensive back, three-time letterwinner and 1990 football team captain for the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater. He graduated magna cum laude in business from UW-Whitewater in 1990 and in 2015 was awarded the Distinguished Alumni Award for Professional Achievement. He earned a law degree from Marquette Law School in 1995, practiced law in Milwaukee until 1999 and is a past member of the State Bar of Wisconsin Board of Governors. He served as an assistant adjunct professor of law at Marquette, where he taught classes in sports law. He serves on the Marquette University National Sports Law Institute Board of Advisors and in 2006, Marquette awarded Eichorst the Sports Law Alumnus of the Year Award. He is also a graduate of the Sports Management Institute and serves on its Executive Committee.

Shawn and his wife Kristin have three sons: Jack, Joseph and Bennett.

HANK M. BOUNDS, PH.D.

UNIV. OF NEBRASKA PRESIDENT SECOND YEAR SOUTHERN MISSISSIPPI (1991)

On Jan. 12, 2015, the Board of Regents appointed lifelong educator Hank M. Bounds, Ph.D., as the seventh president of the University of Nebraska.

Bounds began his tenure as president on April 13, 2015, bringing with him a demonstrated record of expanding opportunities for students, improving higher education outcomes and efficiencies, and building successful partnerships with policymakers, donors and business leaders.

Bounds grew up on a small farm in rural Mississippi, where his family raised hogs and cattle and he hauled hay. His service in the Army National Guard helped him pay for college, and he earned bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Southern Mississippi and a doctorate from the University of Mississippi.

Bounds has devoted his 25-year career to helping change students' lives in the same way education opened doors in his own life. He began as a high school teacher, then rose to principal, superintendent and state superintendent before becoming Mississippi's commissioner of higher education in 2009. In that role, he oversaw a complex system of eight public universities including research universities, regional universities, an academic health science center, historically black institutions, a law center, a school of veterinary medicine and 200 institutes and centers. Together the system enrolled 85,000 students, employed 26,000 faculty and staff, and operated with a combined annual budget of \$4.5 billion, including \$500 million in research and development.

During every year of Bounds' tenure as commissioner, student enrollment and degrees awarded by the institutions in the Mississippi system increased, by a total of 13.3 percent and 11.4 percent, respectively. He advocated with legislative leadership for improved faculty compensation and providing greater opportunities for students. He also provided oversight for private fundraising in excess of \$250 million per year.

Bounds worked with the Board of Trustees to implement a performance-based allocation model that distributed funds equitably and rewarded universities for operating efficiently and achieving attainment outcomes. He designed an efficiencies plan that saved more than \$90 million, an internal audit function, and a comprehensive diversity initiative that led to increased diversity among Mississippi faculty, staff and students.

Bounds also worked with partners to increase educational attainment in Mississippi, including a Center for Education Innovation focused on improving learning opportunities for disadvantaged children. Bounds created an office to foster relationships among university researchers, business and industry, and economic developers. He was tapped by the business community to chair a major statewide initiative to create an action plan to improve Mississippi's competitive position.

Bounds brings this experience to the University of Nebraska, which he believes can serve as a catalyst for change and growth in the lives of students and people in the state and around the world. He is working to make the University of Nebraska a giant in higher education—for the benefit of the state, the country and the world.

Bounds holds faculty appointments in the College of Education and Human Sciences at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and in the Colleges of Education at the University of Nebraska at Omaha and the University of Nebraska at Kearney. He and his wife, Susie, are the parents of a son, Will, and a daughter, Caroline. They reside in Lincoln, Nebraska.

The Board of Regents consists of eight voting members elected by district for six-year terms, and four non-voting student Regents, one from each campus, who serve during their tenure as student body president. The board supervises the general operations of the university, and the control and direction of all expenditures. The board also includes a corporation secretary who manages all records including agendas, minutes, notices, policies and bylaws. Those documents can be found on the web at nebraska.edu/board/.

Ronnie Green assumed full authority as the University of Nebraska-Lincoln's 20th chancellor on May 8, 2016.

Prior to being named chancellor, Green served for six years as the Harlan Vice Chancellor of the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources. In this role, he also jointly served as the Vice President for Agriculture and Natural Resources of the University of Nebraska system. Since 2015, Green also was UNL's Senior Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, the institution's chief academic officer and responsible authority in the absence of the chancellor.

Green was raised on a mixed beef, dairy, and cropping farm in southwestern Virginia. He received bachelor and master's degrees in animal science from Virginia Tech and Colorado State University, respectively. His doctoral program was completed jointly at the University of Nebraska and the USDA-ARS U.S. Meat Animal Research Center in animal breeding and genetics in 1988.

Green has served on the animal science faculties of Texas Tech University and Colorado State University, and as the national program

leader for animal production research for the USDA's Agricultural Research Service and executive secretary of the White House's interagency working group on animal genomics within the National Science and Technology Council where he was one of the principal leaders in the international bovine, porcine, and ovine genome sequencing projects. Prior to returning to NU, Green served as senior global director of technical services for Pfizer Animal Health's animal genomics business.

Green has published 130 refereed publications and abstracts, nine book chapters and 56 invited symposia papers; and has delivered invited presentations in 43 U.S. states and 21 countries around the world. He is a past-president of both the American Society of Animal Science and the National Block and Bridle Club, and has served in a number of leadership positions for the U.S. Beef Improvement Federation, National Cattlemen's Beef Association, National Pork Board, Federated Animal Science Societies and the National Research Council. He was named a fellow of ASAS in 2014 and, in 2015, a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the world's largest general scientific society.

Ronnie and best friend Jane are the proud parents of four children: Justin, a UNL political science student and political journalist in Washington, D.C.; Nate, a UNL business administration graduate and current UNL law student; Kelli, a UNL student majoring in advertising, public relations and global studies; and Regan, a UNL student majoring in pre-inclusive early childhood education.

In 2002, Potuto was named Outstanding Faculty Athletics Representative by the All-American Football Foundation. From 2008-09 to 2011-12 she was president of the 1A FAR (FARs from FBS institutions). Among her NCAA positions, Potuto spent nine years (the maximum) on the NCAA Division I Committee on Infractions (chair her last two years). She was one of three Big 12 Conference representatives on the NCAA Division I Management Council, and served on the NCAA Men's Gymnastics Championship Committee and an NCAA-wide (all divisions) committee to advise NCAA staff on student-athlete issues and educational programming for coaches, staff, and student-athletes.

A sports law expert, Potuto regularly lectures and consults on sports issues in general and NCAA processes in particular. She is an expert witness in litigation involving sports issues. She testified before the House Subcommittee on the Constitution regarding due process in NCAA infractions hearings.

In recent years, she has appeared in media reports in the New York Times, Los Angeles Times, USA Today, Washington Post, CBSSports.com, the Chronicle of Higher Education, and Insider Higher Ed among others. She has presented to the Knight Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics, the National Association of College and University Attorneys, the Association of Public and Land Grant Universities, the Texas Commission of Higher Education, NCAA regional conferences, law conferences and law firms, NACDA, and to universities and law colleges, including the Universities of Istanbul, Washington, Maryland, Oklahoma, Santa Clara, Arizona State, Baltimore, and Mississippi.

Potuto is a past adviser to the Uniform Law Commissioners Committee to draft a sports agent statute, has drafted rules governing search and seizure and hearings for the Nebraska Racing Commission, and also has written on issues of gender equity in college athletics. She has authored numerous articles on sports law issues. She has just completed articles on NCAA treatment of student-athlete violations and on NCAA and Olympic treatment of athlete violations (co-authored with an Olympic arbitrator).

Potuto delivered the 2012 Chancellor's Distinguished Lecture. She serves on the senate's intercollegiate athletics committee. She is a past member of the UNL academic senate and also served on Nebraska's NCAA site certification steering committee.

Potuto teaches constitutional law, procedure, federal jurisdiction, and sports law. She has been a visiting professor of law at the University of Arizona, Rutgers University, the Cardozo College of Law at New York's Yeshiva University, the University of Oregon, the University of North Carolina, and Seton Hall University. She has worked as an assistant prosecutor in both the Essex and Morris County (N.J.) prosecutor's offices.

Potuto was project director and a drafter of the Uniform Law Commissioners Sentencing and Corrections Act, as well as the drafter for the Nebraska Supreme Court Committee to Draft Criminal Jury Instructions. She is the author of three books. She was elected to membership in the American Law Institute, the Nebraska State Bar Foundation, and the Douglass Society.

Potuto earned her bachelor's degree in journalism at Rutgers' Douglass College, and her master's degree in English literature at Seton Hall. She earned her juris doctorate at the Rutgers Law College.

She is a member of the bars of Nebraska and New Jersey and is admitted to practice before the U.S. Supreme Court, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit, and the U.S. District Courts for Nebraska and New Jersey.

2016 SEASON REVIEW

The Nebraska women's gymnastics team rounded out the 2016 season with an eighth-place finish in the team competition at the NCAA Championships in Fort Worth, Texas. The Huskers made their 24th NCAA appearance, as NU put together a 31-12 overall record and a 7-2 regular-season record in the Big Ten. Senior Hollie Blanske added three All-America honors to give her a total of six for her outstanding career. The Huskers took home a combined 51 individual event titles and numerous conference and national awards.

"I thought the way it ended up, it was a very successful season," Nebraska Coach Dan Kendig said. We faced some adversity, but the team kept working hard. I'm really proud of them, and I think that the thing I'm the most proud of is their energy and their fight. We were right in the hunt at the Big Ten Championships and we did well at regionals and the NCAA Championships as well."

Nebraska's 31 wins rank second in program history and are the most since the 2003 team went 32-4.

The Huskers began the season with victories in each of their first four meets, including an upset victory over then-No. 3 Michigan. The Huskers continued to put up consistent scores throughout the season, culminating in the season-high score of 197.350 against Utah State on Senior Day.

The Huskers won their B1G Five qualifying meet with a score of 197.000 to earn the second overall seed at the Big Ten Championships at the Devaney Center in Lincoln. NU put up a solid 196.900, but came up just short of Michigan's 197.125, as the Huskers finished second at the Championships.

Nebraska finished second at the NCAA Iowa City Regional to eventual national champion Oklahoma. The Huskers' score of 196.550 gave them a bid to the program's 24th NCAA Championship meet.

The Huskers finished fifth in their session and eighth overall at the Championships with a solid score of 195.775.

Blanske finished her career as a Husker by doubling her All-America honors at the 2016 NCAA Championships. Blanske earned first-team honors on vault and second-team honors on floor exercise and in the all-around. She also grabbed 16 individual titles throughout the season, with four coming in the all-around. Blanske rounded out her career with a total of 32 individual titles. She was named first-team All-Big Ten and captured the Big



Ten championship with a career-high 9.975 on vault.

Blanske led the way for the Huskers in athletics, academics and community outreach, as she was selected as Nebraska's 2016 HERO Leadership Award winner and was a nominee for Nebraska's Female Student-Athlete of the Year. Blanske was an NACGC/W Scholastic All-American for the third year in a row and she was also selected to the academic All-Big Ten team for a third consecutive year.

Classmate Madison McConkey found balance in her final season, competing on three events throughout her senior year. She was the lead-off competitor on balance beam in 13 of the 14 meets during the season and saw action on the uneven bars and floor exercise multiple times throughout the season.

McConkey was able to set career highs on all three events in her last season as a Husker. During the first home meet against Rutgers, she produced a career-high 9.80 on the uneven bars. She also hit a career-high 9.85 on balance beam at Nebraska's annual Masters Classic. On Senior Day against Utah State, McConkey shined on floor exercise, scoring a career-high 9.80.

Jennie Laeng became a strong all-around performer for the Big Red in her junior campaign. Laeng was a consistent contributor on vault,

averaging above a 9.85 for the 2016 season. Laeng also provided strong scores on uneven bars, balance beam and floor exercise for the Big Red in 2016. She was at her best to begin the season at Arizona State, winning each event and hitting a career-high score of 39.350 to win her first all-around title.

Laeng earned several nominations from the Big Ten throughout the season, earning second-team All-Big Ten honors. She was named Big Ten Gymnast of the Week on Jan. 11, and Big Ten Event Specialist of the Week on Feb. 1. She continued to shine on bars, earning Big Ten all-championship-team accolades for her 9.90 routine at the conference meet. She produced career highs on balance beam with a 9.90 twice throughout the season and on floor exercise with a 9.925 routine at the B1G Five meet in Columbus, Ohio.

Laeng was named an NACGC/W Scholastic All-American for a third time, and she earned academic All-Big Ten honors for the second year in a row.

After a record-breaking sophomore season, Ashley Lambert battled injuries and adversity in her junior campaign. Lambert still achieved career highs on uneven bars with a score of 9.875 and on balance beam with a 9.825 twice in her junior season. She remained strong academically, as she earned academic All-Big Ten honors for the second year in a row.

Danielle Breen emerged as one of Nebraska's top all-around performers, producing career highs above 9.90 on all four events in her sophomore season. Breen proved to be a consistent performer, hitting 43 out of 44 routines on the way to second-team All-Big Ten honors in 2016.

At the Big Ten Championships, Breen earned a spot on the Big Ten all-championship team on uneven bars and in the all-around for her performances. She also placed second in the all-around at the Big Ten Championships with her career-high score of 39.500. At NCAA Championships, Breen showed her steadiness hitting above a 9.80 on three of the four events, helping the Huskers to an eighth-place finish. A standout outside of the gym, Breen earned NACGC/W Scholastic All-America honors as a sophomore. She earned the 2016 Big Ten Sportsmanship award and was named

academic All-Big Ten.

Grace Williams solidified her spot as one of Nebraska's top all-around performers as a sophomore. She earned eight beam titles throughout the 2016 season and achieved career-highs on three events.

Williams was named first-team All-Big Ten and earned spots on the Big Ten all-championship team on uneven bars and balance beam. She was also the co-champion on balance beam at the Big Ten Championships and at the NCAA Iowa City Regional to help the Huskers to their 24th NCAA Championships appearance.

Williams hit 49 of 53 routines and earned 13 total event titles in 2016, reaching career-high scores on uneven bars and floor exercise with scores of 9.925 on both. She also scored a near-perfect 9.95 balance beam routine to help the Huskers to an upset of then-No. 3 Michigan. She also earned a career-high all-around score against Michigan, hitting a 39.500. In the classroom Williams earned academic All-Big Ten honors.

After some early injuries, Sienna Crouse proved to be a solid performer in the Husker lineup during her freshman season. Crouse became a three-event specialist on the vault, uneven bars and floor exercise. At the 2016 Big Ten Championships, Crouse hit a career-high 9.90 on bars and earned a career-high 9.875 score on floor exercise. She was named to the 2016 Big Ten all-championship team on uneven bars. She also achieved a personal best of 9.80 twice throughout the season on vault.

At the NCAA Championships, Crouse contributed important routines to help the Huskers finish eighth in the country. She put up the second highest floor score for the Huskers with a score of 9.8625, only .0125 behind Blanske.

Crouse also got off to an excellent start in the classroom, earning NACGC/W Scholastic All-America honors in 2016.

Catelyn Orel came on strong for the Huskers in her freshman season, competing and providing depth on all four events. Orel earned her first event title against Utah State in the final home meet of the season with a career-high 9.925 on the uneven bars.

She also took 11th out of the 60 competitors that competed on bars at the Big Ten Championships with a score of a 9.875.

Orel scored a personal best on vault, with a 9.80, and in the all-around, with a 39.250, to help the Huskers knock off third-ranked Michigan on Jan. 29. A solid floor performer, Orel hit a high mark of 9.875 twice throughout the season and hit a solid 9.775 on balance beam against Iowa on Feb. 2.

At the NCAA Championships, Orel stepped up, contributing the highest bars score for the Huskers with a 9.8375. Orel also provided a solid floor score and added to the beam lineup to help the Huskers finish eighth at the championships.

Orel was named an NACGC/W Scholastic All-American for her work in the classroom as a freshman.

Megan Schwehofer became a strong three-event specialist for the Huskers in her freshman season. She proved to be a consistent beam worker throughout the season, earning two titles on the event and earning a career-high 9.925 at

the B1G Five meet in Columbus, Ohio. Schwehofer averaged above a 9.80 on both vault and balance beam for the 2016 season.

Schwehofer shined on vault, leading the way for the Huskers with a score of 9.85 at the NCAA Iowa City Regional to help the team earn its 24th NCAA appearance. She also earned her first title on the event against Rutgers, scoring her career high of 9.90. Schwehofer saw some action on floor exercise at the beginning of the season, producing a personal-best 9.875 on the event against Michigan. Schwehofer also earned NACGC/W Scholastic All-America honors as a freshman.

Freshman Kelli Chung trained on all four events early in the season, but suffered an elbow injury that kept her from contributing her gymnastics in 2016. Megan Kuo provided depth to the balance beam lineup in her first season as a Husker. Kuo became a beam specialist, earning an exhibition spot against Minnesota and Michigan in the 2016 season. Kami Shows provided strong depth for the Huskers in her freshman season, earning exhibition spots on uneven bars and balance beam during 2016. She scored a 9.85 in exhibition on uneven bars against Utah State. Shows also competed in exhibition on balance beam at the annual Masters Classic.

The Huskers continued their strong work in the classroom in 2016, as they were one of 23 gymnastics programs across the country that were honored for finishing among the top 10 percent nationally in the Academic Progress Rate (APR). Six Huskers were named NACGC/W Scholastic All-Americans, and the team placed six on the academic All-Big Ten team. NU gymnasts earned a total of 18 spots on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll across the fall and spring semesters and 12 spots on the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team in 2016.

Head coach Dan Kendig ended his 23rd season with the Huskers with a record of 545-207-4 and a career mark of 658-319-5. Kendig's 545 wins as head coach of the Nebraska program place him third among active coaches across all sports in Nebraska history, trailing softball coach Rhonda Revelle and volleyball coach John Cook. Kendig continues to be the program's all-time winningest coach with 14 conference titles and 18 NCAA championship appearances.

STRONG FINISH AT NCAAS

- Nebraska finished with a team score of 195.775 at the NCAA Championships in Fort Worth, Texas, good for eighth in the nation.
- Hollie Blanske earned three All-America honors to give her a total of six for her career. She was named a first-team All-American on vault and earned second-team All-America honors on floor exercise and in the all-around.

- Nebraska tied for second in the Big Ten regular-season standings with a 7-2 record.
- The Huskers took second at the Big Ten Championships with a score of 196.900. Hollie Blanske took home a share of the vault title with a 9.975, and Grace Williams was co-champion on beam with a 9.925. Blanske, Williams, Danielle Breen, Sienna Crouse and Jennie Laeng earned spots on the Big Ten all-championship team.
- Four Huskers earned All-Big Ten honors: Hollie Blanske (First Team), Grace Williams (First Team), Danielle Breen (Second Team) and Jennie Laeng (Second Team).
- Jennie Laeng (Jan. 11) and Hollie Blanske (Jan. 25) were selected Big Ten Gymnast of the Week in 2016. Laeng (Feb. 1) was also chosen as the Big Ten Event Specialist of the Week.

SUPERIOR STAFF

- Head Coach Dan Kendig finished his 23rd season at Nebraska with a 658-319-5 career mark and a 545-207-4 NU mark, continuing his impressive career as the winningest coach in NU women's gymnastics history.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

- A total of six Huskers earned NACGC/W Scholastic All-America honors in 2016: Hollie Blanske, Danielle Breen, Sienna Crouse, Jennie Laeng, Megan Schwehofer and Catelyn Orel.
- Six Huskers garnered academic All-Big Ten honors, giving the women's gymnastics program 174 total academic all-conference selections. Hollie Blanske, Madison McConkey, Jennie Laeng, Ashley Lambert, Danielle Breen and Grace Williams each earned academic all-conference honors.

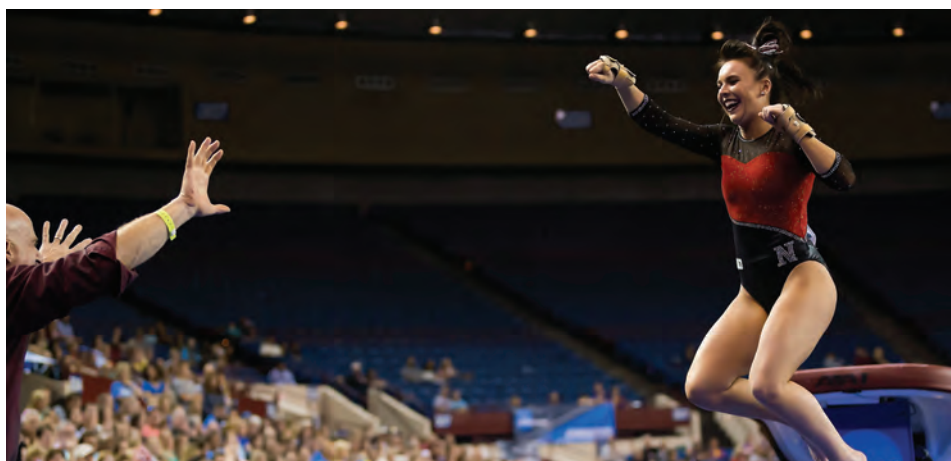

2016 (SENIOR)

Known for her consistency and work ethic throughout her career, Hollie Blanske helped lead the Huskers to three NCAA Championships appearances during her time at Nebraska. Blanske (pronounced BLAN-ski) finished her career by earning three more All-America honors to give her a total of six for her career. She was named first-team All-American on vault and earned second-team accolades on floor exercise and in the all-around following her performance at the NCAA Championships in 2016. She competed in every meet in her senior season, hitting 53 of 55 routines. Blanske also achieved NACGC/W regular season second-team All-America honors in the all-around. She was named first-team All-Big Ten and won the Big Ten vault title.

Blanske excelled as an all-arounder for the Huskers throughout her time at Nebraska scoring a career-high 39.600 two times in her career, including her senior day against Utah State. Blanske also accomplished a career high on vault, scoring a near-perfect 9.975 at the Big Ten Championships. On uneven bars, Blanske was able to hit her career high of 9.90 four times, including at the NCAA Iowa City Regional. She was known for her powerhouse floor routine, notching a 9.95 four times throughout her career and three times in 2016.

Blanske was named Big Ten Gymnast of the Week on Jan. 25, following her all-around victory against Rutgers. Blanske hit a 9.95 on floor exercise to round out a score of 39.500 in the all-around.

At the NCAA Championships, Blanske competed with power and grace. She captured third place on vault with a score of 9.925 and finished 12th on floor exercise and in the all-around, helping Nebraska to an eighth-place finish.

She continued to provide leadership in the classroom and the community, earning the HERO Leadership Award for outstanding service. Blanske earned NACGC/W Scholastic All-America honors for a third time in 2016. She also earned academic All-Big Ten honors for the third year in a row, while being named to the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team in 2016. She was named to the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll in both the fall and spring semesters.

2015 (JUNIOR)

Following a stellar sophomore season, Blanske continued to shine in her junior campaign by earning first-team All-America honors on floor at the 2015 NCAA Championships. She also picked up second-team accolades in the all-around after a steady performance at the NCAA semifinals. One of NU's most consistent performers, Blanske made up part of a trio of all-arounders alongside Grace Williams and Jessie DeZiel, contributing quality scores across the board.

For the second year in a row, Blanske competed in every meet of the season as an all-around competitor, hitting 51 of 52 routines throughout the year. She notched a season-high 39.500 against Penn State, capturing Big Ten Gymnast-of-the-Week honors in the process. She also tied her career high of 9.95 on vault against Rutgers, while matching her personal best on bars with a 9.90 at the annual Masters Classic.

At the NCAA Championships, Blanske showed her prowess as a steady all-around performer when she earned second-team All-America awards for her 39.325 showing, tying for 13th overall. Her season high-tying 9.925 on floor during the semifinal day

punched her ticket to the individual event finals, where she took 11th with a 9.85 score.

2014 (SOPHOMORE)

Blanske became an All-American in 2014, earning first-team accolades on beam at the NCAA Championships. All season long, she helped provide a solid 1-2-3 punch in the all-around with junior Jessie DeZiel and senior Emily Wong. Blanske proved to be one of the Huskers' most valuable gymnasts and continually provided clutch performances in every event.

Blanske did not miss a meet all season in the all-around, delivering her best performance at the Big Ten Championships, soaring to a 39.600. Her performance included career-high scores on floor (9.95) and beam (9.90) en route to finishing as the Big Ten all-around runner-up. She was named to the Big Ten all-championship team on beam, floor and in the all-around.

She notched a career-high score of 9.90 on bars at the Masters Classic, as she tallied her third individual event title on the season. Blanske hit three scores of 9.90 or better on floor during her sophomore campaign and moved into the back of the lineup with her strong routine.

At the NCAA Championships, Blanske proved her strength as a powerful beam worker when she recorded a career-high-matching 9.90 on beam at the NCAA Semifinals and at the Super Six Finals. She took 10th place overall on beam with a 9.85 mark at the event finals.

2013 (FRESHMAN)

Blanske battled back from an offseason knee injury to become a solid three-event competitor for the Huskers in her first season. Appearing on vault, bars and floor for NU, Blanske logged season-high scores of 9.85 or better on each apparatus while securing her spot as one of the squad's top vaulters by the end of 2013.

Blanske came on strong late in the season for Nebraska, posting or tying season bests on all three events during the month of March. She was a crucial part of Nebraska's Big Ten Championship-winning efforts on March 23, finishing in a tie for sixth on floor (9.90) and earning Big Ten co-champion honors on vault (9.95). Blanske also earned her first career Big Ten all-championship team award for her vault performance.

She finished the 2013 season with a trio of individual titles, including two on vault and one on floor. Blanske notched a fourth-place finish on vault at the NCAA Morgantown Regional, posting a 9.925 to come in behind co-champion teammates Jessie DeZiel, Emily Wong and Brittany Skinner (9.95).

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Blanske arrived at Nebraska after competing under coaches Mike Hunger, Sami Wozney, Sarah Jantzi and Rich Stenger at Twin City Twisters alongside fellow Husker All-American Jessie DeZiel. Blanske was a four-time Junior Olympic National qualifier and was a Junior Olympic National Team Member in 2010 and 2011. She was a 2011 Junior Olympic National all-around champion, posting a score of 38.450. She was also a national champion on bars (9.625) and floor (9.775) in 2011. Blanske captured three regional titles and was the 2011 Region IV Co-Regional Gymnast of the Year.

Blanske chose Nebraska over Arkansas, Minnesota, Iowa State, Washington and Denver.

Madison McConkey found balance in her final season as a Husker, competing on three events during her senior year. She was the lead-off competitor on balance beam in 13 of the 14 meets throughout the season and saw action on uneven bars and floor exercise numerous times in 2016.

McConkey was able to set career highs on each of her three events as a senior. At the first home meet against Rutgers, McConkey produced a career-high 9.80 on the uneven bars. She hit a career-high 9.85 on balance beam at Nebraska's annual Masters Classic. On senior night against Utah State, McConkey shined on floor exercise, scoring a career-high 9.80.

At the NCAA Championships, McConkey's mental toughness and leadership helped the Huskers to an eighth-place finish. As a lead-off performer on balance beam she was able to hit a 9.7125 to help the total score.

A standout in the classroom, McConkey earned academic All-Big Ten honors for the third time. She was named to the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete in the fall and spring semesters, and she earned a spot on the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team in 2016.

2015 (JUNIOR)

McConkey provided important depth for the Huskers in her junior campaign. As a three-event specialist, she saw action against Lindenwood, earning season-high marks on all three events. She also earned an exhibition spot on beam twice, preparing to break into the lineups as a senior.

Michele Bryant: NU's First Champion

Michele Bryant will forever hold one distinction that no other Husker female gymnast can claim

A native of Blue Springs, Mo., Bryant became the first female gymnast in school history to win a national title, capturing the NCAA vault championship with a score of 9.85 at the 1990 NCAA Championships in Corvallis, Ore. Bryant's vault score also set a

Nebraska school record held until 1994.

Bryant's NCAA championship capped an impressive Husker career that saw her earn three first-team All-America honors and four Big Eight Championships.

A four-time all-conference selection, Bryant led Nebraska to a 59-20 regular-season record and four Big Eight championships during her collegiate career. It was the first time a gymnastics team had won four straight conference titles in Big Eight history.

At the national level, the Huskers also qualified for the NCAA Championships all four years she competed, the first time in school history the Huskers qualified for nationals in four straight years, while guiding the Huskers to a pair of top-five finishes. As a junior, Bryant earned first-team All-America honors on uneven bars, as the Huskers finished fourth, their best finish in school history. In addition to her vault title, she placed sixth on uneven bars, becoming the first Husker gymnast to earn All-America honors in consecutive seasons, as the Huskers finished fifth at the 1990 NCAA Championships.

The first three-time All-America gymnast in school history, Bryant shared the Big Eight all-around title with fellow Husker Lisa McCrady in 1989 with a score of 38.900, while winning the balance beam title as a junior and the vault title as a senior. Bryant finished her career as Nebraska's school record holder in the all-around (39.000) and vault (9.85).

Bryant's contributions to Husker athletics were recognized with her selection as one of Nebraska's 25 Women of Distinction during the Athletic Department's 25-year celebration in April of 2000. Bryant married John McJunkins in 2005 and has a son, Austin (14), a stepdaughter, Johnna (17) and a stepson, Jaryd (10). She currently works as an accountant in Benton, Ark.

Heather Brink: The Best of 2000

The 2000 season was the culmination of an outstanding career for Heather Brink. The senior from Lincoln permanently etched her name into the record books, winning two national titles at the NCAA Championships in Boise, Idaho, as the Huskers placed fourth at nationals – equaling their best finish in school history.

Brink became the first Husker female to win an all-around national title, scoring a 39.600 to lead the Huskers to the Super Six Finals for the third time in four years. Entering the final event, Brink was in third place and needed a 9.925 for a share of the all-around title. Brink came through with the finest floor routine of her career, scoring a 9.95 and equaling NU's school record to win by .025 of a point.

In the Super Six Finals one night later, Brink was flawless, posting the top score of the evening with a 39.625, including a 9.95 on vault and a 9.925 on uneven bars, as the Huskers recorded their best finish in 11 years. In the event finals, she won her second NCAA title, placing first on vault with a 9.95, while finishing second on uneven bars (9.925) and eighth on floor exercise (9.80). Overall, she earned five All-America honors (four first-team and one second-team).

For her efforts, she was selected as the Honda Award winner, representing the nation's top female collegiate gymnast. Brink joined softball standout Denise Day (1985) and volleyball players Karen Dahlgren (1987) and Allison Weston (1995) as NU's fourth Honda Award winner. Greichaly Cepero won NU's fifth Honda Award in 2000, as the nation's top volleyball player, while Sarah Pavan added honors in 2006.

The 2000 Big 12 and Region 3 Gymnast of the Year, Brink posted eight of the top 10 all-around totals in school history, including a school record of 39.70 at the NCAA Regional. She also became the first Husker gymnast to score a 10.00, recording the mark on vault against Iowa State on Feb. 15, one of three perfect 10s during the season. She closed her collegiate career as the most decorated gymnast in school history, earning two NCAA titles, 11 All-America awards, six regional titles and eight conference titles.

Brink joined the Nebraska staff as assistant coach before the 2012 season and was named associate head coach prior to the 2016 season. She and her husband, Jon, have two sons, Jaxon (10) and Hunter (5).

Richelle Simpson: The Nation's Finest

Richelle Simpson holds a special place in Nebraska gymnastics history after her record-setting performances in 2002, 2003 and 2005.

As the only Husker gymnast to ever earn first-team All-America honors on all four events and the all-around in the same year, Simpson garnered five first-team awards at the 2003 NCAA Championships,

leading the Huskers to a fourth-place national finish at the Bob Devaney Sports Center.

Entering the week of the championships as the nation's top-ranked all-arounder, she captured the NCAA all-around crown with a 39.675, edging out 2002 NCAA Champion Jamie Dantzschler of UCLA, who earned the top all-around performance in Session I of the NCAA Preliminaries with a 39.650.

At the NCAA Super Six Finals, Simpson went on to dominate the competition, producing the top individual performance with scores of 9.925 or better on all four events for an all-around total of 39.800. In the individual event finals, Simpson added an NCAA individual floor title (9.963) to her arsenal of accomplishments.

After being granted a medical hardship year in 2004 by the NCAA, Simpson returned with a vengeance in 2005, leading NU to its first-ever No. 1 ranking after the Masters Classic.

The Toronto, Ontario, native provided an unmatched spark in Nebraska's run to the NCAA Super Six Finals, as the Huskers reclaimed the Big 12 Conference championship.

Simpson, the 2005 South Central Regional Co-Gymnast of the Year, holds or shares records in four categories on Nebraska's all-time charts.

Simpson also became NU's first AAI Award winner in 2005, an honor annually given to the nation's top gymnast on the basis of athleticism, academic excellence and civic responsibility.

She capped her career by earning the first NCAA Top Ten Award in the history of Nebraska women's gymnastics. Simpson became NU's nation-leading 15th student-athlete across all sports to win the Top Ten Award, which is the highest honor given by the NCAA.

Simpson was also the Big 12 Female Sportsperson of the Year, Nebraska's Female Student-Athlete of the Year and was awarded NCAA and Big 12 Postgraduate Scholarships at the conclusion of her final season in 2005. In the fall of 2015, she was honored as the first women's gymnast in the Nebraska Athletics Hall of Fame.

Simpson now lives in Las Vegas and performs in the Cirque du Soleil show *Mystère* with former Husker gymnast A.J. Lamb. Simpson made her debut with Cirque du Soleil in September 2006 and specializes in Chinese poles and the teeterboard.

NEBRASKA'S ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

For Head Coach Dan Kendig and the Nebraska women's gymnastics program, academic success is as paramount as athletic accomplishments. With 10 gymnasts capturing 15 CoSIDA Academic All-America honors and 46 women capturing 97 NACGC/W Scholastic All-America awards since 1994, the Huskers have maintained a high standard of academic excellence and set high expectations at the University of Nebraska.

Since 1988, 10 Husker gymnasts have earned CoSIDA Academic All-America recognition, while Nebraska boasts a nation-leading 326 Academic All-America honors across all sports.

Mary Ocel was the first NU gymnast to earn Academic All-America status, garnering third-team honors in 1988 with a 3.9 GPA. Jane Clemons earned a third-team spot in 1990 with a 3.663 GPA in addition to her Big Eight all-around title that year. In 1993 and 1994, Nicole Duval was named a third-team academic All-American before garnering first-team accolades as a senior, becoming the only Husker to ever earn the scholastic honor three times. Duval also became the first Husker gymnast to be named Nebraska's Female Student-Athlete of the Year in 1994-95.

Joy Taylor, the 1996 Academic All-American Gymnast of the Year, graduated with a 4.0 GPA in biological sciences in 1996. A two-time Academic All-America selection, she was the first Husker female gymnast to earn both athletic and academic All-America honors in the same season. Her teammate, Kim DeHaan, who was a first-team Academic All-America selection, followed in Taylor's footsteps by earning scholastic and athletic honors in the same season.

Bree Dority-O'Callaghan captured third-team Academic All-America and second-team All-America honors on the uneven bars in 2001. She graduated in August 2003 with degrees in economics and finance.

In 2002 and 2003, Jen French was named to the Academic All-America second team, while her teammate Libby Landgraf was named first-team Academic All-American in 2004, becoming the eighth honoree.

Richelle Simpson, who was NU's Female Student-Athlete of the Year in 2004-05, was named to the second team and earned a multitude of national awards in her junior and senior seasons, including the AAI Award and the NCAA Today's Top Ten Award.

Emily Wong is the most recent Husker to earn academic All-America honors, earning a second-team selection in 2013 and first team honors in 2014. An 11-time All-American in competition and Nebraska's second AAI Award winner, Wong capped one of the most successful senior seasons as a Nebraska gymnast in 2014. The Big Ten Gymnast of the Year collected numerous awards through her final season at Nebraska and earned her second CoSIDA Academic All-America award.

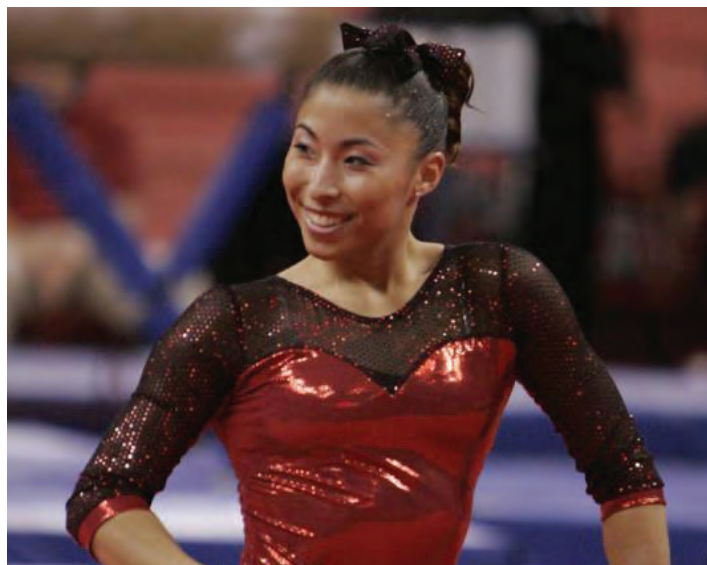
